I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Ashby the sum of two hundred and fifty pounds of like money to be paid unto him by my executor within twelve calendar months next after my decease.

To hold unto and to the use of my said son Joseph Ashby his heirs and assigns for ever from and immediately after my decease subject nevertheless and charged and chargeable as is hereinafter mentioned I give and bequeath all the rest and residue of my stock goods cattle chattels ready money debts owing and personal estate whatsoever and wheresoever not hereinbefore and hereinafter by me given and disposed of unto my said son Joseph Ashby. 5-Anna Ashby^{1,3,4} was born on 9 Dec 1760 in Shillingford, Warborough, Oxfordshire and died on 1 May 1843 in Uxbridge, Middlesex at age 82.

Anna married **John Hull**, ^{1,3,4} son of **Thomas Hull**⁵ and **Mary Cockbolt**, on 9 Nov 1780 in FMH Warborough. John was born on 17 Sep 1755 in Uxbridge, Middlesex and died on 14 Jun 1816 in Uxbridge, Middlesex at age 60. They had five children: **Thomas, Anna, Charlotte, Mary**, and **Jane**.

General Notes: He entered and extended the corn milling business started by his father. He married Anna Ashby (1759-1843) daughter of Robert Ashby of Shillingford. There was one son and four daughters. He was much loved in Uxbridge, having been a leading light in the Auxiliary Bible Society, having started many schools for industry and the poor, and having many friends in the Society of Friends. Became president of the free school on the resignation of Thomas Clarke in 1812. Expressed his intention of willing the interest on $\infty 600$ to the free school and the girls school, and although he did not incorporate this into his will, his widow saw that it was made good. Founded a school in Aylesbury on the Lancasterian model. He was regarded as the father of the auxiliary Bible Society in Uxbridge, formed in 1811. All the local churches participated in this and they were proud to say that none was excluded, and none excluded itself.

Visited Burton with Henry Hull from the US in 1811, to stay at John Yeardleys.

Thomas Scattergood's journal mentions going to Uxbridge to stay with his friend John Hull. The Hulls were also friendly with Elizabeth Fry and her family.

He died in Uxbridge in 1816, and he was eulogised in the 1818 Redford and Riches History of Uxbridge.

Henry was born on 4 May 1807 in Darlington, County Durham, died on 30 May 1881 in 23 Finsbury Square, London at age 74, and was buried on 3 Jun 1881 in FBG Skinnergate, Darlington, County Durham. They had one son: **Henry Fell**.

General Notes: HENRY PEASE (1807-1881), also entered with zeal into the railway projects of his father. His principal achievement was the opening in 1861 of the line across Stainmoor, called 'the backbone of England,' the summit of which is 1,374 feet above sea level. It joined at Tebay the London and North-Western railway, and was soon extended to Saltburn-on-Sea. In January 1854 Pease was deputed by the meeting for sufferings, held on the 17th of that month, to accompany Joseph Sturge and Robert Charleton as a deputation from the Society of Friends to Russia. It joined at Tebay the London and North Western Railway (LNWR), and was soon extended at its eastern limit to Saltburn-on-Sea. In January 1854 Pease was deputed by the meeting for sufferings, held on the 17th of that month, to accompany Joseph Sturge and Robert Charleton as a deputation from the Society of Friends to Russia. On 10 February they were received by the emperor Nicholas, and presented him with a powerful

He received them politely, but their efforts were unavailing, and Alexander William Kinglake ridiculed their action in his history of the campaign, Invasion of the Crimea (1863). Pease was MP for South Durham from 1857 to 1865. In 1867 he visited Napoleon III with a deputation from the Peace Society, but their request for permission to hold a peace congress during the Universal Exhibition in Paris was rejected.

Henry Pease married, on 25 February 1835, Anna, only daughter of Richard Fell of Uxbridge, who died on 27 October 1839, leaving a son, Henry Fell Pease, MP from 1885 for the Cleveland division of Yorkshire; second, on 19 January 1859, he married Mary, daughter of Samuel Lloyd of Wednesbury, with whom he had three sons and two daughters.

Henry Pease was chairman of the first Darlington school board in 1871, first mayor of the town, and president of the Peace Society from 1872. In the early 1860s, when negotiations were in hand for a takeover of the Stockton and Darlington Railway by the North Eastern Railway Company (NER), Pease declared his opposition to the merger, in spite of the generous terms on offer to his family as leading shareholders in the Stockton and Darlington Railway. Following the takeover, however, Pease's sensibilities were overcome by his appointment as vice-chairman of the NER board. It was in that capacity that he presided over the railway jubilee held at Darlington on 27 September 1875, at which eighty British and thirty foreign railways were represented. He was always a prominent member of the Religious Society of Friends. He died at 23 Finsbury Square, London, while attending the yearly meeting, on 30 May 1881, and was buried in the Quaker burial-ground at Darlington on 2 June. Schools and a library were presented by members of the Pease family to Darlington, which benefited greatly from their benevolence until 1902, when the family fortunes were destroyed irrevocably as a result of the collapse of J. and J. W. Pease, the family counting house and banker to leading industrial enterprises in the north-east of England.

Henry Pease, 74 30 5mo 1881

Darlington. An Elder.

With Henry Pease the last of a much beloved and honoured band sisters has passed away. He was the youngest of the eight children of Edward and Rachel Pease of Darlington. One after another he was called to part with these loved companions of his childhood and friends of his riper years, each becoming even dearer as the links on earth were made fewer by the gathering of the family band in the home above. And now that he also has gone to join the innumerable company of the redeemed, it may be useful to recall a little of the way in which he was led, until he too received the summons, 'Come up hither."

His mother was a valued minister in the Society of Friends, and his honoured father for many years held the station of Elder. The home in which he was brought up was therefore one in which the principles of Friends were strictly inculcated. But there was no gloom or austerity; on the contrary, a spirit of love and joyousness seemed to pervade that favoured household which was striking to all who were privileged to become acquainted with it. "Well can I recall the brilliant group of young people assembled there," writes one of the few, who can from personal knowledge speak of what it was. While thus there was no undue repression of natural talents and vivacity, there was the constant endeavour to keep all in subjection to the higher purposes of our existence; and their parents had the greatest joy that Christian parents can have> that of seeing their children in early life give their hearts to the Lord.

Their beloved mother was taken from them suddenly, while absent on a journey in 1833. The remembrance of her earnest prayers in the family circle, and the holy watchfulness of her life, was ever a stimulus and example to her children in their Christian course.

The exact age at which her youngest son made a definite surrender of his heart to God is not known, but it was a marked era which he could ever thankfully recall; and He who called him and gave him strength to make this blessed choice was with him, both as a young boy at school, and afterwards when working as an apprentice; so that his conscientious desire to do right, and his endeavour to help those younger and less experienced than himself, were marked at the time, and are still gratefully remembered.

But though his heart was fixed in the solemn determination to be the Lord's, and the sense of his Saviour's forgiving love was at times granted him, he was not without many secret conflicts. His attainments in the religious life did not keep pace with the ardent desires of his soul. In his journal he often records in touching terms his sense of failure and discouragement, but his Heavenly Father was leading him, and permitting this, and other severe discipline, to cause him to cling more closely to Him.

In 1835 he married Anna Fell, only daughter of Richard Fell, of Uxbridge. In a journal kept at intervals from this date for several succeeding years, we see with what deep seriousness and prayerfulness he entered upon this new phase of life. But this union which promised so much happiness was of short duration; after less than four years, marked by much anxiety on account of her declining health, his beloved wife was taken from him, while in the south of England, where she had gone soon after the birth of her child, in the hope that her native air might restore her.

Leaving his infant son in the loving care of his grandmother, Henry Pease returned to his now lonely home, to take np life's duties again. The spirit in which this was done may be seen from the following entry in his journal, taken from among many similar ones: -

"12th of Eleventh month, 1839.~The Lord on High only knows how I am bowed down under a multitude of besetments. I feel grateful that evening by evening He enables me to wait upon Him, to meditate on the Scriptures, and sometimes to pour out my troubles before Him on the bended knee; earnestly craving His sup-port to keep me watchful, humble, patient; in His own time to bless; and, if right, to permit me to promote His cause on the earth in such way as he may see best. Truly nothing seems so well worth our living for, as to tell of the good-ness of Him, who hath given and who continues to us all that we call good, and for which we must give account."

The prayer of his heart before this sorrow came, and to the close of life, was that he might be permitted to serve God, and do a little good to his fellow-men. This prayer was not perhaps answered quite in the way he expected; but that it was answered is apparent to all who can trace his course through life, as they see how, through much sense of shortcoming and many discouragements, he was led along, and enabled to lend a helping hand to almost every scheme in his own neighbourhood which had for its aim the benefit of others; while in his more public career, his voice and pen were always ready to take up the cause of right and justice.

When permitted to view a Christian's life from the commencement to the close, especially when privileged to know something of the secret communings of the soul, we see that the progress is a gradual one. The earnest desires are first given, then the watchful waiting, and the fervent prayers for strength and guidance.

Our dear friend at this period of his life set apart a short time every evening for reading the Scriptures, meditation, and prayer; and if for any reason this was omitted, he records in his journal that a sense of loss and weakness followed. The privilege of being thus permitted to pour out his troubles before the Lord, and seeking for strength and guidance in times of weakness and perplexity sustained him in the midst of many difficulties. But to approach God in prayer, either in private in the family, or on more public occasions, he always felt to be a most solemn act, needing help from above; and the deep reverence and earnestness of his manner when thus engaged will be remembered by all who heard him.

The way in which he sought for Divine guidance in every action of his life was strikingly shown when the question of entering Parliament was brought before him. In 1845 he was first asked to represent

the southern division of the county of Durham; and again in 1847 pressure was put upon him to induce him to be willing to come forward. He writes, Eighth month 4th, 1847:-

"My prayers have been night and day that I might be preserved out of anything not designed by my Creator; and inasmuch as no clear path appears to stand, I may safely conclude I have not sufficient warrant for a step involving so much."

It was not till the year 1857 that he felt the time had come to respond to the cordial invitation of his countrymen. These intervening years were much occupied in helping forward the extension of the railway system in his neighbour- hood. The personal planning and inspecting of the new lines, over, in some cases, a difficult country, suited his energetic and practical temperament. For eight years he attended Parliament with much diligence and faithfulness; but late hours and life in Town did not suit his health or tastes, and he was glad to retire in 1865, in the hope of being still enabled to serve his fellow men, though in a more private way.

To go back a little in point of time. In 1854 he was appointed, with his friends Joseph Sturge and Robert Charleton, by the "Meeting for Sufferings" in London, to present an address to the Emperor Nicholas of Russia, praying him to avert the war which was then impending in the Crimea. The story of this journey is so well told, both in J. Sturge's and Robert Charleton's memoirs, that it is not needful to recapitulate it here. Though it was not successful in attaining its object, and though much ridicule and opprobium were cast upon their mission, Henry Pease always felt thankful that he was permitted the honour and privilege of thus publicly avowing his detestation of war, and his willingness to make any sacrifice in the interests of peace. In 1867 he was again called to stand before an Emperor, to plead the same cause. On this occasion he was one of a deputation from the Peace Society, appointed to ask permission for a Peace Congress to be held in Paris, at the time of the International Exhibition in that city. The Emperor Napoleon III. received the deputation coldly but courteously, in a room in the Tuileries, but would not grant the desired permission.

In First month, 1859, Henry Pease married Mary Lloyd, daughter of Samuel Lloyd, of Wednesbury. This change in his life, and all the social and domestic enjoyments it brought him, did not cause him to relax in his earnest and prayerful desire to fulfil the many public and private duties that devolved upon him.

