His father was a keen naturalist, but his own interest in natural history, and particularly in birds, developed while he was at Bootham School, York. As he was in business as a corn and seed merchant in Reading until 1909 it was chiefly during holidays that he could indulge in his hobby. As a young man he visited Sutherland several times with his brother-in-law, J. B. Crosfield. Both had egg collections and they had some hazardous and exciting adventures climbing to nests of Ravens and Golden Eagles. Occasionally they saw White-tailed Eagles, but never found a nest of this species. In 1875 they found Goosanders breeding on Loch Shin, the first definite record for the_county and only the fourth for Scotland. In the summer of 1882 H. M. Wallis found on Loch Urigill the nest of a duck which he failed to identify. The eggs and down were submitted to J. A. Harvie-Brown who declared they were those of the Pintail, at that date not known to breed on the Scottish mainland. Later Harvie-Brown became less positive and wished to re-examine the down, but it had unfortunately been destroyed by moth so this was not possible. In the summer of 1886, in company with his life-long friend G. H. Fox, of Falmouth, H. M. Wallis visited western Donegal and discovered a pair of Tree-Sparrows on the island of Aranmore. At that time they had never been met with in Ireland except in Co. Dublin and his statement was treated by Irish naturalists with considerable scepticism. It was not till some twenty years later that the species was again met with in western Ireland, first in Co. Mayo and then in various localities in Donegal. It was a great satisfaction to him to learn that in 1939 a pair had been found on the very farm on Aranmore where he had seen them 53 years before (see *British Birds*, Vol. xxxiv, p. 107). On this same expedition H. M. Wallis found a pair of Red-throated Divers nesting on the mainland. It had been reported previously that some species of diver nested in Donegal. Howard Saunders had surmised it was the Redthroated and his surmise was thus proved correct. In the summer of 1890 Wallis and Fox visited Norway and found Shore-Larks on the Dovrefjeld considerably farther south than they had previously been known to occur in summer. In 1894 the two friends, with their wives, made a holiday trip in the Central Pyrenees. They saw a Fieldfare and found a nest which was unfortunately empty, but which was just like those with which they had become familiar in Norway. On visiting the place again a week later they found the lining of the nest had been pulled out, apparently by Jays, so the breeding of the Fieldfare in the Pyrenees was not definitely proved. In this region H. M. Wallis first met with numerous large Raptores, the group of birds in which he was always specially interested and whose habits he subsequently studied during visits to Morocco and Algeria, as well as in the Alps and the Balkans. His diagrammatic sketches of vultures, eagles,' buzzards and harriers on the wing, showing their distinguishing features in flight, will be familiar to those who have used the *Practical Handbook* and some of them are reproduced in the new *Handbook*. Although he never attempted a systematic ornithological work, H. M. Wallis published a number of notes and short papers, which gave evidence of the keenness of his powers of observation. From 1917 to 1936 he was a frequent contributor to this journal. Perhaps his most noteworthy papers were on the "Mortality among Birds during the February frost in West Cornwall" (Vol. x, p. 267) and on "Recent Changes in the Birds of Scilly " (Vol. xvii, p. 55). He was elected to the B.O.U. in 1895 and for many years he regularly attended meetings of the B.O.C. Although latterly he rarely intervened in discussion, when he did so the vigour and liveliness of his mind were manifest. During the middle of his life, under the nom-de-plume of Ashton Hilliers, he wrote several novels, all of them vigorous, lively tales, showing a mind that was well stored with historical incident and all manner of curious information. In most of these books one or more of the characters were bird-lovers or egg-collectors and many of his own experiences or observations were attributed to them. He was also a great raconteur and to the end, even when he was bedridden, he would regale visitors with lively stories of his adventures among birds and in other fields too : certainly his tales lost nothing in the telling. General Notes: PALLISTER BARKAS (1904-6) writes from the university at Gottingen, Germany:- " I fortunately am always well, so are the children ; and Mrs. Barkas is now getting steadily stronger after a rather long illness. I am busy writing a book on the old bugbear of literary scholars. Metric. . . . The numbers of the University students have not yet declined. There is much difference of opinion as to whether they will, and whether they should. On the latter question, it should be remembered that German higher education is very much specialised on research, i.e., it is more a thorough preparation for a career in science or scholarship and less a general culture for the man of the world. On the former, families are very hard up, and students at the moment seem to have no prospects ; on the other hand, their prospects without a university education are as hopeless as with one ; education is relatively cheap, say, £15-20 p.a. on the arts side, students can live for 100 mk. per month for the seven university months, or for less ; about 20 per cent, or more get reductions and small subsidies of various kinds. My own impression is that the number of people with secondary education carried beyond 15 or 16 years of age will now be greatly reduced, but that the number with university education wiU be reduced less in pro- portion, though still somewhat reduced." *Bootham magazine - April 1933*

Rosalind Barkas was born in Newcastle but when she was only two years old her father was appointed to a position at Göttingen University and the family all soon moved to Germany. Although Rosalind often returned to England to spend time with her grandparents and later for education at Friends School Safron Walden, she was based in Göttingen until just before war was declared in 1939 and her early education was in German. The friends she made during her early life in Germany; her experience of growing up under a regime increasingly dominated by Nazi ideology; her difculties in coping with later schooling in English – which although she spoke she had rarely written: all shaped her character. She never lost her love of Germany and sympathised with what that country went through. And she also empathised with overseas students here who struggled to adjust to a different language and culture. Rosalind's Newcastle grandfather was a Quaker but her grandmother was a member of the Plymouth Brethren and the household was run according to her beliefs. Because of the increasingly difcult political situation in Germany Rosalind and her sister were sent to school in Newcastle in 1935. This did not work out. They were mocked at school because they couldn't read or write in English and at home they struggled to accept the Plymouth Brethren restrictions – particularly on Sunday activities. After a year they were moved to Saffron Walden where they found a completely different atmosphere and Rosalind was soon reading voraciously. She also very much enjoyed the art classes. The girls continued to return to Germany for holidays although life there was becoming increasingly difcult. Horrifed at what was happening to their Jewish friends, they tore down anti-Jewish posters and refused to use the greeting 'Heil Hitler'. During the next few years their parents helped between 50 and 100 Jews to leave the country. However, these activities and the fact that her father was on a Nazi black list meant that eventually in 1939 they all had to leave in a hurry with hardly any money or possessions and without a job to go to. Eventually he got a post teaching at a school in Hartlepool. Rosalind had started to go to Quaker Meetings when still at Saffron Walden and continued to do so while she was at Edinburgh University reading frst German and then an Arts degree which included History, Psychology and Philosophy. Afterwards she spent a year at Woodbrooke while studying for her Teaching Diploma and felt very much at home with the Quakerism she found there. She was infuenced by Friends such as Hugh Doncaster, Jack Hoyland and Konrad Braun. At the end of her course she was ofered the frst teaching job she applied for but found that the school did not accept conscientious objectors on the staff and therefore said she could not take the job. So she then joined Friends Relief Service (FRS) and taught FRS workers German in preparation for the reconstruction work to be done in Germany after the war. A young man called Eric Priestman was one of her students. In addition to her teaching duties she also helped in the FRS ofce and worked long hours in hospitals, shelters and evacuation hostels – often with Eric. She wrote later that she thought "of the momentous days at Woodbrooke and of my decision to join FRS as the foundation stones of my life." After her marriage to Eric in 1945 they became wardens of Gordon House, the then overseas assembly centre in London and where their frst child was born. Later they returned to Birmingham while Eric studied in Woodbrooke for a BA in social studies from Birmingham University and Rosalind helped to support the family by editing a major English-German dictionary. Their home in Birmingham saw the birth of their second and third children and a succession of German au pairs. After some years Eric's job took the family to Maidstone for eleven years (and the fnal addition to their family) and then, in 1967, he was appointed to the staff at Sheffield Polytechnic to teach management studies. Rosalind was delighted to move back to the north and later always spoke of Sheffield and its lively welcoming Meeting with great affection. She first taught at a small girls' grammar school and was able to arrange exchange visits for the girls with a school in Göttingen. As their children became more independent Rosalind increased and widened her work for Friends. As well as numerous local appointments, she served on Yearly Meeting Agenda Committee, clerked the Europe Committee and attended East Germany Yearly Meeting as our Yearly Meeting representative. Later she was to return to visit German Friends on many occasions and she was always welcomed. One seminar on clerkship she conducted is remembered for "combining both practical and inspirational aspects and was conducted with quiet humour and modesty". When their children had all left home, Rosalind and Eric felt it was time for a change. In 1976 they answered an advertisement for Woodbrooke wardens and were accepted. They both found the following six years rewarding and also full of challenges. A number of staff who had been at Woodbrooke for many years were leaving and therefore changes had to be made and managed. The Priestmans' combined experience enabled them to cope – even a complete change of diet was achieved, although not without difculty. The college housed 70 term-time students and at any one time they could be from 20 diferent countries. Many of these found it difcult to adjust to life in England and Rosalind from her own experience was able to help. Also a number of the UK students had come to Woodbrooke at a time of crisis in their lives and her counselling experience (gained through marriage guidance work in Sheffield) was useful. During this time Woodbrooke

on the Road was initiated and Rosalind enjoyed taking part, visiting Meetings both in this country and in Europe. It has since gone from strength to strength. At the end of their time at Woodbrooke they were welcomed back to Sheffield and enjoyed a few richly rewarding years, taking a full part in the Meeting. Sadly this was not to last and in 1985, unexpectedly, Eric had a heart attack and died. Although the next few years were difcult for her, typically Rosalind turned her own experience into help for others and became a bereavement counsellor. Shefeld Friends remember "her gift of being able to listen quietly to others and her ability to empathise with them". "She was never intrusive or judgemental but ofered her time, her advice and her wisdom". And she always encouraged new members of the meeting to become familiar with the wider Quaker family. She was involved in the revision of *Quaker faith & practice* – particularly the chapter on personal relationships – and invited groups to her home to answer their often searching questions. In the nineties, Rosalind heard a talk at Yorkshire General Meeting about a new retirement community which the Joseph Rowntree Foundation was building on the outskirts of York. She learnt that one member of Sheffield Meeting had decided to move to Hartrigg Oaks and since she was determined not to be a burden on her family, she visited the site and soon decided to put down her own deposit. She was one of the first to move into Hartrigg but before moving she had been asked to join a shadow committee to assist with helping new residents settle in. Again, Rosalind's experience and organising ability stood her in good stead. During the first nine months she spent many hours listening to the new residents' hopes and fears, chaired the Residents Meetings, and helped to lay the foundations of the committee structure that is still in place. She also hosted a University of the Third Age (U3A) course in her bungalow – teaching German. New Earswick Meeting welcomed Rosalind and she soon became an active member – serving as an overseer, joining in discussion groups, and fund-raising for the new extension to the meeting house. She was conscious that there could be difculties for the Meeting when large numbers of Hartrigg Friends came to join them and tried to make sure that this was approached sensitively. Rosalind had a gift for making lasting friendships and always kept in touch with friends she had made during each stage of her life. She carried on an extensive correspondence with friends from all over the world who all knew they would be welcomed into her home whenever they were anywhere near her. One note about her reads, "We always left her company refreshed in our friendship and faith." Part of William Blake's poem 'Auguries of Innocence' was read at her Memorial Meeting. It approopriately resonates with Rosalind's long life of service:

"Joy and woe are woven fne, A clothing for the soul divine. Under every grief and pine Runs a joy with silken twine." 9-Francesca Mary Wilson^{78,124} was born on 1 Jan 1888 in 37 Holly Avenue, Newcastle upon Tyne and died on 4 Mar 1981 in Royal Free Hospital, London at age 93.

General Notes: Wilson, Francesca Mary (1888–1981), schoolteacher and refugee relief worker, was born into a Quaker family, at 37 Holly Avenue in Newcastle upon Tyne on 1 January 1888, the daughter of Robert Wilson (1850–1933), a hatter's furrier who owned a family concern of considerable size, and his wife, Laura Maria Wallis (1850–1949). In 1892 the family's standing within their Quaker community was compromised when Laura converted from the Society of Friends to the Plymouth Brethren, an event later described by Francesca as a 'cataclysm' (Horder, 4– 5). Her father, a pacifist with an international outlook, was an influential presence in her life and he encouraged her educational aspirations. Following an education at the Central Newcastle High School for Girls and Armstrong College she entered Newnham College, Cambridge, in 1906, where she took honours in parts 1 and 2 of the historical tripos (1908, 1909). Qualifying with the Cambridge teachers' certificate in 1912, she became an assistant mistress at Bath high school before moving to Gravesend County School for Girls, where she taught from 1914 to 1916. While teaching in Gravesend in 1914, Wilson came into contact with Belgian refugees and decided temporarily to abandon her teaching career to undertake relief work abroad. In 1916 she worked with children at Samoöns, in the Haute Savoie, under the auspices of the Friends' War Victims Relief Committee. The following year she was sent to Corsica for the Serbian Relief Fund, providing occupational therapy for wounded and displaced Serbs, before joining her brother Maurice Wilson (1889–1925) undertaking similar work in north Africa. In February 1919 she moved to Serbia where she distributed food and clothing in Niš, Grdelica, and Belgrade. She developed a lifelong love of Serbia and her first book, Portraits and Sketches of Serbia, published in 1920 was motivated by a desire to raise awareness of Serbia's need for post-war relief and reconstruction.

In 1919 Wilson joined Dr Hilda Clark's Quaker Relief Mission in Vienna where she spent three years organizing food depots. While in Vienna she met the art educator Professor Franz Cižek and organized an exhibition of child art by his pupils which aimed to disseminate Cižek's pedagogical theories and raise money and awareness for the recently formed Save the Children Fund. The exhibition opened in London on 18 November 1920 and then toured the UK and Ireland. After undertaking famine relief with a Quaker team in Buzuluk, Russia, during 1922– 3, she took the Cižek exhibition to the USA where it opened at the Metropolitan Museum, New York, on 10 December 1923, subsequently touring American cities, Canada, and Australia. The exhibition contributed to establishing Cižek's standing among progressive educators in the UK and America in this period.

In 1925 Wilson settled in Birmingham, where she taught history at the Edgbaston Church of England College for Girls. She opened her home in Duchess Road, Edgbaston, to a succession of Russian émigré children whom she 'adopted', and to Nicolai Bachtin (1896–1950) whom she met in Paris in 1928 where he was part of a white Russian émigré intellectual circle. Bachtin became one of the most influential people in her life, settling in Britain permanently in 1932, initially in Cambridge, before moving to the University of Southampton. In 1938 he moved to the University of Birmingham where he taught classics and linguistics until his death. They appear to have been romantically involved for the first year, after which their relationship evolved into an intense friendship. She also took in a number of lodgers including the Nobel laureate and DNA pioneer Maurice Wilkins.

Wilson maintained her interest in international affairs, travelling to the Balkans in 1929 at the request of Hilda Clark to investigate conditions in Macedonia for the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF). Her subsequent report was delivered to the WILPF Sixth International Congress in Prague in August 1929 and published the following year as Yugoslavian Macedonia. In the 1930s she opened her home to refugees, including the art historian Nikolaus Pevsner whom she met in Göttingen in 1933 on a visit to her sister Muriel and brother-in-law Pallister Barkas. She was increasingly worried about fascism, and the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War prompted her return to active relief work. In March 1937 she travelled on behalf of the Friends to southern Spain where, based in Murcia, she ran feeding programmes, established a children's hospital, and founded occupational workshops for the displaced, travelling between there and Birmingham for the next two years. In 1939 she followed the Spanish refugees over the border into France and undertook similar relief schemes under the auspices of the Ouakers in Perpignan. Shortly after the outbreak of war in October 1939 Wilson was sent by the Quakers and the Polish Relief Fund to Hungary to assist Polish refugees, but had to leave in May 1940 following her involvement with the refugee underground movement and her arrest by the Hungarian secret police. During the war she worked for refugee organizations in the UK until 1945 when she joined the newly formed United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA) as a senior welfare working with the displaced survivors of Dachau at Föhrenwald displaced persons' camp outside Munich (1945–6). After the Second World War she settled in London, where she lived at Fellows Road, Hampstead, and taught University of London adult education classes and for the Workers' Educational Association. In the 1940s and 1950s she toured Britain addressing public meetings on humanitarian aid and post-war reconstruction, and also broadcast on these issues. Wilson was a prolific author. While in Vienna she began writing articles, for the Manchester Guardian, the Birmingham Post, and The Friend among others, which drew on her experiences and often had the added benefit of raising money for her relief work. She published two autobiographical accounts of her relief work. In the Margins of Chaos (1944), covering the period from the First World War to her return to England from Hungary in May 1940, was intended to raise public awareness of humanitarian issues and contribute to the discourse surrounding government policy on the displaced and relief practice and training. Aftermath: France, Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia 1945 and 1946 (1947) was promoted as 'the first inside account' of UNRRA's work. In her pamphlet Displaced Persons— Whose Responsibility? (1947) she argued for the need to amend the over-restrictive aliens' legislation, and the benefits to Britain of accepting refugees, which was also a theme of They Came as Strangers: the Story of Refugees to Great Britain published as part of World Refugee Year (1959–60).

Wilson was also very aware of the educative potential not only of her own life story but of those of the women activists with whom she collaborated over the course of her long and active life. She died of bronchopneumonia and cerebrovascular accident at the Royal Free Hospital, Camden, London, on 5 March 1981. A memorial service was held on 6 April at Hampstead meeting house, London.

Daughter of Frederic and the late Eleanor Clark Impey. Elizabeth Stephens Impey, who lost her life by the torpedoing of the P. & O. SS. Persia, was born at Longbridge Place, Northfield, nr. Birmingham, on 29th May, 1877, and was elder daughter of Frederic Impey, J.P., and his wife, Eleanor (Clark) Impey. She was educated at Weston-super-Mare, Polam, and The Mount Schools, and afterwards went through the two years' course of training at Madam Bergman Osterberg's Physical Training College at Dartford, Kent. The skill and aptitude which she had shown in all games at school now became further trained and applied in many directions, and was matched by the development of a fine courage and an indomitable spirit, which, added to splendid physical health, remained her chief characteristics up to the last moment of her life. From 1897 to 1903 she lived at home, teaching physical drill exercises in schools and families, and practising massage, with much success. To her pupils as well as to her many brothers and sister, she was always the good companion. Her spare time and holidays were passed in country pursuits; she was a fearless horsewoman, an expert angler, and a good shot at game. On or in the water, she was equally at home, yet, strangely enough, even her strong swimming did not avail to save her life in the last terrible ordeal. The reason for this, however, was her consistent putting of others first. To quote from a notice in The Friend of January 28th :- " Dr. E. S. Impey was an ideal 'out-door ' companion, with a close affinity for country life and sport of every sort. Many are the friends, both men and women, who have to thank her for week-ends of happy relaxation at her home at Longbridge Place, or for thrilling escapades on the Avon, out of which her quickness and fearlessness usually brought them safely. Her abilities were not, however, limited to out-door interests, for her skill as a cook was only equalled by the fineness of her needlework. Her buoyant straightforward disposition made light of difficulties, "never say die" being a favourite saying which not inadequately expressed her attitude to life. She was a lover of little children, and, whether as teacher or doctor, had a wonderful way of managing them. Her unwavering kindheartedness to all her patients, combined with the persistence and resource of her character, well fitted her for the appointment she was en route to fill. The value of such a life lost both to England in a time of national crisis, and to India in its great need of Women's Medical Service, is incalculable. Dr. Impey loved her profession and looked forward confidently to the great field for important and useful work waiting for her in India. The distinguished London specialist, Dr. Mary Scharlieb, who has a lifelong knowledge of India, wrote to Dr. Impey's father expressing her admiration of and respect for his daughter, and her sense of the loss of the women to whom she would have ministered. In 1904 Elsie Impey began her medical training. She faced the uphill road with characteristic vigour, nothing daunted at returning to school studies in spite of her twenty-seven years. In this decision the counsel of her aunt, Dr. Annie E. Clark, one of the pioneers of women in medicine, was of much assistance. During the years of study at the University of Birmingham, Elsie Impey made for herself a welcome place, and took a leading part in many of the students' clubs. She was elected the first woman President of the Guild of Undergraduates in 1908, and in 1910, on the opening of the new University buildings at Selly Oak, she was presented on behalf of the Guild, to Queen Alexandra. She qualified as M.B., Ch.B., in June, 1911, and was soon embarked on a busy medical career. She held posts as house-surgeon, or physician, at the Children's Hospital, and the General Maternity Hospital, Birmingham; at Swansea General Hospital; and at the Temperance Hospital, London. In the autumn of 1915 she went out to Chalons and Sermaize for the Friends' War Victims Relief Committee, and remained for six weeks. She had long cherished the ambition to work for the women of India : in November, 1915, the opportunity came, and she accepted the post of Medical Officer at the Dufferin Hospital for Women at Lahore. She entered with the keenest zest into preparations for work in the new sphere. She loved her profession and was well fitted for it by many special gifts, e.g., open heartedness, perseverance, a cheery smiling manner, and an optimism which inclined always to the brightest and most hopeful. She sailed for Bombay in the Peninsular and Oriental liner Persia from Tilbury Docks on 18th December, 1915, being seen off by her father and other members of her family Two of her brothers were already serving in France; she was fully aware of the risks of a long voyage while German submarines were engaged in pursuing harmless vessels : but in pursuit of duty, she cheerfully faced all for the sake of the splendid field of service opening before her. The voyage began prosperously; she sent a long and interesting letter (24th December) from Marseilles, spoke of sketching at Gibraltar, and of her fellow passengers, of boat drill and assigned places in the boats. Two postcards from Malta were sent on the 28th. Off Crete on the 30th, just after one o'clock, the Persia was suddenly, without warning, torpedoed, and sank in five minutes. When the explosion took place the passengers were at luncheon. There was a rush for the door, but a lady who was saved was sitting next to Dr. Impey and says that she took her arm and induced her to wait calmly until the saloon had emptied. Then they went for their life-belts and separated. The ship had a dreadful list, the companion-way was slippery and foot- hold almost impossible. When this lady reached it, she found Dr. Impey planted firmly at the top, reaching with one free hand to help everyone up as they came. Many of them gained the boats, of which ten were launched, thereby saving fifty-nine passengers, among them fifteen ladies, besides a number of Lascars and some officers and seamen. When she could help no more, Elsie Impey waved a cheery farewell to Mrs. Russ, another survivor, and dived into the sea, "like a powerful swimmer," but was not seen again. It is supposed that either the suction of the ship, or a blow from floating wreckage prevented her rising to the surface. One of the ladies whom she helped wrote to her father :- "Your daughter was a brave woman; we all consider she died a heroine's death." Another said :- "It was very generous of Dr. Impey to give me the assistance she did, when practically all were looking after themselves," These few particulars of her last deeds of kindness were the greatest comfort to her family, whose sorrow at the loss of one so strong in personality and so joyous in spirit, was lessened by the sympathy of their friends. Her father received from Sir Oliver Lodge, Principal of the University of Birmingham, a letter speaking of her as " a distinguished medical student of the University," accompanied with a " message to the bereaved," in which allusion is made to the continued service of those who have "passed over." In this time of war and loss this thought is one to dwell on. A Minute of Warwickshire North Monthly Meeting, under date 8th February, 1916, spoke of " the courage and self-sacrifice shown by our friend at such a dread moment." A memorial stone at Longbridge Meeting House, beside that to her mother, who died on 6th March, 1914, records the time and manner of her death.

