General Notes: John Scandrett Harford ensured the transition of his line from commerce to landed gentry; this was to be consolidated by the conversion of his son John Scandrett Harford the younger (1787–1866) to the Church of England, as well as the latter's advantageous marriage and literary concerns. The elder J. S. Harford maintained the family's industrial interests as a committee member of the Brass Company, and as an iron merchant and a partner in Lydney ironworks in Gloucestershire. He continued as the leading partner of Harford's Bank until his death. In 1782 he was warden, and in 1798 master, of the Bristol Merchant Venturers' Guild. He married another Quaker, Mary Gray (d. 1830) of Tottenham, Middlesex, in 1780, and they had nine children. By his death he was said to have trebled the fortune inherited from his father nine years earlier, and left nearly £300,000. He lived at Brunswick Square, Bristol, until 1789, when he purchased the Blaise Castle estate, near Bristol; this signified perhaps the greatest single step in the gentrification of the Harfords. He built a grander house to designs by William Patey about 1795, and commissioned additions by John Nash, Humphry Repton, and George Stanley Repton. He is best remembered for Blaise Hamlet, the estate pensioners' houses built by Nash in 1810–11 at a cost of £3800, one of the most successful examples of picturesque architecture in England now in the care of the National Trust. J. S. Harford the elder died at Blaise Castle on 23 January 1815.

General Notes: Gwynne, (Alban) Patrick (1913–2003), architect, was born on 24 March 1913 at Portsdown House, Portchester, Hampshire, the eldest of two children and the only son of Commander Alban Lewis Gwynne (1880–1942), a naval officer based at the Portsmouth submarine school, and his wife, Ruby Muriel, née Bond (1888/9–1942), the daughter of a cavalry officer who grew up in India. The family soon moved to Esher, Surrey, where they rented and then bought Homewood, a large Victorian house sited by the Portsmouth Road with 8 acres of land behind it. Here Gwynne's sister, Noreen Gwyneth (known as Babs), was born in 1915.

Gwynne spent a happy childhood and was educated at Sandroyd preparatory school (from 1921) and Harrow School, which he entered in 1927. Neither academic nor sporty, he took art as an extra subject to get out of cricket. He became skilled in sketching and measured drawing, and discovered the modern movement, whose work was then beginning to be covered by the Architectural Review, for which he took out a subscription. Harrow ran sketching classes to the countryside, including one to Amersham, where he encountered Amyas Connell's pioneering modernist house High and Over (1928–9). That 'sold me' (Bingham, interview) and convinced him that he should become an architect. He had initially agreed with his father's wish that he should train as a chartered accountant, but his father accepted his vocation and gained him a pupillage. From 1930 Gwynne served articles with John Coleridge, a former assistant of Sir Edwin Lutyens, whose architecture Gwynne later described as 'traditional but very decent' (ibid.). He divided his free time between designing houses and furniture, motoring, and being part of his sister's débutante dance circuit. A keen motorist, Gwynne received a Wolseley Hornet as a twenty-first birthday present and drove through France, Belgium, Germany, Austria, and Switzerland with an old school friend in 1934, visiting the modernist houses of Stuttgart's Weissenhof estate (1927), overseen by Mies van der Rohe, and Le Corbusier's Villa Savoye (1929), near Paris.

Having completed his pupillage Gwynne sought work with a modern practice—placing an advert in the Architects' Journal without success. He was then introduced to Swedish friends of the Canadian architect Wells Coates, who held a party so that the two could meet. Coates initially offered Gwynne a job on a two-week trial basis, and this became two years, during which time he assisted in the detailing of Coates's Lawn Road flats, Hampstead, and Embassy Court flats, Hove. Here he also worked with Denys Lasdun and (George) Edric Neel (1914–1952). Working independently he designed a house—Shipwrights (1937) in Benfleet, Essex— in which most of the accommodation was set on the first floor.

Gwynne's father's family were members of the Welsh landed gentry from whom he had inherited an estate in the seaside town of Aberaeron. This Commander Gwynne sold in 1936, and from the subsequent investments he put £10,000 towards a new house at Esher, situated away from the increasingly noisy Portsmouth Road. Not wanting to leave their garden, Alban Gwynne and his wife agreed to Patrick's suggestion that he design a modern house set at the rear of the site. Gwynne talked to his parents daily about their requirements for the new residence, later explaining how 'they completely accepted the basic idea behind the house and its modern manner' (Bingham, interview).

Construction of The Homewood began in October 1937 and was complete seven months later. The result was an accomplished and striking work of modernism, raised on pilotis or stilts, and constructed from reinforced concrete. Though clearly influenced by the Villa Savoye, and one of the most confident statements of Le Corbusier's ideal in British domestic architecture, The Homewood also retains an English flavour, shaped by Coates, as well as— in its large, single living space and use of rich materials— by van der Rohe's Tugendhat House, Brno. Gwynne's Homewood was prominently featured in the Architectural Review (Sept 1939), but the family enjoyed only 'one good year' there. In 1940 Patrick joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, and was sent in the following year to Canada, where he designed airstrips at Assiniboia, Saskatchewan, and Goodridge, Ontario. Both of his parents died in 1942 and Gwynne and his sister returned to The Homewood alone. Babs married soon afterwards, while Patrick, rejecting work in public housing, set up his own architectural practice in the ground-floor wing of the house.

Gwynne's first post-war success came in 1950, when he was placed second (out of sixty-seven entries) in a competition for a restaurant for the Festival of Britain. It led to a commission for the Crescent Restaurant in the Festival Gardens, Battersea, for which he designed a regency-style tent, painted in different colours to last a second year, and managed by Forte Holdings. Gwynne went on to design further restaurants, including that at the Serpentine in London's Hyde Park for Charles Forte in 1963–4. He was inspired by the sight of people walking with umbrellas in the park to create a design around a series of concrete hexagons supported on mushroom columns; the glazing was set back behind the columns, breaking down the building's bulk and giving an indeterminacy to its definition of indoors and outdoors. It was demolished in 1990 but a small version survives as the Serpentine restaurant, also in Hyde Park, and it led to a similar structure being adopted as the foyer of the York Theatre Royal (1967) after its director, Donald Bodley, had lunched in the park. The foyer includes top lighting to ensure that even by day it is possible to see inside the building from outside, while for evening performances it is totally illuminated. A further commission for Forte was Burtonwood service station (1974), two octagons with sweeping copper spires on the M62 motorway near Warrington. In 1954 Gwynne also designed London's first Japanese restaurant, finished using black lacquer, as well as numerous shops, none of which has survived.

Following the success of The Homewood, Gwynne came to specialize in private house design, mainly for a close network centred on his friends, the builder Leslie Bilsby, whom he had met through Wells Coates, and the quantity surveyor Kenneth Monk, with whom he worked on all his domestic designs. Gwynne's first house was the rebuilding of Bilsby's Victorian home in Blackheath, south London, in 1949. From the late 1950s his houses adopted strongly geometric shapes, usually with the garden frontage wider than that to the street, and the principal rooms gathered around a central top-lit stair. This was first seen at The Firs, Hampstead (1958), and two houses in Beechwood Close, all for German émigrés who admired his mixture of modernism, dignified materials, and ability to incorporate the latest appliances. Many features included in these houses also appeared at The Homewood, including fitted furniture, simulated Japanese grass paper for the walls, and murals by Stefan Knapp and Peter Thompson. Gwynne's second house in Blackheath Park for Bilsby (1968–9), described as 'a design which sets out to shock' (Pevsner, 276), comprises pentagonal rooms lined in black plastic with sliding red lacquer doors that could be thrown open for drinks parties. Such houses for him at Angmering, Sussex (1970), where the food servery and drinks cabinet were given equal standing. A last house for Bilsby (1979) was a cluster of octagonal rooms, each with its own cone-shaped roof. Gwynne also had many friends in the worlds of music and theatre, for whom he built or converted houses, including the pianist Sir Clifford Curzon and the actors Laurence Harvey and Jack Hawkins. His largest house was Witley Park, at Brook, near Godalming, Surrey (1961– 3). Built for the department store owner Gerald Bentall, the design was of underlying hexagonal forms incorporated into an overall boomerang-shaped plan.

Gwynne had a strong independent streak and was willing to walk away from commissions if clients would not accept his advice. He took a fastidious and logical approach to the design process— acknowledging a meticulous nature inherited from his mother— and he could be self-critical and ruthless if he decided something was not right. In 1993– 4 he bequeathed The Homewood to the National Trust, though he continued to live and work there for the remainder of his life, advising on its restoration and refurnishing, maintaining his mischievous humour, and searching for perfection in design to the end. Patrick Gwynne died, unmarried, on 3 May 2003 of heart failure, at his home of more than sixty years; he was cremated and his ashes were scattered in the garden. Opened to the public by the National Trust in 2005, The Homewood is notable— along with Ernö Goldfinger's 2 Willow Road, Hampstead— as one of the few inter-war modern houses with fittings and grounds intact.

Eldest son of John Charles Harford, of Blaise Castle, Henbury, and Falcondale, Lampeter, and of Blanche Amabel, second daughter of the Right Hon. St. John Raikes, late Postmaster-General. Was Captain of his House at Cricket and House Racket-player, and won the Cross Country Race in 1914.

Lieutenant Harford had matriculated at Magdalen College, Oxford, but never went into residence, joining instead the 3rd Battalion, South Wales Borderers, in September, 1914. In May, 1915, he was sent to Mudros, being attached to the 2nd Royal Fusiliers, and was severely wounded in Gallipoli by shrapnel, on June 30th, 1915. After being in hospital at Alexandria he was sent home and rejoined the South Wales Borderers in December, 1915. In March, 1916, he was sent with a draft to Egypt, and was transhipped to France the following month, being attached to the 2nd Battalion.

He was killed during a night patrol on October 26th, 1916. He was lying in a shell-hole close to the German trench attempting to locate the wire, when the enemy sent up Very lights and, in trying to confirm his work, he showed himself and was shot dead by a German sniper.

His Colonel wrote : — " He always stuck it and always carried out whatever orders were given him with the utmost cheerfulness."

The Chaplain wrote : — "He went to his death like a gallant gentleman," and all his brother-officers wrote in the same strain of his pluck, and of his cheerful discharge of duty. JOHN HENRY HARFORD

Second Lieutenant Nicholl was born in Swansea on 24 October 1892. He was educated at Eton and the Royal Military Academy at Sandhurst. He represented Sandhurst in sporting competitions against the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich in 1912.

He was posted to the Rifle Brigade (Prince Consort's Own) in 1913. In August 1914, he joined the 3rd Battalion, Welsh Regiment, and was later attached to the 2nd Battalion. While on active service with this battalion, he was killed at Gheluvelt, five miles east of Ypres, on 29 October 1914 while retaking trenches captured by the Germans. He is commemorated at the Menin Gate in Ypres.

General Notes: Jim Rickards, who has died aged 91, taught French and Spanish at Radley College for 27 years and was the first don-in-charge of the Radley Beagles, which has taught generations of Masters of Foxhounds the art of hunting.

He arrived at Radley shortly after leaving the Navy at the end of the war, and one of his first jobs was to rescue the two and a half couple of beagles, then living on college swill in a green house. The "pack", such as it was, had been formed in December 1940.

He built these up over the next 18 years into a flourishing hunt; today the school packs at Radley, Eton, Stowe and Marlborough are the only ones in the country. When, in 1970, the school was thinking about disbanding the beagles, Rickards was instrumental in bringing in Capt Ronnie Wallace, otherwise known as "God" in hunting circles, and between them they persuaded the school to think again.

In the early days the boys looked after the hounds, which were towed in small trailers to the meets by Rickards and his pupils on push-bikes. On one occasion, when the pack was left stranded at Drayton late one evening after hunting, he put the beagles in the fold-out boot of his old Alvis and drove back through Abingdon with the boys on the running boards. Always practical, he started the school's sailing club and, with the help of the boys, built a fleet of Graduate dinghies from raw materials in the workshops, which were still being sailed when his son attended the school 15 years later.

When his friend Chris Ellis bought a derelict 60 ft pilot cutter, Theodora, Rickards and a group of Radley boys helped restore her to take part in Tall Ships races. When the topmast fell down in strong winds in the first race, he was the obvious candidate, with his strength, ingenuity and courage, to be sent up the mast for two hours in rough seas with a small hacksaw to cut the rigging down.