On leaving Parliament in 1865 he was glad to have more time to devote to the affairs of the little section of the Church to which he felt it a great privilege and responsibility to belong. He attended its meetings diligently, including the Yearly Meeting in London. His pertinent and practical remarks in the meetings for business were much valued, his long experience enabling him often to see the way out of a difficulty, or give the needed word of encouragement or warning. He felt that these meetings deserved the best he could give them of his time and thought.

On two occasions he was appointed by the Yearly Meeting on Committees to visit the Friends in Quarterly Meetings which needed help and advice. He much valued the intercourse this gave him with the friends associated with him in these services, and the kindness and love shown by those whom they visited was very cordial to him, and w r as ever gratefully remembered.

For many years he filled the station of Elder. He deeply felt the serious responsibility of this position, and endeavoured to watch over the Hock as one who must give an account; but the deep searchings of heart this caused him, the feelings of weakness and unworthiness that often bowed him down, were known only to Him to whom alone he could come for strength and guidance.

From the pressure of these numerous duties it was his great delight to break away for a few weeks for entire relaxation, when, alone with his wife, or accompanied by some of their children, he would intensely enjoy the beauties of nature, either on the Continent or in some favourite part of our own island. His heart was full of thank- fulness for these pleasures, and for the many blessings richly showered upon" his path during these later years. In reviewing some of these, he writes:- "They almost oppress my heart with gratitude to the great Giver."

Life had many attractions for him, and, his health in some respects improving with advancing age, there seemed every probability that many years might yet be before him. These hopes however were not to be realised.

In the early spring of 1879 he had a very serious illness, from which he never entirely rallied, though he recovered sufficiently to go to London to attend the Yearly Meeting of that year. In the spring of the following year a tour in Spain afforded him great enjoyment. His brightness and energy surprised his companions. He returned home decidedly improved in health, and again enjoyed meeting with his friends in their annual gathering. The summer was passed chiefly at Saltburn and Stanhope. Soon after returning to Pierremont in the autumn he took a severe chill, and a sharp attack of bronchitis very quickly reduced his strength. Though confined to the house during the long, cold winter, his hopefulness and cheerfulness never left him, and he had much quiet enjoyment.

As soon as the weather moderated, the desire of his heart was gratified in finding warmth and sunshine in the south of England. One of those who saw him says that his prized visit left a sense of the nearness of his spirit to his home above; and others remarked that his countenance was peaceful and heavenly.

On his return, a few weeks at his favourite house at Stanhope still further recruited him, so that he again looked forward with much pleasure to attending the Yearly Meeting. He left home on the 16th of Fifth month and settled in with some of his family at his accustomed quarters in Finsbury Square. The exertions however attendant on this journey proved too much for him; he became seriously ill, and his strength rapidly declined. There was little opportunity for expression during his short illness, but quietness and peace seemed to be the clothing of his mind. On being informed that the doctors considered his case a critical one, he showed no anxiety. His thoughtfulness for those around him and his quiet patience were very striking. Owing to the great heat of the weather the windows of his room were kept open, and the sounds of the great city filled the air; but though he had such an intense love for the stillness of the country, this did not seem to ruffle him, and he never expressed the least wish to be anywhere but where he was.

Peacefully, and almost painlessly, he sank into that last sleep, in which, on the evening of Second-day the 31st of Fifth month, his soul gently passed away, his wife and all his children being around him. His remains were laid in the quiet burial-ground behind the meeting-house at Darlington, amid a large concourse of his fellow-townsmen and others, many being the representatives of the Public Bodies in which he had been interested.

The following extract from his journal, written thirty-three years before, may appropriately close this short account of his active life:-

"Fourth month, 1849. - Engaged in planting trees in the addition just made to the burial- ground. The idea seemed touchingly to steal over the mind, that it was not improbable that many a glowing setting sun would cause the shade of these trees to lengthen out over the green mound where my mortal remains would be placed. But oh! if the genial influence of this glorious orb has been exchanged for that kingdom that needeth it not, because the Lamb is the light thereof, how unspeakably happy the exchange!"

30 May 1881, Mon: Another splendid day . The a/cs of Uncle Henry very low indeed. Went to the Gull Rock fishing John William Pease, Howard Fox, Ethel & Beatrice. I fished off the whelps most of the day for 10 pollock - came in about 8 o'clock – a better a/c of Alfred's quinsy & earache. Also a telegram, of Uncle Henry's death at about 5.30 this evening. It is sad & solemn thus to part with one so long so dear so mixed up with one's life! A very warm evening.

3 June 1881, Fri: To Darlington at 11 o'clock to attend Uncle Henry's funeral. To Pierremont, Minnie going to Southend; saw Henry Fell Pease, lunched with him and Lizzie; he showed me the only will they could find made 20 January 1859, the day after his last wedding as I read it - there will be much disappointment. To Pierremont [sic], a large crowd at the funeral, Minnie & I went in the same

carriage as Arthur & Mary. Bevan Braithwaite spoke at the grave side and at length, appropriately in the meeting house, Harrison, Penney well & briefly, back to Brinkburn and then to evening gathering at Pierremont. Tom Pease long & washy, Bevan Braithwaite I could not hear, Arthur & I said a few words and Theodore Fry engaged in prayer; broke up about 7.30 to 8.00, and dined & staid at Brinkburn, Henry & Wilson Lloyd there also.

Then to West Lodge where we were all photographed by Thompson, then came the dejeuner which was very handsomely done, although strictly teetotal, after it was done, I spoke on the Bride and Groom, after me Joseph Beaumont Pease in Lune diction on them, but touching, most touchingly, almost too much so on his own great loss of last autumn, this affecting spectacle stopped all others according to plan. Then came setting off the happy pair which was well done; after that I walked with John Fell and the two Fossicks round Southend. In the evening, everyone came to tea, and we stood and chatted; glad to get home, the happy pair left for York. E.A. Barclay came to it from Tynemouth.

Douglas James, along with the Pease's house (part of which was moved and serves as the University of Victoria's Student Health Services Centre). The tower originally had a tank on a raised platform. Letitia Jean Pease (née Brydges, 1878-1965) who was born in Londonderry Nova Scotia, and her husband Algernon Henry Pease (1882-1955), born in County Durham, England, named their property Hamsterley Farm, after Algernon's birthplace. Algernon came to Canada in 1907 and lived in Winnipeg briefy, where he married Letitia. Upon his arrival to Victoria, Algernon established a chicken farm at Strawberry Vale, which he sold soon after to engage in real estate. He bought this property and operated a strawberry jam factory on it. Strawberries fourished in Saanich and are an important local food product; a Strawberry Festival is still held annually in mid-July. The Peases were entrepreneurial, and in addition to their successful jammaking enterprise they made chocolates and candy, sold produce, owned a chicken farm and made home-made wine, which they marketed during Prohibition. After they sold this property, they opened the Hamsterley Tea Room on the Malahat, then Hamsterley Lakeside and later the Toby Jug at Elk Lake. Algernon was appointed an M.B.E. for his work in establishing the B.C. Salvage Corps in the Second World War. During the War, Letitia Pease was instrumental in starting 'Bundles for Britain,' which sent new and used clothing to those who had been bombed out in Britain. She also opened the Superfuities Shop, on Government Street in Victoria, where donations of valuables, to be sold for the war efort, were accepted. Pease Lake in Central Saanich was named after Algernon. From 1933 to 1946, Alice Maud Robertson of "The Spode Shop" (née Ferguson, 1877-1957), born in Glasgow, Scotland owned the property. She called the property Drummadoon, changed to Upper Drummadoon when her daughter's house, Lower Drummadoon, was built lower down the hill (see 2511 Sinclair Road). Alice, an antique dealer and her husband Frederi

" I worked on orchards both large and small: I seized hammer and saw and called myself a carpenter: I donned the white collar, and forthwith blossomed as a book-keeper. I was from month to month successively surveyor's assistant, packing house hand, and last, but decidedly not least, I was an honest navvy-as to the last calling, however, prompted no doubt by certain insular, and shall I say sub-conscious snobbishness, I took care to protect my caste by accepting employment only with a Government gang engaged on the building of immense stone walls for the purpose of preventing the erosion of a certain river bank. I therefore much prefer that this period of my career should come under the heading of 'Government official.' "In this connection it may possibly interest Old Boothamites when I say that, upon politely introducing myself to a bearded, and not too cleanly, fellow-worker, and when the usual formalities of polite small talk had been duly observed, I discovered him to be a school contemporary of mine- no, not at Bootham, but at St. Peters !-a decidedly interesting man, with a wife and small family, to whom the Okanagan apple had not at this stage brought any degree of wealth. We enjoyed much conversation when the foreman's back was turned and furtively when it was not: and I discovered that on the same construction gang were two other public school boys and ex-officers, who were also temporarily below par financially. I was also told that Archbishop Holgate's had a representative in Kelowna - to wit a certain piano tuner. . . . "Well, to continue: I soon realised that my activities, though healthful, were leading to nothing permanently worthwhile, so I applied for and secured a Government post as Assistant on a large salmon hatchery. ... "The hatchery is placed at a strategic point, adjacent both to the extensive fishing territory of British Columbia and to the native haunts of the soc-eye salmon, when spawning. Rivers Inlet is approximately 300 miles north of Vancouver and consists of a narrow arm of the sea terminating in a more or less turbulent river at the lower end of which stands the hatchery. Access is obtained only by water, there being no roads of any description. "The passage by coastal steamer from Vancouver was both picturesque and interesting and lay for the most part along narrow deep-sea channels between Vancouver Island and the mainland. Our boat called at numerous solitary saw-mills, logging camps, and fish canneries, and threaded its way around countless islands, timber clad and mountainous. "Arriving at Rivers Inlet, one noticed a cannery, post office and store, with a logging camp near by. The order of our going to the hatchery was as follows:-two miles up the river in an out-board motor boat to the beginning of the rapids; here everything transhipped to a Ford truck, then two miles along the roughest of forest trails till past the rapids, and lastly back into another motor-boat and so to the head of the lake and 'home.' "Here we are, then-and oh, the isolation! Hemmed in by water, mountains and forests: no walk owing to the denseness of the timber and undergrowth: the hills dip sheer down to the water, whilst the sceneryone of our few consolations - is magnificent. Our nearest neighbours are a few scattered Indians who trap and fish, whilst occcisionally an odd trapper or prospector visits the district. Mail by steamer once a week and fortnightly in winter. "No wonder that I regretfully said goodbye to my wife and son in Kelowna, with the hopes that the coming year would quickly pass and that my annual three weeks' leave would quickly come. "We are a friendly crowd here-seven of us with a superintendent at our head. Some have married quarters, but the rest of us feed and live together." I wish to thank several Old Scholars for kind remembrances of me on the Whitsuntide picture post-card." Bootham magazine - July 1930