Captain Christian August Max Ahlmann Valentiner (December 15, 1883 – July 19, 1949) was a German U-boat commander during World War I. He was the third highest-scoring U-boat commander of the war, and was awarded the Pour le Mérite, the highest Prussian military order until the end of the war, for his achievements. We are apt to think of "stewardship" in relation to material resources bestowed upon us, but Honor Butlin used her whole life to demonstrate stewardship. She was born into a close, lively and unorthodox Quaker family. One of her fondest memories was of the 'airbaths' the five young Impeys would enjoy as they played naked on the lawns of their Birmingham home and, even in her nineties, she would quote fondly the wise sayings of her mother at every opportunity.

Honor qualified as a nursery school teacher and pioneered modern child care practice by setting up the first Rachel MacMillan children's nursery in Kettering once she had moved there in the 1930's. She loved children and was fascinated by them. She married her fiancee John Butlin, a local shoe factory owner, a few weeks before the War broke out. The home they built a few years after his return from the War was on or near the site of their earliest romantic meetings. She raised three children in an atmosphere of openness and trust and her frank lessons in sex education could be an eye-opener to other less liberal souls. In her wisdom, keen insight and open mind she seemed ahead of her time.

Honor wished to share her possessions - her home, garden and swimming pool especially. Honor's door was always open, her unfussy welcome and loving personality ready to respond to that of God in whoever entered. Many house guests were taken in and cared for in the family home for months at a time, receiving the healing that came through her love. She had a calming presence deriving from her natural consciousness that she was living in God's presence all the time. Throughout her life she truly was a friend to those who might otherwise have been friendless. Honor believed that she had a duty to others and she carried out these 'duties' with joy. In her generosity she manifested love in action.

Serenity, optimism and faith were striking aspects of her character, along with a lively sense of fun. She could be stubborn in her optimism and her ability to discard all troublesome thoughts. The poetry that she wrote often reflected her love of beauty, whilst the glint in her eye and her mischievous smile would show how much she enjoyed life. She was ever ready to share a concern, engaging in lengthy conversation, poetry or silence according to the moment. Always oblivious to any suggestion of eccentricity, for many years she collected vast amounts of secondhand clothing which she carefully laundered and sold in aid of refugees, raising many thousands of pounds in the process. She never wished to lead or control others but rather expected and saw the best of everyone she met.

At various times in the 1960s and 70s, Honor represented Northampton & Wellingborough Monthly Meeting on Meeting for Sufferings and the former Home Service Committee. She also

served Kettering Friends as an Elder and Overseer for many years. A truly grounded Friend, due to the depth of her awareness she had the ability not only to be able to guide others to find a spiritual dimension and fundamental truth in their personal relationships, but also to discern the spiritual paths our lives and work should take for developing a better world. There were dark times, particularly in the latter part of her life, when her husband and later a son died suddenly in tragic circumstances. She endured their deaths with great fortitude, supported by her family and friends, and upheld by her ability to look always to the positive. In her final years, as her memory failed her, it was notable that she first forgot anything that was remotely unpleasant.

Honor Butlin was a healer with great faith in the power of prayer. For some years she held Meeting for Worship at Kettering entirely on her own and, even near the end of her life, would sink into the silence of worship with a sweet smile on her face that brought hope and joy to others. Throughout her life she reached out to that of God in everyone and, indeed, her entire life was a testimony to the Grace of God. She is remembered with love.

WILLIAM WHITE IMPEY was killed on February 11th by an explosion happening while he was blasting holes for apple trees on his farm at Norgrove Court, Worcestershire. He was the fourth son of the late Frederic Impey. His mother was Eleanor Clark of Street. He was at BOOTHAM 1895-9, and was afterwards at Birmingham University. Frederic Impey came to Birmingham from Essex, where his family had been farmers for generations, and while engaging in business he always maintained his interest in farming, and had a dairy of good cows at Longbridge. The herd was one of the first to be tuberculin tested, and the first to produce Grade " A " milk in the Birmingham area. On leaving the University, Bill (as he was always known to his friends) joined his father in the milk business, and he remained a farmer to the end. In 1909 he married Ellen Hale, who, with two sons, survives him. They lived at

Coomber Farm, Longbridge, for some years, moving to a much larger farm at Norgrove about 1920. He was active in all matters relating to farming, a very good and thorough farmer. Land in his care was always seen to improve whether it paid him or not. Fond of all country things, he was a frequent follower of the Worcestershire foxhounds, and a particularly good skater and swimmer. He was of notably strong and powerful build. To him may be ascribed the creation of the new BOOTHAM in one sense, and on this wise : he was an interested Naturalist, and latish one evening he put some snails in a tin saucepan over a Bunsen burner in the old Natural History room, and when the bell rang for reading he went away and did not return. The water boiled away, the tin melted and fell out on to the table which caught fire, spreading quickly, to the swift destruction of the whole scholastic buildings. Bill was a rather inarticulate person, rather abrupt in his way of speaking, but his life and character were such as to make him wannly esteemed wherever he was known. The words of Marty South (in Hardy's Woodlanders), which she uttered at the grave of Giles Winterbourne, "You was a good man, and did good things "were felt to be an appropriate farewell at the little graveyard at Longbridge on February 14th. R. C. Bootham magazine - April 1935

9-Lieut. Col. Arthur Elias Impey^{16,115,169,170} was born on 29 Apr 1885 in Longbridge Place, Kings Norton, Birmingham and died on 29 Oct 1954 in Street, Somerset at age 69.

General Notes: A paragraph from a letter from A. E. IMPEY (1898-1901) is of particular interest at this time. "Our heads in Paris are bloody, but unbowed, and my strong conviction, after twelve years in France, is that the country, practically to a man, hates the thought of either war or conquest. They have but one desire, and that is to live in peace within their own frontiers. All the trouble is caused by their deep-seated mistrust of their German neighbour and, so far as history is a guide, we must admit that they have good grounds for this feeling." Bootham magazine - April 1932 IMPEY.— On 29th October, 1954, Arthur Elias Impey (1898-1901), aged 69 years.

Noted events in his life were:

- He was educated at Bootham School in 1898-1901 in York, Yorkshire.

Arthur married Lillian Cotton,^{16,169} daughter of Nathaniel Hugh Cotton and Harriet Emma Clapp, on 25 Sep 1926 in St. Jean de Luz, France. The marriage ended in divorce. Lillian was born in 1892 in Boston, Massachusetts, USA and died in 1962 in New York, New York, USA at age 70.

Marriage Notes: IMPEY-COTTON.-On September 25th, at St. Jean de Luz, France, Arthur Elia Impey (1898-1901) to Lilian Cotton, of Boston, Mass.

General Notes: Lillian Cotton was born in Boston, Massachusetts, in 1892 to Nathaniel Hugh Cotton and Harriet Emma Clapp. Cotton spent her childhood in Boston and developed an interest in art as a young child, drawing detailed portraits in sketchbooks as early as age ten. She attended the Boston Art Museum School, and later, between 1915 and 1917, she studied at the Art Students League of New York under Robert Henri and George Bellows. Under these realist painters, Cotton developed her technique, and began exhibiting work as early as 1918. Cotton further pursued her study of art in Paris, working under Andre Lhote, Lucien Simon, and Émile-René Ménard. In Paris, Cotton met and married Arthur Elia Impey, a British army officer (after her marriage, Cotton sometimes signed her work "LC Impey," though she is better known as an artist as Lillian Cotton). The couple spent the majority of their time in Paris, in particular Montparnasse, where Cotton had a studio, but often traveled to the United States to visit family and for Cotton to exhibit work. Cotton was most famous for her portraits, especially those of high-society figures and well-known actors, writers, and artists of the day. Her subjects included Greta Garbo, Lauren Bacall, Veronica

Lake, June Walker, Marcel Marceau, Norman Trevor, Stephen James Joyce, Mrs. Thomas Carnegie, Alfred Lunt, Wheeler Williams, Louis Bromfield, and Virginia Berresford. Cotton also painted and sketched portraits of family members, children, and unidentified subjects, and remarked that she preferred to work with women. Cotton was noted for her sound construction and simple and direct style of portraiture, that nevertheless conveyed feeling and a psychological presentation of her subjects. Though less frequently, Cotton also produced landscapes and still-life compositions. Cotton exhibited work between 1918 and 1959 in New York City, Boston, Philadelphia, Washington, DC, and in Paris, notably at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Corcoran Gallery, and the Salon d'Automne. She gained mention and won numerous awards for her work, including two from the National Association of Women Artists. She was a member of that organization, as well as a member of the Société Nationale des Beaux-Arts, the New York Society of Women Artists, and the Pen and Brush Club, among others. Lillian Cotton died in New York City in 1962.

General Notes: On 29-10-1761 a Judith Jesper purchased from John Skingle, a ploy of land near Stebbing, formerly occupied by a messuage known as "Ælemyngs." This may have been this Judith, or possibly her cousin, the daughter of John Jesper.

4-Samuel Jesper¹ was born on 5 Jun 1735 in Broomfield, Chelmsford, Essex, died on 20 Jun 1783 in Broomfield, Chelmsford, Essex at age 48, and was buried in FBG Stebbing, Essex.

Noted events in his life were:

• He worked as a Maltster and Farmer in Broomfield, Chelmsford, Essex.

Samuel married Susannah Marriage,¹ daughter of William Marriage^{1,2} and Susannah Smith,^{1,2} on 1 Dec 1768. Susannah was born on 18 Oct 1744 in Springfield, Chelmsford, Essex, died on 2 Oct 1780 in Broomfield, Chelmsford, Essex at age 35, and was buried in FBG Stebbing, Essex. They had two children: Elizabeth and Samuel.

Marriage Notes: The marriage certificate of Samuel Jesper is still extant: it bears, as is customary with Quaker certificates, the signatures of the witnesses, which in this case number thirty, including:--John Jesper (brother of groom), Judith and Hannah Jesper (first cousins), William and Susannah Marriage (father and mother of bride), Thomas, Robert, John, William, Joseph, Ruth, and Elizabeth Marriage (brothers and sisters of the bride), Elizabeth Gospill (sister of Groom) and Thomas Gospill (her husband), John Mascall (groom's stepfather), &c., &c.

5-Elizabeth Jesper¹ was born on 26 Oct 1769 in Broomfield, Chelmsford, Essex.

5-Samuel Jesper^{1,2,90,159} was born on 13 Jul 1772 in Broomfield, Chelmsford, Essex, died on 15 Sep 1846 in York, Yorkshire at age 74, and was buried in FBG Heslington Road, York.

General Notes: Samuel Jesper was a farmer at Purleigh, Essex. The farmstead, the name of which is variously spelled as Digoods, Drygoods, and Dygoods, was demolished some years ago, but there is still a "Diegoods Farm" in the parish.

Noted events in his life were:

• He worked as a Mealman and Farmer in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex.

• He worked as a Farmer and Mealman in 1807 in Bran End, Stebbing, Essex.

Samuel married Elizabeth Puplett,^{1,2} daughter of Thomas Puplett^{1,2} and Elizabeth Edwards,^{1,2} on 5 Jan 1796 in FMH Maldon. Elizabeth was born on 8 Mar 1775 in Purleigh, Maldon, Essex and died on 15 Jul 1823 in Stebbing, Great Dunmow, Essex at age 48. They had seven children: John, Susannah, Thomas, Samuel, Elizabeth, Joseph, and Rebecca.

Marriage Notes: We have in our possession the original marriage certificate of Samuel Jesper and Elizabeth Puplett. It is pleasing to see that Quaker wives of those days did not promise to obey, and the appearance of the name "Hannah Scott" amongst the list of witnesses is not without interest,--one wonders if the maiden, as she signed her name, had visions of another ceremony 32 years later, at which she would occupy a more important position. There are no Jesper witnesses, the only survivors, Judith and Hannah, being no doubt too old for the drive from Bran End. The family bible, now in our possession, is inscribed,

"Samuel and Elizabeth Jesper's book given them by Judith and Hannah Jesper, the 29th day of the 6th month, 1796," -- a belated wedding gift. *William Alfred Jesper*

General Notes: Elizabeth Puplett was the daughter of Thomas Puplett (who "grew beans for the horses in the Napoleonic Wars") and Elizabeth Edwards, his first cousin, and granddaughter of Thomas and Mary Puplett of Boreham and Hatfield Peverel. Her brother, Benjamin Puplett, was the father of Thomas Puplett, whose name is a household word for all but the very youngest generations of Ackworth Scholars. [We are indebted to our cousin Edith Mary Doubleday, herself a Puplett descendant, for much Puplett information].

6-John Jesper^{1,2,5,173} was born on 22 Apr 1797 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex, died on 1 Jan 1843 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex at age 45, and was buried in FBG Maldon.

General Notes: John Jesper seems to have taken over the management of Dygood's Farm as soon as he arrived at years of discretion. He farmed it till his death which occurred with tragic suddenness (by the breaking of a blood vessel) on New Year's Day--a Sunday--1843.

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as a Farmer in Thornton in Craven, Skipton, Yorkshire.
- He worked as a Farmer in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex.

John married Sarah Levitt,^{2,173} daughter of William Levitt and Lucy, on 30 Apr 1823 in FMH Great Dunmow. Sarah was born in 1799 in Barking, Essex and died on 19 Apr 1868 in Manningham, Bradford, Yorkshire at age 69. They had seven children: John, Alfred, Susannah, Sarah Ann, Lucy, Emily, and Anna.

General Notes: Sarah Levitt (born 8-5-1799) was not a Friend, though she joined the Society on her marriage. We have failed to trace the relationship (if there was any) between her and the Robert Levitt who married Hannah Jesper (No. 3d). After her husband's death, she managed the farm until her son John was old enough to undertake it. Latterly she lived with her married daughter. (Emily, wife of Dr. Robert Parkinson)

Noted events in her life were:

• Miscellaneous: She died at he daughter Emily's home, Bradford, Yorkshire.

7-John Jesper¹ was born on 13 Aug 1825 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex and died in Australia.

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as an apprentice Farmer to his mother for three years on 23 Jun 1843 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex.
- He worked as a Farmer in 1846 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex.
- He emigrated to Australia after 1856.

John married Isabella Clara Colender.

7-Alfred Jesper^{1,2,28} was born on 16 Apr 1827 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex and died on 2 May 1907 in Brantholme, Kendal, Cumbria at age 80.

General Notes: ALFRED JESPER, Born 16-4-1827 at Dygood's; married, 5-1-1860, Rebecca West, daughter of Edward and Ann West of Hull; died 2-5-1907 at Kendal. He was for a short time with the firm of Wilson, Jesper & Co., but at the age of 23 commenced business for himself at Bradford where most of his life was spent. He was a director of the Friends Provident Institution for 20 years. His widow still lives at Kendal--to which [rest is illegible].

Alfred was resident at Brantholme, Kendal at the time of his death, which had been home to Isaac Brown and his 2nd wife, Elizabeth Thornhill.

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as a member of the family firm of Wilson, Jesper & Co. Before 1850.
- He worked as a Woollen Draper in 1850 in Bradford, Yorkshire.
- He had a residence in 1880-1896 in Levens, Kendal, Cumbria.
- He had a residence in 1896 in Brantholme, Kendal, Cumbria.
- He worked as an a Director of the Friends' Provident Assurance.

Alfred married **Rebecca West**,^{1,2,28} daughter of **Edward West** and **Ann Ellis**,^{1,2,156} on 5 Jan 1860. Rebecca was born in 1829 in Hull, Yorkshire and died on 15 Nov 1917 in Skelsmergh, Kendal, Cumbria at age 88. They had four children: **Allan, Walter, Edward West**, and **Helen**.

General Notes: ALLAN JESPER, B. 11-4-1861 at Bradford, entered his father's business but had to abandon it, his health rendering outdoor occupation essential. He lives with his mother at Kendal, devoted to horticulture and allied arts.

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as a Woollen Draper in Bradford, Yorkshire.
- He worked as a Horticulturalist in Kendal, Cumbria.

8-Walter Jesper^{1,2,16,152} was born on 9 May 1863 in Bradford, Yorkshire and died on 25 Feb 1947 in Salisbury, Wiltshire at age 83.

General Notes: WALTER JESPER, B. 9-5-1863 at Bradford; married 18-9-1889, Edith Elizabeth Dixon, daughter of James and Elizabeth Dixon, of Bradford. Entered his father's business and was afterwards with John Priestman & Co. of Bradford. In 1899 he took up a manager-partnership with the firm of Duncan, Barraclough & Co. of Otley. Now living in partial retirement at Menston-in-Wharfedale, taking part in many local affairs.

Jesper. On 25th February, at his home at Salisbury, Walter Jesper (1877-79), aged 83 years.

Noted events in his life were:

Wilson was one of the principals in the firm of Wilson, Jesper & Co.; he took much interest in the Temperance movement and other philanthropic work, and was an amateur geologist, astronomer, and photographer of considerable repute.

Albert Wilson first became interested in cryptogams after meeting James Alfred Wheldon (both men were chemists as well as keen amateur botanists) in 1898, and joined the Moss Exchange Club in 1908. He also joined the Lichen Exchange Club at that time, but the lichen club folded after five years.

Wilson became knowledgeable about Yorkshire's bryoflora while living in that county, and later acquired similar or greater knowledge of the bryofloras of Lancashire and Westmorland. Wilson distributed mosses for the newly formed British Bryological Society in 1923-4, and for some years kept the Society's account of vice-county records, as well as contributing over 2,500 packets of his own to the annual exchanges. He attended few meetings of the BBS during the last 20 years of his life because of increasing deafness, and declined the offer of vice-presidency for the same reason. His herbarium was presented to York Museum, with further plants at Merseyside Museums, the Department of Botany at Edinburgh, Manchester Museum, Cardiff, Oxford and Ulster. The Natural History Museum in London has some of his correspondence.

Family background and biography

Albert Wilson was born on October 12th 1862, at Calder Mount, Garstang, Lancashire, the third child of four born to Charles Wilson (1813/4-1900) and Susanna (*née* Jesper, 1828/9-1916). The Wilsons were Quakers, and Albert's great-grandfather Thomas Wilson (1741-1788) had been a woollen-manufacturer at Thornton, Yorkshire. His grandson Charles (Albert's father) was born at Thornton, and became a clothier/merchant tailor.

The Jespers, who were also Ouakers, were from Essex, Susanna being born at Purleigh, near Maldon, a daughter of John Jesper (1797-1843) and Sarah (*née* Levitt). A Samuel Jesper, who was born at Macclesfield, Cheshire, married Charles's sister, Susannah. The Wilsons often had Jespers from Purleigh staying with them at Calder Mount.

Calder Mount was a spacious house about a mile from Garstang, with a large garden containing a vinery, greenhouses, fernery and orchard. Both Charles and Susanna were interested in plants. Charles owned a telescope, and his sons became interested in science, meteorology and horticulture. Indeed, Albert kept daily records of temperature and rainfall, and sent in records over a period of 40 years.

Albert first became interested in plants at the age of thirteen, when he was at Stramongate School for Quakers, Kendal, where he began to collect and press flowering plants, ferns, and a few mosses for his herbarium, but not liverworts or lichens. From the age of 15, he spent a year at The Woodlands school at Hitchin, Hertfordshire, where countryside over chalk gave him his first experience of calcicoles.

In the following year, Albert became apprenticed to Harrison, Parkinson & Co., pharmaceutical chemists at Bradford, Yorkshire, and had little time for botany during the next four years. However, he did join the Botanical Record Club in 1882.

In 1883 he went to London to study for his pharmaceutical examinations, qualified in 1884, and returned to Bradford as an assistant pharmacist. Later he became a partner in the firm to which he had been apprenticed.

Albert became friendly with John B. Foggitt (born 1861/2), one of the botanical family of Foggitts who for many years had been chemists at Thirsk, Yorkshire. John Foggitt in turn became a pharmacist, and was living at Horton near Bradford in 1881, so may either have met Albert at that time, or later in London. Foggitt later lived at Southport and Kirkby Lonsdale, and sometimes botanised with Wilson.

Albert married Alice Mary Thorp (1861/2-1945) in 1890, and the following year they were living at 20 Merton Road, Bradford. In 1897 they moved out to Ilkley with their son Howard (born 1891/2), who became an optician in later life. Albert travelled to work in Bradford for the next 15 years, until he retired in 1912 at the age of 50.

Albert and his wife moved to Garstang in 1912, in order to help his elderly mother. After she died in 1916, they moved to Bentham, and then in 1918 to Havera Bank, Sedbergh, Westmorland. The country around Sedbergh offered plenty of opportunities for Wilson to indulge his interest in bryophytes, which had first been stimulated when he met another pharmacist, James Alfred Wheldon (1862-1924) in 1898. Wheldon was exploring the districts around his home at Liverpool for mosses, and Albert sent him gatherings for naming which he had collected in the remoter parts of west Lancashire. Over the next nine years, from 1898 to 1907, Wheldon and Wilson did the groundwork for their *Flora of West Lancashire* (1907), and during this period Wilson became serious about and competent in bryology.

After their *Flora* was published in 1907, Wheldon and Wilson continued their friendship, collecting vascular plants, lichens and bryophytes on holidays together, particularly in the Scottish Highlands, Westmorland, and the Isle of Man.

Wheldon died in 1924, and that year Wilson moved from Sedbergh to Ro Wen, near Conway, where he lived until 1946. He continued to record in Westmorland, the Lake District, and also explored the country around his home in North Wales, often in company with Arthur Augustine Dallman (1883-1963). In 1932 he started to prepare his *Flora of Westmorland* (1938), with his son Howard often driving him to locations in the family's car.

Albert's wife died in 1945, after which he went to live with his son at Pear Tree Cottage, Priest Hutton, near Carnforth, Lancashire, where he died in May 1949, aged 87.