At Radley he also coached rowing, managing to combine his two great interests by instructing eights from horseback on the towpath; once he was rescued by the crew when both he and his horse took an unexpected swim.

Rickards was an excellent teacher: he never lost his composure even under great provocation, such as when he arrived in his classroom to find that the lower sixth had brought in his horse to help with the lesson.

The son of a bank manager, Charles James Myddleton Rickards was born on February 1 1913 at Cheadle Hulme in Cheshire. He was educated at Bristol Grammar School, where he was an outstanding gymnast. At Oxford, where he read French and Spanish, he rowed in the Merton eight and sailed for the university. As an officer in the cavalry squadron, he would exercise through the city on one of the 100 horses they had stabled in Merton Street, often with a couple more horses in tow. In his holidays, he travelled across Europe to be a tutor for aristocratic families in Poland and Hungary.

On leaving Oxford, Rickards taught first at L'Ecole des Roches in Normandy; many of those he taught were later to be members of the French government. He then taught for seven years at Liverpool College.

He was returning from a European holiday assignment one September to enlist when he passed through Nuremburg at the time of a rally. Hitler passed within six feet of him. Initially the Army turned him down, as teaching was a reserved occupation; but the Navy took him when he was able to turn the admiralty chart he was given at the interview the right way up. His first duty was organising the defence of the Isle of Sheppey; he was responsible for 12 miles of coastline with a group of pensioners and one saluting gun with enough ammunition to fire for two and a half minutes; after patrolling during the day, they all retired to bed at night.

Inevitably, he ended up at sea, first as a liaison officer with the Free French on a trawler in the North Sea. He spent the rest of the war commanding motor launches and "dog-boats", first on the East coast and then in the Mediterranean. The friendships he built with his fellow officers, and particularly members of the Free French in North Africa, were to last for life. Rickards narrowly escaped being blown up off Oran when the boat alongside was hit by a shell and went down with all hands. Towards the end of the war, his boat was used to land and pick up agents at night from unlit coasts in occupied territories. One of the agents he landed in Algeria was the highly decorated Dane, Major Anders Lassen. Lassen won three Military Crosses and, posthumously, became the only non-Empire soldier to be awarded the Victoria Cross, for a raid on Commachio, Italy. On one occasion, Rickards was sent to Heraklion in Crete to find out if the German had left. On arrival, he was met by a man rowing out in a dinghy. It turned out to be a schoolmaster whom he had known before the war, and who had lived a hermit's life in the hills during the German occupation; he knew the exact location of the 36 mines laid at the harbour entrance.

After a very tense few minutes picking their way through the mines, they motored into the harbour to be given a great welcome in the town, and were driven, garlanded with flowers, through the streets. The following week a minesweeper found exactly 36 mines when it swept the port entrance.

Rickards's small motor launch was also the first Allied boat into Piraeus, Greece, in October 1944. Half a mile from shore, travelling at 15 knots and dodging mines, he hoisted the largest white ensign he could find "so that I wouldn't be mistaken for Jerry". Hundreds of men began to swim out to his boat and dozens of small craft put off. In 1949, the same year that he married the daughter of a fellow master, A K Boyd, author of The History of Radley College, he acquired his first boat, Enchantress, a 19th-century 30 ft gaff-rigged fishing boat with a 10 ft bowsprit and an unreliable petrol paraffin engine with no electronic navigation. He liked to sail around the rocks and fierce tides of the Britanny coast. In retirement he sailed the Atlantic and cruised with friends from the Arctic Circle to the Ionian and Adriatic. He ocean-raced again, navigating in the 1973 Fastnet and La Rochelle races for Ron Amey on Noryema. In the winter, he hunted two days a week with the Old Berks until he was 82, riding ex-chasers. Jim Rickards died on April 17. His wife Juliet, whom he married in 1949, survives him with their son and two daughters.

General Notes: Dundas Harford-Battersby was the vicar of St. Stephen's in the opening years of the twentieth century. Although he was never a Nonconformist he does deserve a mention here because of the role he played in bringing together Anglicans and Nonconformists.

His father had been the vicar of Keswick in the Lake District and in 1875, along with Robert Wilson, a Quaker businessman from Cockermouth, had founded the Keswick Convention. Although not the first of the so-called "Holiness" conventions, Keswick became by far the most famous and longest lasting. By its policy of playing down doctrinal differences and majoring on spiritual experiences, it attracted people from all the various Protestant denominations.

We might wonder who were the first people from Norwich to attend a Keswick Convention? In the 1870s Norwich was one of England's poorer cities and only a comparatively few people could afford the time and money to spend a week in the Lake District. However, in his parish magazine for 1906 Harford-Battersby wrote that he hoped to meet a good number of his congregation at Keswick that summer. Since that time Keswick has been a red-letter date on the calendars of many Norwich folk, and churches in the city have provided conference speakers and soloists. Keswick can be look on as the forerunner of today's high profile summer venues, Spring Harvest, New Wine, Easter People, Greenbelt, etc. These various modern conventions have inevitably dented Keswick's popularity but it does still attract a loyal following from all around Britain, including Norwich, each summer.

General Notes: Sir James Harford, KBE, CMG, former Governor of St Helena, died on November 26 aged 94. He was born on January 7, 1899. JAMES HARFORD belonged to that generation of young veterans who, returning from the horror of the First World War, found their own peace amid Oxford's dreaming spires. When his grandson went up to Balliol 70 years on, he wrote him an affectionate letter, quoting Ovid: ``Ille terrarum mihi praeter omnes angulus ridet" (that corner of the earth which among all others makes me smile).

A second lieutenant in the 2nd Battalion Essex Regiment, James Dundas Harford had gone into the trenches straight from Repton. Wounded in the closing stages of the fighting, he had ended the war in Belgium, in charge of prisoners-of-war at the age of 19. At Oxford he was awarded an honorary scholarship, at that time given to those who were considered to be scholarship material but whose chances of winning one had been spoilt by the war. He read Greats.

He was a founder member of the 1919 Club, formed by those who had gone up after the war, and relished the glittering company he found there. His contemporaries at Balliol included the writers, Nevil Shute, Beverley Nichols, and L.P. Hartley, the film director Anthony Asquith and the politicians, David Maxwell Fyfe, Christopher Hollis and Frank Soskice. Harford's father was an Anglican clergyman at Great Yarmouth and had cherished hopes that his son would follow him into the ministry. At Repton Harford came under the successive headmasterships of William Temple and Geoffrey Fisher, both later to become archbishops of Canterbury. He wrote in his private memoirs before he died: ``It would be difficult to estimate my debt to the chance of intimate and maintained association with these two men so contrasting in their nature and quality of achievement but each with the quality of greatness." Another master who inspired him was the young publisher-to-be Victor Gollancz who taught English (before being dismissed by Fisher). After Oxford, where he also played hockey for Balliol and captained the college at football, Harford found himself with few ideas for a career. A friend who was a housemaster at Eton persuaded him to try teaching there for a while with the prospect of one day getting his own house. But after three years as an assistant master, he could stand no more of it and entered the colonial service. In 1926 he joined the Nigerian administration where he soon found himself, with little training for the job, in charge of an area the size of Wales. But he was to spend eight years working in Nigeria, eventually becoming assistant secretary in the central secretariat and clerk to the executive and legislative councils a post usually awarded to high fliers. Then, after two years in Whitehall, he was dispatched to the West Indies in 1936, initially as the administrator on Antigua and federal secretary of the Leeward Islands government. From there in 1940 he moved to become administrator on St Nevis, where he remained

One of Harford's chief concerns was to ensure that the people in his charge had enough to eat. Food convoys ran the gauntlet of U-boats during the war, transporting food to a distribution centre in Barbados, from where smaller boats ferried supplies round the Caribbean islands. But Barbadians were tempted to fill up the small boats with rum (which they had in excess) instead of swordfish and rice which were most needed.

After 12 months in Whitehall Harford was next posted to Mauritius, as colonial secretary for five years at a time when the island was preparing for universal suffrage. He went to St Helena as governor in 1954 and stayed there until 1958.

After retirement he worked as conference organiser for the Commonwealth Institute until 1964.

James Harford was a kind and courteous man, who was frequently described by that old-fashioned word "a gentleman". Months alone in the African night had given him a deep love of nature and the stars and in old age he was happiest in his garden, in the company of young people and the birds.

His first wife, Thelma, a count's daughter whom he met while skiing, died within a few years of their marriage and he is survived by his second wife, Lilias, a son from his first marriage and two daughters from his second. *The Times 29 Dec 1993*

General Notes: Harford, John Scandrett (1787–1866), biographer, was born at Bristol on 8 October 1787, the second son of the banker and manufacturer John Scandrett Harford (1754–1815) [see Harford family] of Blaise Castle, Henbury, Gloucestershire, and Mary (d. 1830), daughter of Abraham Gray of Tottenham, Middlesex. He was educated under the Revd Lloyd at Peterley House, Buckinghamshire, later studying for several terms at Christ's College, Cambridge. The death of his elder brother, Edward Gray Harford, on 25 April 1804, produced deep religious impressions, which continued throughout his life. His parents were members of the Society of Friends, but he left that connection and was baptized at Chelwood church, Somerset, in 1809. He became a firm supporter of the Church Missionary Society and the Bible Society, and assisted at the formation of the Bristol branches of those associations in 1813. He was a close friend of Hannah More from 1809, and of William Wilberforce from 1812, and he was the model for the hero of Hannah More's novel Coelebs in Search of a Wife (1809).

On 31 August 1812 Harford married Louisa Davies, eldest daughter of Richard Hart Davies, MP for Bristol. The following year he visited Ireland with his wife, and his subsequent 'Letter on the state of Ireland', addressed to William Wilberforce, was published in the Christian Observer (June 1813). On the death of his father in 1815 Harford succeeded to the family estates, and was made a magistrate and a deputy lieutenant for Gloucestershire and Cardiganshire. While in Rome in 1815 he obtained an interview with Pius VII and requested his influence in putting down the Spanish and Portuguese slave trade. He possessed considerable taste in art and literature, and during visits to Paris and other European cities in 1815–17 laid the foundation of a valuable collection of pictures which adorned the walls of Blaise Castle. About 1821, on the death of his brother-in-law, Hart Davies, formerly MP for Colchester, he came into the Peterwell property, Cardiganshire, where he made improvements and took in tracts of waste land.

In 1822, on the advice of Thomas Burgess, bishop of Salisbury, Harford and his brother donated the site of the castle of Lampeter for the foundation of a college in south Wales. The same year, the University of Oxford created him honorary DCL, and he was elected FRS on 29 May 1823. In 1824 he was appointed high sheriff for Cardiganshire. On the completion of St David's College in 1827 Harford was appointed sub-visitor and watched over its interests with great care.

In January 1841 Harford was present in Bristol at a discussion between John Brindley and Robert Owen, when he strongly denounced socialism. He was elected Conservative MP for the borough of Cardigan on 6 July 1841, but as a result of the loss of a poll book a double return was made to parliament and on a petition his name was erased from the roll on 18 April 1842. He contested the same place again on 12 February 1849, without success. For fifteen years he acted as president of the Bristol Infirmary. He contributed towards the restoration of the cathedrals of Llandaff and St David's, and at Lampeter he drained the Gorsddu bog, and made it into cottage garden allotments, while also providing a supply of pure water for the town. During two visits to Italy, in 1846 and 1852, he collected materials for his best-known literary work, the Life of Michael Angelo (1857); he also had a copy of the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel made at his own expense. After the loss of his sight in 1862 he found employment in dictating to his wife his Recollections of W. Wilberforce (1864) from notes of conversations and correspondence in his possession. He died, childless, at Blaise Castle on 16 April 1866, and was buried on 23 April. He was succeeded by his nephew, John Battersby Harford.

General Notes: NICOLAS, JOHN TOUP (1788–1851), rear-admiral, eldest son of John Harris Nicolas (1758–1844), a lieutenant in the navy, was born at Withen, near Helston, Cornwall, on 22 Feb. 1788. Sir Nicholas Harris Nicolas [q. v.] was his brother. As early as 1797 John was borne on the books of one or other of the gun-vessels stationed on the coast of Devonshire and Cornwall, but seems to have first gone to sea in 1799, in the Edgar with Captain Edward Buller, whom he followed in 1801 to the Achille. He was afterwards in the Naiad frigate, but in 1803 was again with Buller in the Malta of 80 guns. He was made lieutenant on 1 May 1804, and, remaining in the Malta, was present in the action off Cape Finisterre on 22 July 1805. From 1807 he was flag-lieutenant to Rearadmiral George Martin [q. v.] in the Mediterranean, and in October 1809 was appointed acting commander of the Redwing. He had been previously promoted from home on 26 Aug., and appointed to the Pilot brig, which he joined at Portsmouth in April 1810.