The stranger possessed of an enquiring mind who studies the arrangement of school life at Bootham is struck with the vigour with which the boys pursue their various hobbies during out of school hours. Forty years ago the late Sir Joshua Fitch commented on the prominence given to the pursuit of science and natural history, and it is common knowledge that the school's Natural History Society is the oldest of its kind in existence. The wise policy of hobby-making never bore worthier fruit than in the work of the late Charles James Spence, who for four and a half years was a scholar in John Ford's time, and whose skill in water-colour painting received the encouragement and assistance of Edwin Moore, of whom he always spoke in terms of warm regard. The singularly choice collection of water-colour drawings and etchings selected from the vast quantity of fine work he left behind him, arranged by his eldest son, Robert Spence, and shown in the Academy of Arts, in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, came as a glad surprise even to many of those who were privileged to know him intimately: for he was a man who shrank from publicity, though he never failed in the performance of what he felt to be his duty, even if, as sometimes was the case, it jarred on his highly strung and sensitive nature. In looking around the walls on the exquisite collection of n g water-colour sketches and 57

etchings, one regretted that all old York Scholars had not the same privilege. It seemed a fitting tribute to his favourite leisure pursuit, and en-abled one to realize how deep the pleasure of his art must have been from boyhood in the making of such delightful transcripts of nature. Norway, Switzerland, Ireland, some of the choicest of Italian scenes, and above all the North Country- on all he levied toll, and with unvarying success. One noticed with pleasure three etchings of Bootham, which were reproduced in the sketch of the history of the School written by John Stephenson Rowntree, and read at the Jubilee Commemoration Meeting, January 30th, 1879. Another group of etchings was of special local interest, being the beautiful series of scenes on the line of the Roman Wall, published in the handbook written by the late Dr. John Collingwood Bruce, F.S.A. Charles James Spence was a man with many- sided gifts. As a banker, he held a high place in the esteem of the commercial community of the busy city of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, in which his business hours were spent. As an Antiquary, his labours as one of the curators of the Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle-upon-Tyne were keenly appreciated by those who knew the wide and accurate range of his knowledge. As chairman of the Free Library Committee in his native town of North Shields, and as Honorary Treasurer of the Literary and Philosophical Society of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, he rendered valuable aid, for he was a keen lover of interesting books and manuscripts. He was the owner, among other treasures, of George Fox's Journal, which his eldest son, Robert Spence, has lent on certain conditions to the Devonshire House Library of the Society of Friends. For the breezy conflicts of political life he had no great liking, but his life-long attachment to Liberal institutions and principles induced him to perform most effective, if sometimes unseen, service for the party. To those who knew him intimately it was a delightful nature that was revealed: a keen sense of humour,

In connection with his business interests he is a member of the National Laundry Owners Association.

John W. Macy Jr., a former chairman of the United States Civil Service Commission and a career public servant for more than 30 years, died of a heart ailment Monday at his home in McLean, Va. He was 69 years old.

Mr. Macy's career as a top official in Federal Government service spanned the administrations of five Presidents, starting with Dwight D. Eisenhower and ending with Jimmy Carter. In that period, the only Presidential Administration he did not serve was that of Gerald R. Ford.

Mr. Macy was credited, particularly in the Johnson Administration, with upgrading the Civil Service to attract a greater share of the nation's most talented managers and thinkers.

He was named chairman of the Civil Service Commission by President Kennedy in 1961 and remained as its head to the end of the Johnson Administration in 1969. He was the commission's executive director from 1953 to 1958, in the Eisenhower Administration. Johnson's 'Talent Scout'

President Johnson, who called Mr. Macy "my talent scout" for major appointments, said the commission chairman was "the best there is." Johnson relied heavily on Mr. Macy, who would provide the President with a list of three or four suggested names for a top job, along with an evaluation of each. The names were usually drawn from a file kept by Mr. Macy of some 20,000 highly qualified potential appointees.

In 1969, with President Nixon in office, Mr. Macy became the first president of the newly formed Corporation for Public Broadcasting, whose function was to funnel Federal funds to public television and radio broadcasting stations and programs. Three years later he was forced out of the post in a dispute with the Nixon Administration on the future direction and financing of public broadcasting.

His final tour in Federal service came in the Carter Administration when Mr. Macy was named director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. After leaving Government at the end of President Carter's term in 1980, Mr. Macy served in a variety of consulting jobs.

John Williams Macy Jr. was born in Chicago on April 6, 1917. After graduating from the North Shore Country Day School in Winnetka, Ill., he entered Wesleyan University in Middletown, Conn. Upon graduation, in 1938, he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and was a Rhodes Scholar nominee. Enlistment in Army

That same year, he embarked on his Government career as an intern of the National Institute of Public Affairs, going on from there to personnel posts with the Social Security Board and the War Department before enlisting in the Army Air Force in World War II as a private. He served in the China theater and rose to the rank of captain.

Mr. Macy returned to government after the war, serving in personnel and management posts with the Atomic Energy Commission and the Department of the Army before being named in 1953 as executive director of the Civil Service Commission, then the highest nonappointive position in the Civil Service.

Mr. Macy is survived by his wife, the former Joyce Hagen; two sons, Thomas L. of McLean and Richard H. of New York City; two daughters, Mary D. Macy of Nantucket, Mass., and Susan Jarvinen of Denver, and a brother, Francis U. Macy of Skaneateles, N.Y.

Frederick was born on 30 Mar 1812 in Westminster, London, died on 22 Oct 1855 in Staines, Middlesex at age 43, and was buried in Brompton Cemetery, London. They had two children: (**No Given Name**) and (**No Given Name**).

General Notes: Became a Catholic in 1839. Frederick Lucas (30 March 1812 - 22 October 1855) was a British religious polemicist and founder of The Tablet.

He was born in Westminster, the second son of Samuel Hayhurst Lucas, a London corn-merchant, who was a member of the Society of Friends. He was educated at a Quaker school in Darlington, and then at University College, London. He studied law at Middle Temple, and was called to the bar in 1835.

Lucas was a Quaker convert to Catholicism.

In 1840, Lucas founded The Tablet, published in London, a progressive international Catholic weekly newspaper, just 11 years before the restoration of the Catholic hierarchy in England and Wales. It is the second oldest surviving weekly journal in Britain after The Spectator (which was founded in 1828). It has an international readership of over 55,000.

After establishing the Irish Tenant Right League with Charles Gavan Duffy in 1850, he was elected as Member of Parliament (MP) for Meath in 1852. After failing in a complaint-mission to Rome on behalf of the league, Lucas died in October 1885 at Staines, Middlesex, and is buried in Brompton Cemetery, London.

Lucas, Frederick (1812–1855), journalist and politician, born in Westminster, London, on 30 March 1812, was the son of Samuel Hayhurst Lucas (d. in or after 1840), a corn merchant in the City of London, and a member of the Religious Society of Friends. Samuel Lucas (1811–1865) was his elder brother. After spending eight years in a Quaker school at Darlington, he became, in his seventeenth year, a student at the London University, then recently established. He took a leading part in almost every discussion in the college debating club, or Literary and Philosophical Society. At this period the Roman Catholic claims were the principal topic of discussion, and he eagerly espoused the cause of emancipation, and devoted much attention to Irish politics. When he left the university, which had not then the power to confer degrees, he took up the study of the law, first in the chambers of Revell Phillips, and afterwards in those of Duval. He was called to the bar at the Middle Temple in 1835.

In 1838 Lucas delivered two lectures on education in the Literary and Scientific Institution at Staines. In these lectures, which excited some attention at the time, and were afterwards published, he bestowed his warmest sympathies on the feudal and Catholic spirit of medieval Christendom. Early in 1839, in the course of some conversations with Thomas Chisholm Anstey, he was led seriously to examine the doctrines of Roman Catholicism, and in less than a week he was reconciled to the Roman church by Father Lythgoe SJ. He forthwith published a pamphlet entitled Reasons for Becoming a Roman Catholic, Addressed to the Society of Friends (1839). This offended many of his former acquaintances, but later his wife and two of his brothers followed him into the Roman communion, and he maintained an intimacy with many persons of opposite and irreconcilable views and principles. The most conspicuous of these, outside the Catholic body, were John Stuart Mill and Thomas Carlyle. On 5 August 1840 he married Elizabeth Skidmore, daughter of William Ashby of Staines, Middlesex; they had two sons.

About this time Lucas wrote for the Dublin Review, and acquired a literary reputation which made his co-religionists desirous that he should be permanently engaged in the support of their cause. With the aid of some wealthy Catholics he was enabled to start The Tablet, a weekly London newspaper, the first number of which appeared on 16 May 1840. In conducting this journal he advocated the most advanced ultramontane and pro-Irish opinions with such zeal and occasional asperity of language that he soon found himself in opposition to powerful sections of his own religious community. An attempt to force his removal as editor in 1842 led him to start a rival journal, the True Tablet, which won the support of other English Catholics and of Daniel O'Connell and triumphed over its opponent, resuming the name of The Tablet in 1843. He identified himself with the Irish national movement and supported O'Connell in his demand for repeal of the Union. Towards the end of 1849 he moved the publishing offices of The Tablet to Dublin.

Lucas became an Irish political figure, leading in the foundation of the tenant-right agitation in 1850 and of the Independent Irish Party in 1851. In 1852 he was returned to parliament as one of the members for the county of Meath. He soon became a prominent debater in the House of Commons, and by his ability and evident sincerity, even when urging unpopular opinions, he gained the respect of many of his opponents. In 1853, when dissensions arose among the tenant-right party, Dr Cullen, archbishop of Dublin, and some other bishops prohibited the priests in their dioceses from interfering in political affairs. Lucas denounced in The Tablet this action of the archbishop, and determined to appeal from the episcopal decision to the Holy See. In the autumn of 1854 he started on a mission to Rome. He had two

interviews with Pope Pius IX, at whose suggestion he began to write a full 'Statement' of the condition of affairs in Ireland and of the questions at issue between himself and Dr Cullen. In May 1855, his health having broken down, Lucas returned to England, so altered in appearance that when he presented himself at the House of Commons the doorkeepers did not know him. He stayed with friends and relatives, and finally moved to the house of his brother-in-law at Staines, where he died of heart disease on 22 October 1855. He was buried in Brompton cemetery on 27 October. Lucas's 'Statement' was not quite completed at the time of his death. This document occupies more than 300 pages in the second volume of Lucas's Life by his brother Edward. About six months after his death the 'Statement' was presented to the pope. It failed to achieve its object.

He took firstclass honours in the London BS examination and, though he took the Fellowship in the same year and intended to practise surgery, he proceeded to the MD two years later. From 1899 to 1902 he served as a civil surgeon with the South African Field Force, winning the Queen's Medal with seven clasps. On his return to England he was elected assistant surgeon at the Great Northern Hospital and soon afterwards assistant surgeon to St Mary's, where he duly became lecturer in surgery, surgeon, and consulting surgeon, and was elected a governor and vice-president of the Hospital. He first came into prominence by his remarkable operative treatment of upper-arm palsy in children, reported jointly with Wilfred Harris, MRCP, at the annual meeting in 1903 of the British Medical Association. Basing his surgery on the latest physiological researches of Sherrington, Ballance, and others, he successfully undertook cross-union of the nerve roots. During the war he served as a temporary colonel, Army Medical Service, having been commissioned captain à la suite on the formation of the Royal Army Medical Corps (Territorial Force) on 6 December 1908. He was at the Dardanelles and in Egypt as consulting surgeon to the troops in the Mediterranean, was mentioned in despatches and created a Companion of the Bath (military division) in 1916. Low was consulting surgeon to several cottage hospitals and chief consulting surgeon to the London Midland and Scottish Railway. He was an active member of the Court of the Royal Sea-bathing Hospital at Margate. At the University of London he served in the Senate and was an examiner in surgery; he also examined for the Universities of Cambridge and Liverpool. At the Royal College of Surgeons he served on the Court of Examiners, of which he became chairman, from 1918 to 1928, and on the board of examiners in dental surgery 1921-23. He was a member of Council from 1916 to 1933, and vice-president in 1928 and 1929. He joined the Society of Apothecaries in 1914, becoming a Warden, a position to which he had just been re-elected at the time of his death. He was an active attendant at medical societies, becoming president 1919 and a trustee of the Medical Society of London, and president of the Royal Society of Medicine in 1932, having already been president of the section of surgery 1927-28. He also served on the council of King Edward's Hospital Fund for London. Low married in 1902 Mabel, eldest daughter of John Ashby, JP, of The Close, Staines. Mrs Low was a distinguished painter. She survived him with four sons and two daughters; their youngest son rowed in the Oxford boat in 1930. Low practised at 76 Harley Street, and died on 2 September 1942, aged 74, having been for some years crippled with arthritis. He was buried at Golders Green and a memorial service was held at St Mary's Hospital Chapel on 5 September. Mrs Low wrote a memoir of her husband (see below), she herself died on 18 July 1947. Low was an excellent general surgeon and a sound man of affairs. Of strong conservative opinions, he was tolerant and courteous, and a most loyal friend. Portly and rubicund, he was a centre of good talk at many medical gatherings, and even when severely crippled he retained his cheerful affability. He was a keen promoter of the social side of professional life, and compiled an account of the College Council Club, which he had managed with great success for many years. In freemasonry he was a past-master of the Sancta Maria Lodge at St Mary's Hospital and a member of the United Grand Lodge of England.