The Wests are an old Quaker family of good standing: Leonard West was one of the founders of the Boys' School now at Bootham, York. J. Walter West, the watercolour artist, is of this family, and so, too, we believe, was Benjamin West, the Royal Academician. Edward West was a successful businessman and at one time Mayor of Bradford. He had two children, both of whom died in infancy; his widow is now living with her nieces at Grange-over-Sands.

Sarah married Edward West,^{1,119} son of Edward West and Ann Ellis,^{1,2,156} on 22 May 1850. Edward was born in 1821 and died in 1883 at age 62. They had two children: Edward and (No Given Name).

Noted events in his life were:

Married, 18-10-1876, at Bradford, John Satterthwaite, whose first wife was Deborah Jesper. John Satterthwaite died 22-10-1903, and Lucy Satterthwaite is now living at Grange-over-Sands.

Robert Parkinson was a chemist, analyst, and one of the pioneers of photography; he died at Grange-over-Sands on 23-7-1913 in his 83rd year, They had three children, two of whom (Lucy Ann Parkinson and Isabel Parkinson) are still living at Grange. Emily married **Dr. Robert Parkinson**,^{2,174,176,177} son of **Thomas Parkinson**^{2,174,177} and **Deborah Stansfield**,^{2,174} on 23 Sep 1856. Robert was born on 27 Jul 1830 in Bradford, Yorkshire and died on 23 Jul

1913 in Grange over Sands, Cumbria at age 82. They had three children: Ellen, Lucy Anna, and Isabel.

General Notes: Robert Parkinson . . 82 23 7 1913 Grange-over-Sands. (Reported last year.) Robert Parkinson was born at Bradford, Yorks., in 1830. His father, who was an iron- founder in the town, died when R. Parkinson was two years of age, and during his school days at Ackworth he also lost his mother. He always cherished happy memories of her, and she had lived long enough to impart to him the ardent love of Nature, and especially of flowers, which was characteristic of him to the very end of his long life. He was left under the guardianship of her two cousins, Thomas Wilson, of Bradford, and Charles Wilson, of Preston; and he continued his education at Tulketh Hall School, near Preston, till he was old enough to be apprenticed as a chemist to Henry Dymond (1801-1866), and, later, to George Barritt, of Croydon. There he spent seven years, and afterwards studied Chemistry and Pharmacy at Bloomsbury Square, London, where he passed his qualifying examinations. This was followed by two years study at the German Universities of Giessen and Munich, at the former of which he took the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in 1854; and his residence abroad served to widen his outlook as a very diffident young Quaker of the early nineteenth century. On returning to England, he entered the chemist's business of his guardian, Thomas Wilson, at Bradford, where he worked as an analyst, and inaugurated the then new art of photography. In 1856 he was married to Emily Jesper, and their happy married life extended over a period of forty-nine years ; of their three daughters, the two younger ones are still living at Grange. Robert and Emily Parkinson made their home at Bradford for thirty-two years, and though always of a retiring disposition, Robert Parkinson undertook and carried through much useful work in connexion with the Meeting, and was Clerk of the large Monthly Meeting of Brighouse for many years. Scientific and philanthropic institutions in the town also owed much to his unobtrusive help, and when he removed to Grange-over-Sands, in 1889, he was greatly missed. He continued to be a Director of the Friends' Provident Institution and to make weekly visits to Bradford to attend the Board meetings for some fifteen years; but the quiet of a country life and the charm of his beautiful garden at Grange were increasingly attractive to him. During his first years there he took some part in the life of the village, being a member of the District Council, and he occasionally gave lectures on scientific subjects. He tried always to foster a spirit of love and toleration between the different sects and parties that made up the small village community. The loss of his wife in 1905, after ten years of failing health, was a great sorrow, borne with Christian patience, and the gentle forbearance with the failings of others which always characterized him became even more marked in the years that remiained. During the last two years of his life he had to resign himself to being an invalid, but this time was brightened to those about him by the kindly flashes of humour which always endeared him to his many friends. He died at Grange, after only one night's final illness, in his 83rd year.

John Shipley died 13-3-1915, aged 85; his widow is living at Garstang.

Martha Jesper died 8-7-1857 at Birmingham and Thomas Jesper married secondly Elizabeth Fisher, who died 19-9-1891 at Leicester. Died 31-12-1869 at Warwick. Thomas Jesper was for some years a Miller at the Bran End Mill, Stebbing; subsequently he removed to Birmingham, where he carried on the business of Corn Dealer and Merchant. He was an old Ackworth Scholar and for years a well-known figure on the School Committee.

1860 sold his share of a claim and stamp mill for £4,000. Came to England 1861, and again settled down for a short time with Wilson, Jesper & Co. In 1866 (Aug. 23) married Catherine Neville of Northampton. In 1869 he sailed again for Melbourne, where he commenced a dry goods business, which ended disastrously--his partner hypothecating the funds. R.W. Jesper thereupon went to San Francisco, commenced burning charcoal at Healdsburg, thence to San Jose, and later to Tuscaloosa, Alabama, where he was a partner in a firm of Tanners and Shoe Manufacturers. In 1878 we find him farming at Maryville, East Tennessee. In 1887 he sold out and went on to Tacoma, Washington, thence to Seattle, and finally to Lopez Island, where he acquired a 120 acre farm which he farmed with success until his death. Robert William Jesper died at Anacortes, Washington, his city home, in 1904, his wife at Fort Steilacoom, Washington, in 1913. They had an only son.

Hugh Jesper married Jennie Amanda Troxell, daughter of Franklin C. and Keturah Troxell, of Port Stanley, San Juan County, Washington, and has six children.

We wish that space permitted us to narrate the life story of Sir Richard Tangye--"if it were engraven upon the understanding it would be a bright ensample unto him that would be admonished." The son of a small farmer in the parish of Ilogan, Cornwall, one of five brothers, educated at the village school at Redruth, and for a short time at Sidcot (to Sidcot's lasting gain), he came to Birmingham at an early age and started business with two of his brothers in a small workshop for which they paid 4/- a week; long before Sir Richard's death the "Cornwall Works" covered over 20 acres and employed 2,000 men. Sir Richard died in 1906 at Kingston-on-Thames, where (and at "Glendorgal") Lady Tangye still resides. They had six children, of whom the eldest son is now Sir Harold Lincoln Tangye, Bart. A younger son, Wilfrid, is a lieutenant on active service.

Caroline married Sir Richard Trevithic Tangye,^{1,178} son of Joseph Tangye⁷⁸ and Ann Bullock,⁷⁸ on 24 Jan 1859 in FMH Birmingham. Richard was born on 24 Nov 1833 in Broad Lane, Illogan, Redruth, Cornwall, died on 14 Oct 1906 in Coombe Bank, Kingston Hill, Surrey at age 72, and was buried in Putney Vale Cemetery, London. They had five children: Mabel Louise, Harold Lincoln, Arthur Llewellyn, Elsie Getrude, and Richard Trevithick Gilbertstone.

General Notes: TANGYE, Sir RICHARD (1833-1906), engineer, born at Broad Lane, Illogan, Cornwall, on 24 Nov. 1833, was fifth son in a family of six sons and three daughters of Joseph Tangye, a quaker Cornish miner of Redruth, who afterwards became a small shopkeeper and farmer there, by Anne (d. 1851), daughter of Edward Bullock, a small farmer and engine driver. After attending the British school at Illogan, and helping his father on his farm, he was at the age of eight disabled for manual labour through fracturing his right arm, and spent three years (1844-7) at a school at Redruth kept by William Lamb Bellows, father of John Bellows [q. v. Suppl. II]; thence he went in February 1847 to the Friends' School, Sidcot, Somerset, where he formed a lifelong friendship with William Tallack [q. v. Suppl. II]. He remained there as pupil teacher and assistant until 1851; in that year he visited with his brother James the Great Exhibition in London. Finding the teaching profession uncongenial, Tangye at the end of 1852, in reply to an advertisement, went to Birmingham and entered the office of Thomas Worsdell, a quaker engineer, as clerk at £50 a year. His younger brother George soon joined him as junior clerk ; they were followed by two other brothers, James and Joseph, mechanical experts who had worked under Brunel for Mr. Brunton, engineer to the West Cornwall railway, and had made a hydraulic press which favourably impressed Brunel.

At Birmingham Tangye soon obtained a complete grasp of the commercial details of the engineering bushiess, and he proved his interest in the welfare of the workmen by obtaining the firm's assent to a half-holiday on Saturdays, a concession to labour which was subsequently adopted in England universally. In 1855, owing to a difference with his employer, Richard left the firm. Soon he and three brothers, including Joseph, who had made himself an expert lathemaker, began to manufacture tools and machinery on their own account, renting a room at 40 Mount Street, Birmingham, for 45. a week. The brothers prospered, and took a large workshop for 10s. a week, bought an engine and boiler to supply their own motive power, and took one work-man into their employ. In 1856 Brunel, mindful of James and Joseph's earlier efforts, commissioned the brother's at Birmingham to supply him with hydraulic lifting jacks to launch the 'Great Eastern' steamship. The successful performance of this commission proved the first step in the firm's prosperity. In 1858 the brothers bought the sole right to manufacture differential pulley blocks, recently invented by Mr. J. A. Weston ; but rival claims to the patent rights involved them in 1858 in a long and costly though successful lawsuit. A fifth brother, Edward, joined them that year. The firm now devoted itself solely to the manufacture of machinery and every kind of power machine. The growth of the industry led to their removal in 1859 to new premises in Clement Street, Birmingham ; three years later the firm acquired three acres of land at Soho, three miles from Birmingham, and built there the 'Cornwall Works.' Ultimately this factory through Richard's skill, energy, and business acumen absorbed thirty acres of surrounding land and gave employment to 3000 hands. Works in Belgium were established under Edward's management in 1863 ; a London warehouse was added in 1868, and branches were subsequently formed at Newcastle, Manchester, Glasgow, Sydney, Melbourne, and Johannesburg. One of the

The brothers were considerate employers. In 1872, in which year the three elder brothers, James, Joseph, and Edward, retired from the business, Richard permanently instituted the Saturday half-holiday which he had pressed on his first employer twenty years earlier, and he averted a strike by granting unasked a nine hours day. In 1876 Tangye instituted at the works a large dining-hall, educational classes, concerts, and lectures, with which his friend. Dr. J. A. Langford [q. v. Suppl. II], was closely associated.

In the religious, municipal, and political life of Birmingham Tangye took an active share. In his early days there he helped Joseph Sturge [q. v.] at the Friends' Sunday schools. A staunch liberal in politics, he supported John Bright in every election at Birminghamp but refused many invitations to stand for parliament himself. He was a firm free trader, and remained loyal to Gladstone after the home rule split of 1886, keeping alive the principles of liberalism in the 'Daily Argus,' which he founded in association with Sir Hugh Gilzean Reid in 1891. He was knighted in 1894 on Lord Rosebery's recommendation. A member of the Birmingham town council from 1878 to 1882 and of the Smethwick school board, Tangye and his brothers were generous benefactors to the town. To the mimicipal art gallery (founded in 1867) the firm in 1880 gave £10,000 for new buildings (opened by King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, in 1885), as well as for the acquisition of objects of art ; later they presented Albert Moore's 'The Dreamers' ; Tangye also loaned his fine collection of Wedgwood ware, of which a handbook was published in 1885. The School of Art (founded in 1843), to which the Tangyes in 1881 contributed £12,000, was rebuilt in 1884.

Tangye cherished literary interests. His admiration for Oliver Cromwell led him from 1875 to collect literature and relics relating to the Protector, and in 1889 he bought the fine Cromwellian collection of J. de Kewer Williams, congregational minister, to which he made many additions. He embodied the results of his study of the period of the protectorate in 'The Two Protectors, Oliver and Richard Cromwell' (1899). A catalogue of his Cromwellian collection of MSS., miniatures, and medals, by W. Downing, was published in 1905. Between 1876 (when Langford was his companion) and 1904 Tangye made eight extended voyages, visiting Australia, America, South Africa (where his firm had business branches), and Egypt. Tangye recounted his experiences in 'Reminiscences of Travel in Australia, America, and Egypt' (1883), and 'Notes on my Fourth Voyage to the Australian Colonies, 1886' (Birmingham, 1886).

On a short record of his early career contributed in 1889 to a series of biographies of self-made men in the 'British Workman' Tangye based his full autobiography 'One and All' (1890), which, reaching its twentieth thousand in 1905, was reissued in a revised form under the title of 'The Rise of a Great Industry.' Tangye also published 'Tales of a Grandfather' (Birmingham, 1897). Tangye resided at Birmingham till 1894, spending his summers from 1882 at Glendorgal, a house which he had purchased near Newquay. In 1894 he removed to Kingston-on-Thames. He died at Coombe Bank, Kingston Hill, on 14 Oct. 1906, and was buried in Putney Vale cemetery. He married on 24 Jan. 1859 Caroline, daughter of Thomas Jesper, corn merchant, of Birmingham. She survived him with three sons, of whom two, Harold Lincoln and Wilfrid, joined the business, and two married daughters. The son Harold, who was created a baronet in June 1912, is author of 'In New South Africa' (1896)

and 'In the Torrid Sudan' (1910).

A portrait in oils, by E. R. Taylor, hangs in the Birmingham School of Art. A bronze memorial plate erected by public subscription, with relief portraits of Richard and George Tangye, is in the Birmingham Art Gallery.

General Notes: Todd, Dorothy Annie [Ann] (1907–1993), actress, was born on 24 January 1907 at Crumley House, Hartford, near Northwich, Cheshire, the daughter of Scottish parents, Thomas Todd, a clerk in an alkali works, and his wife, Constance, née Brooke. Her brother was the playwright Harold Brooke. She was educated at St Winifred's boarding-school in Eastbourne and studied at the Central School of Speech Training and Dramatic Art, with the aim of teaching drama herself. She changed her mind after her début, in January 1928, as a fairy in Yeats's The Land of Heart's Desire at the Arts Theatre, and she appeared later that year as Lady Prudence Willowby in Wodehouse's A Damsel in Distress at the New Theatre. Many roles, few memorable, quickly followed: between 1929 and 1939 there were almost twenty parts at a dozen West End theatres. By the time of her appearance in The Man in Half-moon Street at the New (1939), as a younger woman in love with an older man with a past, she had moved from the froth of the early 1930s to more serious work.

Throughout the decade Todd was equally busy in films, making her début in the melodrama These Charming People (1931), from Michael Arlen's play, followed by Keepers of Youth and The Ghost Train (both 1931, from plays by Arnold Ridley). The Water Gypsies (1932), from A. P. Herbert's novel, was her first showcase role, and she played Drummond's (Ralph Richardson's) kidnapped wife in The Return of Bulldog Drummond (1934). On 6 December 1933 she married Victor Neill Malcolm, an engineer and the grandson of Lillie Langtry, with whom she had a son. Further films included the costly science-fiction epic Things to Come (1936), from H. G. Wells's novel, a version of Edgar Wallace's The Squeaker (1937), Poison Pen (1939), and Ealing's melodrama Ships with Wings (1941). Most were routine ingénue roles, but Todd impressed as the neurotic wife of the squire (Ralph Richardson) in South Riding (1938). She also starred in the first ever British television serial, Ann and Harold (BBC, 1938). Having divorced Malcolm, on 27 October 1939 she married the writer Nigel Trevithick Tangye (1909–1988), with whom she had a daughter. Back on stage Todd was a lively Peter Pan (1942) at the Winter Garden, then scored her biggest success in Lottie Dundass (1943), an all-woman production at the Vaudeville, followed by a fine performance as a murderess, Madeleine Smith, in The Rest is Silence (1944) at the Prince of Wales. Although her brief time on screen in Perfect Strangers (1945) was praised by critics, Todd became an international star overnight with her film performance as the emotionally disturbed pianist Francesca Cunningham in the psychological drama The Seventh Veil (1945). The scene in which her Svengali-like guardian (James Mason) smashed his cane down on the keyboard at which Todd played became particularly notorious; she was suddenly in great demand. Blonde, with almost sphinx-like features, high cheekbones, and deep-set blue eyes, she had a glacial beauty. She signed, with Rank, what was at the time the biggest contract offered to a British actress. A Hollywood career, however, failed to materialize: she had the lesser female role in Hitchcock's talky, stodgy The Paradine Case (1947), and the brooding So Evil my Love (1948, and made in England), though good, was not popular. At home The Passionate Friends (1949) was a sensitive, entertaining, romantic drama; having divorced Tangye, she then married the film's director, David Lean (1908–1991), on 21 May 1949. He directed her in Madeleine (1950, a reprise of her 1944 stage role), which was not a success, and The Sound Barrier (1952), in which she again appeared with Ralph Richardson, this time as his daughter. She and Lean divorced in 1957. Facial injuries sustained during an assault and robbery led to Todd's making fewer films; Losey's Time without Pity (1956) had been a sombre drama, Taste of Fear (1961) was a good Hammer thriller, and The Fiend (1971) was disturbing horror. Her last films were Preminger's unexciting spy film The Human Factor (1979) and the confusing thriller The McGuffin (1985).

In the 1950s, though, Todd was busy again on the stage. She reprised her role in The Seventh Veil (1951) at the Prince's Theatre, but, oddly, it was not successful. She played Lady Macbeth at the 1954 Edinburgh festival with the Old Vic company, and played it again, along with roles in Love's Labour's Lost, The Taming of the Shrew, and Henry IV, parts 1 and 2, in its 1954–5 season. She was Jennifer Dubedat in a revival of The Doctor's Dilemma (1956) at the Saville and made her Broadway début, at the Cort Theatre, as Davina Mars in The Four Winds (1957). Her final stage appearance was at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre, Guildford, as Florence Lancaster in a favourite play, Coward's The Vortex (1965). Thereafter she forged a new career as a documentary film-maker, narrating, directing, and producing a series of travelogues, or 'diary documentaries' as she called them. Often made in exotic locations, they included Free in the Sun (Australia), Thunder in Heaven (Nepal), Thunder of Silence (Jordan), Thunder of the Kings (Egypt), and Thunder of the Gods (Greece).

Todd's autobiography, The Eighth Veil (1980), was 'an intelligent account of a varied, if not always happy, life' (The Times, 19). In 1989 Durham University awarded her an honorary DLitt. In her later years she made frequent radio and television appearances. Away from acting she enjoyed writing, painting, and gardening. Following a stroke, Todd died on 6 May 1993 at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, London.

General Notes: In the early 1950s Derek Tangye and his wife Jeannie were walking along the cliffs near Lamorna, above Mount's Bay in Cornwall, when they saw a buzzard drifting overhead. Suddenly we saw below it in the distance a small grey cottage on the edge of a wood. It was as grey as the boulders heaped haphazardly around it, as grey as the ancient stone hedges which guarded long forgotten meadows. This was Minack. We knew at the instant of seeing it that it was to become our home.

The quotation is from A Cornish Summer (1970), the seventh in a series of autobiographical books, all bestsellers and describing their life in that cottage, their early struggles on a flower farm, and their love for the wild landscape and their various animals, that has become known as the "Minack Chronicles". The 19th, The Confusion Room, was published this year. Friends in London had been amazed that this good-looking and sophisticated couple should take such a plunge. Derek had worked in Fleet Street as a gossip columnist on the Express and elsewhere. Jeannie had been an agony aunt on the Mirror and had been press officer for the Savoy Hotel Group, which inspired her book Meet Me at the Savoy, published under her maiden name Jean Nicol, and also a bestseller. Their friends included Danny Kaye, David Milford Haven, the photographer Baron, Beverley Nichols, A.P. Herbert, Noel Coward and Tyrone Power; also, surprisingly perhaps, George Brown, the future Foreign Secretary. It is said that when Jeannie came down the stairs at the Savoy the orchestra would strike up with the tune "Jeannie with the Light Brown Hair". Derek Tangye had Cornish ancestry and had spent happy childhood holidays at his family home at Glendorgal, near Newquay. He had always admired a house called Boskenna at Lamorna, but when he took Jeannie to see it they decided that a simple cottage was really their ideal. Minack, or Dorminack, was certainly simple when they moved in, with an earth floor, no water and electricity, a mile down a bumpy muddy track. However they still returned once or twice a year to London, where they took a luxurious suite first at the Savoy, then at Claridges. In 1961 Tangye published A Girl on the Roof, which was a great success. He and Jeannie had been adopted by a succession of cats - notably Monty and Lama - which became the heroes (or heroines) of subsequent books. A Drake at the Door (1963) was so named because of a pet Muscovy duck named Boris (after Pasternak), and A Donkey in the Meadow (1965) was in honour of Fred, a donkey rescued from the knacker's yard.

The books were illustrated by Jeannie, and nearly all were serialised in popular illustrated magazines. The fan mail grew. The Tangyes' romantic story struck a chord with many who felt that they longed to escape from the stresses of modern life. There were also pilgrimages of admirers, mostly unsolicited.

In spite of all this Derek Tangye constantly needed reassurance, as I discovered when I was his publisher. He was touchy about the promotion of other bestselling writers on country matters - Gavin Maxwell, for example, or James Herriot (tricky for us, at Michael Joseph, as Herriot was also one of our authors). He was afraid of missing out on new readers and in each book would in some way recapitulate the story of how Jeannie came to Dorminack, and then go on to the previous years' adventures which could be a shipwreck, swallows nesting for the first time under the eaves, or a gala at Lamorna village.

After I had left Michael Joseph, I used to be invited to a special post- Christmas lunch at Dorminack. The big fire blazed and the cottage would be strung with hundreds of cards from all over the world, champagne flowed and we ate in a miniature conservatory watched by donkeys from the hedge above, maybe also with a gull on the roof. Jeannie was a very good cook and baked her own bread. She died suddenly in 1986, and Derek tried for two years afterwards to keep up the tradition of these lunches. It became too much for him, and he could not be persuaded to resume them at our house, at the other end of Cornwall. Indeed, after Jeannie's death he scarcely left his patch, as he called it, except for a yearly excursion to Claridges in the old tradition. Jeannie's funeral was made especially memorable by an address by John Le Carre. Derek also spoke of her on the television programme Songs of Praise in 1992, and many of us were moved to tears when Baron's photograph of her beautiful face appeared as if from the clouds. Derek's book about her, Jeannie (1986), also part of the "Minack Chronicles", I consider to be his best. Some time before they had bought several acres of meadow sloping down to the sea, looking out to St Michael's Mount, and when she was dying they decided to form it into a trust, the Minack Chronicles Trust, as a place for solitude and preserving natural life.

The possibility of a television series based on the books kept Derek Tangye buoyed up in his last years, when he became increasingly crippled by arthritis and gout. This and the extraordinary flow of admirers who continued to make the pilgrimage and wade through the stream known as Monty's Leap.