In the Pilot he went out again to the Mediterranean, and for the next four years was employed in most active and harassing service on the coast of Italy, capturing or destroying great numbers of coasters, and of vessels laden with stores for the Neapolitan government. Alone, or in company with the Weasel sloop, or the Thames frigate [see Napier, Sir Charles], he is said to have captured or destroyed not less than 130 of the enemy's vessels between his first coming on the coast and July 1812. He afterwards went round to the Adriatic, continuing there with the same activity and good fortune. He returned to England towards the end of 1814, but on the escape of Napoleon from Elba was again sent out to the Mediterranean, where, on 17 June, off Cape Corse, he engaged the French sloop Égérie. After several hours both vessels had suffered severely, and the Égérie had lost many men, killed and wounded. The Pilot's loss in men had been slight, but her rigging was cut to

pieces, and the Égérie made good her escape. The Pilot's first lieutenant, Keigwin Nicolas, a brother of the commander, was among the wounded. On 4 June 1815 Nicolas was nominated a C.B.; on 26 Aug. he was promoted to the rank of post-captain, in October he received from the king of Naples the cross of St. Ferdinand and Merit, and in the following April was made a knight-commander of the order. He returned to England in July 1816, when the Pilot was paid off.

From 1820 to 1822 Nicolas commanded the Egeria frigate on the Newfoundland station, and on his return to England was sent to Newcastle, where a dispute between the keelmen and shipowners threatened to give rise to disturbance. The mere presence of the frigate in the Tyne enforced order, and the dispute being adjusted, the Egeria went to Sheerness and was paid off. Nicolas's conduct and tact on this occasion were highly approved. He was nominated a K.H. on 1 Jan. 1834. From 1837 to 1839 he commanded the Hercules of 74 guns, on the Lisbon station; from 1839 to 1841 the Belle-Isle in the channel and the Mediterranean; and the Vindictive, on the East India station, from 1841 to 1844, returning to England by Tahiti, where he was sent to protect English interests during the arbitrary proceedings of the French (Ann. Reg. pt. i. p. 256). On 30 Dec. 1850 Nicolas was promoted to be rear-admiral. He died at Plymouth on 1 April 1851, and was buried in St. Martin's Church. He married in 1818 Frances Anna, daughter of Nicholas Were of Landcox, near Wellington in Somerset, by whom he had issue. He was the author of 'An Inquiry into the Causes which have led to our late Naval Disasters,' 1814; and of 'A Letter to Rear-Admiral Du Petit Thouars on late events at Otaheite,' Papeete, 1843.

Granville Toup Nicolas (d. 1894), son of the above, entered the navy in 1848, was promoted lieutenant in 1856 after service in the Black Sea, and in the following year was appointed to the Leopard, the flagship of Sir Stephen Lushington [q. v.], on the south-east coast of America. Thence he was appointed to Sir James Hope's flagship, the Impérieuse, on the China station. He was subsequently left in command of the gunboat Insolent, and was repeatedly engaged in the operations for the suppression of the Tae-ping insurrection. He was promoted commander in 1867, retired as captain in 1882, and died at Edinburgh on 21 April 1894 (Times, 25 April, 1894).

9-Jonathan Binns Were<sup>24,25</sup> was born on 25 Apr 1809 in Wellington, Somerset and died on 6 Dec 1885 in Wellington House, Brighton Beach, Victoria, Australia at age 76.

General Notes: Jonathan Binns Were (1809-1885), stockbroker, was born on 25 April 1809 at Wellington, Somerset, England, the third son of Nicholas Were and his wife Frances, née Binns. In 1829 he joined the firm of Collins & Co., colonial merchants and bankers, of Plymouth. In 1833 he married Sophia Mullet Dunsford (1811-1881), a Quaker. They had twelve children, three of whom died in infancy. In 1882 he married Elizabeth, daughter of Donald Gordon McArthur of Melbourne.

Were emigrated in 1839 and settled in Melbourne. He brought a prefabricated house and merchandise worth about £1500. He traded at first under his own name, then with his brother George and with other partners until 1861, when the title J. B. Were & Son was adopted. Were's were importers, exporters, and agents for shipping, land, cattle, sheep and wool. In 1851 they became brokers and buyers of gold, and in 1853 began to deal in shares.

In February 1841 Were had become an agent for Henry Dendy. Were's subsequent business failure and bankruptcy in 1843 forced Dendy into insolvency; both their interests in the Brighton Estate were acquired eventually by Were's eldest brother Nicholas who lived in England. In 1857, after his second bankruptcy, the firm's share dealings rapidly took precedence over its commerce. In 1859 Were was both chairman and secretary of a regular stock exchange and in 1860 began to operate 'solely as Broker and Agent'. He successfully challenged stock jobbing by campaigning for an exchange on which brokers could not be principals and in 1865 was elected first chairman of 'The Stock Exchange of Melbourne'. He was a leading broker until his death, taking into partnership at various times his sons, Jonathan Henry, Francis Wellington and Arthur Bonville, and his son-in-law Sherbourne Sheppard.

In the 1840s Were was prominent in communal and business activities. He was first president of the Chamber of Commerce, one of three on the standing committee for separation, president of the Bible Society, a member of the Melbourne Hospital Committee, the Immigration Board and other institutions, and a director of many companies. He was the first justice of the peace appointed for Port Phillip, was a leading Church of England layman, and helped to run the 1881 Melbourne Exhibition, after which he was appointed C.M.G. In 1856 he was elected for Brighton to the Legislative Assembly, but his second bankruptcy soon caused his retirement. Contemporaries considered him most notable for the extraordinary number of his consular posts. He was knighted by the kings of Sweden and Denmark.

Were was a strange mixture of worldly ambition and idealism, of breadth of vision and rashness. His life seems to divide naturally into two periods at about 1857. Most of his public service took place in the 1840s and it was then that he lived in some style; 'all was English' at Moorabbin House in Brighton. He died on 6 December 1885.

Staniforth Ricketson (1891-1967), stockbroker, was born on 1 August 1891 at Malvern, Melbourne, fifth child of Victorian-born parents Henry Joseph Ricketson, squatter, and his wife Sophia Henrietta, née Sheppard. His maternal great-grandfather J. B. Were had set an example which would influence Staniforth's career. The boy was given the maiden name of his paternal grandmother Georgina, née Staniforth (d.1882); her widowed husband Henry Ricketson senior married J. B. Were's daughter Edith in 1884, reinforcing the connexion between the two families.

At Prahran North State School, Ricketson received a gold medal as dux (1905) of boys. In 1906 he won Corrigan entrance and government scholarships to Wesley College. Leaving school in 1907, he worked on pastoral stations in Victoria and New South Wales. In 1908 he found a job as a correspondence clerk with the Australian Mercantile Land & Finance Co. Ltd, Melbourne. Next year he accompanied his brother Lancelot to King Island where they ran the Ricketson Bros general store. Staniforth also edited the local newspaper, The King Islander. In 1910 Ricketson moved to Tasmania where he became a reporter with the North Western Advocate and Emu Bay Times. At the invitation of his great-uncle Francis Wellington Were, he returned to Melbourne and joined the staff of J. B. Were & Son on 4 December 1911. Within a year he had charge of the Australian Stock Exchange Intelligence, the firm's periodical which summarized news for clients. He expanded the publication and presented additional features under the heading, 'Talks on 'Change'. On 17 March 1914 he was elected a member of the Stock Exchange of Melbourne and admitted as a partner in J. B. Were & Son.

With the outbreak of World War I, Ricketson and many of his colleagues and relations on the stock exchange immediately volunteered for service. He enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 17 August and was posted to the 5th Battalion's 'F' Company which was composed of old boys from Victorian public schools. Sailing for the Middle East in October, he took part in the Gallipoli landing on 25 April 1915. His strength of purpose was readily apparent. When the company's commissioned and non-commissioned officers became casualties that day, he braved heavy fire to rally the men and dig a shelter for a wounded officer. He was commissioned on 27 April and awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal. For his subsequent services on the peninsula he was mentioned in dispatches.

W. L. Winter Cooke described how, in June, 'a Turkish bullet ploughed a furrow-right across [Ricketson's] scalp-just missing the bone-but he disregarded it, smiled and carried on'. A shellblast in August left Ricketson partially deaf in the right ear. Evacuated to England in October suffering from diarrhoea, he was sent home in February 1916 to recuperate. At the Presbyterian Church, Prahran, on 6 April that year he married Mary Gwendolyn Brown; they were to have six children before being divorced in 1945. On 4 May 1916 F. W. Were sold the business to his three partners F. J. Fleming, W. F. Geach and Ricketson. Back in England by September, Ricketson was promoted captain in January 1917. He rejoined the 5th Battalion on the Western Front in November and his A.I.F. appointment terminated in Melbourne on 3 September 1919.

In 1923 Ricketson introduced J. B. Were & Son's Weekly Share Market Letter to clients. An increasingly strong force in the firm, he urged his partners in 1928 to sponsor the raising of capital for the first of the Capel Court group of companies, Were's Investment Trust Ltd (later Australian Foundation Investment Co. Ltd). The success of this venture encouraged the firm to back National Reliance Investment Co. Ltd, which was registered in December 1929.

In 1930, when Prime Minister J. H. Scullin's Labor government struggled to cope with the Depression, some ministers and back-benchers advocated financial policies that alarmed Ricketson. As a young man he had met J. A. Lyons who, by November 1930, was acting Federal treasurer. That month Lyons defied caucus and set about raising a £28 million conversion loan. Ricketson formed and headed a committee to advise Lyons and promote the loan. This cabal, comprising Ricketson, four other businessmen and his friend (Sir) Robert Menzies, became known as 'the Group'.

After the conversion loan had been fully subscribed, Ricketson took a prominent part in moves in Melbourne to form an Australian Citizens' League with the aim of restoring 'political integrity and stability' and creating 'a healthy atmosphere remote from party politics'. As acting honorary secretary of the organizing committee, he advertised 'A Monster Mass Meeting' to be held in the Melbourne Town Hall on 19 February 1931. The meeting was a resounding success, and a council of the league (All for Australia League from March) was elected with Ricketson as honorary treasurer. He and his colleagues in the Group had already begun moves to persuade Lyons to leave the Australian Labor Party. In March Lyons revealed his decision to defect. When the Victorian section of the United Australia Party was formed in May, Ricketson was elected temporary secretary of its central council. Under Lyons's leadership, the U.A.P. won a decisive victory in the Federal elections in December.

In 1935 J. B. Were & Son moved to a new Capel Court building in Collins Street. Additional companies were launched: Capel Court Investment Trust (Australia) Ltd in 1936 and Jason Investment Trust (Australia) Ltd in 1937. Ricketson chaired the newly formed Argus & Australasian Ltd in 1936-39. His 'skill and foresight', especially in building up stocks of newsprint before the price rose, ensured that the business was profitable. He had given evidence in 1936 to the Commonwealth government's royal commission on monetary and banking systems. Among other matters, he explained the operation of the 'outside exchange market'. To demonstrate its benefits, he described how-during the financial crisis in the United States of America-

J. B. Were & Son had 'bought for Australian clients some 23 million dollars of Australian [issues of] dollar bonds at about 25 to 40 per cent of their par value, most of these having since recovered to above par'.

In the late 1930s Ricketson directed his firm's successful promotion and underwriting of major companies, including Australian Paper Manufacturers Ltd, Felt & Textiles of Australia Ltd and Imperial Chemical Industries of Australia & New Zealand Ltd. On 26 October 1940 he became sole proprietor of J. B. Were & Son, but in December admitted six new partners. He served on the committee of the Stock Exchange of Melbourne in 1942-46. Having forecast in 1943 that World War II would be followed by a period of 'great industrial expansion', in September 1946 he described 'talk of an early economic depression' as 'moonshine'. On 21 October that year at St Stephen's Presbyterian Church, Caulfield, he married Edna Letitia Holmes, a 35-year-old secretary. His firm marketed a substantial parcel of ordinary shares in Foy & Gibson Ltd and in 1948 issued a special booklet promoting the expansion plans of Broken Hill Proprietary Co. Ltd and its subsidiary, Australian Iron & Steel Ltd.