In 1886 the Staines brewery became a private company, and in 1890, when Ashby was sixteen, his father settled in Rome, there to become an enthusiastic explorer of the Campagna and an associate of Rodolfo Lanciani. Learning and enthusiasm won Ashby a scholarship at Christ Church, Oxford, where he was a pupil of Francis John Haverfield and John Linton Myres; he was awarded a first-class degree in classical moderations (1895) and in literae humaniores (1897).

In 1897 Ashby was awarded a Craven fellowship, thereafter devoting himself to studies of Roman antiquities, on which he obtained the Oxford degree of DLitt (1905) and the Conington prize for classical learning (1906). His first article, 'The true site of Lake Regillus', was published in 1898. At this time the city of Rome was being transformed by a series of excavations: renewed work on the Roman forum had commenced in 1898 under Giacomo Boni. Ashby wrote a regular series of reports on these developments, which appeared in the Classical Review (1899–1906), and subsequently in The Times, the Times Literary Supplement, and the Antiquaries Journal (1921–5, 1930).

Ashby was the first student of the British School at Rome, enrolling in January 1902, under Gordon McNeil Rushforth, its first director. In the same year he was elected a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries and appointed honorary librarian of the school. Following Rushforth's early retirement due to ill health Ashby was appointed assistant director (1903) under Henry Stuart Jones. When Stuart Jones had to retire due to ill health (1905) Ashby continued as assistant director until 1906 when he was appointed director, a position he held until 1925. His first assistant director was

Augustus Moore Daniel, who subsequently became director of the National Gallery in London. Ashby's position at the school was not always secure but it was strengthened in 1909 by the appointment of Eugénie Strong as assistant director, who in effect served as hostess for the school, extending its influence in Roman society.

At this period foreign archaeologists were not permitted to excavate in Italy. This led to an emphasis on topographical and museum studies. Ashby himself produced a series of detailed topographical studies of the Roman roads of Italy, which were brought together in the valuable work The Roman Campagna in classical times (1927); this was republished in 1970 with an Italian edition in 1982. A second strand of Ashby's research was on the aqueducts of the city of Rome: his first study was published in the Classical Review (1900).

Ashby became a master of Rome's urban topography, and derived from early literature and prints a unique knowledge of the vicissitudes of the city's monuments and artistic treasures. While the former mastery was evinced by articles eventually running into hundreds, the latter was demonstrated by his treatment of such varied themes as Eufrosino della Volpaia's map of the Campagna (1547), the sixteenth-century architectural drawings of Antonio Labacco, the topographical studies of Étienne du Pérac (1581), Giovanni Battista de'Cavalieri's Antiquae statuae urbis Romae, and the Windsor Castle, Soane Library, and Eton College collections of drawings and paintings.

Ashby gained experience of excavation at the Roman town of Caer-went in south Wales through the encouragement and support of Haverfield. This project, initiated by the Clifton Antiquarian Club, was organized under the title of the Caerwent Exploration Fund (1899–1910, 1913), with Lord Tredegar as its president. Ashby worked with Alfred E. Hudd and A. Trice Martin, an assistant master at Clifton College, and he contributed to the annual reports which were published in Archaeologia (1901–7, 1909–11).

Ashby sought to make the British School at Rome a focus for archaeological research in the western Mediterranean. Duncan Mackenzie, who had been working with Arthur Evans at Knossos, was appointed an associate student of the British School. Ashby and Mackenzie visited Sardinia together in June 1906, and later that summer presented a joint paper on the ethnology of the island to the British Association for the Advancement of Science meeting in York. This area of research was brought to a close in 1909 when Mackenzie returned to the eastern Mediterranean to work for the Palestine Exploration Fund. Ashby returned to Sardinia in 1912. Attention then turned to the British islands of Malta and Gozo which offered possibilities for research on the prehistory of the Mediterranean. He was joined for the 1905– 6 session by Thomas Eric Peet. Ashby made a series of visits to Malta in 1908 and 1909. In 1910 and 1911 he returned with Peet to excavate the sites of Hagiar-Kim and Mnaidra.

In 1912, with the support of the British ambassador, Sir Rennell Rodd, it was decided to expand and relocate the British School at Rome to a new, permanent building in the Valle Giulia, designed by Lutyens. This expansion allowed the school to embrace not only archaeology but also art and architecture when it moved to the new premises in 1915. During the First World War Ashby, with his Quaker leanings, volunteered for service in the first British Red Cross ambulance unit (1915). Though criticized for not fighting in the trenches, and asked to return to Rome where Mrs Strong was trying to run the school, he continued to serve initially as translator in the unit which was based at the Villa Trento near Udine, and was mentioned in dispatches for his intrepidity on the Asiago plateau while working with the Red Cross. Following the Italian defeat at Caporetto, Ashby served at the British Red Cross headquarters in Genoa from late 1917 to spring 1918. He then moved to Rome and undertook a role as an education officer, lecturing on ancient Rome to the troops.

Ashby resumed his role as director of the school in spring 1919. One of the immediate tasks was to resume, with Eugénie Strong, the school's work on the sculpture catalogue initiated by Stuart Jones. Ashby returned to Malta in March 1921 to work with Themistocles Zammit at Hal-Tarxien; the work was published in the Antiquaries Journal (1924). Ashby continued his interest in prehistory by collaborating with Peet and H. Thurlow Leeds on an essay on the western Mediterranean for the Cambridge Ancient History (1924). On his return from Malta, in spring 1921, Ashby met Caroline May, eldest daughter of Richard Price-Williams, civil engineer, who had been working in the school library; she was a cousin of Walter Ashburner, an old friend of Ashby's who had links with the British Institute at Florence. They married on 20 July 1921; there were no children.

Ashby feared that Eugénie Strong would resent losing her role as hostess at the school, and indeed relations between them became strained. In 1924 the school's executive committee decided to renew both appointments for just one more year (when Mrs Strong would be sixty-five, and could be retired). The news was met with shock: Rennell Rodd reported in late November 1924: almost everyone I meet deplores the decision ... In spite of Ashby's eccentricities he had the regard of all the Italian archaeologists and they are all very much upset at his going. In his own particular line he is considered one of the greatest authorities and his collections and maps which have been at the disposal of students are almost unique in their way. (Hodges, 79)

In 1925 Ashby, who settled in Rome, set himself to complete three standard works: a valuable revision of the second part of W. J. Anderson and R. P. Spiers, The architecture of Greece and Rome (1927), first published in 1902; a thoroughly revised edition of Samuel B. Platner's Topographical dictionary of ancient Rome (1929); and Ashby's own The aqueducts of ancient Rome, a work of lasting value, published posthumously under the guidance of Ian Richmond in 1935. Ashby lectured in Australia (following up a first visit made in 1914), and in 1926 he embarked on a lecture tour of North America in conjunction with the Archaeological Institute of America. He also completed Some Italian scenes and festivals (1929), a work dedicated to his wife; it appeared in a revised edition as Sagre e feste d'Abruzzo (1995).

Ashby was a member of the German Archaeological Institute (1913), of the Pontificia Accademia Romana d'Archeologia (1914); a foreign member of the Reale Accademia dei Lincei (1918); an honorary associate of the Royal Institute of British Architects (1922); an honorary member of the Reale Accademia di San Luca (1925); and a fellow of the Reale Società Romana di Storia Patria (1923), and of the British Academy (1927). His figure was stocky, his head tall and forceful, with a neat beard first red and later white. He spoke equally brusque English and Italian; John Ward-Perkins recalled a 'flow of impeccably idiomatic Italian spoken in an accent which to his dying day remained obstinately British' (Hodges, 6). He was shy with strangers, blunt with acquaintances, and devoted to his friends.

Ashby's health seems to have been in decline—one symptom was a deterioration in his eyesight. In 1930 he was elected to a senior research studentship at Christ Church, Oxford. He returned to England to fulfil the residence requirements and on his way to Oxford, on the morning of 15 May 1931, he fell from the Southampton to Waterloo train between New Malden and Raynes Park, Surrey. The post-mortem revealed that he had an enlarged brain tumour, and although there was a suspicion of suicide an open verdict was recorded. He was cremated and the ashes were interred at St Margaret's Bay in Kent, a place of which R. R. Campbell recalled that Ashby 'was almost as fond as of his own beloved Rome' (Smith, 521).

On 6 May 1890 he married Esther Maria Coleman; they had two sons and two daughters.

There were three main facets to Ashby's life: his work as a land and estate agent, his passionate interest in natural history, and his involvement with the Society of Friends. Having failed at wattle-bark-growing in the South-East, about 1890 he joined a cousin's firm of land and estate agents and financiers; later, as Saunders & Ashby, they owned much of Eden Hills, which they largely developed. In 1902 the Ashbys moved to Blackwood in the Adelaide hills and established the property, Wittunga, in virgin bushland. He retired in 1914 but continued an independent business from his home. In 1918 he visited North America.

Ashby was an avid collector of birds, butterflies and other insects, shells (particularly chitons) and plants. A critical observer, with infectious enthusiasm, he wanted to share each new discovery. He published over eighty papers in ornithology alone, and named or discovered several new birds. But his most outstanding contributions were on chitons, recent and fossil, on which he was a world authority, discovering over twenty new taxa. His collection, presented to the South Australian Museum in 1932, was considered the best of its kind.

Wittunga began as a formal English gentleman's garden, but as Ashby became increasingly fascinated by Australian native flora, he specialized in its cultivation, collecting numerous plants from the bush throughout Australia. He experimented with methods of cultivation and evolved the 'Ashby system' of watering, giving plants a soaking every three to four weeks instead of the usual light surface watering. Speaking and writing often, he introduced many Australians to their unique flora. A 1934 bushfire burnt part of Wittunga garden, gutted the house and destroyed many of his records and collections. Fortunately many bird-skins and chitons were in the Museum, but material burnt included some 'type' specimens. At 73 he could not rebuild these, but instead enlarged his horticultural interests by establishing an Australian native-plant nursery; over 300 tried and proven species were offered cheaply. An enlightened conservationist, he worked to preserve wildlife reserves such as Flinders Chase, and was a prime mover in securing Chauncy's Line Reserve.

For many years Ashby was one of the Quakers' most widely known members, speaking at public meetings and on the radio, and writing to the press on such issues as peace and temperance. His life exemplified his belief: 'Six working days are a better index of what we are than one Sunday'.