She and her husband lived for twenty years in the house adjoining the watermill at Bran End, near Stebbing, removing in 1891 to Saffron Walden where, 11-7-1911, Rachel Barritt died. They had seven children, the eldest of whom, Emily, married John Frederick Jeffrey, a descendant of the Marriage-Gospill union referred to under (4b). Joseph Barritt lives with his two youngest children, Cornelius and Caroline, at Pinner.

The Library of the Society of Friends recently catalogued a collection of historically important papers of a member of the Society of Friends and a World War I Conscientious Objector (CO). This remarkable and inspiring man was Cornelius 'Corney' Barritt and his papers, which include correspondence, postcards, photographs, diaries, newspaper cuttings and publications, illustrate both his life and his interests. The papers (TEMP MSS 62) were catalogued by Krzysztof Adamiec, a University College London student undertaking a two-week placement with the library. Cornelius Barritt, born in Stebbing, Essex, on 24 July 1883, was called up to 'serve his country' in 1916. Stressing his dedication to peace and his conscientious objection to war, he applied for absolute exemption from military service under the Military Service Act (2 March 1916). After a series of hearings in March 1916, the Local Tribunal refused his case and he was conscripted into the army and sent to Harwich.

In April 1916. Cornelius Barritt was arrested with sixteen other COs at Landguard Fort, Harwich, kept in darkness and subjected to a diet of bread and water. Despite their objection to combatant and non-combatant service, the members had been forcibly attached to the Eastern Non-Combatant Corps (NCC) where they refused to undertake the work assigned to them. Even when threatened by an officer that they would face the death sentence, they still refused to obey military orders. One officer warned: 'Once you are across the channel your friends in Parliament and elsewhere won't be able to do anything for you'. Many members of Parliament had pressed for assurances that conscientious objectors would not be subjected to the death penalty during the passage of the first Military Service Act. However, there was a loop-hole and those individuals who were not legally recognised as being COs could be subject to army regulations which prescribed death by shooting as the punishment for disobedience on active service. On 7 May 1916, the seventeen COs left Harwich for France, arriving at Le Havre on 8 May. On arrival at camp, they were told they were no longer prisoners but soldiers of the King, their past disobediences forgotten. Being free to move about the camp, the COs discussed their strategy of resistance. On 10 May they paraded with the British Expeditionary Forces, but when the order 'Right turn! Quick march!' was given, the men stood rigidly in their positions. David Boulton's book *Objection Overruled* provides an account of the events that follow: 'The infuriated NCOs [Non Commissioned Officers] ordered that they be locked up and "treated as prisoners of war".' Physical ill-treatment, bullying and threats of execution followed. The men were

split up. Some were sent to Harfleur and put to work in a quarry. They refused to handle tools. In desperation, the authorities prescribed the punishment ... 'crucifixion'. Cornelius Barritt was subjected to 'crucifixion', also-known as 'Field Punishment No. 1. "Cornelius described the experience vividly to the Non Conscription Fellowship: 'The Quartermaster Sergeant had us each handcuffed to a tent with our hands round the pole behind us, which made the shoulders ache to a quite excruciating degree ... [The following evening] we were placed with our faces to the barbed wire of the inner fence. As the ropes with which we were tied were fastened round the barbed wire instead of the usual thick wooden post, it was impossible to tie them much more tightly, and I found myself drawn so closely to the fence that when I wished to turn my head I had to do so very cautiously to avoid my face being torn on the barbs. To make matters less comfortable, it came on to rain and the cold wind blew straight across the top of the hill.' Despite this treatment, Cornelius Barritt and the other men stood by their principles and refused to obey military orders. A few days later, they were sent to the Field Punishment Barracks at Boulogne. There they refused to work and again were subjected to crucifixion in crowded, windowless punishment cells. Cornelius Barritt describes the cells in his diary: 'rats were not infrequent visitors. They would sit on the edge of a fire bucket to drink the water and occasionally run up one's back during a meal. ... There were now eleven of us in one cell (there had been twelve at one time) ... The conditions of living twelve in a cell can be better imagined than described. We could just lie six a side with our feet almost touching ... ' On 7 June, four COs, including Cornelius Barritt, were court-marshalled and found guilty of disobeying orders. Barritt records his sentencing on 15 June in his papers: '... an officer read out our sentences one by one: "To suffer death by being shot" ... Then came a pause ... then followed: "Confirmed and commuted to ten years' penal servitude ... " David Boulton's book informs us that 'Barrett, Foister, Ring and Scullard were the first to be subjected to this ghoulish treatment. They were not the last. During the ten days that followed there were almost daily repeat performances. Altogether in June 1916, thirty-four men received the death sentence, commuted to ten years' penal servitude.' Cornelius Barritt returned to Britain as part of his sentence at the end of June and was imprisoned in Winchester Civil Prison. Public criticism of the treatment of COs led to all men serving sentences of imprisonment being able to appeal to the Central Tribunal meeting at Wormwood Scrubs. Barritt's appeal was successful and he was sent out on special employment schemes, first to Dyce Quarry Camp near Aberdeen and then to Wakefield Prison. Later, he decided that he could not conscientiously remain within the scheme so he, with a number of other COs, wrote a letter to the Secretary of the Home Office Committee on the Employment of Conscientious Objectors explaining the reasons why they decided not to remain within their working scheme. It reads: 'We hold the same views as the men in prison and we realise that absolute exemption is the only exemption which will satisfy our conscience., .' At the beginning of 1917, Cornelius was sent back to prison; this time to Maidstone Prison, where he remained until the amnesty in 1919. Amongst Cornelius Barritt's papers are a series of postcards of Dartmoor Prison and scenes of everyday life of prisoners. They provide a disturbing insight into the harsh treatment of COs in prison during this period. After the war, Cornelius Barritt married Gladys Mary Lawrence of St John's Wood, London (1920). Their wedding certificate and wedding book are extant amongst his papers (TEMP MSS 359). As a result of his deteriorating health caused by the sufferings he endured as a CO, Cornelius and Gladys Barritt moved to Caloundra, thirty miles north of Brisbane, Queensland, Australia, in 1952. There he continued to work for peace with the support of his wife.

He was a dedicated member of the Society of Friends, serving on a number of committees. In 1920, he became secretary of London & Middlesex Quarterly Meeting Extension Committee and served on Meeting for Sufferings, the Home Service Committee and the Penal Reform Committee. He stayed in touch with his prison companions long after the war had ended and organised at least one reunion in 1931.

Cornelius Barritt died in 1967. Gladys Mary Lawrence continued his peace work until her death in 1975. According to Lucie Barritt, who worked on the Barritt family genealogy, his dying words were: 'We must endeavour to throw a veil over what seems wrong in others; and see the good side of them. It's hard, it's hard - but it's the only way'.

The Library is thankful for Krzysztof's work which has both made this important collection more accessible for research and complements the retrospective cataloguing of the printed peace collection currently underway.

• He resided at No. 42 In 1910 in Crockett's Road, Handsworth, Birmingham.

Joseph married Margaret Alice Carter,^{1,176} daughter of Thomas Carter^{1,159,184} and Mary Brunton,^{1,159,184} on 25 Sep 1889 in FMH Yealand. Margaret was born on 3 Jun 1852 in Preston, Lancashire and died on 31 Jan 1914 in Handsworth, Birmingham, Warwickshire at age 61. They had three children: Constance, Wilfrid, and Elsie.

General Notes: Samuel Jesper came when young from Essex to the North of England and was apprenticed to the woolen drapery business at Stockport, Cheshire. He afterwards started business on his own account at Macclesfield, in or near which town the rest of his life was spent. Samuel Jesper was a devout Friend, for over 50 years a member of the Cheshire Monthly Meeting--serving as overseer and elder, and delighted to entertain those traveling in the ministry and visiting the Quarterly and Monthly meetings: he took great interest in the welfare of his fellowtownsmen and was an Alderman for some years: on more than one occasion he was earnestly solicited to take the Mayoral chair, but his conscientious objection to take or administer oaths prevented him from accepting this honour. As a striking example of the esteem in which he was held may be quoted the fact that the bells of the parish church were rung on the occasion of his youngest daughter's wedding--an almost unique tribute to a quakeress. We have before us a copy of the minute of condolence passed by the Macclesfield Corporation on his death; it, or rather the letter from the Mayor to his eldest son, reads:--

"I beg to express to you and the several members of your family how greatly the Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough, together with myself, feel the loss of the late Alderman Samuel Jesper. His many kind and amiable qualities will long be remembered by his friends; and the conscientious fulfillment of duty to his political and religious convictions must be recognized with thankfulness now that so much he advocated has been accepted by his countrymen."

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as a Woollen draper in Macclesfield, Cheshire.
- He worked as a Councillor and Alderman in Macclesfield, Cheshire.
- He worked as a Ouaker Elder.

Samuel married Hannah Wilson,^{1,2,4,31} daughter of Richard Wilson^{1,2,33,174} and Deborah Stansfield,^{1,2,33,174} on 26 Apr 1826 in Lothersdale, Skipton, Yorkshire. Hannah was born on 31 Dec 1802 in Thornton in Craven, Skipton, Yorkshire and died on 24 Jun 1849 in Macclesfield, Cheshire at age 46. They had nine children: Thomas Wilson, Samuel, Eliza Ann, William Henry, Charles Alfred, Charles Richard, Deborah, Hannah Maria, and Sylvanus.

General Notes: Samuel Jesper's first wife was the sister of Charles Wilson who married Susannah Jesper (No. 10): she, too, was a most devout Friend and the curious in such matters will find a lengthy memoir in the Annual Monitor. Her mother, a minister in the Society, predeceased her by only two years and she also finds a place in that--in those days--occasionally rather depressing publication.

General Notes: THOMAS WILSON JESPER, Born 3-2-1827 at Macclesfield. Married (firstly) 21-11-1850, Ann Thistlethwaite, daughter of John and Margaret Thistlethwaite of Leeds, who died 23-8-1865 aged 40; (secondly) 22-2-1867, Mary Ann Tennant, daughter of John and Elizabeth Tennant of Countersett, Wensleydale, who died 29-6-1886, aged 65; (thirdly) 22-11-1887, Alice Esther Ward, daughter of Samuel and Frances Emery Ward of Rye Farm, Moreton-in-Marsh, Gloucestershire, who survived him and is now living with her step-daughter at Bournemouth. Thomas Wilson Jesper entered his father's business, but after a short time joined his brother Charles in a cotton mill at Preston. This mill they held until the close of the cotton famine, Thomas Wilson Jesper working incessantly on the distress committee, and the mill itself being used for relief work. In 1868 he entered into partnership as a Coal Agent with his brother-in-law, Samuel Tennant, at Darlington, removing to York in 1875 where he remained until his death on 2-5-1901. By his first wife he had three children:--

General Notes: ALFRED JESPER, Born 19-1-1853 at Hanley: married firstly at Liverpool, 16-5-1877, his half second cousin Maria Tennant (she was also niece to his father's second wife), daughter of William and Maria Tennant who died 24-3-1906 aged 55; secondly 28-8-1907 at York, Lilly Jane Wright who survives him. Alfred Jesper was a coal agent, succeeding to his father's business on the latter's death. He died 18-3-1913 at York, leaving, by his first wife, one son.

Noted events in his life were:

- He was educated at Ackworth School.
- He was a Quaker until his early 20s, when he resigned membership.
- He worked as an apprentice Woollen Draper to Samuel Jesper (grandfather) before 1873.
- He worked as an employee of the North Eastern Railway about 1873-1880 in York, Yorkshire.

"Guild Socialism was much stimulated during World War I by the rise of the left-wing shop stewards' movement, demanding "workers' control" in the war industries. After the war, the building workers, led by Hobson and Malcolm Sparkes, founded building guilds that built houses for the state; but after the economic slump of 1921 the state withdrew financial help and the movement collapsed. "Britannica.com, s.v. Guild Socialism

Hansard, HL Deb 30 April 1918 vol 29 c894; Lord Parmoor: "Let me give three illustrations only of who these people are who are suffering in this way. I will take three notorious cases. One is that of Mr. Malcolm Sparkes, who is really the author of the much praised Whitley Report. He is a writer and investigator of great eminence, and even while in prison has been consulted by the Government in reference to this Report. What is his position? He has already suffered sixteen months of solitary confinement in prison. We are not so rich in men of that kind that we can afford to waste them in such a manner, apart from the torture which it is to men of that intellectual eminence to be in prison under existing conditions." MS: "A Guildsman's Reply, The Labour Monthly, Vol. 1 Dec 1921 no. 6, pp. 520-6.

MALCOLM J. SPARKES (1897-98) has at last been let out of gaol, unconditionally. His services have been long very badly needed and even while he was in prison he had frequently to be consulted about matters relating to the building trade. Bootham magazine - April 1919

Malcolm Sparkes. " A MAN of hope, with forward looking mind." These words, which were carved by his own request on the tombstone of a great physician, might with equal truth be spoken

of Malcolm Sparkes. The fire of £in unquenchable optimism made his life shine like a beacon, but it was a consuming fire, and it burned out his physical frame before the age when most men have reached their prime. He died at his home at Jordans on April 6th, 1933, at the age of 51. I have a right, I think, to claim the privilege of writing about him. After he came on from Ackworth in 1898, we were at Bootham together for a year, both of us in No. 10, then surely the most joyous bedroom in the school; both pretty lively members, he known as "kitten " and I as " mouse." Then in 1917 we came together again in a sort of College course at Wormwood Scrubs. I shall never forget the thrill of pleasure when we recognised each other, both unshaven monstrosities in prison garb, on the same landing in "A" hall. Unfortunately, after our first term we were separated, he being transferred to Wandsworth, I to Maidstone. Since the war, always attracted by his adventures in the sphere of industrial idealism, I had closely followed his career until in 1925 I joined him as co-director when he started Drytone, Ltd., a concern manufacturing high-class wood-work. Beginning his training with a London firm immediately after leaving Bootham, Malcolm Sparkes specialised in woodwork design. His genius as a creative artist and craftsman soon showed itself, and by 1914 he had risen to the position of Assistant Managing Director in his firm; but his connection with them was broken as a result of his uncompromising stand as a CO. in the war. Before this happened, however, he had often found himself in the position of negotiator on the employers' side in patching up quarrels in the building industry. His disgust at the waste of time and energy involved in these disputes and his high regard for Trade Unions set him planning constructive councils for " causing peace " in industry. For him a peacemaker was a maker of peace, something very much more than a mode- rator of discord. He loved Rufus Jones' definition : "Peace- making is the divine business of drawing men together into unity of spirit and purpose." In 1916 he wrote a Memorandum applying his idea of Constructive Councils particularly to the building industry. His proposals met with instant and enthusiastic response from both Employers' and Workers' Associations, and as a result the Building Trade Parliament was set up. Then at the request of Mr. Whitley, who was working out a Reconstruction Policy for the Government, Malcolm Sparkes drafted a further Memorandum with wider application. The final proof of this docu- ment was passed on January 28th, 1917, and on the next day its author was arrested as an Absentee and clapped in gaol. But the seed had been sown; the ideas were embodied in the Whitley Report, and eventually Whitley Councils were set up in every industry. Unfortunately, they changed their character and lost influence by departing from Malcolm Sparkes's very definite and wise contention that Industrial Councils should be constructive, and nothing but constructive, and should refuse to discuss disputes, for which the machinery was already provided in the Conciliation Boards. Whilst in Wandsworth Prison he was consulted on details of his scheme by the Government, by the Bureau of Industrial Research at Washington, and by many others. The value of his services and the need for further help were so extensively recog- nised that in February, 1918, thanks particularly to the influence of the late Lord Milner, he was released unconditionally from prison. As a logical sequel to the idea of Industrial Parliaments, and encouraged by G. D. H. Cole's writings, Malcolm Sparkes saw great possibilities in the Guildisation of Industry, each in- dustry running under self-government as a public service, and aiming at cash surplus only for the purpose of perfecting the service itself. In 1920, putting his ideas into practice, he started the London Guild of Builders, the main structure of which had been worked out by himself and other building trade men in Wands- worth Prison on scraps of paper circulated secretly, and at great personal risk, in defiance of regulations. In this Guild all branches of the industry, technical, clerical, and operative were repre-sented on the Board and united for a common purpose, service of the community. The success of the Guild was embarrassingly rapid, but differences of opinion as to management and methods of finance led to his severance two years later and the collapse of the Guild, a bitter grief to him, more especially because it involved his friends in financial loss. An invincible optimist, Malcolm Sparkes had no use for the ever-growing network of merely negative prohibitions and con- trols by which the social conscience of the community sought to express itself in industrial matters. He saw evidence of fear and lack of faith in all these regulations, and his soul cried out for something much more positive. All his conceptions for the right organisation of industry were based on faith in the uncommon fineness of the common man, and if for this reason alone, his life shone, and will continue to shine, like a beacon over a world distracted and in ruins through lack of that faith. 7-Sylvanus Jesper^{31,185} was born on 7 May 1849 in Preston, Lancashire and died on 30 Mar 1871 in Preston, Lancashire at age 21.

General Notes: SYLVANUS JESPER, Born 7-5-1849, entered his father's business for a year or so, but was always delicate and died 30-3-1871 from "heart disease brought on by severe cold." There is a five-page memoir in the Annual Monitor for 1872.

Samuel next married Lucy Tunstall,^{1,2,185} daughter of Croudson Tunstall^{1,2,33,184,185,192} and Anne Gibbins,^{1,2,33,185,192,193} on 13 Nov 1851. Lucy was born on 23 Jun 1811 and died on 5 Jan 1873 in Prestbury. Cheshire at age 61. They had no children.

General Notes: Samuel Jesper's second wife, Lucy Tunstall, was an equally prominent member of the society, the daughter of an elder, and ministered most devotedly to her youngest step-son, Sylvanus, whose health was always delicate and who died at the early age of 22. Her unremitting care of this youth aggravated the malady from which she herself died.

Noted events in her life were:

6-Elizabeth Jesper¹ was born on 17 Sep 1803 in Dygood's Farm, Purleigh, Essex, died on 26 Dec 1885 in Martins Hall, Bran End, Stebbing, Essex at age 82, and was buried in FBG Stebbing, Essex. She never married, but lived (except for the first few years) all her life at Bran End, firstly with her father, and after his death with her sister

General Notes: In partnership with Charles Wilson, his brother Samuel's wife's brother, he founded the business of Wilson, Jesper, and Company, Woollen Drapers and Clothiers, with headquarters at Preston, and branches at Penrith, Carlisle, Appleby, and elsewhere. Joseph Jesper had two children, Joseph (B. 25-6-1842, D. 20-1-1846), and William (B. 7-1-1844, D. 9-10-1847). In later life failing eyesight compelled him to relinquish business, and he retired to the little village of Freckleton, outside Preston, where Sarah Jesper died 19-6-1889, and Joseph 6-3-1890. He was a "minister in good esteem" in the Society of Friends, and took an active part in its religious life.

We have spoken already of the Stebbing Meeting House: Rebecca Whitehead was one of the last worshippers there, and towards the end of her life she sat there on many occasions alone. Her grave, and that of her husband and sister, are amongst the few for which namestones have been provided.

Rebecca married Joseph Whitehead,^{1,2,92} son of Mark Whitehead¹ and Mary Warren,¹ on 6 Oct 1835 in FMH Stebbing. Joseph was born about 1807 in Totham, Essex, died on 14 Apr 1875 in Martins Hall, Bran End, Stebbing, Essex about age 68, and was buried in FBG Stebbing, Essex. They had one daughter: Susannah.

Marriage Notes: Rebecca Jesper, Born 22-4-1807 at Dygood's. She married 6-10-1835 at Stebbing, Joseph Whitehead, son of Mark and Mary Whitehead, of Totham, Essex, a miller. They had one child, Susannah Whitehead, B. 29-1-1837, who died young. They lived at Martin's Hall, with Rebecca's sister Elizabeth, and there Joseph Whitehead died 14-4-1875, Rebecca Whitehead 3-11-1883. These were the palmy days of Martin's Hall: Joseph Whitehead--"a kind-hearted, dapper little Friend, very neatly attired in Quaker broadcloth and white cravat"--and his wife--"a bright, cheery little lady in Quaker dress"-kept open house, and many relations and friends testify to their unfailing hospitality. We have heard from several sources of the strawberry banquet held at Bran End every June, when the Quarterly Meeting came to Stebbing, of the kindly bees that for years made their home in the roof, and never stung even the most austere visitor, of the grape vine that covered the old house (there is a fragment still left, --but quantum mutatus ab illo!), of the Mulberry tree, of the boat on the little brook for the more adventurous nephews and nieces, of the dolls that came from market in Joseph Whitehead's capacious pockets for the less so:--for everyone, Martin's Hall seems to have pleasant associations. William Alfred Jesper (1916)

General Notes: EDWARD WEST JESPER, B. 24-2-1865. On leaving school went on the Continent to perfect himself in French and German, caught a series of chills the winter he was at Leipzig University; went out to Natal on a health voyage, but never recovered and died at Levens 21-4-1890.

Bryological career

Albert Wilson first became interested in cryptogams after meeting James Alfred Wheldon (both men were chemists as well as keen amateur botanists) in 1898, and joined the Moss Exchange Club in 1908. He also joined the Lichen Exchange Club at that time, but the lichen club folded after five years.

Wilson became knowledgeable about Yorkshire's bryoflora while living in that county, and later acquired similar or greater knowledge of the bryofloras of Lancashire and Westmorland. Wilson distributed mosses for the newly formed British Bryological Society in 1923-4, and for some years kept the Society's account of vice-county records, as well as contributing over 2,500 packets of his own to the annual exchanges.

He attended few meetings of the BBS during the last 20 years of his life because of increasing deafness, and declined the offer of vice-presidency for the same reason. His herbarium was presented to York Museum, with further plants at Merseyside Museums, the Department of Botany at Edinburgh, Manchester Museum, Cardiff, Oxford and Ulster. The Natural History Museum in London has some of his correspondence.

Family background and biography

Albert Wilson was born on October 12th 1862, at Calder Mount, Garstang, Lancashire, the third child of four born to Charles Wilson (1813/4-1900) and Susanna (*née* Jesper, 1828/9-1916). The Wilsons were Quakers, and Albert's great-grandfather Thomas Wilson (1741-1788) had been a woollen-manufacturer at Thornton, Yorkshire. His grandson Charles (Albert's father) was born at Thornton, and became a clothier/merchant tailor.

The Jespers, who were also Quakers, were from Essex, Susanna being born at Purleigh, near Maldon, a daughter of John Jesper (1797-1843) and Sarah (*née* Levitt). A Samuel Jesper, who was born at Macclesfield, Cheshire, married Charles's sister, Susannah. The Wilsons often had Jespers from Purleigh staying with them at Calder Mount.