For a long period in the 1950s Ricketson advocated the severance of the Commonwealth Bank of Australia's 'central bank function from its trading activities'. The establishment of the Reserve Bank of Australia in 1959 has been attributed in part to his influence and persistence. Late in the decade he was closely involved in setting up the short-term money market. In the 1960s he continued to chair a number of companies, including Capel Court Investment Co. (Australia) Ltd, to whose group had been added Lombard Investments (Australia) Ltd, Brenton Investments (Australia) Ltd, Clonmore Investments (Australia) Ltd and Haliburton Investments (Australia) Ltd.

Ricketson was a staunch Anglican and a teetotaller. He demanded that his firm, partners and staff should not engage in share trading on their own account. Many of his associates and subordinates found him overbearing. His sons Anthony, Michael and John joined the firm only to leave it, as did a number of its senior officers. Sir Keith Murdoch had told Ricketson in 1948: 'I have a tremendous admiration for your power of organisation, your courage and your integrity, so it has not disturbed me when I have (very occasionally) felt that your remarks or views have been couched in hard words because your work and great undertakings require intensity of thought and effort'.

A member of the Melbourne Club and the Naval and Military Club, Ricketson also belonged to the Australian and Australasian Pioneers' clubs in Sydney. His recreations were tennis, squash, swimming and, in later life, walking. In the 1950s and 1960s he went with associates and friends on excursions to country retreats, at which they studied and discussed ecological and environmental issues, as well as financial and public affairs. Jack Cato recorded these occasions in photographs and verse. Images of Ricketson reveal a tall, handsome man, generally with an impassive face.

Survived by his wife and their daughter and son, and by the two daughters and three of the four sons of his first marriage, Ricketson died on 6 December 1967 at Kew and was cremated. J. B. Were had died on the same day eighty-two years previously; he, too, was aged 76. When news of Ricketson's death reached the Stock Exchange of Melbourne, members adjourned for two minutes as a mark of respect. His estate, including Toolebewang farm at Launching Place, Upper Yarra Valley, was sworn for probate at \$1,994,720, of which \$1,153,614 was his interest in J. B. Were & Son. A portrait of Ricketson by Sir John Longstaff is held by the family; another by (Sir) William Dargie is in the firm's possession. Frank Strahan

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(1891–1967) entered the financial world in 1911 as a stockbroker with the firm established by his great-grandfather, J.B. Were & Son. After war service he returned to Weres as senior partner, and turned it into Australia's largest stockbroking firm. Conservative and outspoken, Ricketson was extremely influential in the finance industry as he pushed for banking law reforms and helped establish the short-term money market. He played a central role in the recruitment of J.A. Lyons to head the new United Australia Party. figures in Australian Financiers: Biographical Essays (ed. R.T. Appleyard and C.B. Schedvin, 1988).

Louisa married **Rev. Dr. Thomas James Ewing**<sup>24</sup> on 21 Dec 1837 in St. David's church, Hobart, Tasmania, Australia. Thomas was born in 1813 and died on 4 Feb 1882 in 3 Crescent Villas, Plymouth, Devon at age 69. They had six children: Henry Montagu, Jessy Louisa, Frances Elizabeth, Louisa Emily, Florence Mabel, and Blanche Evangeline.

General Notes: Thomas James Ewing (1813?-1882), Church of England clergyman, was born in Devonshire, England. In 1831 he became a scholar of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, and in 1833 sailed for Hobart Town, arriving in November. In November 1837 at St David's Church he married Louisa Were; in May 1838, he was admitted to holy orders by Bishop William Grant Broughton and appointed next month to St George's, Battery Point, with a stipend of £200. In February 1840 he became chaplain of St John's, New Town, and headmaster of the Queen's Orphan Schools, two separate schools for boys and girls founded by Lieutenant-Governor (Sir) George Arthur for the orphans and children of convicts. He was priested by Bishop Francis Nixon on 21 September 1843.

In 1841 reports that Ewing had been guilty of serious misconduct with one of the senior girls began to circulate among the pupils. These eventually reached the ears of the schools' surgeon, on whose advice Ewing asked the colonial secretary for an independent investigation. Captain Charles Swanston, one of the guardians of the schools, was asked to make the inquiry and in due course reported to the lieutenant-governor that, although Ewing was not guilty of criminal conduct, his imprudence was inconsistent with his position as headmaster. In January 1844 Ewing was notified that his two positions were to be separated, and that he was to continue as chaplain of St John's and act as chaplain to the schools but not as headmaster. In accepting this decision, Ewing inquired whether the lieutenant-governor was satisfied with the discharge of his duties as headmaster during the last five years and received a formal expression of satisfaction in reply. On 7 January 1846 Ewing was granted leave to return to England to see his mother, and sailed with his wife and four children a few days later. In reporting the grant of leave to the Colonial Office, Lieutenant-Governor Sir John Eardley-Wilmot stated that Ewing 'bears the highest character as a Clergyman and a Gentleman'. His leave was extended, and in April 1847 he wrote at length to the bishop of Tasmania about the deplorable state of the orphan schools. Among other things he claimed that, under his charge, the schools had been a credit to the colony and had been greatly admired by several distinguished visitors, and that he had been removed from the headmastership so that a position could be found for the commandant of Port Arthur whose health had failed. Ewing also offered to superintend the training of the Protestant children at the schools, in addition to his other duties, without any increase in salary.

This letter was forwarded by the bishop to the secretary of state, who sent it for comment to Lieutenant-Governor Sir William Denison. Denison did not reply until September 1849, nearly two years after Ewing's return from leave. Denison admitted that the state of the schools was bad but claimed that, even so, they were better conducted than when Ewing was headmaster. While not denying Ewing's reason for his removal, which had been his predecessor's doing, he suggested that there were other causes, particularly the affair of 1841, in which Denison thought Ewing 'was very mildly dealt with'. Finally he rejected outright Ewing's offer to superintend the Protestant children on the ground that 'Mr Ewing is not in any way fitted for a situation of such importance, even were he free and untrammelled'.

Ewing remained chaplain of St John's until March 1863 when he was publicly farewelled and given a purse of forty-three sovereigns by parishioners and friends before his departure for England for eighteen months leave. At this farewell Ewing declared his intention to return to the colony, but he remained in England. In 1864 he received the degree of D.D. from the archbishop of Canterbury, and served as chaplain at Tattingstone, Suffolk, in 1868-70, and at Postwick, Norfolk, in 1876-82. He died at Plymouth, Devonshire, on 4 February 1882, aged 69. Ewing had strong scientific interests, especially in ornithology. Two species of birds were named after him and some of his papers were published. These included 'A Catalogue of the Birds of Tasmania', and 'Migrating Caterpillar' (Tasmanian Journal of Natural Science, 1842), 'List of the Birds of Tasmania', and 'On Silk Producing Moth' (Proceedings of the Royal Society of Tasmania, 1855, 1863). He was also something of a statistician. From official records he prepared 'Statistics of Tasmania, 1838-1841' (Tasmanian Journal of Natural Science, 1846). This paper earned him the praise of the lieutenant-governor who offered to appoint him honorary statistician to the government in June 1841. Ewing accepted the post but apparently produced no more statistics. Select Bibliography

Percy Roger Whalley was born in 1881 at Herbrandston, Pembrokeshire, son of Major Percy Charles Whalley of the Royal Artillery (South Hook Fort). His mother Florence Mabel Whalley who was born in Tasmania, sadly died at the young age of 38 when Percy Roger Whalley was only 7 years old. Percy had 3 younger sisters, Barbara, Pamela and Cynthia (who was born the year the mother died).

Percy Roger Whalley was educated at the Royal Military College and was commissioned to the Unattached List as a 2nd Lieutenant on the 8th January 1901. On the 26th April 1902 he was seconded for service to the Worcestershire Regiment in South Africa and promoted to rank of Lieutenant. He was awarded the Queen's Medal with 5 clasps. On the outbreak of the 1914-18 War he was Adjutant of the 1/8th Battalion of the Regiment and went out to France with them in 1915. He later joined 144th Brigade as Brigade Major. In 1916 he took over Command of the 3rd Battalion on the Somme and served almost continuously with that Battalion until he brought them home after the Armistice. Mark [ii] Harford (1738–1798) of Stoke Bishop, increased the family's stake in the Bristol Brass Company by marrying Sarah (d. 1798), daughter of Samuel Lloyd, in 1762, and became its leader. In the following years it became one of the most important industrial enterprises in the world, owning copper mines, smelters, and brassworks, in Cornwall, Bristol and its environs, Esher in Surrey, Lower Redbrook in the Wye valley, and Swansea. Mark [ii] Harford headed a committee of nine, on which sat five Harfords, including his first cousins Edward [iii] and Joseph, of the Blaise Castle and Stapleton branches. Much is known about Henry Charles Harford, firstly due to his exploits during the Anglo Zulu War but also because he came from an eminent family linked through marriage to the Scott family of Outlands in Devon. Captain Robert Falcon Scott - Scott of the Antarctic - was Harford's cousin. Charlie Harford, as he was popularly known, played a significant role in the Anglo Zulu War of 1879 and his eye-witness accounts, writings and sketches on the subject have only recently been discovered. Harford was well known to his colleagues for his intense interest in nature, especially of beetles, butterflies and moths, an interest which matched his enthusiasm for military life. Harford participated in a number of important actions during the Zulu War and was at Rorke's Drift where he witnessed and recorded the fortification of the Mission Station prior to the invasion of Zululand. As an experienced Lieutenant attached to the Colonial Natal Native Contingent from the 99th (Wiltshire) Regiment, he led the first attack against the Zulus under the watchful eye of the British Commander, Lord Chelmsford during which he caused some confusion in the heat of battle by famously pausing to collect a rare beetle. For his calm bravery Harford earned the respect and admiration of his fellow officers while modestly shunning suggestions he would be suitably decorated. Within days he wrote a remarkable and detailed account of the engagement which, beyond his immediate family, remained unread. Harford then accompanied Lord Chelmsford on his ill-fated reconnaissance from Isandlwana which left the British unprepared and unaware of the approaching Zulu Army, and he scrupulously recorded the chaos and confusion in the hours leading to the Zulu destruction of Chelmsford's main camp. He witnessed the aftermath of both the destruction of Isandlwana and the Zulu attack at Rorke's Drift where, just days later, he supervised the disbandment of the Natal Native Contingent. At the same time Harford's senior officer, Commandant Lonsdale, gave him custody of two officer deserters, Lieutenants Higginson and Stephenson; both officers had abandoned their men in action against the Zulus and the situation caused Harford some perplexing moments. Following the eventual Zulu defeat on the 4th July 1879 Harford was part of the force that searched for King Cetshwayo and following his capture the King was given into the custody of Harford until his exile to Cape Town. Harford meticulously recorded and sketched his experiences and these feature for the first time in this remarkable new work. Harford was extremely lucky to have survived to old age, he eventually died at the age of 86.

He was born in India where he immediately developed fever and was given into the care of an Indian family as he was not expected to survive. He was subsequently returned to his parents fit and well but prior to his second birthday he managed to fall out of an upper window and was impaled on spiked railings. Again, he was expected to die of his injuries but he survived and recovered. His account contains many unusual hair-raising experiences. His childhood was spent largely exploring, hunting and shooting, both in England and then in Natal, South Africa and his diaries are illuminating, amusing and exciting. His accounts of fishing and hunting trips, often in unmapped areas of Natal, make wonderful reading, as do the escapades and pranks which were a feature of his life. Harford possessed a wonderful sense of humour which shines through his accounts. Throughout his writings, he expresses his love of nature and wildlife yet at the same time he begins to note the way of life of the native population he mixed with. His childhood friends in South Africa included such young notables as Cecil Rhodes, Spencer Drake (descendent of Sir Francis Drake), Robert and Frank Colenso, and the feral youth John Dunn (later to become adviser to King Cetshwayo). He also formed many friendships with British army officers, friendships which drew him to an army career at an early age. As a youth he learned to speak fluent Zulu and when in his twenties, as the Adjutant of the 99th Regiment then serving in England, he was well aware of the looming war in Zululand. He offered his services to the War Office, services which were promptly accepted and he soon found himself back in Natal in time for the Anglo-Zulu War. After service in Zululand, Harford remained in the British army and served variously in the UK, Bahamas and India. He retained his interest in collecting rare specimens and he meticulously recorded these and sent the best exhibits to the Museum of Natural History in Durban. A number of rare items were also presented to the British Museum in London (then latterly to the Natural History Museum). Like many dedicated military officers, he married late in life but tragically lost his new young wife to fever in India. He was left with an infant daughter, Sweetie, and never remarried.