A member of many learned and scientific organizations, Ashby was elected a fellow of the Linnean Society of London and a corresponding fellow of the American Ornithologists' Union. He was a council-member of the Royal Society of South Australia in 1900-19, and president of the Royal Australasian Ornithologists' Union in 1926. He died at Wittunga on 8 January 1941, and was interred in the Friends' Burial Ground, West Terrace, Adelaide. His daughter Alison was a distinguished collector and painter of Australian flora. His garden has been preserved by the gift of his son Keith and his family, who in 1965 donated 35 acres (14 ha) to the Board of Governors of the Botanic Garden, Adelaide.

Noted events in his life were:

- He emigrated to Australia.
- He worked as an Australian property developer and a noted amateur malacologist and ornithologist.

Edwin married **Esther Maria Coleman**, ^{151,167} daughter of **Arthur Coleman** and **Lucy May**, ^{49,167} on 6 May 1890 in FMH Mount Barker, Australia. Esther was born on 20 Nov 1867 and died on 11 Dec 1943 in Blackwood, South Australia at age 76. They had four children: **Ivan Edwin, Arthur Keith, Gwyneth Sterry**, and **Alison Marjorie**.

- 9-Dr. Ivan Edwin Ashby¹⁶⁷ was born on 17 Feb 1893 in 'Trumara', 48 Melbourne St, North Adelaide, South Australia and died on 2 Aug 1920 in Adelaide, South Australia at age 27.
- 9-Arthur Keith Ashby¹⁶⁷ was born on 13 Oct 1896 in 'Trumara', 48 Melbourne St, North Adelaide, South Australia and died on 29 Dec 1971 in Blackwood, South Australia at age 75.

Arthur married **Edith Mary Walker**, ¹⁶⁷ daughter of **Joseph Walker** and **Charlotte Edmunds**, on 9 Nov 1921 in FMH Melbourne, Australia. Edith was born on 19 May 1896 in Riverdale, Yinnar, Victoria, Australia. (10 May 1896 also given) and died on 23 Jun 1947 in Blackwood, South Australia at age 51. They had four children: **Hazel Gwenyth, Enid Lucy, Eric Ivan**, and **Alison Beth**.

Hazel married **Prof. Sir Michael Francis Addison Woodruff**, ¹⁶⁷ son of **Harold Addison Woodruff** and **Margaret Adah Cooper**, on 12 Jun 1946 in Adelaide, South Australia. Michael was born on 3 Apr 1911 in Mill Hill, London and died on 10 Mar 2001 in Edinburgh, Midlothian, Scotland at age 89. They had three children: **Keith Sterry Addison, Geoffrey H. A.**, and **Margaret**.

General Notes: SIR MICHAEL FRANCIS ADDISON WOODRUFF

Michael Woodruff, one of the pioneers in transplantation, performed the first successful kidney transplant in the UK in 1960. But in addition he was a true surgeon scientist, who made many major contributions to transplantation biology. These included studies of the immuno- suppressive activities and mechanisms of action of antilymphocyte sera, tolerance induction and mechanisms of tissue allograft rejection. He was a lateral thinker, a trait he displayed from his earliest days, and not least during his three and a half years as a prisoner of war in the notorious Japanese prisoner-of-war camp at Changi.

EARLY YEARS

Michael Woodruff was born in Mill Hill in London but at the age of two years he was taken to Melbourne when his father, Harold, was appointed Professor of Veterinary Pathology and Director of the Veterinary Institute at the University of Melbourne. His father was Professor of Veterinary Medicine at the Royal Veterinary College in London at the time, and Michael Woodruff admits to have been continually amazed in later life that his father gave up a secure chair in London for a post in the antipodes, presumably because of a sense of adventure. Later his father was to become Professor of Bacteriology, also in the University of Melbourne. At the outbreak of World War I his father was commissioned in the Australian Army Veterinary Corps and sent to Egypt, and Michael and his younger brother were taken back to London by their mother and lived with her mother in Finchley.

In 1915 Michael had an otitis media as a complication of measles, and his mother, who was nursing him, developed a staphylococcal septicaemia and died, leaving the two little boys motherless. He and his brother returned to Melbourne on a troop ship, cared for by an aunt, Elsie Cooper, while their father returned at about the same time but separately in 1917. Michael had few memories of those early childhood years but did have clear memories of the Zeppelin air raids on London! In 1919 his father married again and their stepmother was to become a much-loved mother to the two boys. Michael and his brother were sent to Trinity Grammar School for their early schooling. Then in 1924 he and his brother spent a year as boarders at Queen's College in Taunton, Somerset, while their father was on sabbatical leave at the Pasteur Institute in Paris. Michael does not recall his time at Taunton with any pleasure for the headmaster (as he told his father) believed that 'colonial boys were backward' and as a result Michael had been placed in a class far below what would have been appropriate.

Despite the virtual loss of an educational year they did have a marvellous summer holiday in Paris with their father. On return to Melbourne Michael went to Wesley College, a Methodist Public School, for his secondary education. This he found to be a stimulating environment and his love of mathematics developed there and continued for the rest of his life. He also became a keen rower and would have stayed on for an extra year with the hope of getting into the first crew if he had not won a senior government scholarship to the University of Melbourne and a scholarship to Queen's College, a residential college of the university.

UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE

Because of his enjoyment of mathematics he enrolled not only for the four-year engineering course but also for an honours course in mathematics, beginning in 1929. His tutor at Queen's was Harrie (later Sir Harrie) Massey (FRS 1940), a young physicist who later became Professor of Physics at University College London and Physical Secretary of the Royal Society. Although he enjoyed his studies, by the end of the third year he was doubtful about the future for a young engineer in an Australia that was in the midst of a deep recession, and decided to switch to medicine. Although his parents were supportive they felt that he should finish his engineering degree before embarking on medicine. This he did and finished top of the year with first-class honours. Furthermore he completed two years of the mathematics course, also with first-class honours. While in Queen's he became interested in the organ in the chapel, to which he had easy access, and decided to learn the instrument properly. He became a pupil of Dr A. E. Floyd, the distinguished organist and chorister of St Paul's Cathedral, and later was to become the college organist at Queen's College.

In 1933 he embarked on his medical course; his teachers included the renowned Professor of Anatomy, Frederic Wood Jones FRS, the Professor of Pathology, Professor Peter MacCallum, Dr Rupert Willis, who later was to turn his lecture notes into the classical text- book of the time in pathology, and a surgeon and lecturer in pathology, Mr E. S. J. King, later to become Professor of Pathology in succession to Professor MacCallum. In 1934 the Royal College of Surgeons of England held the primary FRCS exam in Melbourne (it then being possible to do this as a student), and Woodruff was one of four who passed. He graduated in medicine in 1937 with honours and won both the Beaney and Ryan prizes in surgery.

After graduation he became house surgeon at the Royal Melbourne Hospital to Mr E. S. J. King, an honorary consultant surgeon who not only lectured in pathology but was also the only surgeon who engaged in serious research. This obviously influenced Woodruff's decision to pursue an academic career as well as a career in surgery. He did a further year of internal medicine on the advice of Sir Sidney Sewell, under whom he had served as a house physician, took his MD by exam and then embarked on his surgical training.

MILITARY SERVICE AND CHANGI PRISONER-OF-WAR CAMP

Just as Woodruff embarked on his surgical career, war had broken out in Europe and although he was a pacifist in his student days the evil of Hitler led him to enrol in the Australian Army Medical Corps. He was advised that he would be more useful in the army if he had a higher surgical degree and as he had passed the primary exam of Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons as a student, he was able to take the second part of the Master of Surgery degree of the University of Melbourne (the second part of the FRCS had to be taken in London, and at that time that was impossible). He was successful and was then posted to the 10th Australian Army General Hospital in Malaya as a Captain in the Australian Army Medical Corps.

Life in Malacca in the 10th Army General Hospital was, for a few months, allegedly that of a lotus land with a mixture of tennis, gin slings and just enough work to keep him interested. However, after the bombing of Pearl Harbor life changed rapidly. He was posted to a casualty clearing station in Malaya, where he was engaged in giving anaesthetics and assisting at major operations; it should be remembered that at this time he had little actual surgical experience. He was then moved across the causeway into the Singapore General Hospital under the command of Albert Coates, later to become a famous plastic surgeon in Melbourne. Shortly afterwards the allied troops had surrendered to the Japanese, and Woodruff and his medical colleagues with their patients were marched to the Changi prisoner-of-war camp to join some 55000 other Australian and British troops as prisoners of war (POWs).

In Changi there was not enough work to occupy all the surgeons, particularly one as junior as Woodruff. However, he realized that malnutrition, and especially vitamin deficiency, was likely to be a major problem on the meagre rations they were allocated. Thus he successfully sought permission to be the person responsible not only for the care of prisoners with deficiency diseases but also for developing methods of avoiding the inevitable vitamin deficien- cies. This involved using rice polishings, husks, dead weevils and extracts rich in riboflavin made from literally tons of grass that they would harvest each day (figure 1). A report on this outstanding work was published by the Medical Research Council (MRC) after the war (25)*. Later during his three and a half years as a POW he was sent as a surgeon to look after POWs in outlying camps and because these prisoners were not allowed to be sent back to Changi for treatment he had to do everything on the spot as best he could. This even included the suc- cessful use of hypnosis in the absence of chloroform (2).

Of particular note to his future career was that in the camp they had a copy of Maingot's textbook of surgery (Maingot 1936). As a young trainee surgeon no doubt he spent a lot of time devouring everything in the book, but he recalls in his memoirs that he read with interest that skin allografts were accepted initially but later rejected after a couple of weeks, and allegedly decided then to investigate this phenomenon if he ever left Changi.

Woodruff is extremely reticent about his time in Changi even in his autobiography, in contrast to the accounts of other POWs such as Sir Edward (Weary) Dunlop and Sir Albert Coates. His reminiscences are very matter-of-fact accounts of his activities, with barely a mention of any interaction with his captors. Nevertheless although he says little, it is of interest that years later when he was visiting William Longmire's department at University of California, Los Angeles, a young scientist working in the department, Paul Terasaki, was asked to take him to dinner by his chief. Terasaki recalls how innocently he took him to a Japanese restaurant, not knowing of Woodruff's time as a Japanese POW. Woodruff politely suggested that he would prefer to eat elsewhere!

RETURN TO MELBOURNE

Woodruff returned to Melbourne in 1945, anxious to resume his surgical training. No doubt this was a very competitive arena, with many young budding surgeons returning from the war on top of the more recent graduates seeking a surgical post. However, he was fortunate to be appointed as a Surgical Associate to Albert Coates, who had just rejoined the staff of the Royal Melbourne Hospital. As this was an unpaid post he took a part-time lecturer post in the Department of Pathology, which provided a modest income.

In January 1946 he accepted an invitation to attend a meeting of the Australian Student Christian Movement, which he had been a member of and enjoyed as a student. The meeting was in Mittagong in New South Wales, where he met Hazel Ashby, a young science graduate from Adelaide. It was love at first sight and six months later they were married. She was to become a scientific colleague, the mother of their three children as well as a lifelong tennis and sailing partner.

SHEFFIELD

Michael was anxious to get to the UK as soon as possible to take the second part of his FRCS, and booked passages for himself and Hazel on a cargo passenger boat before he had any job to go to. Although he had been offered a travelling fellowship to Oxford for two years by the Australian Red Cross Society, he did not accept it because it was conditional on his returning to Australia at the end of the two years. Before he left he applied for the post of Tutor in Surgery at the University of Sheffield and while on the voyage received a cable to say that his application had been successful.