Calder Mount was a spacious house about a mile from Garstang, with a large garden containing a vinery, greenhouses, fernery and orchard. Both Charles and Susanna were interested in plants. Charles owned a telescope, and his sons became interested in science, meteorology and horticulture. Indeed, Albert kept daily records of temperature and rainfall, and sent in records over a period of 40 years.

Albert first became interested in plants at the age of thirteen, when he was at Stramongate School for Quakers, Kendal, where he began to collect and press flowering plants, ferns, and a few mosses for his herbarium, but not liverworts or lichens. From the age of 15, he spent a year at The Woodlands school at Hitchin, Hertfordshire, where countryside over chalk gave him his first experience of calcicoles.

In the following year, Albert became apprenticed to Harrison, Parkinson & Co., pharmaceutical chemists at Bradford, Yorkshire, and had little time for botany during the next four years. However, he did join the Botanical Record Club in 1882.

In 1883 he went to London to study for his pharmaceutical examinations, qualified in 1884, and returned to Bradford as an assistant pharmacist. Later he became a partner in the firm to which he had been apprenticed.

Albert became friendly with John B. Foggitt (born 1861/2), one of the botanical family of Foggitts who for many years had been chemists at Thirsk, Yorkshire. John Foggitt in turn became a pharmacist, and was living at Horton near Bradford in 1881, so may either have met Albert at that time, or later in London. Foggitt later lived at Southport and Kirkby Lonsdale, and sometimes botanised with Wilson.

Albert married Alice Mary Thorp (1861/2-1945) in 1890, and the following year they were living at 20 Merton Road, Bradford. In 1897 they moved out to Ilkley with their son Howard (born 1891/2), who became an optician in later life. Albert travelled to work in Bradford for the next 15 years, until he retired in 1912 at the age of 50.

Albert and his wife moved to Garstang in 1912, in order to help his elderly mother. After she died in 1916, they moved to Bentham, and then in 1918 to Havera Bank, Sedbergh, Westmorland. The country around Sedbergh offered plenty of opportunities for Wilson to indulge his interest in bryophytes, which had first been stimulated when he met another pharmacist, James Alfred Wheldon (1862-1924) in 1898. Wheldon was exploring the districts around his home at Liverpool for mosses, and Albert sent him gatherings for naming which he had collected in the remoter parts of west Lancashire. Over the next nine years, from 1898 to 1907, Wheldon and Wilson did the groundwork for their *Flora of West Lancashire* (1907), and during this period Wilson became serious about and competent in bryology.

After their *Flora* was published in 1907, Wheldon and Wilson continued their friendship, collecting vascular plants, lichens and bryophytes on holidays together, particularly in the Scottish Highlands, Westmorland, and the Isle of Man.

Wheldon died in 1924, and that year Wilson moved from Sedbergh to Ro Wen, near Conway, where he lived until 1946. He continued to record in Westmorland, the Lake District, and also explored the country around his home in North Wales, often in company with Arthur Augustine Dallman (1883-1963). In 1932 he started to prepare his *Flora of Westmorland* (1938), with his son Howard often driving him to locations in the family's car.

Albert's wife died in 1945, after which he went to live with his son at Pear Tree Cottage, Priest Hutton, near Carnforth, Lancashire, where he died in May 1949, aged 87.

Sir Richard died in 1906 at Kingston-on-Thames, where (and at "Glendorgal") Lady Tangye still resides. They had six children, of whom the eldest son is now Sir Harold Lincoln Tangye, Bart. A younger son, Wilfrid, is a lieutenant on active service.

General Notes: In the early 1950s Derek Tangye and his wife Jeannie were walking along the cliffs near Lamorna, above Mount's Bay in Cornwall, when they saw a buzzard drifting overhead. Suddenly we saw below it in the distance a small grey cottage on the edge of a wood. It was as grey as the boulders heaped haphazardly around it, as grey as the ancient stone hedges which guarded long forgotten meadows. This was Minack. We knew at the instant of seeing it that it was to become our home.

The quotation is from A Cornish Summer (1970), the seventh in a series of autobiographical books, all bestsellers and describing their life in that cottage, their early struggles on a flower farm, and their love for the wild landscape and their various animals, that has become known as the "Minack Chronicles". The 19th, The Confusion Room, was published this year. Friends in London had been amazed that this good-looking and sophisticated couple should take such a plunge. Derek had worked in Fleet Street as a gossip columnist on the Express and elsewhere. Jeannie had been an agony aunt on the Mirror and had been press officer for the Savoy Hotel Group, which inspired her book Meet Me at the Savoy, published under her maiden name Jean Nicol, and also a bestseller. Their friends included Danny Kaye, David Milford Haven, the photographer Baron, Beverley Nichols, A.P. Herbert, Noel Coward and Tyrone Power; also, surprisingly perhaps, George Brown, the future Foreign Secretary. It is said that when Jeannie came down the stairs at the Savoy the orchestra would strike up with the tune "Jeannie with the Light Brown Hair". Derek Tangye had Cornish ancestry and had spent happy childhood holidays at his family home at Glendorgal, near Newquay. He had always admired a house called Boskenna at Lamorna, but when he took Jeannie to see it they decided that a simple cottage was really their ideal. Minack, or Dorminack, was certainly simple when they moved in, with an earth floor, no water and electricity, a mile down a bumpy muddy track. However they still returned once or twice a year to London, where they took a luxurious suite first at the Savoy, then at Claridges. In 1961 Tangye published A Girl on the Roof, which was a great success. He and Jeannie had been adopted by a succession of cats - notably Monty and Lama - which became the heroes (or heroines) of subsequent books. A Drake at the Door (1963) was so named because of a pet Muscovy duck named Boris (after Pasternak), and A Donkey in the Meadow (1965) was in honour of

The books were illustrated by Jeannie, and nearly all were serialised in popular illustrated magazines. The fan mail grew. The Tangyes' romantic story struck a chord with many who felt that they

longed to escape from the stresses of modern life. There were also pilgrimages of admirers, mostly unsolicited.

In spite of all this Derek Tangye constantly needed reassurance, as I discovered when I was his publisher. He was touchy about the promotion of other bestselling writers on country matters - Gavin Maxwell, for example, or James Herriot (tricky for us, at Michael Joseph, as Herriot was also one of our authors). He was afraid of missing out on new readers and in each book would in some way recapitulate the story of how Jeannie came to Dorminack, and then go on to the previous years' adventures which could be a shipwreck, swallows nesting for the first time under the eaves, or a gala at Lamorna village.

After I had left Michael Joseph, I used to be invited to a special post- Christmas lunch at Dorminack. The big fire blazed and the cottage would be strung with hundreds of cards from all over the world, champagne flowed and we ate in a miniature conservatory watched by donkeys from the hedge above, maybe also with a gull on the roof. Jeannie was a very good cook and baked her own bread. She died suddenly in 1986, and Derek tried for two years afterwards to keep up the tradition of these lunches. It became too much for him, and he could not be persuaded to resume them at our house, at the other end of Cornwall. Indeed, after Jeannie's death he scarcely left his patch, as he called it, except for a yearly excursion to Claridges in the old tradition. Jeannie's funeral was made especially memorable by an address by John Le Carre. Derek also spoke of her on the television programme Songs of Praise in 1992, and many of us were moved to tears when Baron's photograph of her beautiful face appeared as if from the clouds. Derek's book about her, Jeannie (1986), also part of the "Minack Chronicles", I consider to be his best. Some time before they had bought several acres of meadow sloping down to the sea, looking out to St Michael's Mount, and when she was dying they decided to form it into a trust, the Minack Chronicles Trust, as a place for solitude and preserving natural life.

The possibility of a television series based on the books kept Derek Tangye buoyed up in his last years, when he became increasingly crippled by arthritis and gout. This and the extraordinary flow of admirers who continued to make the pilgrimage and wade through the stream known as Monty's Leap.

Rachel Jesper was a scholar and pupil teacher at Ackworth, and before her marriage lived with Joseph and Sarah Jesper, ministering to the latter who was an invalid. She and her husband lived for twenty years in the house adjoining the watermill at Bran End, near Stebbing, removing in 1891 to Saffron Walden where, 11-7-1911, Rachel Barritt died. They had seven children, the eldest of whom, Emily, married John Frederick Jeffrey, a descendant of the Marriage-Gospill union referred to under (4b). Joseph Barritt lives with his two youngest children, Cornelius and Caroline, at Pinner.

- She worked as a Pupil teacher, Ackworth School in Ackworth, Pontefract, Yorkshire.

General Notes: The Conscientious Objector Friend Cornelius Barritt

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The Library of the Society of Friends recently catalogued a collection of historically important papers of a member of the Society of Friends and a World War I Conscientious Objector (CO). This remarkable and inspiring man was Cornelius 'Corney' Barritt and his papers, which include correspondence, postcards, photographs, diaries, newspaper cuttings and publications, illustrate both his life and his interests. The papers (TEMP MSS 62) were catalogued by Krzysztof Adamiec, a University College London student undertaking a two-week placement with the library. Cornelius Barritt, born in Stebbing, Essex, on 24 July 1883, was called up to 'serve his country' in 1916. Stressing his dedication to peace and his conscientious objection to war, he applied for absolute exemption from military service under the Military Service Act (2 March 1916). After a series of hearings in March 1916, the Local Tribunal refused his case and he was conscripted into the army and sent to Harwich.

In April 1916. Cornelius Barritt was arrested with sixteen other COs at Landguard Fort, Harwich, kept in darkness and subjected to a diet of bread and water. Despite their objection to combatant and non-combatant service, the members had been forcibly attached to the Eastern Non-Combatant Corps (NCC) where they refused to undertake the work assigned to them. Even when threatened by an officer that they would face the death sentence, they still refused to obey military orders. One officer warned: 'Once you are across the channel your friends in Parliament and elsewhere won't be able to do anything for you'. Many members of Parliament had pressed for assurances that conscientious objectors would not be subjected to the death penalty during the passage of the first Military Service Act. However, there was a loop-hole and those individuals who were not legally recognised as being COs could be subject to army regulations which prescribed death by shooting as the punishment for disobedience on active service. On 7 May 1916, the seventeen COs left Harwich for France, arriving at Le Havre on 8 May. On arrival at camp, they were told they were no longer prisoners but soldiers of the King, their past disobediences forgotten. Being free to move about the camp, the COs discussed their strategy of resistance. On 10 May they paraded with the British Expeditionary Forces, but when the order 'Right turn! Quick march!' was given, the men stood rigidly in their positions. David Boulton's book Objection Overruled provides an account of the events that follow: 'The infuriated NCOs [Non Commissioned Officers] ordered that they be locked up and "treated as prisoners of war".' Physical ill-treatment, bullying and threats of execution followed. The men were split up. Some were sent to Harfleur and put to work in a quarry. They refused to handle tools. In desperation, the authorities prescribed the punishment ... 'crucifixion'. Cornelius Barritt was subjected to 'crucifixion', also-known as 'Field Punishment No. 1. "Cornelius described the experience vividly to the Non Conscription Fellowship: 'The Quartermaster Sergeant had us each handcuffed to a tent with our hands round the pole behind us, which made the shoulders ache to a quite excruciating degree ... [The following evening] we were placed with our faces to the barbed wire of the inner fence. As the ropes with which we were tied were fastened round the barbed wire instead of the usual thick wooden post, it was impossible to tie them much more tightly, and I found myself drawn so closely to the fence that when I wished to turn my head I had to do so very cautiously to avoid my face being torn on the barbs. To make matters less comfortable, it came on to rain and the cold wind blew straight across the top of the hill.' Despite this treatment, Cornelius Barritt and the other men stood by their principles and refused to obey military orders. A few days later, they were sent to the Field Punishment Barracks at Boulogne. There they refused to work and again were subjected to crucifixion in crowded, windowless punishment cells. Cornelius Barritt describes the cells in his diary: 'rats were not infrequent visitors. They would sit on the edge of a fire bucket to drink the water and occasionally run up one's back during a meal. ... There were now eleven of us in one cell (there had been twelve at one time) ... The conditions of living twelve in a cell can be better imagined than described. We could just lie six a side with our feet almost touching ... ' On 7 June, four COs, including Cornelius Barritt, were court-marshalled and found guilty of disobeying orders. Barritt records his sentencing on 15 June in his papers: '... an officer read out our sentences one by one: "To suffer death by being shot" ... Then came a pause ... then followed: "Confirmed and commuted to ten years' penal servitude ... " David Boulton's book informs us that 'Barrett, Foister, Ring and Scullard were the first to be subjected to this ghoulish treatment. They were not the last. During the ten days that followed there were almost daily repeat performances. Altogether in June 1916, thirty-four men received the death sentence, commuted to ten years' penal servitude.' Cornelius Barritt returned to Britain as part of his sentence at the end of June and was imprisoned in Winchester Civil Prison. Public criticism of the treatment of COs led to all men serving sentences of imprisonment being able to appeal to the Central Tribunal meeting at Wormwood Scrubs. Barritt's appeal was successful and he was sent out on special employment schemes, first to Dyce Quarry Camp near Aberdeen and then to Wakefield Prison. Later, he decided that he could not conscientiously remain within the scheme so he, with a number of other COs, wrote a letter to the Secretary of the Home Office Committee on the Employment of Conscientious Objectors explaining the reasons why they decided not to remain within their working scheme. It reads: 'We hold the same views as the men in prison and we realise that absolute exemption is the only exemption which will satisfy our conscience., .' At the beginning of 1917, Cornelius was sent back to prison; this time to Maidstone Prison, where he remained until the amnesty in 1919. Amongst Cornelius Barritt's papers are a series of postcards of Dartmoor Prison and scenes of everyday life of prisoners. They provide a disturbing insight into the harsh treatment of COs in prison during this period. After the war, Cornelius Barritt married Gladys Mary Lawrence of St John's Wood, London (1920). Their wedding certificate and wedding book are extant amongst his papers (TEMP MSS 359). As a result of his deteriorating health caused by the sufferings he endured as a CO, Cornelius and Gladys Barritt moved to Caloundra, thirty miles north of Brisbane, Queensland, Australia, in 1952. There he continued to work for peace with the support of his wife.

He was a dedicated member of the Society of Friends, serving on a number of committees. In 1920, he became secretary of London & Middlesex Quarterly Meeting Extension Committee and served on Meeting for Sufferings, the Home Service Committee and the Penal Reform Committee. He stayed in touch with his prison companions long after the war had ended and organised at least one reunion in 1931.

Cornelius Barritt died in 1967. Gladys Mary Lawrence continued his peace work until her death in 1975. According to Lucie Barritt, who worked on the Barritt family genealogy, his dying words were: 'We must endeavour to throw a veil over what seems wrong in others; and see the good side of them. It's hard, it's hard - but it's the only way'. The Library is thankful for Krzysztof's work which has both made this important collection more accessible for research and complements the retrospective cataloguing of the printed peace collection currently underway.

He retired on account of ill health after 47 years service. On 25-9-1899 he married Margaret Alice Carter, daughter of Thomas and Mary Carter of Yealand, who died 31-1-1914. They had three children,

• He worked as an Engineer with Tangye Bros. In Birmingham, Warwickshire.

• He resided at No. 42 In 1910 in Crockett's Road, Handsworth, Birmingham.

General Notes: Samuel Jesper came when young from Essex to the North of England and was apprenticed to the woolen drapery business at Stockport, Cheshire. He afterwards started business on his own account at Macclesfield, in or near which town the rest of his life was spent. Samuel Jesper was a devout Friend, for over 50 years a member of the Cheshire Monthly Meeting--serving as overseer and elder, and delighted to entertain those traveling in the ministry and visiting the Quarterly and Monthly meetings: he took great interest in the welfare of his fellowtownsmen and was an Alderman for some years: on more than one occasion he was earnestly solicited to take the Mayoral chair, but his conscientious objection to take or administer oaths prevented him from accepting this honour. As a striking example of the esteem in which he was held may be quoted the fact that the bells of the parish church were rung on the occasion of his youngest daughter's wedding--an almost unique tribute to a quakeress. We have before us a copy of the minute of condolence passed by the Macclesfield Corporation on his death; it, or rather the letter from the Mayor to his eldest son, reads:--

"I beg to express to you and the several members of your family how greatly the Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough, together with myself, feel the loss of the late Alderman Samuel Jesper. His many kind and amiable qualities will long be remembered by his friends; and the conscientious fulfillment of duty to his political and religious convictions must be recognized with thankfulness now that so much he advocated has been accepted by his countrymen."

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as a Woollen draper in Macclesfield, Cheshire.
- He worked as a Councillor and Alderman in Macclesfield, Cheshire.
- He worked as a Quaker Elder.

7-Thomas Wilson Jesper^{1,2,16,121} was born on 3 Feb 1827 in Macclesfield, Cheshire, died on 2 May 1901 in York, Yorkshire at age 74, and was buried in FBG York.

General Notes: THOMAS WILSON JESPER, Born 3-2-1827 at Macclesfield. Married (firstly) 21-11-1850, Ann Thistlethwaite, daughter of John and Margaret Thistlethwaite of Leeds, who died 23-8-1865 aged 40; (secondly) 22-2-1867, Mary Ann Tennant, daughter of John and Elizabeth Tennant of Countersett, Wensleydale, who died 29-6-1886, aged 65; (thirdly) 22-11-1887, Alice Esther Ward, daughter of Samuel and Frances Emery Ward of Rye Farm, Moreton-in-Marsh, Gloucestershire, who survived him and is now living with her step-daughter at Bournemouth. Thomas Wilson Jesper entered his father's business, but after a short time joined his brother Charles in a cotton mill at Preston. This mill they held until the close of the cotton famine, Thomas Wilson Jesper working incessantly on the distress committee, and the mill itself being used for relief work. In 1868 he entered into partnership as a Coal Agent with his brother-in-law, Samuel Tennant, at Darlington, removing to York in 1875 where he

remained until his death on 2-5-1901. By his first wife he had three children:--

Noted events in his life were:

- He was educated at Lawrence Street School (later became Bootham School) in 1839-1840 in York, Yorkshire.
- He worked as a Woollen draper, Cotton spinner in 1850-1852 in Preston, Lancashire.
- He worked as a Cotton Miller in 1852-1867 in Preston, Lancashire.
- He worked as a Coal agent in 1868 in Darlington, County Durham.

General Notes: ELEANOR JESPER, Born 5-9-1851 at Macclesfield, kept house for her father on more than one occasion, (nursing her step-mother Mary Ann Jesper, through a long, trying illness) and for her brothers, with Charles Jesper prior to his marriage, and with Alfred Jesper after his first wife's death. She is living unmarried, with her father's widow, at Bournemouth.

8-Alfred Jesper^{2,121} was born on 19 Jan 1853 in Hanley and died on 18 Mar 1913 in York, Yorkshire at age 60.

General Notes: ALFRED JESPER, Born 19-1-1853 at Hanley: married firstly at Liverpool, 16-5-1877, his half second cousin Maria Tennant (she was also niece to his father's second wife), daughter of William and Maria Tennant who died 24-3-1906 aged 55; secondly 28-8-1907 at York, Lilly Jane Wright who survives him. Alfred Jesper was a coal agent, succeeding to his father's business on the latter's death. He died 18-3-1913 at York, leaving, by his first wife, one son.

Noted events in his life were:

- He was educated at Ackworth School.
- He was a Quaker until his early 20s, when he resigned membership.
- He worked as an apprentice Woollen Draper to Samuel Jesper (grandfather) before 1873.
- He worked as an employee of the North Eastern Railway about 1873-1880 in York, Yorkshire.
- He worked as a Coal agent for Messrs Henry Briggs & Co. In Micklegate, York.

9-William Alfred Jesper¹ was born on 30 Mar 1878 in York, Yorkshire.

Noted events in his life were:

- He was educated at Ackworth School.
- He worked as a Railway Clerk in York, Yorkshire.
- He worked as an Author of "A Short History of the Jesper Family from the 17th century to the Present Time" in 1916.

8-Charles Jesper^{1,2} was born on 3 Dec 1854 in Hanley and died on 18 Nov 1900 in Great Northern Hotel, London at age 45.

General Notes: CHARLES JESPER, Born 3-12-1854 at Hanley. Married 30-4-1895 at York, Agnes Sinclair Mckay, daughter of William Mckay J.P. the then Lord Mayor. Died 18-11-1900 at the Great Northern Hotel, London, when in town on business. He was for some years General Goods Manager of the North Eastern Railway and held in high esteem by both officers and staff. He left three children.

Noted events in his life were:

• He worked as a Goods Manager for the North-Eastern Railway in York, Yorkshire.

9-Leslie Charles Jesper¹ was born on 21 Jun 1896 in York, Yorkshire.

General Notes: LESLIE CHARLES JESPER, Born 21-6-1896 at York. At the outbreak of the Great War he joined the Public Schools Batallion of the Royal Naval Division, took part in the Gallipoli

operations, and was invalided home towards the close of 1915.

9-Col. Norman McKay Jesper¹ was born on 21 Jun 1896 in York, Yorkshire and died in 1968 in Goring By Sea, West Sussex at age 72.

General Notes: NORMAN MCKAY JESPER, Born 21-6-1896 at York (a twin with Leslie). In August 1914 he was employed in a bank at Constance and for a few days was under arrest. He has recently completed a course of training with the Inns of Court O.T.C. and is now a commissioned officer with the Grenadier Guards--"Somewhere in France."

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as a Director of the Northern ports during the Dunkirk evacuation in 1940 in Dunkirk, France.
- He worked as a Chief of the British Transport Commission Police in 1956-1958.

9-Sydney Watson Jesper¹ was born on 6 Jun 1900 in York, Yorkshire.

7-Samuel Jesper^{1,2} was born on 29 Jun 1828 in Macclesfield, Cheshire and died on 6 Feb 1899 in Underwood, Penrith, Cumbria at age 70.

General Notes: SAMUEL JESPER, Born 29-6-1828 at Macclesfield. Married, 17-11-1859, Susannah Smith, daughter of Lewis and Susannah Smith, who died 5-5-1901. Samuel Jesper served his apprentice with his uncles Charles Wilson and Joseph Jesper and on coming of age was taken into partnership. About 1876 he took charge of the Penrith and Carlisle branches--opening out further branches at Appleby and Dumfries, and taking the then manager of the Penrith branch into partnership. The partnership was dissolved in 1885, Samuel Jesper retaining the Carlisle and Dumfries establishments. Though a successful businessman in the early part of his career, his latter years were troubled by financial losses--the most serious of which was due to the defalcations of an employee. He died at "Underwood," a residence he had built for himself near to Penrith, on 6-2-1899 leaving five children:--

General Notes: LOUIS BEDFORD JESPER, B. 3-9-1860 at Preston. Married 10-3-1887 at Yealand Conyers, Amelia Mary Hannah Bragg, daughter of Robert and Jane H. Bragg of Lancaster. He was apprenticed to Wilson Jesper & Co., Penrith, and afterwards was for some years with his mother's cousin Herbert Beddal of London. Subsequently he entered Wilson Jesper's Carlisle Branch and was ultimately taken into partnership by his father. On the latter's death he assumed full control of the Carlisle business, which he retained until recently. He and his wife live at Carlisle, and have had three children:--

Noted events in his life were:

- He worked as an apprentice to Wilson, Jesper & Co., Woollen Drapers and Clothiers in Penrith, Cumbria.
- He worked as a Clothier and Draper, in partnership with Herbert Beddall in London.
- He worked as a Partner in Wilson, Jesper & Co. In Carlisle, Cumbria.