### A CHAT WITH CAPTAIN HARFORD.

Captain Samuel Henry Harford, British Consul in the Island of New Caledonia, is fresh from the scene of the most recent tornado. He arrived here a day or two ago, en route for England, whence he goes on leave after some two and a-half years' residence in the French settlement During a half-hour's chat a representative of this journal had with the old and distinguished Imperial officer - Captain Harford saw service in the Crimea, was at the siege and assault at Sebastopol, and has filled several Consular appointments - it was perhaps natural that the latest experience should be the initial topic. The storm which raged at Noumea and. thereabouts caused much damage. Roofs and balconies, he said, were blown away, buildings destroyed, and trees were blown down in every direction, and he had no doubt that up the country from Noumea the sugar and coffee plantations had suffered severely - Captain Harford generalises by saying the damage must have been enormous. Strange to say, in Noumea only one fatality was reported. Of course, on the coast at Thio, for instance - the Falls of Garry and the Professor were lost, and the Fiado Is still missing. With regard to this latter vessel, Captain Harford does not think it at all likely that anything further will be heard of the unfortunate ship.

The subject of the storm brought up the kindred one of weather forecasting. And if Captain Harford was more definite on one question than another, it was with regard to the services rendered by Mr. Wragge to Noumea. Even at the risk of making the Government Meteorologist blush, it is due to him to record an outsider's appreciation of the Queensland Weather Bureau. " He is a most marvellous man," remarked Captain Harford. " His predictions are very accurate, and of course they prove extremely useful. His forecasts are published every night in the papers, and are always acted upon, the people anchor their roofs or their houses, and do everything necessary. The last storm struck exactly where he said it would. He has established quite a reputation In Noumea, where what he says is believed to be just as certain as that the sun will rise."

Pursuing the subject further, Captain Harford expressed the belief that the Italian Consul owed his life - or at any rate he avoided a very unpleasant night by paying attention to the Queensland Weather Office forecast The Italian Consul bad been dining with Captain Harford, and the latter suggested that, in view of the serious weather ahead, he would be safer to remain at his (the captain's) house than In his own wooden dwelling. The advice was accepted, and, as events proved, he was wise to do so, for the house of the Italian Consul was practically demolished by the tornado.

It would appear that in New Caledonia every industry is made subservient to mining. There are some excellent cattle pastures there-sheep do not thrive and the cattle all look well. But the people

do not raise nearly enough to supply the wants of the place, which are somewhat extensive because of the penal and military establishments kept up there. Certainly of late the Industry has made some strides, which no doubt accounts for the falling off of cattle shipments from Queensland, although considerable shipments still find their way to the island from Australia. But, as already etated all enterprise is devoted to mining, which is largely in the hands of three or four big companies. Indeed, the future of the Island Is believed to depend on the mineral deposits there, which are very numerous, and equally extensive. The principal, undertaking has one of the Rothschilds behind it, and next in importance, perhaps, is the International Mining Company, in which Lord Dunmore bas a large Interest. There would appear to be no limit to the deposits of chrome, cobalt, copper, and nickel, and some rich gold discoveries are numbered among the finds. Numerous experts have been asked to pass Judgment on several properties held by both the companies mentioned, as well as on some of the private mines, and their reports have been extremely favourable. The difficulty in the matter is one Queensland has experienced, not so much in regard to her mining industry as In other ventures namely, labour. It is in every respect costly, and there seems to be little doubt but that this is hampering those engaged in the undertakings. Even convict labour, after all the wearing official preliminaries have been taken, costs about £3 a month, and free labour - that Is " free" convicts runs as high as £5 and £10 per month, while Chinese and Tonganeee labour Is worth as much as from £6 to £8 per month, and the same figure may be quoted for time-expired Kanakas. " Free" convicts and Kanakas appear to be the chief labour availed of. It has been found that when Chinese and Javanese are worked in communities they do very well, but then there are few mines which can employ a whole village, and, consequently, in this form the labour can seldom be b

Captain Harford was loud in his praises of the climate and scenery of the island. He speaks of it as a most healthy and salubrious place, where no epidemic more serious than prickly heat has been known, and where nothing more harmful in the way of pests than mosquitoes have ever established themselves. They have, of course, heard of the tick, but fortunately have not yet experienced it. What New, Caledonia and her dependencies suffer most from is lack of population - a want the French settlement Is not singular in. Captain Harford himself has been stationed at Noumea for about two and a half years, and is now on leave. He hopes to return about August or September, but In the meantime will visit England, making a short stay at Port Said. He leaves Brisbane on the 12th April by one of the B.I. boats.

Truman married Mary Dickinson,<sup>34,41,42</sup> daughter of Caleb Dickinson<sup>34,41</sup> and Sarah Vickris,<sup>34,41</sup> on 26 Feb 1728 in Corsham, Wiltshire. Mary was born on 8 Dec 1713 in Monks, Chippenham, Wiltshire and

General Notes: Harford, James (1734–1817), iron and tin plate manufacturer and merchant, was the son of Truman Harford (1704–1750), merchant and manufacturer, and Mary Taylor of Baldock, Hertfordshire, and grandson of Charles Harford (1662–1725), a merchant, of Bristol [see Harford family]. He developed a powerful network of tin plate- and iron-making interests and was the foremost among many Bristol merchants who became industrial entrepreneurs in south Wales. He lived at Felindre, Melingriffith, near Cardiff, and at his estate at Chew Magna in Somerset. In 1756 he married Anne Summers, daughter of his business partner, Richard Summers; they had six sons and four daughters.

Harford developed industrial interests while maintaining his connections in Bristol, where he was a member of the Society of Merchant Venturers and part of an extensive Quaker merchant family. He succeeded by linking and developing existing enterprises rather than establishing new ventures, and was one of the few ironmasters to prosper in the eras of both charcoal and coke fuel. His numerous interests included the Pen-tyrch, Ebbw Vale, Nant-y-glo, Sirhowy, and Caerphilly smelting works in south-east Wales; Redbrook furnace, Monmouth forge, Newent forge, and New Weir forge in the Wye valley; and the Machen and Basaleg forges near Newport, Monmouthshire.

Harford's central industrial concern was the Melingriffith forge and tin plate works near Cardiff, which was established by Bristol merchants about 1750. He became a partner about 1768, along with the noted ironmaster Richard Reynolds, Richard Summers, and a number of others. By the 1770s he was in partnership with John Partridge sen. (fl. 1730s–1770s) and John Partridge jun. (c.1736–1816), Quaker ironmasters of Ross, Herefordshire, and Monmouth. In 1795 Harford and his younger brother John Harford (1736–c.1816), with James's sons Richard Summers Harford [see below] and Samuel Harford (1766–1838), were major figures in the enterprise. At this time Melingriffith was the largest tin plate works in the world. The main products were tin plate, and wrought-iron bars, sheets, rods, and hoops, but the company also dealt in cast-iron pots, frying pans, anvils, hammers, and spades, some purchased from other manufacturers. Goods were exported under the auspices of James Harford & Co., merchants, of Bristol. In 1805 the nearby Pen-tyrch furnace was bought, and both enterprises were enlarged. However, in 1808 the partnership was dissolved, as the Harfords concentrated on more recently acquired, larger ironworks. They left Felindre, their local residence, in 1810 and Melingriffith and Pen-tyrch were transferred in 1812 to a group led by Richard Blakemore (b. 1775), the grandson of John Partridge sen.

Of the other ironworks interests, most were intended initially to complement the existing business, such as Redbrook furnace and Lydbrook forge, brought into the group through partnership with the Partridges. Caerphilly furnace was acquired in 1781 with a rolling and slitting mill. Although a blowing engine was installed in 1793, the furnace remained charcoal-fuelled and output in 1796 was only 600 tons. It was out of blast by 1805, made obsolete by the larger coke-fuelled works the Harfords had acquired.

The acquisitions which carried the Harfords into the production of bulk iron began in the 1790s. The only new venture was the ironworks at Nant-y-glo, promoted in 1792 with Thomas Hill, already a successful ironmaster at Blaenafon. Unfortunately, Hill complained that £485 was spent above his £10,000 capital and refused to let production start, even though Harford, Partridge & Co. had spent £16,381. The company was obliged simply to smelt material in stock, and the works lay idle from 1796 until 1802, when Hill returned with different partners.

Immediately before this débâcle, however, Harford, Partridge & Co. had become partners of Jeremiah Homfray at Ebbw Vale ironworks, introducing capital for expansion. It became the sole owner in 1796. This was the first element in what was to become one of the most powerful ironworks enterprises in south Wales. James Harford as senior partner and his brother John as managing partner expanded Ebbw Vale from one blast furnace to four. Then, around the time of James's death in 1817, the company acquired the adjacent Sirhowy works (much to the anger of another ironmaster, Richard Fothergill, who had confided his own plans to renew the lease). This site too was expanded, from two furnaces to five. The period of greatest growth in the Harford iron fortunes ensued, under the management of Richard Summers Harford. Output at Ebbw Vale in 1805 had been 3664 tons; but from the two combined works it was 10.425 tons in 1823 and 26.020 in 1830. The capital value in 1820–21 was over £62.000 and rising rapidly.

As the possessor of an extensive industrial empire, James Harford was an enthusiastic promoter of improvements to transport. In 1785 he became a trustee of the turnpike from Merthyr Tudful to Tongwynlais, which brought iron to Melingriffith. When the Glamorganshire Canal Company was established in 1790, he was its first honorary treasurer and he and his sons were among the largest shareholders. Richard Crawshay, the Merthyr ironmaster, was constantly at loggerheads on the canal committee with Harford, whom he described as 'a rude, selfish Jew Quaker', insolent, and 'a mercenary fellow who must be treated as Circumstances require' (Letterbook, xx, 92). Harford, Partridge & Co. and James Harford were also leading shareholders in the Monmouthshire Canal Company. Harford's interests in education and workers' welfare were demonstrated at Melingriffith. From about 1775 the works had a scheme for medical attendance, as well as a reading-room. In 1786 a friendly society, the Melingriffith Benefit Club, was established, one of the earliest in south Wales. In 1798 there were sixty-three members, including John Harford, the employees at Melingriffith, and other local people. The club provided social activities, benefits, and pensions, and similar ones were started at Caerphilly in 1787 and at Ebbw Vale. A school for workers and their children existed at Melingriffith before 1786, and in 1807 James Harford invited Joseph Lancaster to address a meeting which resulted in the establishment there by subscription of a Lancastrian school for boys and girls. James Harford's sons and grandsons continued in the iron industry. His eldest son, Truman Harford (1758–1803), took the lease of Caerphilly furnace with his father and Philip Crocker in 1789 and dealt with

iron orders at Melingriffith in the 1790s, but he established himself also as a brewer in Limehouse, London. Samuel, his fourth son, participated at Melingriffith. John Harford (1768–1851), his fifth son, and his daughters Elizabeth Harford (d. 1836) and Sophia Harford (b. 1779) lived at Gelliwastad, Machen, about 1816 and may have overseen Caerphilly furnace and Machen forge. However, it was James's second son, Richard Summers Harford (1763–1837), iron manufacturer, who became his effective heir. Richard established Nant-y-glo ironworks and lived nearby at Trosnant until 1799, and continued to operate associated collieries until 1801. He was increasingly involved at Ebbw Vale, which became the focus of the Harford interests, and he built a three-storey mansion, Ebbw Vale House, in 1817. He led the company from the time of his father's death in 1817 until his own in 1837. He followed his father into the Society of Merchant Venturers in 1825 and inherited the Chew Magna estate. In 1792 he married Jane Lloyd Perkins; their sons, Summers Harford and Charles Lloyd Harford, appear subsequently to have taken responsibility for the works. Their iron business was severely damaged by defaults on credits in Maryland, USA, which led to the bankruptcy of Harford, Davies & Co. of Ebbw Vale in 1842. Significantly, the meeting of creditors was held in Bristol. Although Ebbw Vale continued to expand under new owners, this ended almost a century of the Harfords' leadership in the iron trade of south Wales.

obtained eternal redemption for us ; and his humble confidence in his Heavenly Father's love and mercy often enabled him to realise the beautiful promise, " Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on Thee, because he trusteth in Thee." The yoingest of a large family, and never having known a father's care, his life was early shadowed by the loss of brothers and sisters ; and his own health, which was never robust, broke down after his twenty-third year ; and a voyage to Nevis, in the West Indies, was considered the best human means to check serious symptoms that followed an attack of small-pox ; and this proved very effectual. Under the feeling tliat the doctrine of the Atonement needed to be more fully set forth, he employed himself, during a time of recovery from severe bronchial attacks, in compiling a little pamphlet, " How we are saved by Christ " ; and later, "Jesus fulfils the Law"; and this occupation was a source of great interest ; and also the committing to memory of large portions of Scripture and a number of hymns. While still young he was appointed an Elder in Bristol Meeting, and afterwards in those at Tottenham and Saffron Walden ; and his active service in all these places was much valued. In his business relations he had many severe reverses ; but these were accepted as from a Father's hand, and he frequently and gratefully acknowledged that " Goodness and mercy had followed him all the days of his life " ; and we thankfully think of him now as " dwelling in the house of the Lord for ever."