After his arrival in Sheffield he prepared for the FRCS exam, which he took in London in 1947 at the Royal College of Surgeons of England and was delighted to be informed that he had passed, in a strange ritual that continued for many years and will be familiar to all sur- geons of that generation. By strange coincidence he had had tutorials from a surgeon, Colonel Julian Taylor, in the Changi POW camp, and in the clinical part of the exam Julian Taylor was his examiner, the only person he knew in the whole examination hall! Once he had his FRCS his clinical responsibilities back in Sheffield increased considerably and he received a much valued training in both emergency and elective general surgery.

Before Woodruff had left Australia he had decided to try to combine clinical practice and research, in other words to become what we call today an academic surgeon. There was no laboratory space in Professor Brockman's department of surgery in Sheffield but he was given space in Professor Green's laboratories in Pathology. Here he and Hazel began an extensive study of thyroid allografts in the anterior chamber of the eye with a particular interest in why allografts were not rejected in this immunologically privileged site. This work was communicated in due course to the Royal Society and published in the Philosophical Transactions (3). This has to be regarded as a promising start to his academic career in transplantation. Soon after arrival in Sheffield he arranged to visit Peter (later Sir Peter) Medawar (FRS 1949), who was then Professor of Zoology in Birmingham, to discuss aspects of tissue transplantation and rejection, because his research ambitions were now firmly directed down that road. As all who had met Medawar would affirm, this must have greatly reinforced his interest in his chosen field.

Of interest is that after 18 months in Sheffield he applied for a vacancy on the staff of the Royal Melbourne Hospital but was unsuccessful. One wonders what impact he would have had on surgery in Australia if he had been given the job.

ABERDEEN

However, soon after that a Senior Lecturer post and Honorary Consultant Surgical post at the University of Aberdeen and the Royal Infirmary was advertised, and as this department under Professor W. C. (Bill) Wilson provided laboratory space he decided to apply. It should be noted that neither he nor Hazel were quite sure where Aberdeen was and had to find it on a map before he went for interview. However, he was thrilled by what he saw before the inter- view and was delighted to be told that he was the successful appointee.

There were good laboratory facilities in Aberdeen and despite a heavy clinical load Professor Wilson gave him every encouragement to pursue his research work. Furthermore he was successful in obtaining support for his work from the MRC, which included the salary of a research assistant, a post that Hazel occupied for the first year till their first child was imminent. They continued the study of grafts in the anterior chamber of the eye but during a visit by Sir Macfarlane Burnet FRS and his wife, who in fact stayed with them, they undoubtedly discussed at length the classical book by Fenner and Burnet in which the hypothesis that the recognition of self occurred in the foetus in utero was presented (Burnet & Fenner 1949). After this visit he attempted to induce tolerance in rats by placing tiny skin allografts on the foetus in utero and challenging them several weeks after birth with a skin graft from the same donor. Alas,

the technical aspects of these experiments proved too difficult, and of course shortly afterwards Billingham, Brent and Medawar were to publish their seminal paper on the induction of neonatal tolerance (Billingham et al. 1953). In Aberdeen he also began his work on antilymphocyte serum for immunosuppression, but this too was largely unsuccessful, although it was later to succeed in Edinburgh. However, he was able to make several observations on the mechanisms of action of this agent (4, 5). This work was combined with studies on the effect of cortisone, which he had brought back from the USA, on allograft survival.

In 1950 he spent four months in the USA, supported by a World Health Organisation (WHO) Travelling Fellowship. During this visit he took the opportunity to visit some of the surgical giants of the day such as W. Blalock, W. Longmire, F. Moore, E. Churchill, L. Dragstedt, J. Gibbon, W. Walters, W. Cole and C. Huggins, as well as their institutions. He came away with the realization that surgical research was a highly respected and successful field of endeavour in the USA, and undoubtedly this provided further fuel to his own ambitions, a not uncommon occurrence among visiting surgeons in the years after World War II. He also met and signed a contract with the publisher Charles C. Thomas to write a book entitled The transplantation of tissues and organs. In fact the book was not published till 1960, but what an extraordinary scholarly work it proved to be; it still is the most complete bibliog- raphy of tissue and organ transplantation up to the time of publication (26).

While in Aberdeen it had become known that in mice the rejection of a skin allograft was determined by red cell antigens and indeed later it was recognized that in rodents histocom- patibility antigens were expressed on red cells as well as on white cells. He therefore availed himself of an opportunity to investigate this in humans when a colleague in the blood bank (Dr T. Allen) identified two unrelated individuals who were identical for all the red cell antigens known at the time. The two volunteers agreed to an exchange of skin grafts; however, the grafts were rejected promptly, in contrast to control autografts (7). It is of note that Woodruff suggested at that time that it would be logical to look for transplantation antigens on nucleated white cells. It was not till 1958 that Dausset described 'Mac', the first histocompatibility leu- cocyte antigen in humans (Dausset 1958).

In 1951 he was awarded a Hunterian Professorship of the Royal College of Surgeons of England; the title of his lecture was 'The transplantation of homologous tissue and its surgi- cal application' (6). During his time in Aberdeen, Professor Wilson was encouraging him to apply for chairs in surgery and although shortlisted for the chairs of surgery at St Mary's in London and at St Andrews University he was unsuccessful. However, his application for the Chair of Surgery at the University of Otago, the only Medical School in New Zealand, was successful and in 1953 he and his family returned to the antipodes to take up residence in Dunedin.

NEW ZEALAND

His four years in Dunedin were very active at a research level and included continuing stud- ies of tolerance in the rat to skin allografts by injection of leucocytes at birth, which proved relatively unsuccessful (9). He also attempted to induce tolerance to paternal antigens in the human by injecting infants at birth with leucocytes from their fathers, which also proved unsuccessful but fortunately did not produce graft-versus-host disease (GVHD) (10). Peter Medawar came to Dunedin as a visiting professor for a month in 1956 and told him about the unpublished work of Billingham and Brent (1957) describing GVHD, which in retrospect Woodruff was relieved not to have produced in those infants. During Medawar's visit they set up some collaborative experiments on tolerance induction in rats, which were completed and published after Medawar had left (12). Woodruff had also coined the term 'adaptation' to describe the phenomenon in which allografts become less susceptible to rejection with time.

On the clinical side apart from his general surgical responsibilities, Woodruff found him- self responsible for the treatment of burns, there being no plastic surgeon in Dunedin, and established a frozen skin bank for temporary cover of the burn injury, no mean feat in those days. Although his time in New Zealand has to be regarded as very successful, Dunedin, with a population of about 100000, was really too small for a clinical medical school as well as being relatively isolated, and it was really for those reasons that when the two chairs of sur- gery in Edinburgh became vacant he decided to apply. He was appointed without interview to the Chair of Surgical Science (later changed at Woodruff's insistence to the University Chair of Surgery) at the University of Edinburgh in 1957. Undoubtedly his appointment to Edinburgh was a result of his very productive scientific time in Dunedin.

EDINBURGH

In Edinburgh Woodruff had excellent facilities and over the next almost 20 years till his retire- ment in 1976 his department was to be a major contributor to the science of transplantation. The university had allowed him to appoint two scientists in the department apart from clinical colleagues and this undoubtedly contributed to the scientific success of the research activities. The two scientists were Donald Michie and James Howard (FRS 1984), both to become dis- tinguished scientists in their own right. As Professor of Surgery about 50% of his time was devoted to clinical work and teaching, which he felt was an important aspect of any academic surgeon's life if they were to maintain the respect of their clinical colleagues.

The MRC had agreed to establish a Research Group on Transplantation with Michael Woodruff as Honorary Director. The research activities of the group included the study of immunological tolerance, the immunosuppressive action of antilymphocyte serum and thoracic duct drainage, autoimmune haemolytic anaemia in mice and various aspects of the immune response to cancer in animals. The clinical research programme included the estab- lishment of a renal transplant programme, and indeed the first successful kidney transplant in the UK between identical twins was performed by Woodruff in 1960 (15). Woodruff felt that if renal transplantation was to get off the ground in a conservative medical environment in Edinburgh the first transplant had to be successful, and he had waited till this opportunity arose. Between 1960 and 1976, 127 patients with end-stage renal failure were treated with a kidney transplant. Other interests included the establishment of vascular surgery in Edinburgh, the treatment of autoimmune haemolytic anaemia by immunosuppression and the role of immunotherapy in the treatment of cancer. The clinical transplant programme was enhanced by a large grant from the Nuffield Foundation to build the Nuffield Transplant Surgery Unit at the Western General Hospital in Edinburgh, soon to become known as Fort Woodruff because of the strict isolation protocols necessary in those days of enhanced susceptibility to infection in immunosuppressed patients.

During 1970 there was an outbreak of hepatitis B, a viral infection transmitted by blood contamination, in the dialysis and transplant unit; several patients and four staff died of ful-minant hepatic failure. This was a devastating episode in Woodruff's life, which affected him gravely. The unit was closed for a time while the whole episode was reviewed and plans were made to prevent the transmission of hepatitis B in the future, but the decision to start again was not an easy one for him, and involved considerable courage and determination.

When Woodruff retired from the chair of surgery in 1976 he moved to the MRC Clinical and Population Cytogenetics Unit at the invitation of the Director, Professor H. J. Evans; sup-ported by grants from the Nuffield Foundation, the Wellcome Trust and the MRC, he was to spend a productive 10 years studying aspects of the biology of cancer. Indeed during this period of posthumous research-as many of his colleagues described it-he was to write 25 scientific papers and two books, namely The interaction of cancer and host: its therapeutic significance (27) and Host and cellular variation and adaptation in cancer (28). He com- mented later on being amazed to find how much work he could do in the laboratory with no clinical or

administrative responsibilities.

Before and after his retirement he served as an adviser to the WHO and as a visiting pro- fessor in several universities, mostly in the USA and Australia. He also visited several research institutes, usually for a month or two, where inevitably he became involved in col- laborative experiments. For example, in the South African Institute of Medical Research in Johannesburg he established the technique of renal transplantation in vervet monkeys and baboons, which was later put to very good effect by a young surgeon Bert (later Professor) Myburgh, and at the Walter and Elisa Hall Institute in Melbourne he began studies with Noel Warner of an immunopotentiating agent in transplanted tumours in athymic mice. He was elected President of the Transplantation Society in 1972 and presided over the international congress in Jerusalem in 1974 with great aplomb. As a member of the council of the Royal Society and its Vice-president in 1978-79 he visited China under the Scientific Exchange agreement between the Royal Society and the Chinese Academy. The trip started off disas- trously because he was not expected till the following month and they wanted to send him home! However, he happened to mention that he was a Vice-president of the Royal Society and all doors were opened. Finally he and his wife joined Lord Todd, the President of the Royal Society, and his wife, who had just arrived on an official visit and graciously accepted the Woodruffs in their party.

SCIENTIFIC CONTRIBUTIONS

Woodruff's first publication appeared in the Australian and New Zealand Journal of Surgery in 1940, and was a scholarly report of a well-planned clinical experiment describing the diagnosis of vitamin A and D deficiency and its management in patients with obstructive jaundice (1). Certainly this work was of a standard that suggested that his future career might lie in academic surgery. Interestingly, his co-author was Douglas (Pansy) Wright, later to become a distinguished Professor of Physiology and Chancellor of the University of Melbourne. As mentioned above, Woodruff had been responsible for nutrition, or perhaps better described as lack of nutrition, in Changi. After the war he submitted a report to the Director General of Medical Services on deficiency diseases in Australian POWs in Singapore. A copy was sent to Sir Edward Mellanby FRS, Secretary of the MRC, who suggested that it be combined with a report of deficiency diseases in civilian internees in Hong Kong by Dr Dean Smith. This com- bined report was published as an MRC Special Report in 1951, Deficiency diseases in Japanese prison camps, and was regarded as a major contribution in this area at the time (25).