General Notes: ERIC JESPER, B. 31-3-1888 at Carlisle. An exceedingly precocious youth of great promise but delicate health. We have before us poems written by him in very early days which shew decided skill in versification coupled with depth of feeling quite unusual in a boy. He entered his father's business at the age of 18, but his health broke down after a short time and he died at Carlisle, 13-4-1907 in his twentieth year.

9-**Muriel Jesper**¹ was born on 24 Aug 1892 in Carlisle, Cumbria.

9-Dorothy Jesper¹ was born on 15 Aug 1899 in Carlisle, Cumbria.

8-Lucy Isabel Jesper¹ was born in 1862 in Preston, Lancashire.

General Notes: LUCY ISABEL JESPER, B. 9-8-1861 at Preston, entered the nursing profession and for 15 years held the post of Assistant Lady Superintendent at the Liverpool Royal Infirmary. In 1911

she took up a course of study at the Royal Sanitary Institute, London, obtained her diploma, and is now Lady Sanitary Inspector and Health Visitor at Shrewsbury.

Noted events in her life were:

• She worked as an Assistant Lady Superintendent at the Liverpool Royal Infirmary.

• She worked as a Lady Sanitary Inspector and Health Visitor in Shrewsbury, Shropshire.

8-Mary Alexandra Jesper¹ was born on 8 Mar 1863 in Preston, Lancashire, died on 3 Jan 1932 at age 68, and was buried in FBG York.

General Notes: MARY ALEXANDRA JESPER, B. 8-3-1863 at Preston. Lived at home until the death of her parents and has since been engaged in secretarial work.

8-Florence Jesper¹ was born on 26 May 1867 in Preston, Lancashire.

General Notes: FLORENCE JESPER, B. 26-5-1867 at Preston. Lived at home until the death of her parents. For some years conducted a school for young children at Penrith, and is now taking a course of secretarial training at Kennsington College.

8-Wilson Jesper¹ was born on 24 Nov 1868 in Preston, Lancashire, died on 18 Jan 1948 at age 79, and was buried in FBG York.

General Notes: WILSON JESPER, B. 24-11-1868 at Preston. Apprenticed to Samuel Harlock of Nantwich, and later entered the business of Wilson Jesper & Co. for whom he acted as book-keeper and traveller for some years, He is an accomplished violin player.

7-Eliza Ann Jesper¹ was born on 10 Sep 1829 in Macclesfield, Cheshire and died on 11 Sep 1906 in Garstang, Lancashire at age 77.

General Notes: ELIZA ANN JESPER, B. 10-9-1829 at Macclesfield: kept house for her brother Samuel until his marriage, and for her father after the death of his second wife. On his death she removed to Garstang where she built a small house in which she lived until her death, 11-9-1906.

Noted events in her life were:

• She was educated at The Mount School (Castlegate) in Aug 1839-Jun 1842 in York, Yorkshire.

7-William Henry Jesper¹ was born on 21 Apr 1831 in Macclesfield, Cheshire and died on 12 Jan 1832 in Macclesfield, Cheshire.

7-Charles Alfred Jesper¹ was born on 28 Jun 1833 in Macclesfield, Cheshire and died on 18 Feb 1834 in Macclesfield, Cheshire.

7-Charles Richard Jesper^{1,2,187} was born on 3 Oct 1838 in Macclesfield, Cheshire and died on 6 Aug 1889 in Seacombe, Birkenhead, Cheshire at age 50.

8 April 1917 – 30 April 2011

We give thanks for Sam's life. It is a very long life to give thanks for. He was born in April 1917 which was before the Russian October Revolution. Born in the family home at Broomfield Mill, his life came full circle 94 years later when he died in April 2011 in his last home in the Broomfield Mill Barn converted by Peter and Angela, when they were a young couple. He was educated at the Ouaker schools at Sidcot (1928 – 1932) and Bootham (1932 – 1935). Sam may have been destined for the milling industry from an early age. In 1933 his Auntie Mary gave him a book on "Organisation and Management in the Flour Milling Industry". He wanted to be a chemist so his farther Percy compromised, or was it Sam who compromised and Sam went to work for G. W. Chitty and Co Ltd in Dover. Chitty's mill was also the home of the pioneers of Cereal Chemistry Dr Kent Jones and Dr Amos where father gained significant knowledge and experience. There began the lifelong passion for cereal chemistry and flour milling. Just before the war, he became a partner in the family flour and feed milling business. He gained a first class in his milling certificate which he studied by correspondence course.

In January 1940 he joined the Friends Ambulance Unit and registered as a conscientious objector. His tribunal in April 1940 assigned him to "Ambulance work under Civilian control". Throughout the war and just afterwards he played a crucial role in humanitarian aid to lessen the suffering caused by war. In the London blitz he did relief work in bomb shelters and for people bombed out of their homes. When they heard that provincial cities such as Coventry, Plymouth and Southampton were being bombed, they drove through the night with masked lights to be there to help in the morning. They set up field kitchens – a skill that came in handy when he later organised the food stops on the Aldermaston marches.

In Cairo in autumn 1941 he joined the No 1 Mobile Hospital run by the Royal Army Medical Corp. He drove the generator truck to power the tented hospital. They moved backwards and forwards across the North African desert according to the military situation. He was in Benghazi in 1941 and Tripoli and Tunis in 1943. Writing home, he told his mother, Dorothy not to worry because the German bombers respected the field hospital's Red Cross pinned out on the desert and the Italian bombers missed! We can't help feeling that, if he was still able, he would be back there today trying to ameliorate the suffering.

In June 1944 he was sent to Bari in Southern Italy to work with a group of about 600 mid European Jewish refugees. He said they "were very traumatised by their experiences and situation. I was able to get tools and materials from an army 'Returned Store Depot '.... I had them making beds out of timber and wire, utensils out of tins etc. We got sewing machines and using old canvas made windjammers lined with old blankets. So they cheered up and gave me a splendid supper and testimonial when I left." When the British Protectorate allowed a quota of 1000 Jewish refugees to resettle in Palestine, Sam accompanied them on the troopship as a Welfare Officer.

In 1945 - 46 in Ortona in the Abruzzi in Italy, Sam was in charge of the programme to help the local peasants rebuild their houses destroyed in the war. He managed a fleet of 40 lorries for carrying building materials and the wood the peasants collected to trade for tiles to rebuild their roofs.

When Sam was on leave from Ortona in summer 1945, his brother Stephen asked him to come with him to London to help 2 girls move flats. Stephen was a student on George Eglington's farm whose daughter Pearl was studying at the Architectural Association in London. The rest is history. Pearl and Sam got married in November 1946. They moved into the flat at Broomfield Mill, as Sam had rejoined W and H Marriage's and Sons.

Father was for many years a keen participant in the Flour research association at St Albans and latterly the Flour Milling and Baking research Association at Chorleywood. All the research reports from Chorley wood were carefully studied and saved. In 1973 he contacted the Perry Foundation and got them to fund research at Chorleywood on "the effects of fertilizer and nitrogen treatments on wheat". The goal was to see the relationship between wheat production techniques and consumer requirements. This was very much a forerunner of today's vogue for localism and "pip to plate". He developed a system of paying farmers more for growing better quality wheat. He was not just interested in the high tech side of milling and had a close interest in the production of stoneground flour and the early days of organic production or to quote the Farmers weekly in 1974 "Muck and Magic".

He set the focus of the firm onto quality and technical excellence that has provided us with an enduring foundation for today.

Sam was a lifelong member of the Society of Friends. He was clerk to monthly meeting for many years. In the 1950's he oversaw the sale of the large old Chelmsford Meeting House in Duke Street. Then he got 3 for the price of one. The sale of the Duke Street premises financed new Meeting Houses in Billericay (?) and Brentwood (?) as well as this one. For many years he oversaw the management of the building and the maintenance of the garden. He and Pearl arranged the provision of the disabled access and toilet.

He loved swimming. He was in the Bootham School Swimming Team with Richard Branson's dad. Not many people know that. In the Dover Swimming Club he was training to swim the channel before war broke out. In the 1950's and 60's he was a very active member of Chelmsford Amateur Swimming Club. He was the Chair from 19(?) to 19(?). Many people in Chelmsford in their 50's and 60's can swim thanks to him. It only cost 4 old pence for children to swim in the large old outdoor pool in Chelmsford. Sam taught any child who turned up on a Saturday morning and any who came to the swimming club on Tuesday nights. No jostling by pushy parents to get their children into paid swimming lessons for the few. His grandchildren were impressed by Grandpa Sam at Overstrand when he was nearly 70. He swam twice between two breakwaters, got out and said "I'm as weak as a kitten and can't swim like I used to". He only gave up swimming when he got too cold in the water and couldn't warm up afterwards.

Above all Sam was a family man. Pearl and Sam were married for over 64 years and had 4 children: Peter in 1947, Caroline in 1949, George in 1951 and William in 1961. Sam and Pearl moved to Mashbury in 1948 which had a lovely garden for children to play in. Sam created a very productive vegetable garden when they moved to Windmill Pasture in 1956. He always pressed a cabbage or a cat on visitors before they left. When he moved to the barn in 2003 he carried on gardening until very recently.

All 4 children had 3 children each who loved Grandpa Sam as he was such good fun and told such interesting stories. In turn their children boasted at school about their Great Grandpa Sam. After Pearl had her stroke in December 2007, Sam did everything he could to look after her.

In fact everything he did, he did well; everywhere he went he was loved and respected; everyone could rely on him; he left a great mark on the world; and cracked funny jokes. We will all miss him. https://www.justgiving.com/sdmarriage

In the spring there are countless numbers of geese going north. They settle on the stubbles to feed and are very difficult to get near with a gun. Almost the only way to achieve success is to dig a hole in the ground and put out decoys. A piece of tin cut in the shape of a goose will bring them down to feed, and then is the time to shoot, as they don't stay long when they find that the decoys are not live geese. They fly in huge flocks of triangular shape with the apex pointing north. About the middle of October they come south again, as also do the wild turkeys which, if anything, are more unapproachable than the geese* We see ducks of all sorts and sizes, the pintail and mallard being the most common. When the farmers are ploughing in the summer they often come on the nests in the fields. I myself saw one not long ago with seven eggs in it, and the old duck sat still till the plough was only a foot away, when she ran oft pretending to have a broken wing The ploughman moved the nest on the land already ploughed, and the old bird returned to it as soon as he moved away. Then there are plenty of prairie chicken, of a light colour and about the same size as an old--country grouse. In the winter we are deserted by all except the sparrows and snowbirds and a few hawks in the timber. Several species of owls are to be seen from time to time, the best looking being a large white one, bigger than any of his kind at home. Just here we are on the plain bare prairie, with not a tree for miles, and it looks pretty bleak when the thermometer gets down to 360 below zero In the fall I drove out to Long Lake in a two-horse democrat. There was no trail for most of the way, and as there were a few new houses, the farmer who drove us mistook some of the landmarks, and we rattled over the prairie at a good pace in the hope of hitting the right trail somewhere later on. At last we reached a ravine with a few small lakes at the bottom, and knew where we were. I don't know that 1 am particularly nervous, but I did not think much of the place where we decided to cross, as it was strewn with boulders of no small size and an upset seemed almost certain. I don't fancy any sane man in England would drive down a place like that, but out here they don't mind taking a few chances. We got safely down and up the other side, however, and then drove on to the lake. Looking down hill we saw the Arm river covered with geese, and then, after skirting the lake, we rattled down a steep hill at the foot of which stood a charming little stone house overlooking the water. Here we were warmly welcomed by the proprietor, a Yankee farmer who had bought the place a year before. After dinner we talked over various political questions affecting this country, and finally the old Yankee got on to the recent war. He maintained strongly that it was not the proper way to settle difficulties by killing one another, and insisted that some other and less barbarous method would have to be found. It seemed odd to hear a man who had probably never heard of the Society of Friends talk like that, but it made me feel that there must be more people holding Friends' views with regard to war than some people think. ... It was an ideal spot, this, looking over the lake about a mile wide, to the opposite shore where two green-houses were conspicuous among the trees and a bare stubble field or two on the hillside above. A stern-wheel steamer came by as we looked, frightening a great flock of geese, and then we turned back and hitched up for our ride home. Driving straight across the prairie we passed three wolves, separately, each standing up on a hill and looking like a statue. ... I missed Old Scholars badly, but I shall get to York again at Whitsuntide one of these days. You may be sure that when a man has been four years in succession, he doesn't care to miss it. I'm sorry I can't send any photos, but I'm too far from 'the madding crowd's ignoble strife,' as Mr. Brayshaw would say-" Marriage.— On 31st July, 1949, at Bath, Neville Marriage (1895-98), aged 67 years.

After the war he trained in otorhinolaryngology at The London Hospital under Mr C Keogh before obtaining consultant posts at the beginning of the NHS. He worked as a truly general ear, nose, and throat surgeon, bringing the evolving specialty to his patients, who admired him. It is worth noting that his uncle, Isaac Brown, was the first Principal of the Flounders and that F. H. B.'s nephew, A. Barratt Brown, has succeeded him as Clerk to the Governors. For the last quarter-century F. H. B. has lived at Letchworth, an educational leader in the town. He was chairman of the Education Committee, and a governor of the new Grammar School; he took a large share in starting an Adult Education Settlement in Letchworth. F. H. B. had a deep influence on those around him, which surprised many who knew him as a quiet, retiring personality. I knew him best when we were colleagues at Oliver's Mount. His scholarly mind attracted us, and his rooms were open to a group that enjoyed many good talks on theology, history and literature, with an occasional hand of whist given in. BROWN.— On December 26th, at Letchworth, Francis Henry Brown (1868-71), aged 81 years.

General Notes: SIDNEY KEMP BROWN 1900 - 1978 S.K.B. was a boy at Bootham from 1913 to 1918. He was an active member of many school societies - notably Archaeology - and was at one time or another secretary of most of them. He was Head Reeve during his last term (in which capacity he hoisted the School's Union Jack at the end of the First World War) and in his many and varied activities one begins to see the S.K.B. of the years to come. After Cambridge he taught at the Friends' School, Wigton, and the happiest event of this period was the meeting with his wife, Edith, who was to make her own significant contribution, coaching games at The Mount and costuming our plays and operas, as well as quietly supporting Sidney in all his tasks. She joined him in York in 1929, two years after Sidney had started his long service to Bootham as a teacher of History, Geography and (from 1932) Economics. He became House Master of Watson, was appointed Senior Master in 1946, spent a well-earned sabbatical term in France and North Italy, deputised for a term for Tom Green during the latter's leave of absence, and retired in 1964. During his retirement, after a trip with Edith to Kenya to visit their daughter and son-in-law, he made two notable contributions to The Old Scholars Association - the compilation of the new Register and the writing of the booklet 'Bootham School 1823 - 1973'. He suffered a severe stroke early in September from which he did not recover. He died on September 16th. S.K.B.'s most conspicuous talents lay in the fields of administration and organisation. Details never bored him and complications never daunted him. During his eighteen years as Senior Master his thoroughness and devotion ensured the smooth running of the School and it was taken for granted, and often therefore without acknowledgement, that the multifarious small and routine arrangements were being well looked after. His service to the Society of Friends was of a similar nature, carried out with equal dedication. He had been clerk of the Preparative, Monthly and Quarterly Meetings, and was for many years Treasurer of York Meeting, and Convenor of its Property and Finance Committee. It was very fitting that at Yearly Meeting in Lancaster this year, warm tribute was paid to the thoroughness and patience with which he had organised hospitality at the Y.M. in York four years before. All this may sound a bit dull and unimaginative. But there was more to S.K.B. than an efficient administrator. He was a many sided personality, with endearing foibles and idiosyncracies. He could laugh until tears streamed down his cheeks and bedewed his spectacles and he could break out into a storm of indignation if he judged - usually rightly - that a colleague had behaved outrageously; and it was with joyous zest that he played a memorable Mrs. Malaprop in 'The Rivals' and in three later school plays the part of the 'Little Man', cheerfully coping with surprising and unexpected situations. Above all, we shall remember him with affection and gratitude for the way in which he glorified all the tasks he undertook - from acting headmaster to the clearing of lockers - by the devotion and dedication with which he performed them. His work and long service to School and Meeting were his means of expressing what he rarely expressed in words - the depth and sincerity of his Quaker faith. J.A.K..

Sociologist whose research looked at the wartime experience of women workers *Huw Beynon - The Guardian* Thursday 14 June 2007 00.08 BST Professor Richard Brown, a major figure in postwar British sociology, who was renowned for his studies of work and workers in industrial settings and did much valuable research on training and policy provision for deaf people, has died aged 73 from lung cancer.

Brought up in a Quaker family in York, with an elder sister and a younger brother, Richard attended Bootham school in the city, run by Quakers, where his father was a teacher. He completed his national service with the Friends Ambulance Unit on international duty.

He went on to read history at Cambridge University and helped with courses at a local borstal as part of the university's social service organisation. He left Cambridge in 1956 and quickly moved to Vienna to become involved in the plight of refugees from Hungary before studying for a diploma in personnel management at the London School of Economics. This twin-track career became an established pattern, as he combined academic life with his involvement in the peace movement and in numerous causes relating to poverty and oppression. At Cambridge, and through the influences of Peter Lazlett and the visiting lectures of George Homans, he had become interested in sociology and especially the sociology of work. Though inclined towards a career in personnel management, he was encouraged at the LSE to take up research and joined a project at Leicester University in 1959, on the employment of women workers in the local hosiery industry. It was there that he was appointed to his first lectureship and also met and married Jane.

He moved from Leicester to Durham University in 1966 to join John Rex in the newly established department of sociology and social policy. When Rex left for Warwick in 1970, Richard held the fort until Philip Abrams arrived in 1971. After Abrams' untimely death in 1982, Richard (then reader) was appointed professor, a post he held until retirement, at the age of 60, in 1993. His early reputation was built on two classic evaluative articles (on the style of industrial sociology developed at Liverpool University and the Tavistock Institute) in the Sociological Review, and in Sociology, in 1965 and 1967. These revealed a keen analytical style and careful appreciation of detail that was to be the hallmark of his work.

They were followed by two further papers in Sociology (with Peter Brannen). Based on extensive researches into the lives of shipyard workers, they placed Richard at the forefront of sociological debate on the relationship between individual actions, social structure and the organisation of classes.

In the 1970s, he increasingly came to understand "work" to involve a "work history" and a life span of choice and constraint. This rekindled his earlier interests in issues of gender and led to projects on the wartime experiences of women workers in shipyards and munitions factories. In 1995, after retirement, he completed his major work on the "negotiated order" of employment: Understanding Industrial Organisations: Theoretical Perspectives in Industrial Sociology.

In parallel with these major interests, Richard became directly involved in research into the circumstances of deaf people, giving home in his department at Durham to the deaf studies research unit. Headed by David Bryant, with funding from the British Deaf Association, the unit had a major impact on training and policy provision. Richard was a passionate advocate of the unit, representing it to numerous funding bodies. In 1997, he co-authored (with Mary Brennan) Equality Before the Law: Deaf People's Access to Justice, which became the seminal text on English interpretation of British sign language in legal settings. In these and other matters (and in contrast to the spirit of the times) he had a strong line in self deprecation, always deflecting attention to the contributions of others.

Richard was an active member of his trade union (AUT) and the British Sociological Association (BSA). He was the BSA's president from 1983 to 1985, and founder of its journal, Work Employment and Society, which he edited from 1986 to 1989. In 1995 he was elected president of the sociology and social policy section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science. The Changing Shape of Work (1997) was the product of a conference he organised under that title.

Richard found pleasure in the outdoors and in his family life. He was fond of walking and gardening; was a good cricketer and extremely keen on making things. His stroke, some years ago, was a desperate blow. However, through it all, his bright eyes shone and he engaged in conversation about friends, politics and sport.

He is survived by Jane, and children Kate, Matthew, Adam and William.

Almost immediately he joined the Hampshire Regiment and was on active service in North Africa and Italy. He started work in the ethnography department of the British Museum in 1947 and as assistant keeper in charge of Asian and Pacific collections, developing a particular interest in Melanesia, including Papua New Guinea. In later years he returned to Bootham to give lectures on this period of his life, and his vivid accounts of tribal life in the Tifalmin Valley were greatly appreciated by the School. Successive appointments to a variety of ethnological posts culminated in his appointment as Curator of the Pitt-Rivers Museum and head of the Department of Ethnology and Prehistory at Oxford University where he was also elected a Fellow of Linacre College. OBITUARY.

HENRY MARRIAGE WALLIS.