Ann K. Lury was the eldest daughter of Robert and Jane Eaton of Swansea, and her childhood's home was a very happy one, her bright, loving, unselfish spirit made her beloved by all with whom she came in contact. When through no fault of his, her father's bank had to be closed soon after she left school, she worked indefatigably in picking and sending fruit to the market, making cheese for sale, and training her young brothers and sisters to work, trying ito find out what each was best suited for. In this way they were able to keep their beautiful home until the bank was re-opened with no loss to anyone but themselves : and may we not say that this early trial and training brought forth rich fruit in after days.

In the autumn of 1838 she was married to Samuel Harford Lury, of Bristol, and at first the restraints of city life were trying to one who was used to riding over the moors and hills near her home. In 1840 a son was born, and about the same time her mother died, and a few weeks after her father, bringing thought and care and suffering upon her when not quite twenty-four, which were unmurmuringly and patiently borne.

At this time she was rarely willing to speak of her spiritual experience; but as years went on, all around her noticed a change in this respect, and her testimony to her Saviour's love to her, and his power to save from sin was clear and unwavering.

In 1858, after a sojourn of six years in Tottenham, all her husband's property was lost owing to the unprincipled conduct of an agent, and he took his family to reside for a while in the South of France to try and recover as much as he could. With a face unshadowed by this trial, she dismissed her servants with the exception of one who would not leave her, and did her best to teach and do everything for the four children who went with them. This was a time never to be forgotten, and the example of both parents in many difficulties, always " seeking first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness," did much to mould the characters of their children.

In 1859 a move was made to Saffron Walden, where for sixteen years she led a busy life of ministry to others.

After returning to Bristol for fourteen years, they removed to Clevedon, and the last six years were very happy ones. She was weak and ill when her beloved husband was taken to his heavenly home after an illness of two days, and she was then in daily expectation of following him ; but to the surprise of all she rallied, and though never again able to leave her bed, she lived - waiting her Lord's time as she said - for four years and a half. An expression often on her lips, if her daughters were called away, was " Don't trouble about me."

She passed peacefully away after a week's illness, three of her children being with her. Just before the end she said, " I have nothing to wait for, I know whom I have believed." She sent a message of love and blessing to her eldest daughter who was not able to return from America in time to see her again. When realizing this she said, " God knows best."

One of England's oldest Quakers, Sarah Jane Lury, died at her home at Clevedon, Somerset, on January 3, when she was nearly 99. During her long life she travelled in America, Canada, and New Zealand. In her middle nineties she made the shorter but still enterprising journey to South Wales in order to nurse and keep house for a sick niece. Sarah Jane was taken to Friends Meetings by her mother when she was so small that she could sit on the matting at her mother's feet. Her little Quaker bonnet gave her much trouble. Meetings in those days usually lasted an hour and a half, and Friends then made no special provision for children. But even at the age of six Sarah Jane was impressed. When she grew up her father gave her some property, to teach her how to manage money, and she used some . of her " riches " to visit cousins in Florida. Soon after this another woman Friend asked Sarah Jane Lury to join her in visits to American Friends - one of those missions of friendship which individual Quakers used to undertake even more frequently than today. The two women "traveiled hard " in Kansas, going to Red Indian centres as well as to American Meetings, and on one occasion nursing their sick host and his wife and preparing a meal also for Red Indian guests who came in their war-paint. She next went to New Zealand, and when the companion whom she found there to accompany her on visits to very isolated Friends fell ill on the way, Sarah Jane nursed her for, ten days and nights before anyone could arrive to relieve her. On a later visit to New Zealand she helped to start a hostel for women students. At home again Sarah Jane Lury kept shop, organised temperance work, typed letters advocating social reform, and "did the thing that was nearest" all the time, up to the very last.

"Joseph Beck, the father of Joseph, the husband of the well known Mary Beck, built the house at Frenchay. The wife of the elder Joseph Beck, survived him. She had three husbands, Jos. Beck, Coysgarne, and lastly Daniells, This Mrs. Daniells lived at a corner house in James Square, Bristol, the corner originally opposite the entrance from the Barton. Here she was visited by Alexander Selkirk, then recently returned from his solitary abode in the Island of Juan Fernandez. There also she was accustomed to entertain Daniel De Foe. It was in her house that Selkirk gave De Foe an account of his adventures, etc., from which De Foe drew up a narrative of Selkirk which was published. Many years later Defoe wrote and published his romance of Robinson Crusoe, the notion of which was suggested by Selkirk's narrative. The Romance speedily supplanted the genuine work, and while the existence of the latter is now hardly known the former is still among the most popular of books.

"A gentleman (name forgotten) who was accustomed to meet Selkirk at Mrs. Daniells' sent a paper to the Gentleman's Magazine containing a very specific account of what he heard from him. "W. P. Lunell died 30 or 40 years since. His sons are living. The foregoing has been copied by some few but never published just as here given. Who the conversation was with I do not know, but it is quite authentic. It works in with J. Harford's account, and the gentleman alluded to as sending to the Gent. Mai;, was no doubt Joseph Harford. Use this as you like as original, "Gotham, 1868." " (Sfi.) Francis Fry."

General Notes: Joseph Harford aggrandized the family by marrying in 1763 Hannah (d. 1811), daughter of Joseph Kill of Stapleton Grove, near Bristol, where they took up residence. He became a justice of the peace, treasurer of Bristol Infirmary, promoter of the Bristol Library Society, and chairman of the Bristol slavery abolition committee. He was prominent in Bristol politics during the radical campaign of 1769 and was in 1771 one of Edmund Burke's two sponsors to become a member of parliament, opening his campaign with a subscription of £300. Burke said, 'You could not have a better man than Mr Harford. He has a great bottom for confidence. He has a firm Integrity; very enlarged notions; and one of the most solid and well cultivated understandings I have met with' (Underdown, 137). Harford himself was elected to Bristol common council in 1779 and acted as high sheriff on three occasions. The Society of Friends disavowed him for taking his oath, resulting in his conversion to the Church of England. Joseph Harford died at Stapleton Grove on 11 October 1802.

Much is known about Henry Charles Harford, firstly due to his exploits during the Anglo Zulu War but also because he came from an eminent family linked through marriage to the Scott family of Outlands in Devon. Captain Robert Falcon Scott - Scott of the Antarctic - was Harford's cousin. Charlie Harford, as he was popularly known, played a significant role in the Anglo Zulu War of 1879 and his eye-witness accounts, writings and sketches on the subject have only recently been discovered. Harford was well known to his colleagues for his intense interest in nature, especially of beetles, butterflies and moths, an interest which matched his enthusiasm for military life. Harford participated in a number of important actions during the Zulu War and was at Rorke's Drift where he witnessed and recorded the fortification of the Mission Station prior to the invasion of Zululand. As an experienced Lieutenant attached to the Colonial Natal Native Contingent from the 99th (Wiltshire) Regiment, he led the first attack against the Zulus under the watchful eye of the British Commander, Lord Chelmsford during which he caused some confusion in the heat of battle by famously pausing to collect a rare beetle. For his calm bravery Harford earned the respect and admiration of his fellow officers while modestly shunning suggestions he would be suitably decorated. Within days he wrote a remarkable and detailed account of the engagement which, beyond his immediate family, remained unread. Harford then accompanied Lord Chelmsford on his ill-fated reconnaissance from Isandlwana which left the British unprepared and unaware of the approaching Zulu Army, and he scrupulously recorded the chaos and confusion in the hours leading to the Zulu destruction of Chelmsford's main camp. He witnessed the aftermath of both the destruction of Isandlwana and the Zulu attack at Rorke's Drift where, just days later, he supervised the disbandment of the Natal Native Contingent. At the same time Harford's senior officer, Commandant Lonsdale, gave him custody of two officer deserters, Lieutenants Higginson and Stephenson; both officers had abandoned their men in action against the Zulus and the situation caused Harford some perplexing moments. Following the eventual Zulu defeat on the 4th July 1879 Harford was part of the force that searched for King Cetshwayo and following his capture the King was given into the custody of Harford until his exile to Cape Town. Harford meticulously recorded and sketched his experiences and these feature for the first time in this remarkable new work. Harford was extremely lucky to have survived to old age, he eventually died at the age of 86.

He was born in India where he immediately developed fever and was given into the care of an Indian family as he was not expected to survive. He was subsequently returned to his parents fit and well but prior to his second birthday he managed to fall out of an upper window and was impaled on spiked railings. Again, he was expected to die of his injuries but he survived and recovered. His account contains many unusual hair-raising experiences. His childhood was spent largely exploring, hunting and shooting, both in England and then in Natal, South Africa and his diaries are illuminating, amusing and exciting. His accounts of fishing and hunting trips, often in unmapped areas of Natal, make wonderful reading, as do the escapades and pranks which were a feature of his life. Harford possessed a wonderful sense of humour which shines through his accounts. Throughout his writings, he expresses his love of nature and wildlife yet at the same time he begins to note the way of life of the native population he mixed with. His childhood friends in South Africa included such young notables as Cecil Rhodes, Spencer Drake (descendent of Sir Francis Drake), Robert and Frank Colenso, and the feral youth John Dunn (later to become adviser to King Cetshwayo). He also formed many friendships with British army officers, friendships which drew him to an army career at an early age. As a youth he learned to speak fluent Zulu and when in his twenties, as the Adjutant of the 99th Regiment then

serving in England, he was well aware of the looming war in Zululand. He offered his services to the War Office, services which were promptly accepted and he soon found himself back in Natal in time for the Anglo-Zulu War. After service in Zululand, Harford remained in the British army and served variously in the UK, Bahamas and India. He retained his interest in collecting rare specimens and he meticulously recorded these and sent the best exhibits to the Museum of Natural History in Durban. A number of rare items were also presented to the British Museum in London (then latterly to the Natural History Museum). Like many dedicated military officers, he married late in life but tragically lost his new young wife to fever in India. He was left with an infant daughter, Sweetie, and never re-married.

## VISIT OF THE BRITISH CONSUL. A CHAT WITH CAPTAIN HARFORD.

Captain Samuel Henry Harford, British Consul in the Island of New Caledonia, is fresh from the scene of the most recent tornado. He arrived here a day or two ago, en route for England, whence he goes on leave after some two and a-half years' residence in the French settlement During a half-hour's chat a representative of this journal had with the old and distinguished Imperial officer - Captain Harford saw service in the Crimea, was at the siege and assault at Sebastopol, and has filled several Consular appointments - it was perhaps natural that the latest experience should be the initial topic. The storm which raged at Noumea and. thereabouts caused much damage. Roofs and balconies, he said, were blown away, buildings destroyed, and trees were blown down in every direction, and he had no doubt that up the country from Noumea the sugar and coffee plantations had suffered severely - Captain Harford generalises by saying the damage must have been enormous. Strange to say, in Noumea only one fatality was reported. Of course, on the coast at Thio, for instance - the Falls of Garry and the Professor were lost, and the Fiado Is still missing. With regard to this latter vessel, Captain Harford one of weather forecasting. And if Captain Harford was more definite on one question than another, it was with regard to the services rendered by Mr. Wragge to Noumea. Even at the risk of making the Government Meteorologist blush, it is due to him to record an outsider's appreciation of the Queensland Weather Bureau. " He is a most marvellous man," remarked Captain Harford. " His predictions are very accurate, and of course they prove extremely useful. His forecasts are published every night in the papers, and are always acted upon, the people anchor their roofs or their houses, and do everything necessary. The last storm struck exactly where he said it would. He has established quite a reputation In Noumea, where what he says is believed to be just as certain as that the sun will rise."