By this time he was in Sheffield and had embarked on an academic surgical career with his major research activity directed at transplantation biology. His first major experiment in this area was begun in Sheffield and continued in Aberdeen with his wife, Hazel; it was reported to the Philosophical Transactions of the Royal Society in 1950 (3) and was an extensive study of the transplantation of thyroid and spleen autografts and homografts (now known as allo- grafts) in the anterior chamber of the eye and subcutaneously in the guinea-pig. In this paper the privileged state of the anterior chamber of the eye was confirmed and the term 'adaptation' was first used to describe the resistance to rejection of an established allograft in certain situ- ations, a phenomenon still of considerable interest today. It is interesting to note in this report that he saw transplantation of tissues to 'be of great clinical importance, especially in endocrinology', but no mention is made of organ transplantation even though pioneer attempts at kidney transplantation were taking place in Paris and Boston. Indeed, in his Hunterian lecture delivered at the Royal College of Surgeons of England in 1952 he stated that 'At present, therefore, homotransplantation of a kidney in humans would seem likely to prove futile and possibly disastrous', which at the time was a reasonable assessment of the situation (6). This probably explains why after moving to Edinburgh he did not perform a kidney transplant till an identical twin recipient with renal failure presented.

He continued his studies on the induction of lymphopoenia in rats both by an antilympho- cyte serum (ALS) and thoracic duct drainage, the latter being a technical tour de force. Both these agents proved to be powerful immunosuppressive modalities, and this work was of pioneering significance in the field of transplantation (20). In fact his contributions to the mechanisms of action of ALSs were enormous over many years. Medawar, who was to enter this field later, is said by Brent (1997) to have often been regarded as the 'high priest' of ALS, but Brent feels that this accolade rightly belonged to Woodruff. Since then the use of ALS and other antilymphocyte biological agents have become a part of routine clinical immunosuppression in organ transplantation. Some years later Woodruff persuaded the Wellcome Foundation to produce an ALS for clinical use, but in a multicentre study in the UK funded by the MRC of its immunosuppressive activity in renal transplantation it proved relatively inef- fective, presumably because it had been raised using lymphoblasts as the source of antigen and had little activity against T cells.

Prompted by the prediction of Burnet and Fenner that exposure of a foetus in utero to a foreign antigen would result in the subsequent recognition of that antigen as self, and no doubt after discussions with Burnet on the occasion of his visit to Aberdeen, Woodruff attempted to produce tolerance in rats by placing skin grafts on foetuses in utero, but the procedure was not tolerated by the experimental animals. However, after the later seminal publication of Billingham et al. (1953) showing that the injection of a cell suspension in utero would produce tolerance to subsequent skin grafts from the donor of the cell suspension in a mouse model, Woodruff repeated his earlier experiments in the rat with splenic tissue and was able to induce tolerance to later donor skin grafts (8, 9, 11). It is a pity that he chose such a techni- cally demanding model in the first instance.

He remained forever fascinated with the concept of tolerance induction, and after his obser- vation that in rats the injection of a cell suspension could produce tolerance for as long as two weeks after birth he injected two male infants with leucocytes from their father at birth and then challenged them with a skin graft from the fathers at six months of age. Both grafts took and remained perfectly healthy for four weeks before beginning to shrink in size, suggesting that a degree of tolerance might have been produced. He then became aware of the as yet unpublished work of Brent and Billingham describing the phenomenon of GVHD in mice, and no doubt recalled his earlier rat work in which substantial numbers of rats injected with donor splenic tissue lost weight and died before they could be challenged with a skin graft, and so did no further experiments of this nature. Fortunately neither infant showed any evidence of GVHD, presumably because the cells had been injected intramuscularly rather than intra- venously. Later he was to define GVHD or runt disease in the rat by the injection of thoracic duct lymphocytes at birth (14). A little later he was to switch his efforts in tolerance induction to adult animals, using a combination of irradiation and cytotoxic drugs to achieve a degree of immunological immaturity before exposure to donor antigen, a strategy that was successful (16, 17).

Another experiment on humans allowed him to confirm the observations of Owen (1945) amd Billingham et al. (1952) and later Medawar describing the chimaeric state of dizygotic cattle twins, which allowed skin allografts to be successfully exchanged between the twins, when he had the opportunity of exchanging skin grafts between dizygotic human twins who were chimaeric for red cell antigens (13). Both grafts took and certainly the female twin was tolerant of her brother's skin although the picture was not so clear in the reverse direction. Over many years he also studied the effect of steroids on tolerance induction and on graft sur- vival in rats, this being the only drug then available with apparently modest immunosuppres- sive activities.

On the clinical side he established a major renal transplant unit at Edinburgh, and indeed the first successful renal transplant in the UK was performed between identical twins in 1960. The unit was one of the world's pioneering units in the field as the surgical techniques and immunosuppressive protocols evolved. Indeed, Tom Starzl points out that the technique of extravesical

ureteroneocystostomy by which the transplanted ureter is implanted in the blad- der, generally credited to Lich, was in fact devised by Woodruff. The first custom-designed transplant unit was built for his requirements in Edinburgh at the Western Infirmary (23). The basis of the design was to provide isolation of the transplant patients, including an enclosed communication with radiotherapy, with strict barrier nursing protocols for all staff, because infection was the major cause of death in these heavily immunosuppressed patients in the early days of transplantation. As time has moved on and less immunosuppression is used, these pre- cautions are no longer necessary. The experience of the transplant unit was reported regularly in the clinical literature, culminating in a total review of the Edinburgh experience during his last year in office (24). Another clinical interest was peripheral vascular surgery, and he was instrumental in establishing this other relatively new specialty in Edinburgh.

After his retirement in 1976 he spent 10 years engaged in full-time research in cancer, because, in common with many transplant biologists, he had always had in interest in tumour immunology, and indeed some of his earlier publications dealt with approaches to the immunology of cancer and the immunotherapy of tumours with the use of Corynebacterium parvum (18, 19, 21, 22). During this time he published 25 papers, and also two books (27, 28) that summarized the work and concepts described in those papers. In the second book he describes the heterogeneity of the cell population making up a tumour, and proposes that this could explain the current difficulties in treating cancer, an important concept.

AWARDS

Woodruff received several awards during his career, including the Lister Medal and the Transplantation Society Medal (figure 2), and gave many named lectures around the world. In 1968 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society and in 1969 he was knighted by the Queen for services to medicine (figure 3). He was made an Honorary Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, the American Surgical Association and the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh. He also served on several editorial Boards and on a number of WHO committees over several years.

OTHER INTERESTS

He and his wife remained keen tennis players almost up till his death and no doubt the tennis court in their home 'Bield' in Edinburgh ensured regular tennis for one and all. But also in Edinburgh he became a very keen sailor, joining the Royal Forth Yacht Club, and soon cruis- ing and racing became a continuing passion. For several years the family would tow a 26 foot sloop (Therapist I) on an old army truck from Edinburgh to the Mediterranean each summer, but eventually he bought a larger boat (Therapist II) and over two summers sailed it from Edinburgh to Toulon, where it remained for regular holidays in the Mediterranean. As an undergraduate Michael had had a major interest in rowing, and to a lesser extent in hockey. Music was another pleasure and although he had been the college organist at Queen's College as an undergraduate he did not play the organ very much thereafter; he did learn to play the piano, but not as well as he played the organ. Mathematics, and especially number theory, continued to fascinate him throughout his life and he does mention that he tried intermittently to find a general proof of Fermat's last theorem but without success, although finding it great fun.

His family were always an important part of his life. His wife, Hazel, was an early colleague as mentioned above, and a lifelong tennis and sailing partner. Geoffrey, his eldest son, graduated in medicine from University College London and became a consultant ophthalmologist at Leicester. Keith, the second son, read civil engineering at Sheffield University and now lives and practises in Tasmania. Margaret, the third child, who was born in Dunedin, took an Honours BSc in botany at Sheffield University. Obviously Sheffield University had made a favourable impression on the Woodruffs during their time there!

WOODRUFF THE MAN

Michael Woodruff was a commanding presence in any gathering. It has to be said that he was not a particularly good lecturer because he had a rather ponderous delivery with a tendency to mumble, but he did have a great turn of phrase and a rather wicked sense of humour. Tom Starzl recalls that when Woodruff had just retired from clinical practice at the age of 65 years and at a meeting he (Starzl) was suggesting to Sir Roy Calne FRS and Michael Woodruff that they had arrived at just the right time in transplantation, Woodruff remarked that Roy and Tom 'might really have amounted to something if they had not been so preoccupied with surgery'! Starzl regarded this as a vintage Woodruff endearment.

He was a pioneer in transplantation both clinically and scientifically, and followed in the steps of Lister as a true surgeon scientist. What is surprising is that he was not successful in producing many surgeons in his own mould, despite the intellectual talent that was entering surgery and especially transplantation in the 1960s. However, his influence in transplantation at all levels was enormous.

Although he left Melbourne in 1946 never to return, except as a visitor, he never forgot his Australian roots, and Gus Nossal FRS recalls that his home in Edinburgh was a veritable Mecca for Australian visitors. However, many countries can claim a bit of this remarkable man, apart from Australia: namely, New Zealand, England and Scotland.

Constrained by shyness and a severe stutter, Alison received most of her education at home. She shared her father's passion for native plants, and as a child vowed to paint every Australian wildflower. Gaining brief but valuable tuition from the artist Rosa Fiveash, she painted specimens from the surrounding bush in watercolours and on china. Later her activities were restricted by family responsibilities, including caring for her bedridden mother.

From about 1944, after both her parents had died, Ashby began to seek plants further afield. Besides painting, she collected cuttings and seeds for propagation at Wittunga or by fellow members of the South Australian Society for Growing Australian Plants, referring to plants which had never been cultivated before as her grandchildren. She also pressed thousands of specimens for the State herbaria in Perth and Adelaide. Her meticulous annotations demonstrated her powers of observation and knowledge of the flora. Two species--Acacia ashbyae and Solanum ashbyae--were named

after her.

In 1957 Ashby transferred her portion of Wittunga to the National Trust of South Australia, of which she had been elected (1956) a founding council member. She wanted the 80-acre (32 ha) reserve, which was named Watiparinga, `re-clothed in Australian trees and shrubs' for the enjoyment of the public. Assisted by friends from SGAP and other organisations, she made it one of several planting projects. She had progressively lodged her completed watercolours with the South Australian Museum, and in 1958 nine paintings were reproduced as postcards, the beginning of a series that eventually included 240 of her 1500 paintings and led to widespread appreciation of her skills as a botanical artist. She was appointed MBE in 1960, and was awarded the Australian natural history medallion by the Field Naturalists' Club of Victoria in 1975.

Although suffering from hypothyroidism Miss Ashby travelled widely: every spring from 1963 to 1977 she drove alone to Western Australia, dividing her time between the Geraldton and Albany areas; each summer she went to the Australian Alps. She moved in 1972 from Wittunga to a home unit at Victor Harbor, a short drive from her nephew's farm, Mount Alma, near Inman Valley. In her eighties and walking with the aid of two sticks, she would work on `Sandy Reserve', an area of partially cleared scrub on Mount Alma set aside for her plantings, and enjoy the `bush air', which she believed had special therapeutic powers. She died on 12 August 1987 at Victor Harbor. A lifelong member of the Society of Friends, she was buried with a simple Quaker ceremony in the Inman Valley cemetery. The paintings which she had given to the museum are now held by the State Herbarium, South Australia.