(1854-1941)

H. M. Wallis was born at Ipswich in January, 1854, and was therefore nearly 88 when he died on November 10th, 1941. His father was a keen naturalist, but his own interest in natural history, and particularly in birds, developed while he was at Bootham School, York. As he was in business as a corn and seed merchant in Reading until 1909 it was chiefly during holidays that he could indulge in his hobby. As a young man he visited Sutherland several times with his brother-in-law, J. B. Crosfield. Both had egg collections and they had some hazardous and exciting adventures climbing to nests of Ravens and Golden Eagles. Occasionally they saw White-tailed Eagles, but never found a nest of this species. In 1875 they found Goosanders breeding on Loch Shin, the first definite record for the county and only the fourth for Scotland. In the summer of 1882 H. M. Wallis found on Loch Urigill the nest of a duck which he failed to identify. The eggs and down were submitted to J. A. Harvie-Brown who declared they were those of the Pintail, at that date not known to breed on the Scottish mainland. Later Harvie-Brown became less positive and wished to re-examine the down, but it had unfortunately been destroyed by moth so this was not possible. In the summer of 1886, in company with his life-long friend G. H. Fox, of Falmouth, H. M. Wallis visited western Donegal and discovered a pair of Tree-Sparrows on the island of Aranmore. At that time they had never been met with in Ireland except in Co. Dublin and his statement was treated by Irish naturalists with considerable scepticism. It was not till some twenty years later that the species was again met with in western Ireland, first in Co. Mayo and then in various localities in Donegal. It was a great satisfaction to him to learn that in 1939 a pair had been found on the very farm on Aranmore where he had seen them 53 years before (see British Birds, Vol. xxxiv, p. 107). On this same expedition H. M. Wallis found a pair of Red-throated Divers nesting on the mainland. It had been reported previously that some species of diver nested in Donegal. Howard Saunders had surmised it was the Redthroated and his surmise was thus proved correct. In the summer of 1890 Wallis and Fox visited Norway and found Shore-Larks on the Dovrefjeld considerably farther south than they had previously been known to occur in summer. In 1894 the two friends, with their wives, made a holiday trip in the Central Pyrenees. They saw a Fieldfare and found a nest which was unfortunately empty, but which was just like those with which they had become familiar in Norway. On visiting the place again a week later they found the lining of the nest had been pulled out, apparently by Jays, so the breeding of the Fieldfare in the Pyrenees was not definitely proved. In this region H. M. Wallis first met with numerous large Raptores, the group of birds in which he was always specially interested and whose habits he subsequently studied during visits to Morocco and Algeria, as well as in the Alps and the Balkans. His diagrammatic sketches of vultures, eagles,' buzzards and harriers on the wing, showing their distinguishing features in flight, will be familiar to those who have used the *Practical Handbook* and some of them are reproduced in the new *Handbook*. Although he never attempted a systematic ornithological work, H. M. Wallis published a number of notes and short papers, which gave evidence of the keenness of his powers of observation. From 1917 to 1936 he was a frequent contributor to this journal. Perhaps his most noteworthy papers were on the "Mortality among Birds during the February frost in West Cornwall" (Vol. x, p. 267) and on "Recent Changes in the Birds of Scilly " (Vol. xvii, p. 55). He was elected to the B.O.U. in 1895 and for many years he regularly attended meetings of the B.O.C. Although latterly he rarely intervened in discussion, when he did so the vigour and liveliness of his mind were manifest. During the middle of his life, under the nom-de-plume of Ashton Hilliers, he wrote several novels, all of them vigorous, lively tales, showing a mind that was well stored with historical incident and all manner of curious information. In most of these books one or more of the characters were bird-lovers or egg-collectors and many of his own experiences or observations were attributed to them. He was also a great raconteur and to the end, even when he was bedridden, he would regale visitors with lively stories of his adventures among birds and in other fields too : certainly his tales lost nothing in the telling. He was a Second Lieutenant, and had served nine months in 1916 with the Artists' Rifles.

One told us that if there was a dangerous job to be done he would always go himself instead of sending a man, and, as he put it, 'Mr. Wallis could always get what he wanted done without giving an order. Rosalind Barkas was born in Newcastle but when she was only two years old her father was appointed to a position at Göttingen University and the family all soon moved to Germany. Although Rosalind often returned to England to spend time with her grandparents and later for education at Friends School Safron Walden, she was based in Göttingen until just before war was declared in 1939 and her early education was in German. The friends she made during her early life in Germany; her experience of growing up under a regime increasingly dominated by Nazi ideology; her difculties in coping with later schooling in English – which although she spoke she had rarely written: all shaped her character. She never lost her love of Germany and sympathised with what that country went through. And she also empathised with overseas students here who struggled to adjust to a diferent language and culture. Rosalind's Newcastle grandfather was a Quaker but her grandmother was a member of the Plymouth Brethren and the household was run according to her beliefs. Because of the increasingly difcult political situation in Germany Rosalind and her sister were sent to school in Newcastle in 1935. This did not work out. They were mocked at school because they couldn't read or write in English and at home they struggled to accept the Plymouth Brethren restrictions – particularly on Sunday activities. After a year they were moved to Saffron Walden where they found a completely different atmosphere and Rosalind was soon reading voraciously. She also very much enjoyed the art classes. The girls continued to return to Germany for holidays although life there was becoming increasingly difcult. Horrifed at what was happening to their Jewish friends, they tore down anti-Jewish posters and refused to use the greeting 'Heil Hitler'. During the next few years their parents helped between 50 and 100 Jews to leave the country. However, these activities and the fact that her father was on a Nazi black list meant that eventually in 1939 they all had to leave in a hurry with hardly any money or possessions and without a job to go to. Eventually he got a post teaching at a school in Hartlepool. Rosalind had started to go to Quaker Meetings when still at Saffron Walden and continued to do so while she was at Edinburgh University reading frst German and then an Arts degree which included History, Psychology and Philosophy. Afterwards she spent a year at Woodbrooke while studying for her Teaching Diploma and felt very much at home with the Quakerism she found there. She was infuenced by Friends such as Hugh Doncaster, Jack Hoyland and Konrad Braun. At the end of her course she was ofered the frst teaching job she applied for but found that the school did not accept conscientious objectors on the staff and therefore said she could not take the job. So she then joined Friends Relief Service (FRS) and taught FRS workers German in preparation for the reconstruction work to be done in Germany after the war. A young man called Eric Priestman was one of her students. In addition to her teaching duties she also helped in the FRS ofce and worked long hours in hospitals, shelters and evacuation hostels – often with Eric. She wrote later that she thought "of the momentous days at Woodbrooke and of my decision to join FRS as the foundation stones of my life." After her marriage to Eric in 1945 they became wardens of Gordon House, the then overseas assembly centre in London and where their frst child was born. Later they returned to Birmingham while Eric studied in Woodbrooke for a BA in social studies from Birmingham University and Rosalind helped to support the family by editing a major English-German dictionary. Their home in Birmingham saw the birth of their second and third children and a succession of German au pairs. After some years Eric's job took the family to Maidstone for eleven years (and the fnal addition to their family) and then, in 1967, he was appointed to the staff at Sheffield Polytechnic to teach management studies. Rosalind was delighted to move back to the north and later always spoke of Sheffield and its lively welcoming Meeting with great affection. She first taught at a small girls' grammar school and was able to arrange exchange visits for the girls with a school in Göttingen. As their children became more independent Rosalind increased and widened her work for Friends. As well as numerous local appointments, she served on Yearly Meeting Agenda Committee, clerked the Europe Committee and attended East Germany Yearly Meeting as our Yearly Meeting representative. Later she was to return to visit German Friends on many occasions and she was always welcomed. One seminar on clerkship she conducted is remembered for "combining both practical and inspirational aspects and was conducted with quiet humour and modesty". When their children had all left home, Rosalind and Eric felt it was time for a change. In 1976 they answered an advertisement for Woodbrooke wardens and were accepted. They both found the following six years rewarding and also full of challenges. A number of staff who had been at Woodbrooke for many years were leaving and therefore changes had to be made and managed. The Priestmans' combined experience enabled them to cope - even a complete change of diet was achieved, although not without difculty. The college housed 70 term-time students and at any one time they could be from 20 different countries. Many of these found it difcult to adjust to life in England and Rosalind from her own experience was able to help. Also a number of the UK students had come to Woodbrooke at a time of crisis in their lives and her counselling experience (gained through marriage guidance work in Sheffield) was useful. During this time Woodbrooke on the Road was initiated and Rosalind enjoyed taking part, visiting Meetings both in this country and in Europe. It has since gone from strength to strength. At the end of their time at Woodbrooke they were welcomed back to Sheffield and enjoyed a few richly rewarding years, taking a full part in the Meeting. Sadly this was not to last and in 1985, unexpectedly, Eric had a heart attack and died. Although the next few years were difcult for her, typically Rosalind turned her own experience into

help for others and became a bereavement counsellor. Shefeld Friends remember "her gift of being able to listen quietly to others and her ability to empathise with them". "She was never intrusive or judgemental but ofered her time, her advice and her wisdom". And she always encouraged new members of the meeting to become familiar with the wider Quaker family. She was involved in the revision of Quaker faith & practice - particularly the chapter on personal relationships - and invited groups to her home to answer their often searching questions. In the nineties, Rosalind heard a talk at Yorkshire General Meeting about a new retirement community which the Joseph Rowntree Foundation was building on the outskirts of York. She learnt that one member of Sheffield Meeting had decided to move to Hartrigg Oaks and since she was determined not to be a burden on her family, she visited the site and soon decided to put down her own deposit. She was one of the first to move into Hartrigg but before moving she had been asked to join a shadow committee to assist with helping new residents settle in. Again, Rosalind's experience and organising ability stood her in good stead. During the first nine months she spent many hours listening to the new residents' hopes and fears, chaired the Residents Meetings, and helped to lay the foundations of the committee structure that is still in place. She also hosted a University of the Third Age (U3A) course in her bungalow – teaching German. New Earswick Meeting welcomed Rosalind and she soon became an active member – serving as an overseer, joining in discussion groups, and fund-raising for the new extension to the meeting house. She was conscious that there could be difculties for the Meeting when large numbers of Hartrigg Friends came to join them and tried to make sure that this was approached sensitively. Rosalind had a gift for making lasting friendships and always kept in touch with friends she had made during each stage of her life. She carried on an extensive correspondence with friends from all over the world who all knew they would be welcomed into her home whenever they were anywhere near her. One note about her reads, "We always left her company refreshed in our friendship and faith." Part of William Blake's poem 'Auguries of Innocence' was read at her Memorial Meeting. It approopriately resonates with Rosalind's long life of service:

"Joy and woe are woven fne, A clothing for the soul divine. Under every grief and pine Runs a joy with silken twine." 8-Francesca Mary Wilson^{78,124} was born on 1 Jan 1888 in 37 Holly Avenue, Newcastle upon Tyne and died on 4 Mar 1981 in Royal Free Hospital, London at age 93.

General Notes: Wilson, Francesca Mary (1888–1981), schoolteacher and refugee relief worker, was born into a Quaker family, at 37 Holly Avenue in Newcastle upon Tyne on 1 January 1888, the daughter of Robert Wilson (1850–1933), a hatter's furrier who owned a family concern of considerable size, and his wife, Laura Maria Wallis (1850–1949). In 1892 the family's standing within their Quaker community was compromised when Laura converted from the Society of Friends to the Plymouth Brethren, an event later described by Francesca as a 'cataclysm' (Horder, 4– 5). Her father, a pacifist with an international outlook, was an influential presence in her life and he encouraged her educational aspirations. Following an education at the Central Newcastle High School for Girls and Armstrong College she entered Newnham College, Cambridge, in 1906, where she took honours in parts 1 and 2 of the historical tripos (1908, 1909). Qualifying with the Cambridge teachers' certificate in 1912, she became an assistant mistress at Bath high school before moving to Gravesend County School for Girls, where she taught from 1914 to 1916. While teaching in Gravesend in 1914, Wilson came into contact with Belgian refugees and decided temporarily to abandon her teaching career to undertake relief work abroad. In 1916 she worked with children at Samoëns, in the Haute Savoie, under the auspices of the Friends' War Victims Relief Committee. The following year she was sent to Corsica for the Serbian Relief Fund, providing occupational therapy for wounded and displaced Serbs, before joining her brother Maurice Wilson (1889–1925) undertaking similar work in north Africa. In February 1919 she moved to Serbia where she distributed food and clothing in Niš, Grdelica, and Belgrade. She developed a lifelong love of Serbia and her first book, Portraits and Sketches of Serbia, published in 1920 was motivated by a desire to raise awareness of Serbia's need for post-war relief and reconstruction.

In 1919 Wilson joined Dr Hilda Clark's Quaker Relief Mission in Vienna where she spent three years organizing food depots. While in Vienna she met the art educator Professor Franz Cižek and organized an exhibition of child art by his pupils which aimed to disseminate Cižek's pedagogical theories and raise money and awareness for the recently formed Save the Children Fund. The exhibition opened in London on 18 November 1920 and then toured the UK and Ireland. After undertaking famine relief with a Quaker team in Buzuluk, Russia, during 1922–3, she took the Cižek exhibition to the USA where it opened at the Metropolitan Museum, New York, on 10 December 1923, subsequently touring American cities, Canada, and Australia. The exhibition contributed to establishing Cižek's standing among progressive educators in the UK and America in this period.

In 1925 Wilson settled in Birmingham, where she taught history at the Edgbaston Church of England College for Girls. She opened her home in Duchess Road, Edgbaston, to a succession of Russian émigré children whom she 'adopted', and to Nicolai Bachtin (1896–1950) whom she met in Paris in 1928 where he was part of a white Russian émigré intellectual circle. Bachtin became one of the most influential people in her life, settling in Britain permanently in 1932, initially in Cambridge, before moving to the University of Southampton. In 1938 he moved to the University of Birmingham where he taught classics and linguistics until his death. They appear to have been romantically involved for the first year, after which their relationship evolved into an intense friendship. She also took in a number of lodgers including the Nobel laureate and DNA pioneer Maurice Wilkins.

Wilson maintained her interest in international affairs, travelling to the Balkans in 1929 at the request of Hilda Clark to investigate conditions in Macedonia for the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF). Her subsequent report was delivered to the WILPF Sixth International Congress in Prague in August 1929 and published the following year as Yugoslavian Macedonia. In the 1930s she opened her home to refugees, including the art historian Nikolaus Pevsner whom she met in Göttingen in 1933 on a visit to her sister Muriel and brother-in-law Pallister Barkas. She was increasingly worried about fascism, and the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War prompted her return to active relief work. In March 1937 she travelled on behalf of the Friends to southern Spain where, based in Murcia, she ran feeding programmes, established a children's hospital, and founded occupational workshops for the displaced, travelling between there and Birmingham for the next two years. In 1939 she followed the Spanish refugees over the border into France and undertook similar relief schemes under the auspices of the Quakers in Perpignan. Shortly after the outbreak of war in October 1939 Wilson was sent by the Quakers and the Polish Relief Fund to Hungary to assist Polish refugees, but had to leave in May 1940 following her involvement with the refugee underground movement and her arrest by the Hungarian secret police. During the war she worked for refugee organizations in the UK until 1945 when she joined the newly formed United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA) as a senior welfare worker working with the displaced survivors of Dachau at Föhrenwald displaced persons' camp outside Munich (1945–6). After the Second World War she settled in London, where she lived at Fellows Road, Hampstead, and taught University of London adult education classes and for the Workers' Educational Association. In the 1940s and 1950s she toured Britain addressing public meetings on humanitarian aid and post-war reconstruction, and also broadcast on these issues. Wilson was a prolific author. While in Vienna she began writing articles, for the Manchester Guardian, the Birmingham Post, and The Friend among others, which drew on her experiences and often had the added benefit of raising money for her relief work. She published two autobiographical accounts of her relief work. In the Margins of Chaos (1944), covering the period from the First World War to her return to England from Hungary in May 1940, was intended to raise public awareness of humanitarian issues and contribute to the discourse surrounding government policy on the displaced and relief practice and training. Aftermath: France, Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia 1945 and 1946 (1947) was promoted as 'the first inside account' of UNRRA's work. In her pamphlet Displaced Persons— Whose Responsibility? (1947) she argued for the need to amend the over-restrictive aliens' legislation, and the benefits to Britain of accepting refugees, which was also a theme of They Came as Strangers: the Story of Refugees to Great Britain published as part of World Refugee Year (1959–60).

Wilson was also very aware of the educative potential not only of her own life story but of those of the women activists with whom she collaborated over the course of her long and active life. She published a biography of Eglantyne Jebb, founder of the Save the Children Fund, in 1967, and in her final years she was working on a group biography of three women whom she had known well, Dame Kathleen Courtney, the college principal Geraldine Jebb, and the relief worker Margaret McFie, which she intended to publish to mark the first United Nations International Women's Year in 1975 but which remained unfinished. She died of bronchopneumonia and cerebrovascular accident at the Royal Free Hospital, Camden, London, on 5 March 1981. A memorial service was held on 6 April at Hampstead meeting house, London.

In 1898 he attended a lecture by the pioneer bird photographer, Richard Kearton, and afterwards he and his brother started to photograph birds themselves. They each lectured at Bootham showing their own slides. Arnold Wallis worked on dragon flies for some years, and was local recorder for wood lice. Apart from natural history, his favourite recreation was fly fishing. During the first world war he joined the Friends' Ambulance Unit and served on a hospital train in France and Belgium. His active interest in the Society of Friends continued until the end and he was an Elder of Scarborough Meeting. Birmingham, on 29th May, 1877, and was elder daughter of Frederic Impey, J.P., and his wife, Eleanor (Clark) Impey. She was educated at Weston-super-Mare, Polam, and The Mount Schools, and afterwards went through the two years' course of training at Madam Bergman Osterberg's Physical Training College at Dartford, Kent. The skill and aptitude which she had shown in all games at school now became further trained and applied in many directions, and was matched by the development of a fine courage and an indomitable spirit, which, added to splendid physical health, remained her chief characteristics up to the last moment of her life. From 1897 to 1903 she lived at home, teaching physical drill exercises in schools and families, and practising massage, with much success. To her pupils as well as to her many brothers and sister, she was always the good companion. Her spare time and holidays were passed in country pursuits; she was a fearless horsewoman, an expert angler, and a good shot at game. On or in the water, she was equally at home, yet, strangely enough, even her strong swimming did not avail to save her life in the last terrible ordeal. The reason for this, however, was her consistent putting of others first. To quote from a notice in The Friend of January 28th :- " Dr. E. S. Impey was an ideal 'out-door ' companion, with a close affinity for country life and sport of every sort. Many are the friends, both men and women, who have to thank her for week-ends of happy relaxation at her home at Longbridge Place, or for thrilling escapades on the Avon, out of which her quickness and fearlessness usually brought them safely. Her abilities were not, however, limited to out-door interests, for her skill as a cook was only equalled by the fineness of her needlework. Her buoyant straightforward disposition made light of difficulties, "never say die" being a favourite saying which not inadequately expressed her attitude to life. She was a lover of little children, and, whether as teacher or doctor, had a wonderful way of managing them. Her unwavering kindheartedness to all her patients, combined with the persistence and resource of her character, well fitted her for the appointment she was en route to fill. The value of such a life lost both to England in a time of national crisis, and to India in its great need of Women's Medical Service, is incalculable. Dr. Impey loved her profession and looked forward confidently to the great field for important and useful work waiting for her in India. The distinguished London specialist, Dr. Mary Scharlieb, who has a lifelong knowledge of India, wrote to Dr. Impey's father expressing her admiration of and respect for his daughter, and her sense of the loss of the women to whom she would have ministered. In 1904 Elsie Impey began her medical training. She faced the uphill road with characteristic vigour, nothing daunted at returning to school studies in spite of her twenty-seven years. In this decision the counsel of her aunt, Dr. Annie E. Clark, one of the pioneers of women in medicine, was of much assistance. During the years of study at the University of Birmingham, Elsie Impey made for herself a welcome place, and took a leading part in many of the students' clubs. She was elected the first woman President of the Guild of Undergraduates in 1908, and in 1910, on the opening of the new University buildings at Selly Oak, she was presented on behalf of the Guild, to Queen Alexandra. She qualified as M.B., Ch.B., in June, 1911, and was soon embarked on a busy medical career. She held posts as house-surgeon, or physician, at the Children's Hospital, and the General Maternity Hospital, Birmingham; at Swansea General Hospital; and at the Temperance Hospital, London. In the autumn of 1915 she went out to Chalons and Sermaize for the Friends' War Victims Relief Committee, and remained for six weeks. She had long cherished the ambition to work for the women of India : in November, 1915, the opportunity came, and she accepted the post of Medical Officer at the Dufferin Hospital for Women at Lahore. She entered with the keenest zest into preparations for work in the new sphere. She loved her profession and was well fitted for it by many special gifts, e.g., open heartedness, perseverance, a cheery smiling manner, and an optimism which inclined always to the brightest and most hopeful. She sailed for Bombay in the Peninsular and Oriental liner Persia from Tilbury Docks on 18th December, 1915, being seen off by her father and other members of her family Two of her brothers were already serving in France; she was fully aware of the risks of a long voyage while German submarines were engaged in pursuing harmless vessels: but in pursuit of duty, she cheerfully faced all for the sake of the splendid field of service opening before her. The voyage began prosperously; she sent a long and interesting letter (24th December) from Marseilles, spoke of sketching at Gibraltar, and of her fellow passengers, of boat drill and assigned places in the boats. Two postcards from Malta were sent on the 28th. Off Crete on the 30th, just

after one o'clock, the Persia was suddenly, without warning, torpedoed, and sank in five minutes. When the explosion took place the passengers were at luncheon. There was a rush for the door, but a lady who was saved was sitting next to Dr. Impey and says that she took her arm and induced her to wait calmly until the saloon had emptied. Then they went for their life-belts and separated. The ship had a dreadful list, the companion-way was slippery and foot- hold almost impossible. When this lady reached it, she found Dr. Impey planted firmly at the top, reaching with one free hand to help everyone up as they came. Many of them gained the boats, of which ten were launched, thereby saving fifty-nine passengers, among them fifteen ladies, besides a number of Lascars and some officers and seamen. When she could help no more, Elsie Impey waved a cheery farewell to Mrs. Russ, another survivor, and dived into the sea, "like a powerful swimmer," but was not seen again. It is supposed that either the suction of the ship, or a blow from floating wreckage prevented her rising to the surface. One of the ladies whom she helped wrote to her father :- " Your daughter was a brave woman ; we all consider she died a heroine's death." Another said :- " It was very generous of Dr. Impey to give me the assistance she did, when practically all were looking after themselves," These few particulars of her last deeds of kindness were the greatest comfort to her family, whose sorrow at the loss of one so strong in personality and so joyous in spirit, was lessened by the sympathy of their friends. Her father received from Sir Oliver Lodge, Principal of the University of Birmingham, a letter speaking of her as " a distinguished medical student of the University," accompanied with a " message to the bereaved," in which allusion is made to the continued service of those who have " passed over." In this time of war and loss this thought is one to dwell on. A Minute of Warwickshire North Monthly Meeting, under date 8th February, 1916, spoke of

Captain Christian August Max Ahlmann Valentiner (December 15, 1883 – July 19, 1949) was a German U-boat commander during World War I. He was the third highest-scoring U-boat commander of the war, and was awarded the Pour le Mérite, the highest Prussian military order until the end of the war, for his achievements. Honor Morriss Butlin 21 vi 1911 - 7 viii 2005 We are apt to think of "stewardship" in relation to material resources bestowed upon us, but Honor Butlin used her whole life to demonstrate stewardship. She was born into a close, lively and unorthodox Quaker family. One of her fondest memories was of the 'airbaths' the five young Impeys would enjoy as they played naked on the lawns of their Birmingham home and, even in her nineties, she would quote fondly the wise sayings of her mother at every opportunity.