Pursuing the subject further, Captain Harford expressed the belief that the Italian Consul owed his life - or at any rate he avoided a very unpleasant night by paying attention to the Queensland Weather Office forecast The Italian Consul bad been dining with Captain Harford, and the latter suggested that, in view of the serious weather ahead, he would be safer to remain at his (the captain's) house than In his own wooden dwelling. The advice was accepted, and, as events proved, he was wise to do so, for the house of the Italian Consul was practically demolished by the tornado.

It would appear that in New Caledonia every industry is made subservient to mining. There are some excellent cattle pastures there-sheep do not thrive and the cattle all look well. But the people do not raise nearly enough to supply the wants of the place, which are somewhat extensive because of the penal and military establishments kept up there. Certainly of late the Industry has made some strides, which no doubt accounts for the falling off of cattle shipments from Queensland, although considerable shipments still find their way to the island from Australia. But, as already etated all enterprise is devoted to mining, which is largely in the hands of three or four big companies. Indeed, the future of the Island Is believed to depend on the mineral deposits there, which are very numerous, and equally extensive. The principal, undertaking has one of the Rothschilds behind it, and next in importance, perhaps, is the International Mining Company, in which Lord Dunmore bas a large Interest. There would appear to be no limit to the deposits of chrome, cobalt, copper, and nickel, and some rich gold discoveries are numbered among the finds. Numerous experts have been asked to pass Judgment on several properties held by both the companies mentioned, as well as on some of the private mines, and their reports have been extremely favourable. The difficulty in the matter is one Queensland has experienced, not so much in regard to her mining industry as In other ventures namely, labour. It is in every respect costly, and there seems to be little doubt but that this is hampering those engaged in the undertakings. Even convict labour, after all the wearing official preliminaries have been taken, costs about £3 amonth, and free labour - that Is " free" convicts runs as high as £5 and £10 per month, while Chinese and Tonganeee labour Is worth as much as from £6 to £8 per month, and the same figure may be quoted for time-expired Kanakas. " Free" convicts and Kanakas appear to be the chief labour availed of. It has been found th

Captain Harford was loud in his praises of the climate and scenery of the island. He speaks of it as a most healthy and salubrious place, where no epidemic more serious than prickly heat has been known, and where nothing more harmful in the way of pests than mosquitoes have ever established themselves. They have, of course, heard of the tick, but fortunately have not yet experienced it. What New, Caledonia and her dependencies suffer most from is lack of population - a want the French settlement Is not singular in. Captain Harford himself has been stationed at Noumea for about two and a half years, and is now on leave. He hopes to return about August or September, but In the meantime will visit England, making a short stay at Port Said. He leaves Brisbane on the 12th April by one of the B.I. boats.

Edward Henry Paul Cave was born at Twyford in Leicestershire, where his father was a curate. His early years were spent mainly on the Continent as his father changed livings. After school at Tonbridge and rejection by the Royal Navy because of eye problems, he entered Sandhurst for one year and then transferred to the Royal Flying Corps, joining No 6 Squadron on the Ypres salient in June 1915. The following year he was shot down on 16 January, suffering a compound fracture of the femur, which left him with one of his characteristics, a limp, the other being his beloved pipe. It was a year before he was able to resume flying, and his interest in radiology was kindled by numerous x-rays on his right leg. Demobilised in 1918 after further service in Egypt and Palestine, he entered King's College and qualified in 1923. After this he turned to radiology and studied under Robert Knox. In 1925 he took the DMRE and went to Reading to a practice in London Street. He also succeeded Dr L L Phillips as honorary radiologist to the Royal Berkshire Hospital.

Before the second world war he held a variety of honorary appointments, including local hospitals as well as at Swindon and Battersea, and in 1948 he became consultant to the Reading group, a post from which he retired in 1958. Then began a period of long and happy retirement in Switzerland, when he was able to recapture some of the joys of previous holidays spend walking in the mountains above Lake Como. Working alone for most of his life, he was a staunch individualist with an interest in the uncommon reflected in his many publications. He also wrote a chapter in Hey Groves's Surgery and related his experiences with radioactive contrast media in intravenous pyelography as long ago as 1946. In his last year he was still experimenting with casts of the lower bowel and their relationship to neoplastic changes. A pioneer x-ray worker, he escaped relatively lightly with minor skin changes in his lower limbs, unlike some of his contemporaries.

His father, a partner in the private bank of Kingston and Prideaux, was a descendant of Humphrey Prideaux, dean of Norwich, but was raised as a Quaker. Frederick Prideaux was educated at the Plymouth grammar school, at a private school at Egloshayle, near Wadebridge, Cornwall, and under a private tutor. He was instructed in law by his elder brother, Walter Prideaux, of the firm of Lane and Prideaux, solicitors, London, and by the eminent Quaker conveyancer John Hodgkin. On 26 May 1834 he was admitted a student at Lincoln's Inn, where he was called to the bar on 27 January 1840. At Clifton on 14 April 1853 he married Fanny Ash, a poet and the second daughter of Richard Ball of Portland House, Kingsdown, Gloucestershire. After practising for some years in London, Prideaux moved to Bath in 1858. James Charleton was subsequently remarried, in 1835; his new wife was Elizabeth Fox; Robert Charleton's relationship with his stepmother was sufficiently harmonious for him to continue under her roof after his father's death until his own marriage, on 13 December 1849, to her niece, Catherine Brewster, eldest daughter of Thomas Fox of Ipswich. He was trained in business by Henry Fowler Cottrell, a Bath land surveyor, and set up on his own account as a pin manufacturer at Kingswood, near Bristol, in 1833, continuing until his retirement in 1852. Charleton was one of the earliest advocates of total abstinence, and lectured on that subject in England in 1836, and in 1842 with his friend Samuel Capper in Ireland. An evangelical Ouaker, he accompanied Capper in his tent-meeting tour in Oxfordshire and the neighbouring counties during 1849. He advocated the formation of the Friends' Foreign Missionary Association. His philanthropic interests were numerous. The schools at Kingswood and Oldland Common were mainly dependent on his support, as was the large British School in Redcross Street, Bristol. The Peace Society was another institution which engaged Charleton's attention; and in 1854 he was a member of a deputation of three sent from London to present an address to Tsar Nicholas at St

Petersburg against the imminent (Crimean) war. The mission was widely criticized in the press, fulfilling the prediction of Richard Cobden that the expedition would 'expose them to a charge of seeking their own glorification' (Mason, 5– 6). Again in 1858, in company with Robert Forster, he travelled to Russia and Scandinavia to present the plea for liberty of conscience issued by the Society of Friends. In 1860 he was unanimously recorded by the monthly meeting of Bristol as a minister. In the same year his only child, a son, was born. Henceforth his time was chiefly occupied in lecturing throughout England and Ireland. Some of his lectures and works on religious subjects were published between 1855 and 1869. He was an early and committed opponent of the Contagious Diseases Acts, organizing the movement's first public meeting, and acting as treasurer to the national association for the repeal of the acts, until ill health obliged him to resign. He died from cancer of the face at his residence, Ashley Down, near Bristol, on 5 December 1872 after an illness of eight years' duration.

By his death he was said to have trebled the fortune inherited from his father nine years earlier, and left nearly £300,000. He lived at Brunswick Square, Bristol, until 1789, when he purchased the Blaise Castle estate, near Bristol; this signified perhaps the greatest single step in the gentrification of the Harfords. He built a grander house to designs by William Patey about 1795, and commissioned additions by John Nash, Humphry Repton, and George Stanley Repton. He is best remembered for Blaise Hamlet, the estate pensioners' houses built by Nash in 1810–11 at a cost of £3800, one of the most successful examples of picturesque architecture in England now in the care of the National Trust. J. S. Harford the elder died at Blaise Castle on 23 January 1815.

The family soon moved to Esher, Surrey, where they rented and then bought Homewood, a large Victorian house sited by the Portsmouth Road with 8 acres of land behind it. Here Gwynne's sister, Noreen Gwyneth (known as Babs), was born in 1915.

Gwynne spent a happy childhood and was educated at Sandroyd preparatory school (from 1921) and Harrow School, which he entered in 1927. Neither academic nor sporty, he took art as an extra subject to get out of cricket. He became skilled in sketching and measured drawing, and discovered the modern movement, whose work was then beginning to be covered by the Architectural Review, for which he took out a subscription. Harrow ran sketching classes to the countryside, including one to Amersham, where he encountered Amyas Connell's pioneering modernist house High and Over (1928– 9). That 'sold me' (Bingham, interview) and convinced him that he should become an architect. He had initially agreed with his father's wish that he should train as a chartered accountant, but his father accepted his vocation and gained him a pupillage. From 1930 Gwynne served articles with John Coleridge, a former assistant of Sir Edwin Lutyens, whose architecture Gwynne later described as 'traditional but very decent' (ibid.). He divided his free time between designing houses and furniture, motoring, and being part of his sister's débutante dance circuit. A keen motorist, Gwynne received a Wolseley Hornet as a twenty-first birthday present and drove through France, Belgium, Germany, Austria, and Switzerland with an old school friend in 1934, visiting the modernist houses of Stuttgart's Weissenhof estate (1927), overseen by Mies van der Rohe, and Le Corbusier's Villa Savoye (1929), near Paris.

Having completed his pupillage Gwynne sought work with a modern practice— placing an advert in the Architects' Journal without success. He was then introduced to Swedish friends of the Canadian architect Wells Coates, who held a party so that the two could meet. Coates initially offered Gwynne a job on a two-week trial basis, and this became two years, during which time he assisted in the detailing of Coates's Lawn Road flats, Hampstead, and Embassy Court flats, Hove. Here he also worked with Denys Lasdun and (George) Edric Neel (1914–1952). Working independently he designed a house— Shipwrights (1937) in Benfleet, Essex— in which most of the accommodation was set on the first floor.

Gwynne's father's family were members of the Welsh landed gentry from whom he had inherited an estate in the seaside town of Aberaeron. This Commander Gwynne sold in 1936, and from the subsequent investments he put £10,000 towards a new house at Esher, situated away from the increasingly noisy Portsmouth Road. Not wanting to leave their garden, Alban Gwynne and his wife agreed to Patrick's suggestion that he design a modern house set at the rear of the site. Gwynne talked to his parents daily about their requirements for the new residence, later explaining how 'they completely accepted the basic idea behind the house and its modern manner' (Bingham, interview).

Construction of The Homewood began in October 1937 and was complete seven months later. The result was an accomplished and striking work of modernism, raised on pilotis or stilts, and constructed from reinforced concrete. Though clearly influenced by the Villa Savoye, and one of the most confident statements of Le Corbusier's ideal in British domestic architecture, The Homewood also retains an English flavour, shaped by Coates, as well as— in its large, single living space and use of rich materials— by van der Rohe's Tugendhat House, Brno. Gwynne's Homewood was prominently featured in the Architectural Review (Sept 1939), but the family enjoyed only 'one good year' there. In 1940 Patrick joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, and was sent in the following year to Canada, where he designed airstrips at Assiniboia, Saskatchewan, and Goodridge, Ontario. Both of his parents died in 1942 and Gwynne and his sister returned to The Homewood alone. Babs married soon afterwards, while Patrick, rejecting work in public housing, set up his own architectural practice in the ground-floor wing of the house.

Gwynne's first post-war success came in 1950, when he was placed second (out of sixty-seven entries) in a competition for a restaurant for the Festival of Britain. It led to a commission for the Crescent Restaurant in the Festival Gardens, Battersea, for which he designed a regency-style tent, painted in different colours to last a second year, and managed by Forte Holdings. Gwynne went on to design further restaurants, including that at the Serpentine in London's Hyde Park for Charles Forte in 1963– 4. He was inspired by the sight of people walking with umbrellas in the park to create a design around a series of concrete hexagons supported on mushroom columns; the glazing was set back behind the columns, breaking down the building's bulk and giving an indeterminacy to its definition of indoors and outdoors. It was demolished in 1990 but a small version survives as the Serpentine restaurant, also in Hyde Park, and it led to a similar structure being adopted as the foyer of the York Theatre Royal (1967) after its director, Donald Bodley, had lunched in the park. The foyer includes top lighting to ensure that even by day it is possible to see inside the building from outside, while for evening performances it is totally illuminated. A further commission for Forte was Burtonwood service station (1974), two octagons with sweeping copper spires on the M62 motorway near Warrington. In 1954 Gwynne also designed London's first Japanese restaurant, finished using black lacquer, as well as numerous shops, none of which has survived.