Frederick Curtis was born in 1873, the son of Albert Curtis MRCS 1857, a general practitioner at Staines, Middlesex, and grandson of Frederick Curtis MRCS 1832, who had practised there previously. He was brought up a Quaker and educated at Bootham, York. His family had a long tradition in medicine for his was the seventh successive generation of medical men, earlier generations having engaged in general practice at Alton, Hampshire.

He studied medicine at Guy's Hospital, but interrupted this work to pursue his other interests of ornithology and botany, inherited perhaps from his distinguished ancestor William Curtis, the botanist and founder of the Botanical Magazine. In 1897 he joined an expedition to Navaya Zemlya in the Arctic in search of the breeding ground of the little stint and other rare birds, but it failed to achieve its objective; the little stint was later found breeding 100 miles to the east. He was elected a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society as a result of this journey and was a Member of the Ornithological Union. He later declined an invitation to join Captain Scott's last expedition to the Antarctic.

He resumed his studies at Guy's, qualifying MRCS, LRCP in 1901, and held the junior appointments of assistant house surgeon, house surgeon, obstetric resident and assistant demonstrator in anatomy at Guy's and clinical assistant at the Throat Hospital, Golden Square. He obtained his FRCS in 1902, married, and joined the practice of W A Berridge, MRCS 1876, at Redhill. There he established himself as an able general surgeon and general practitioner. He came to Redhill when professional jealousy and intrigue were at a peak, and by his quiet and friendly personality dispelled much of an undesirable atmosphere.

He was appointed to the Reigate and Redhill Cottage Hospital as an honorary medical officer in 1904, was appointed to the Board of Management in 1907 and, when policy changed, was elected medical representative to the Board in 1932. He became senior surgeon in the same year and chairman of the Medical Staff Committee. His partner, W A Berridge, retired in 1914; and he had another partner, Francis Gayner MRCS 1905, who joined him in 1908.

During the first world war he volunteered for military service with the RAMC at its outbreak, but was refused and was requested to continue at Redhill. He worked at nine war hospitals and convalescent homes including that at Reigate and Redhill Hospital, then no longer a "Cottage" Hospital; huge numbers of battle casualties from France were distributed in the area after disembarkation at Newhaven. He continued to conduct general practice and took his share in caring for the patients of two colleagues absent with the Army. His partner was frequently ill, and at intervals Curtis cared for the inmates of a large orphanage for children of depressed gentle-folk, St Ann's School. When this closed as an orphanage it was filled with troops, which engaged him in further surgical work at the Reigate and Redhill Hospital. He was awarded the OBE in 1919 in recognition of his services.

After the war he was responsible in cooperation with his colleagues for enlarging the Reigate and Redhill Hospital into a small general hospital, renamed the East Surrey Hospital. For many years he was consultant surgeon to the Royal Earlswood Hospital for Mental Defectives, and was obstetric consultant to the Borough of Reigate before the days of specialists in the subject in country towns. He retired from hospital practice in 1934 but continued as senior partner to build his general practice, so that when the second world war broke out it was a partnership of five. Two partners were immediately called to their Volunteer Reserves and he carried on throughout the war in general practice, retiring in late 1945 at the age of 72. He moved to the edge of Ashdown Forest, even then following up an aspect of cancer research and indulging his pursuits of natural history and gardening.

He died on 11 February 1966 at the age of 94 after a short period of incapacity; his wife died soon after him aged 92. They were survived by three daughters and their son Frederick John Curtis who continued the practice since his father's retirement.

Frederick Crowlejs the last surviving son of Abraham Crowley, was born at Alton, in Hampshire, nearly eighty-five years ago. His whole life was passed in his native town, of which he was a highly esteemed and honoured citizen, and in whose affairs he took, for many years, a conspicuous and useful part. Elected a member of the Alton Local Board in 1865, and serving for twenty-seven years as its chairman, he remained on it mitil, in '1894, it was merged in the Urban District Council. He was then elected Chairman of the new body, and continued a member of it until his retirement six years ago. During this period he largely controlled the affairs of the town, his byisiness capacity, extensive local knowledge and recognised integrity rendering him well fitted for a prominent position in its government; and he was able to carry out many important public improvements. His generosity was conspicuous in all local institutions; the Mechanics' Institute - which he joined while quite a young man, and of which, having been more than twenty years its president, he was, at the date of his death, the oldest member - receiving a large measure of his support. There he gave annual lectures, chiefly on scientific subjects, in which he was keenly interested. His lectures on heat, light, sound, electricity, the phonograph, and kindred topics, always illustrated by the newest apparatus, were listened to by large and appreciative audiences. Greatly interested, like his father before him, in Education, he bought, in 1866, a site for a British School; and having erected a suitable building on it, he handed the property over to the School Committee, as a free gift. He was also one of the governors of the Grammar School. Another institution which he supported was the Young Women's Christian Association, founded and endowed by himself and his Avife, and for which he provided adequate accommodation. The spacious grounds of his home of Ashdell were freely throw-n open for Sunday School and other fetes, and large number bers of visitors enjoyed walking amongst the beautiful trees and flowers. His head gardener had been with him for nearly forty years, and many of his employees had worked for him nearly all their lives. Frederick Crowley's character has been described as that of the sterling type, so often infused by a Friends' descent and training into a strong yet retiring nature such as his was. One who knew him well names further characteristics as especially distinguishing him: Uprightness, Cheerfulness, Thoroughness, and Benevolence ; qualities that were, in great measm-e the outcome of the inner spirit that actuated him, and which showed themselves in his daily life. "He walked before God," continues the narrator, "in the simple faith of one who know that he was redeemed and forgiven. . . . One never knew him dull or depressed. He was not a man of moods. Cheerfulness, it has been said, keeps up a kind of daylight in the mind, and fills it with a steady and perpetual serenity. This was true of Frederick Crowley. It was the joy of his heart to help his fellow men. Being possessed of outward means, he felt it his duty to give freely." He was deeply attached to the Society of Friends, and was loyal to its principles, which he carried out in his private and public life. He held for several years the offices of Elder and Treasurer of his Monthly Meeting; and, until bodily weakness set in, a few years since, no one was a more regular attender of Monthly, Quarterly and Yearly Meetings. An illustration of his adherence to the principles of Friends was given in the perseverance with which he kept up the little Meeting at Alton, although it often happened, in recent years, that only one member besides himself was present. It may be added that, unless some Friends come to reside in the locality, this Meeting, which holds, a long record of worthies who, in former generations have worshipped there, must cease to exist. Frederick Crowley's spiritual attitude was ever that of humility and a sense of unworthiness. The simplicity of his faith was striking. During his illness he spoke of his trust in the Saviour, quoting the words: "I know Him whom I have believed, and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed to Him." After three or four years of illness, borne with true patience and resignation, the end came peacefully. In the words of one who was present, "We could not but rejoice that now at length his eyes were open to see the King in His beauty, that all the weakness and weariness, were past, and that he was truly at rest."

On leaving Dublin in 1868 he entered into partnership with his old schoolfellow William Impey, in an ironmongery business at Bournemouth. Theirs was at that time the only business of the kind in the then young town. He well remembered when cattle fed in the fields which now form the beautiful central gardens of Bournemouth, and he liked to tell of the days when the now prosperous town was still very small and comparatively unimportant. In 1888 he was married to Florence Mary Matthews, of Didsbury, but the union was only of short duration, as his wife died at the birth of their first child. Eighteen months later he married Alice Matthews, the marriage being celebrated at Christiania, in Norway. Morris Wood will be remembered by many visitors to Bournemouth, for the great interest he took in the Friends' Meeting there. He had been largely instrumental in raising the funds for building the first Meeting House. Previously to this he used to drive six miles to Poole to attend at the old Meeting House there, often taking visitors and others over in his conveyance. M. W. was of a genial disposition, and on his giving up his business in Bournemouth and removing to Dunstable, Beds., in 1910, he was much missed by Friends and other visitors to the town. Early in October, 1917, he went to London to undergo an operation for cataract, after which heart trouble and other complications arose, and he passed away, November 5th, aged 74 years.

General Notes: MR. EDWARD HOOPER was born on the 18th of November, 1822, at No. 1 South Place, Finsbury, where his father, Mr. John Hooper, was a prominent medical practitioner. His constitution was never robust, and he was subjected to no course of study beyond that of a classical education. This did not develop to his friends an innate taste for mechanical pursuits of which he was himself sensible, and which gratified itself in such occupations as drawing steam-engines and making models of ships elaborately finished and rigged.

Consequently his introduction to business commenced in the country with a miller, who combined with this the timber and coal business, and he was about nineteen years of age when he was allowed to

enter upon the career of his choice.

He was then articled for three years to the late Mr. Benjamin Cubitt, M. Inst. C.E., at that time local superintendent of the Brighton, Croydon, and Dover railway, and was chiefly employed in the mechanical department at the joint station, New Cross.

He also took a prominent part for one in his then position in the experiment of the atmospheric railway from Croydon to London; subsequently he was engaged under other engineers in the making of the Jemappe and Louvain railway, on the Eastern Counties line, and on surveys in Wales and other places. He was thus engaged when the death of Mr. Cubitt in January, 1848, and the railway panic about the same time, combined to unsettle him in the pursuit of railway engineering.

His father died in the autumn of this year, and in the following year he paid a visit to America.

On his return the removal of the duty on bricks caused him to give his attention to that manufacture. The result was his establishment of brick-works at Exbury, 17 miles from Southampton, and his residence in that town, he at the same time pursuing his profession as an architect. This business he worked successfully till 1866, when it was superseded by the occupation of the Portland cement works. The disease of which he died on July 2nd, 1869, had been slowly developing itself for two or three years, but during that time the influence of his life and conversation was also gaining upon his fellow-townsmen and friends, and he died much respected and beloved. The most marked feature in his character was submission to the Divine will, which after a life of unusual trial shone out to its close. Mr. Hooper was elected an Associate of the Institution on the 25th of June, 1844; but, from living in the country, was unable to attend the meetings and take part in the discussions.

The prisoner, it was stated, was admitted a solicitor some years ago, and practised

in Paddington-street until last year, when he was struck off the rolls. In June last year he became a bankrupt, with liabilities amounting to £2,982, and assets, which he valued at £23,953, but which had realised nothing. The first forged mortgage deed was dated 1897, and was in respect of property in Queen's Head-street, Islington. Upon this he obtained £500. In 1900 his aunt had £1,300 to invest, and again he forged other deeds upon the same property to secure his aunt's money. The case, Mr.Mathews said, was a very grave one, and was greatly aggravated by the gross perjury the prisoner committed before the Incorporated Law Sooiety. Mr. Warburton, who defended, said theprisoner was the son of a solicitor, and his mother was the daughter of a Shropshire justice of the peace. He was educated at Charterhouse, and married the daughter of an officer of some social position. After this he conceived the idea of becoming solicitor to public companies, but unfortunately all had turned out unfortunate.— Canon Haig-Brown, who was headmaster of the Charterhouse, was called to speak to the prisoner's character. Other witnesses also gave evidence on his behalf. Mr. Justice Grantham said whatever his character was once there was no justification for his conduct, and he sentenced him to five years penal servitude.