Following the success of The Homewood, Gwynne came to specialize in private house design, mainly for a close network centred on his friends, the builder Leslie Bilsby, whom he had met through Wells Coates, and the quantity surveyor Kenneth Monk, with whom he worked on all his domestic designs. Gwynne's first house was the rebuilding of Bilsby's Victorian home in Blackheath, south London, in 1949. From the late 1950s his houses adopted strongly geometric shapes, usually with the garden frontage wider than that to the street, and the principal rooms gathered around a central top-lit stair. This was first seen at The Firs, Hampstead (1958), and two houses in Beechwood Close, all for German émigrés who admired his mixture of modernism, dignified materials, and ability to incorporate the latest appliances. Many features included in these houses also appeared at The Homewood, including fitted furniture, simulated Japanese grass paper for the walls, and murals by Stefan Knapp and Peter Thompson. Gwynne's second house in Blackheath Park for Bilsby (1968– 9), described as 'a design which sets out to shock' (Pevsner, 276), comprises pentagonal rooms lined in black plastic with sliding red lacquer doors that could be thrown open for drinks parties. Such houses epitomized 1960s executive living at its most stylish and futuristic. Smaller versions appeared in a speculation of four houses for Monk at Coombe, Kingston upon Thames, and a seaside house for him at Angmering, Sussex (1970), where the food servery and drinks cabinet were given equal standing. A last house for Bilsby (1979) was a cluster of octagonal rooms, each with its own cone-shaped roof. Gwynne also had many friends in the worlds of music and theatre, for whom he built or converted houses, including the pianist Sir Clifford Curzon and the actors Laurence Harvey and Jack Hawkins. His largest house was Witley Park, at Brook, near Godalming, Surrey (1961– 3). Built for the department store owner Gerald Bentall, the design was of underlying hexagonal forms incorpo

Gwynne had a strong independent streak and was willing to walk away from commissions if clients would not accept his advice. He took a fastidious and logical approach to the design

process— acknowledging a meticulous nature inherited from his mother— and he could be self-critical and ruthless if he decided something was not right. In 1993– 4 he bequeathed The Homewood to the National Trust, though he continued to live and work there for the remainder of his life, advising on its restoration and refurnishing, maintaining his mischievous humour, and searching for perfection in design to the end. Patrick Gwynne died, unmarried, on 3 May 2003 of heart failure, at his home of more than sixty years; he was cremated and his ashes were scattered in the garden. Opened to the public by the National Trust in 2005, The Homewood is notable— along with Ernö Goldfinger's 2 Willow Road, Hampstead— as one of the few inter-war modern houses with fittings and grounds intact.

Eldest son of John Charles Harford, of Blaise Castle, Henbury, and Falcondale, Lampeter, and of Blanche Amabel, second daughter of the Right Hon. St. John Raikes, late Postmaster-General. Was Captain of his House at Cricket and House Racket-player, and won the Cross Country Race in 1914.

Lieutenant Harford had matriculated at Magdalen College, Oxford, but never went into residence, joining instead the 3rd Battalion, South Wales Borderers, in September, 1914. In May, 1915, he was sent to Mudros, being attached to the 2nd Royal Fusiliers, and was severely wounded in Gallipoli by shrapnel, on June 30th, 1915. After being in hospital at Alexandria he was sent home and rejoined the South Wales Borderers in December, 1915. In March, 1916, he was sent with a draft to Egypt, and was transhipped to France the following month, being attached to the 2nd Battalion.

He was killed during a night patrol on October 26th, 1916. He was lying in a shell-hole close to the German trench attempting to locate the wire, when the enemy sent up Very lights and, in trying to confirm his work, he showed himself and was shot dead by a German sniper.

His Colonel wrote : — " He always stuck it and always carried out whatever orders were given him with the utmost cheerfulness."

The Chaplain wrote : — "He went to his death like a gallant gentleman," and all his brother-officers wrote in the same strain of his pluck, and of his cheerful discharge of duty. JOHN HENRY HARFORD

General Notes: Dundas Harford-Battersby was the vicar of St. Stephen's in the opening years of the twentieth century. Although he was never a Nonconformist he does deserve a mention here because of the role he played in bringing together Anglicans and Nonconformists.

His father had been the vicar of Keswick in the Lake District and in 1875, along with Robert Wilson, a Quaker businessman from Cockermouth, had founded the Keswick Convention. Although not the first of the so-called "Holiness" conventions, Keswick became by far the most famous and longest lasting. By its policy of playing down doctrinal differences and majoring on spiritual experiences, it attracted people from all the various Protestant denominations.

We might wonder who were the first people from Norwich to attend a Keswick Convention? In the 1870s Norwich was one of England's poorer cities and only a comparatively few people could afford the time and money to spend a week in the Lake District. However, in his parish magazine for 1906 Harford-Battersby wrote that he hoped to meet a good number of his congregation at Keswick that summer. Since that time Keswick has been a red-letter date on the calendars of many Norwich folk, and churches in the city have provided conference speakers and soloists. Keswick can be look on as the forerunner of today's high profile summer venues, Spring Harvest, New Wine, Easter People, Greenbelt, etc. These various modern conventions have inevitably dented Keswick's popularity but it does still attract a loyal following from all around Britain, including Norwich, each summer.

General Notes: Sir James Harford, KBE, CMG, former Governor of St Helena, died on November 26 aged 94. He was born on January 7, 1899. JAMES HARFORD belonged to that generation of young veterans who, returning from the horror of the First World War, found their own peace amid Oxford's dreaming spires. When his grandson went up to Balliol 70 years on, he wrote him an affectionate letter, quoting Ovid: ``Ille terrarum mihi praeter omnes angulus ridet" (that corner of the earth which among all others makes me smile).

A second lieutenant in the 2nd Battalion Essex Regiment, James Dundas Harford had gone into the trenches straight from Repton. Wounded in the closing stages of the fighting, he had ended the war in Belgium, in charge of prisoners-of-war at the age of 19. At Oxford he was awarded an honorary scholarship, at that time given to those who were considered to be scholarship material but whose chances of winning one had been spoilt by the war. He read Greats.

He was a founder member of the 1919 Club, formed by those who had gone up after the war, and relished the glittering company he found there. His contemporaries at Balliol included the writers, Nevil Shute, Beverley Nichols, and L.P. Hartley, the film director Anthony Asquith and the politicians, David Maxwell Fyfe, Christopher Hollis and Frank Soskice. Harford's father was an Anglican clergyman at Great Yarmouth and had cherished hopes that his son would follow him into the ministry. At Repton Harford came under the successive headmasterships of William Temple and Geoffrey Fisher, both later to become archbishops of Canterbury. He wrote in his private memoirs before he died: ``It would be difficult to estimate my debt to the chance of intimate and maintained association with these two men so contrasting in their nature and quality of achievement but each with the quality of greatness." Another master who inspired him was the young publisher-to-be Victor Gollancz who taught English (before being dismissed by Fisher). After Oxford, where he also played hockey for Balliol and captained the college at football, Harford found himself with few ideas for a career. A friend who was a housemaster at Eton persuaded him to try teaching there for a while with the prospect of one day getting his own house. But after three years as an assistant master, he could stand no more of it and entered the colonial service. In 1926 he joined the Nigerian administration where he soon found himself, with little training for the job, in charge of an area the size of Wales. But he was to spend eight years working in Nigeria, eventually becoming assistant secretary in the central secretariat and clerk to the executive and legislative councils a post usually awarded to high fliers. Then, after two years in Whitehall, he was dispatched to the West Indies in 1936, initially as the administrator on Antigua and federal secretary of the Leeward Islands government. From there in 1940 he moved to become administrator on St Nevis, where he remained

One of Harford's chief concerns was to ensure that the people in his charge had enough to eat. Food convoys ran the gauntlet of U-boats during the war, transporting food to a distribution centre in Barbados, from where smaller boats ferried supplies round the Caribbean islands. But Barbadians were tempted to fill up the small boats with rum (which they had in excess) instead of swordfish and rice which were most needed.

After 12 months in Whitehall Harford was next posted to Mauritius, as colonial secretary for five years at a time when the island was preparing for universal suffrage. He went to St Helena as governor in 1954 and stayed there until 1958.

After retirement he worked as conference organiser for the Commonwealth Institute until 1964.

James Harford was a kind and courteous man, who was frequently described by that old-fashioned word "a gentleman". Months alone in the African night had given him a deep love of nature and the stars and in old age he was happiest in his garden, in the company of young people and the birds.

His first wife, Thelma, a count's daughter whom he met while skiing, died within a few years of their marriage and he is survived by his second wife, Lilias, a son from his first marriage and two daughters from his second. *The Times 29 Dec 1993*

General Notes: Harford, John Scandrett (1787–1866), biographer, was born at Bristol on 8 October 1787, the second son of the banker and manufacturer John Scandrett Harford (1754–1815) [see Harford family] of Blaise Castle, Henbury, Gloucestershire, and Mary (d. 1830), daughter of Abraham Gray of Tottenham, Middlesex. He was educated under the Revd Lloyd at Peterley House, Buckinghamshire, later studying for several terms at Christ's College, Cambridge. The death of his elder brother, Edward Gray Harford, on 25 April 1804, produced deep religious impressions, which continued throughout his life. His parents were members of the Society of Friends, but he left that connection and was baptized at Chelwood church, Somerset, in 1809. He became a firm supporter of the Church Missionary Society and the Bible Society, and assisted at the formation of the Bristol branches of those associations in 1813. He was a close friend of Hannah More from 1809, and of William Wilberforce from 1812, and he was the model for the hero of Hannah More's novel Coelebs in Search of a Wife (1809).

On 31 August 1812 Harford married Louisa Davies, eldest daughter of Richard Hart Davies, MP for Bristol. The following year he visited Ireland with his wife, and his subsequent 'Letter on the state of Ireland', addressed to William Wilberforce, was published in the Christian Observer (June 1813). On the death of his father in 1815 Harford succeeded to the family estates, and was made a magistrate and a deputy lieutenant for Gloucestershire and Cardiganshire. While in Rome in 1815 he obtained an interview with Pius VII and requested his influence in putting down the Spanish and Portuguese slave trade. He possessed considerable taste in art and literature, and during visits to Paris and other European cities in 1815–17 laid the foundation of a valuable collection of pictures which adorned the walls of Blaise Castle. About 1821, on the death of his brother-in-law, Hart Davies, formerly MP for Colchester, he came into the Peterwell property, Cardiganshire, where he made improvements and took in tracts of waste land.

In 1822, on the advice of Thomas Burgess, bishop of Salisbury, Harford and his brother donated the site of the castle of Lampeter for the foundation of a college in south Wales. The same year, the University of Oxford created him honorary DCL, and he was elected FRS on 29 May 1823. In 1824 he was appointed high sheriff for Cardiganshire. On the completion of St David's College in 1827 Harford was appointed sub-visitor and watched over its interests with great care.

In January 1841 Harford was present in Bristol at a discussion between John Brindley and Robert Owen, when he strongly denounced socialism. He was elected Conservative MP for the borough of Cardigan on 6 July 1841, but as a result of the loss of a poll book a double return was made to parliament and on a petition his name was erased from the roll on 18 April 1842. He contested the same place again on 12 February 1849, without success. For fifteen years he acted as president of the Bristol Infirmary. He contributed towards the restoration of the cathedrals of Llandaff and St David's, and at Lampeter he drained the Gorsddu bog, and made it into cottage garden allotments, while also providing a supply of pure water for the town. During two visits to Italy, in 1846 and 1852, he collected materials for his best-known literary work, the Life of Michael Angelo (1857); he also had a copy of the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel made at his own expense. After the loss of his sight in 1862 he found employment in dictating to his wife his Recollections of W. Wilberforce (1864) from notes of conversations and correspondence in his possession. He died, childless, at Blaise Castle on 16 April 1866, and was buried on 23 April. He was succeeded by his nephew, John Battersby Harford.