Honor qualified as a nursery school teacher and pioneered modern child care practice by setting up the first Rachel MacMillan children's nursery in Kettering once she had moved there in the 1930's. She loved children and was fascinated by them. She married her fiancee John Butlin, a local shoe factory owner, a few weeks before the War broke out. The home they built a few years after his return from the War was on or near the site of their earliest romantic meetings. She raised three children in an atmosphere of openness and trust and her frank lessons in sex education could be an eye-opener to other less liberal souls. In her wisdom, keen insight and open mind she seemed ahead of her time.

Honor wished to share her possessions - her home, garden and swimming pool especially. Honor's door was always open, her unfussy welcome and loving personality ready to respond to that of God in whoever entered. Many house guests were taken in and cared for in the family home for months at a time, receiving the healing that came through her love. She had a calming presence deriving from her natural consciousness that she was living in God's presence all the time. Throughout her life she truly was a friend to those who might otherwise have been friendless. Honor believed that she had a duty to others and she carried out these 'duties' with joy. In her generosity she manifested love in action.

Serenity, optimism and faith were striking aspects of her character, along with a lively sense of fun. She could be stubborn in her optimism and her ability to discard all troublesome thoughts. The poetry that she wrote often reflected her love of beauty, whilst the glint in her eye and her mischievous smile would show how much she enjoyed life. She was ever ready to share a concern, engaging in lengthy conversation, poetry or silence according to the moment. Always oblivious to any suggestion of eccentricity, for many years she collected vast amounts of second-hand clothing which she carefully laundered and sold in aid of refugees, raising many thousands of pounds in the process. She never wished to lead or control others but rather expected and saw the best of everyone she met.

At various times in the 1960s and 70s, Honor represented Northampton & Wellingborough Monthly Meeting on Meeting for Sufferings and the former Home Service Committee. She also served Kettering Friends as an Elder and Overseer for many years. A truly grounded Friend, due to the depth of her awareness she had the ability not only to be able to guide others to find a spiritual dimension and fundamental truth in their personal relationships, but also to discern the spiritual paths our lives and work should take for developing a better world. There were dark times, particularly in the latter part of her life, when her husband and later a son died suddenly in tragic circumstances. She endured their deaths with great fortitude, supported by her family and friends, and upheld by her ability to look always to the positive. In her final years, as her memory failed her, it was notable that she first forgot anything that was remotely unpleasant. Honor Butlin was a healer with great faith in the power of prayer. For some years she held Meeting for Worship at Kettering entirely on her own and, even near the end of her life, would sink into the silence of worship with a sweet smile on her face that brought hope and joy to others. Throughout her life she reached out to that of God in everyone and, indeed, her entire life was a testimony to the Grace of God. She is remembered with love.

The water boiled away, the tin melted and fell out on to the table which caught fire, spreading quickly, to the swift destruction of the wholes cholastic buildings. The Library of the Society of Friends recently catalogued a collection of historically important papers of a member of the Society of Friends and a World War I Conscientious Objector (CO). This remarkable and inspiring man was Cornelius 'Corney' Barritt and his papers, which include correspondence, postcards, photographs, diaries, newspaper cuttings and publications, illustrate both his life and his interests. The papers (TEMP MSS 62) were catalogued by Krzysztof Adamiec, a University College London student undertaking a two-week placement with the library. Cornelius Barritt, born in Stebbing, Essex, on 24 July 1883, was called up to 'serve his country' in 1916. Stressing his dedication to peace and his conscientious objection to war, he applied for absolute exemption from military service under the Military Service Act (2 March 1916). After a series of hearings in March 1916, the Local Tribunal refused his case and he was conscripted into the army and sent to Harwich.

In April 1916, Cornelius Barritt was arrested with sixteen other COs at Landguard Fort, Harwich, kept in darkness and subjected to a diet of bread and water. Despite their objection to combatant and non-combatant service, the members had been forcibly attached to the Eastern Non-Combatant Corps (NCC) where they refused to undertake the work assigned to them. Even when threatened by an officer that they would face the death sentence, they still refused to obey military orders. One officer warned: 'Once you are across the channel your friends in Parliament and elsewhere won't be able

to do anything for you'. Many members of Parliament had pressed for assurances that conscientious objectors would not be subjected to the death penalty during the passage of the first Military Service Act. However, there was a loop-hole and those individuals who were not legally recognised as being COs could be subject to army regulations which prescribed death by shooting as the punishment for disobedience on active service. On 7 May 1916, the seventeen COs left Harwich for France, arriving at Le Havre on 8 May. On arrival at camp, they were told they were no longer prisoners but soldiers of the King, their past disobediences forgotten. Being free to move about the camp, the COs discussed their strategy of resistance. On 10 May they paraded with the British Expeditionary Forces, but when the order 'Right turn! Quick march!' was given, the men stood rigidly in their positions. David Boulton's book *Objection Overruled* provides an account of the events that follow: 'The infuriated NCOs [Non Commissioned Officers] ordered that they be locked up and "treated as prisoners of war".' Physical ill-treatment, bullying and threats of execution followed. The men were split up. Some were sent to Harfleur and put to work in a quarry. They refused to handle tools. In desperation, the authorities prescribed the punishment ... 'crucifixion'. Cornelius Barritt was subjected to 'crucifixion', also-known as 'Field Punishment No. 1. "Cornelius described the experience vividly to the Non Conscription Fellowship: 'The Quartermaster Sergeant had us each handcuffed to a tent with our hands round the pole behind us, which made the shoulders ache to a quite excruciating degree ... [The following evening] we were placed with our faces to the barbed wire of the inner fence. As the ropes with which we were tied were fastened round the barbed wire instead of the usual thick wooden post, it was impossible to tie them much more tightly, and I found myself drawn so closely to the fence that when I wished to turn my head I had to do so very cautiously to avoid my face being torn on the barbs. To make matters less comfortable, it came on to rain and the cold wind blew straight across the top of the hill.' Despite this treatment, Cornelius Barritt and the other men stood by their principles and refused to obey military orders. A few days later, they were sent to the Field Punishment Barracks at Boulogne. There they refused to work and again were subjected to crucifixion in crowded, windowless punishment cells. Cornelius Barritt describes the cells in his diary: 'rats were not infrequent visitors. They would sit on the edge of a fire bucket to drink the water and occasionally run up one's back during a meal. ... There were now eleven of us in one cell (there had been twelve at one time) ... The conditions of living twelve in a cell can be better imagined than described. We could just lie six a side with our feet almost touching ... ' On 7 June, four COs, including Cornelius Barritt, were court-marshalled and found guilty of disobeying orders. Barritt records his sentencing on 15 June in his papers: ' ... an officer read out our sentences one by one: "To suffer death by being shot" ... Then came a pause ... then followed: "Confirmed and commuted to ten years' penal servitude ... " David Boulton's book informs us that 'Barrett, Foister, Ring and Scullard were the first to be subjected to this ghoulish treatment. They were not the last. During the ten days that followed there were almost daily repeat performances. Altogether in June 1916, thirty-four men received the death sentence, commuted to ten years' penal servitude.' Cornelius Barritt returned to Britain as part of his sentence at the end of June and was imprisoned in Winchester Civil Prison. Public criticism of the treatment of COs led to all men serving sentences of imprisonment being able to appeal to the Central Tribunal meeting at Wormwood Scrubs. Barritt's appeal was successful and he was sent out on special employment schemes, first to Dyce Quarry Camp near Aberdeen and then to Wakefield Prison. Later, he decided that he could not conscientiously remain within the scheme so he, with a number of other COs, wrote a letter to the Secretary of the Home Office Committee on the Employment of Conscientious Objectors explaining the reasons why they decided not to remain within their working scheme. It reads: 'We hold the same views as the men in prison and we realise that absolute exemption is the only exemption which will satisfy our conscience., .' At the beginning of 1917, Cornelius was sent back to prison; this time to Maidstone Prison, where he remained until the amnesty in 1919. Amongst Cornelius Barritt's papers are a series of postcards of Dartmoor Prison and scenes of everyday life of prisoners. They provide a disturbing insight into the harsh treatment of COs in prison during this period. After the war, Cornelius Barritt married Gladys Mary Lawrence of St John's Wood, London (1920). Their wedding certificate and wedding book are extant amongst his papers (TEMP MSS 359). As a result of his deteriorating health caused by the sufferings he endured as a CO, Cornelius and Gladys Barritt moved to Caloundra, thirty miles north of Brisbane, Queensland, Australia, in 1952. There he continued to work for peace with the support of his wife.

He was a dedicated member of the Society of Friends, serving on a number of committees. In 1920, he became secretary of London & Middlesex Quarterly Meeting Extension Committee and served on Meeting for Sufferings, the Home Service Committee and the Penal Reform Committee. He stayed in touch with his prison companions long after the war had ended and organised at least one reunion in 1931.

Cornelius Barritt died in 1967. Gladys Mary Lawrence continued his peace work until her death in 1975. According to Lucie Barritt, who worked on the Barritt family genealogy, his dying words were: 'We must endeavour to throw a veil over what seems wrong in others; and see the good side of them. It's hard, it's hard - but it's the only way'.

By the death of Henry Shewell Corder, at an age only two years short of the century, Chelmsford Meeting has lost, not only a beloved and honoured member, but a prominent and striking figure, a man remarkable for the clearness of mind and vigour of body which he retained to the close of a long and useful life. The son of Thomas and Mary (Shewell) Corder, born at Widford Hall, near Chelmsford, on a farm which, as he believed, had been under cultivation for more than 1,000 years, he was the eldest but one in a family of twelve, and he lived to be the last but one of his generation. His memory remained unclouded to the very end, and he was fond of talking of things which happened in the far-off days of more than ninety years ago. After six years under a village school-master, a man simple and sincere, who had begun life as a ploughman and had taught himself, even to the extent of Greek, while at work and in his meal -times, he spent some time at Isaac Payne's boarding-school at Epping. His father was a farmer, but he, when his school -days were over, was apprenticed for seven years to his uncle, John Shewell, a draper at Ipswich. Those were strenuous years. Apprenticeship then was a very different affair from the brief and comparatively perfunctory apprenticeship of to-day. The hours were long, the work was hard. He was required to master the details of every department of the business. " I was taught my trade," said Henry Corder many years afterwards. " Young fellows nowadays have to pick up for themselves anything they want to learn. We had no time for cricket or sport, but had to take our recreation, whether in walking or skating, or what not, before six in the morning, or by moonlight after business hours." After some time spent at North Shields, he went into partnership with his uncle at Ipswich. A breakdown in health, however, compelled him, after all, to give up indoor work and go back to the land; and he finally settled at Rollestons Farm, Writtle, where he spent nearly twenty years. Henry Corder was twice married. His first wife was Rachel, daughter of Robert Spence, of North Shields. After a brief union she and her two young children died, within a short time of one another; and in 1850, he married Mary Ann, daughter of Samuel and Rebecca Alexander, of Ipswich. At Christmas, 1910, he and his wife, who, with their son and daughter, survives him, celebrated their Diamond wedding. Retiring from Writtle after some twenty years of farming, he finally removed to Garden Cottage, Chelmsford, a quiet and beautiful retreat, where, among his flowers and fruit-trees, he spent the tranquil evening of his days. Although generally regarded, perhaps by those who did not know him intimately, as a man of particularly good physique, Henry Corder can hardly be said to have enjoyed robust health, and it was thus all the more remarkable that, with advancing years, there seemed to come to him a renewal of physical power, due, so he firmly believed, to a careful and well-ordered life, and especially to that total abstinence which he had practiced for many years. He had not, however, always been an abstainer. In early manhood, he had been in the habit of taking his daily glass like most other people, following in this respect the custom of the time. But when he was about 60, and still farming at Rollestons, having been asked by a number of his workpeople to help in forming a small Temperance Association, he and his brother Edward, who was long the chairman of the Chelmsford Board of Guardians, at once signed the Pledge. Never again did he touch alcohol as a beverage in any form; and he always held the firm belief that this change from very moderate drinking to complete abstinence was the reason why he maintained his health and vigour unimpaired to the very end of his long life. A favourite recreation of his old age was in walking; especially along the riverside from Chelmsford to Maldon, or round by Writtle to revisit the scenes of his farming experiences. But he took an especial interest in his garden, in which grew a profusion of old English perennials and heavily -bearing fruit trees, and in his vinery, whose training and pruning he did with his own hands. It is related that his gardener, having doubted the value of an aloe, "if 'e only blooms one in a 'underd years," Henry Corder retorted : " Oh, but it's a handsome plant, that helps to beautify and ornament the garden." 'Well," said the old man after a pause, "I tell yer this, Mr Corder, that there plant is for the pride of man, and it ain't no use keeping it !" Henry Corder took little part in public affairs, but he was always ready to preside over or to speak at Meetings for philanthropic purposes, and he was for a great many years president of the Chelmsford Temperance Society and Federal Union. For fifteen years he look a leading part in the Bible Class of the Young Men's Christian Association, which he attended with great regularity, and for some years he was president of the Association. He first attended a Meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society when he was 10; he began to subscribe to its funds when he was 14, and he is believed to have attended Bible Society Meetings for eighty-six years with hardly a break. An able and interesting lecturer, he gave at various times, at Chelmsford and elsewhere, addresses on such subjects as "Poetry," with illustrative extracts, "The Crusades " and " Visits to the British Museum." A series of evenings was devoted to an exposition of the Prophecies of Daniel, whose fulfilment was a favourite theme with him. The wide range of his reading was often well shewn in his addresses, and his excellent memory enabled him to quote with ease and accuracy from poets, philosophers and commentators. He kept up his Latin by reading the Vulgate, and his Greek with the New Testament. By Henry Corder's death, Chelmsford Meeting and Essex and Suffolk Quarterly Meeting have lost a beloved and deeply revered spiritual leader. His was a teaching ministry, on a highly spiritual level, His favourite themes were taken mostly from texts in Isaiah, and from the Gospel and the Epistles of John. His excellent memory enabled him to repeat these perfectly and with telling emphasis ; another portion of Scripture being often drawn upon to amplify and enforce the meaning of the original text. His teaching on Friends' principles was direct and frequent respecting the need of the baptism of the Spirit and of true communion with God; and he often emphasised the fact that spiritual food must be partaken of constantly in order to sustain the spiritual life. "Building up yourselves on our most Holy Faith," "Be ye holy as I the Lord your God am Holy "were themes on which he often spoke. While politics were scrupulously avoided in his sermons, prominent events of the day often had their place. He loved to use the words of the prayer commencing " Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of Thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love Thee and worthily magnify Thy Holy Name "; and whenever he concluded Meeting with a benediction, it was most impressive and solemn. To those attending mid-week Meetings his eloquence there seemed at its best. "Increasing in the knowledge of God and therefore increasing in His Love " was the subject of his last mid-week sermon. Nor can his ministry be said to have been confined to Meeting alone. On his walks he often called on friends and neighbours. And his kindly gifts of fruit and flowers, and his words of comfort and advice were appreciated by all who knew him, not less than his welcome and regular ministration from the gallery. To those privileged, over a long course of years, to receive his pleasant calls, it was felt to be a privation when excessive deafness, and finally, inability for more than a very short walk, brought these times of pleasant intercourse to an end. His memory remained clear to the last, and it was easy to draw from him many details of private or national events of long ago. He was always anxious to keep abreast of the times. The Coal Strike caused him much concern, as was evident from his reference to it in his very last sermon, preached on the Sunday before his death; and, again, when with indistinct utterance, he tried to discuss almost with his latest breath. This constant freshness, one might almost say youth- fulness of mind, was one of the charms of his character; and his oft-expressed determination never to grow old

mentally, was thus fulfilled to the very end.

John was born on 8 Nov 1818 in Howard Street, North Shields, Northumberland, died on 22 Jul 1901 in Chirton Cottage, North Shields, Northumberland at age 82, and was buried in Preston Cemetery, North Shields, Northumberland. They had eight children: **John Foster, Thomas, Elizabeth, Henry Corder, Edward, Alfred, Robert Foster**, and **Mary Emma**.

General Notes: JOHN FOSTER SPENCE was born at North Shields on the 8th of November, 1818, and was the seventh in a family of eighteen children. His father, Robert Spence, son of Robert Spence of Whaite Mill House, Hartwith, Yorks., and Sarah, daughter of Robert Walker, of Gildersome, was born in 1784; a very noteworthy man, who did a great deal for the town of his adoption, and was foremost in all work of an educational and charitable nature. The late Dr. Leitch, of Keswick, wrote to his brother, the Town Clerk of Shields: "So good Robert Spence has gone, now that man has lived to some purpose for others and for himself,"

" The active friendly honest man, Where'er he be, "

Tis he fulfils great nature's plan, And none but he."

Doubtless from him his son John inherited much of his power of concentration and method in his work. In a diary kept by Robert Spence is the following extract taken from the Register Book at Darley, Yorks.:-"John Spence of Moneth Hill laid down his life in the Castle of York, for the testimony of Truth against the oppression of Tithes, the fourth day of the sixth month, 1696, Benjamin Holden, priest, being prosecutor." Robert Spence settled in Shields in partnership with Joseph Procter in 1804, and in 1810 married Mary, daughter of Robert Foster, of Hebblethwaite Hall , near Brig Flats, Lancaster, of whom Southey wrote: "Wordsworth sent me a man the other day who was worth seeing, he looked like a first assassin in Macbeth as to his costume, but he was a rare man. He had been a lieutenant in the Navy, was scholar enough to quote Virgil aptly, had turned Quaker and was now a dealer in wool. He had seen much and thought much, his head was well stored and his heart in the right place." His people were all Quakers of long standing, but being in the West Indies in time of war he joined the Navy, rose to be a lieutenant in charge of the "Pelican," but soon after Friends' principles result in word was and he left the Service. His sword was made into a carving knife of most noble proportions, which is in the writer's possesion. Early in the Nineteenth Century, when J. F. Spence was a lad, Naturea on a sond was put in the lockup, of which R. Spence, as Borough Treasurer , kept the keys. It was generally a case of drunk and disorderly on Sunday after Meeting R. Spence and his sons used to go and unlock and consider the case. It generally ended in "Now go home to thy wife and don't ever do this again." At nine years of age John was put on the top of the coach at Newcastle on a cold winter day and sent off alone to York, where his brother Robert was already settled in at school, and many times he has told me what a little castaway he felt. Their Master, " Billy " Simpson as he always called him, was evidently a most unsuit

boys had to drink mugsful at every meal, whether they liked it or no. Once, Myles Foster, John's mother's brother, called, and finding W. Simpson flogging a boy, told him that if he ever so treated any relation of a Foster or Spence, every one would be removed from the school, so none of them ever benefited by the proverbial rod. Under John Ford matters went very differently, and J. F. S. always spoke of him in terms of love and respect. J. F. Spence was devoted to Natural History in all its branches, and he had large collections of shells, butterflies, minerals, fossils, and curious beasts in bottles, or alive, when he could get them from the sailors entering the port of Shields, and Chirton Cottage, where he lived, was quite a home for destitute reptiles, beasts, and birds. Botany was also a very pet hobby and his garden was full of rare plants and gave him great pleasure and interest. He was also a very clever joiner and the toys he made for his children would compare well with those of the present day. How he managed to take keen interest in all these subjects, in addition to business and his public life, was wonderful, but "Where there's a way " was always his motto, and he had the power, as he once told me, of putting aside at once any sub- ject no matter how engrossing or upsetting it might be, and throwing himself into the next work with his mind quite free. He was intensely single-minded, what was right was the main thing. Intense simplicity characterised his whole life in every particular, the greatest abstemiousness in food and drink, constant work till late at night, and up early in the morning, and yet there was not a more truly happy man in the world, nor one who kept his youth more thoroughly. His intense enjoyment of any pleasure, such as a day in the country, or a family gathering, was charming to see, and even at the time of his death at nearly eighty-three years of age, his childlike clear, merry blue eyes told of his healthy, happy life. No work was a trouble to him, and indeed if anyone suggested "Will it trouble you too much, Mr. Spence," his answer was "I do not know the meaning of that word." He must have been a mischievous lad, for he used to tell tales of practical jokes with the greatest delight. One of an old grey hen, decorated with sealing wax, etc., described as a wonderfully rare bird from Japan, the "Volucrus Hong Kong" by name, and purporting to be sent by a distinguished savant to a budding astronomer, as a token of respect. The bird was hailed with delight, stuffed, and presented amid applause, to the Natural History Society, of North Shields. It still reposes in its case, cocking its eye as if it saw the joke. Another, of a squib tied on to the tail of an objectionable poodle, whose mistress thought the devil had gone under her bed as the squib exploded, was very funny. He left school at about fourteen years of age, and very few years after was appointed Secretary of the Natural History Society, then a very flourishing body in North Shields. In 1839, when twenty-one years old, he went abroad for some weeks, visiting the Rhine and Switzerland, and left an interesting diary. En route for Hull, he says : "Arrived at York and had to wait for Hull coach, so ran along to see the old school, play ground very much altered, considerably larger and looking very pleasant, as the poplars planted when I was there have grown considerably." In 1843, he married Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas and Mary Corder, of Reeds, near Chelmsford, and had six sons and two daughters. The four sons who lived were all sent to Bootham, and it was a pleasure to him when the third generation also went there. When the writer and her brothers were at school in York, every autumn a message was sent to the "Mount" & "Bootham," asking all Spences and relations of Spences to join him at the hotel for half-past seven breakfast. Then what a day we had ! Attended by as many as ten boys and girls, with his coat tail pockets filled with good things, he went in search of the old cab- man with a very capacious vehicle, who always whipped up when we hove in sight, and we all packed in, fruit and food under the seats, girls and J. F. S. inside, and boys by the driver and on the roof, and off to Strensal for the day. Plant tins, collecting boxes, and butterfly nets all came out, and he was as young arid eager as any of the party; telling us tales of what they used to do "When I was at school," and how much better the country side was then for Natural History. Back to tea at the hotel, and then to see him off by train, with such pleasant memories to cheer us, and his kindly "Take care of yourselves "ringing in our ears. His father died in 1845, and he took over many of his responsibilities and appointments. He laboured hard to effect the incorporation of the Borough of Tynemouth, and in 1854 was elected a Councillor, and an Alderman in 1862. He was Mayor of the Borough in 1861, and again in 1891, when he held the position for three consecutive years; and received the Freedom of the Borough, a portrait, hung in the Council Chamber, and many other tokens of love and respect, not only from his fellow townsmen, but from the whole County of Northumberland. He was Chairman of the Sanitary Committee and of the Board of Guardians, served for six years on the School Board, and was Vice-Chairman of that body, and when the Local Government Act came into operation, was elected a County Councillor for Northumberland. He was foremost in the establishment of a Custom House for the Borough, and also in the formation of the River Tyne Com- mission, of which he was a life member. He was also on the Salmon Conservancy Board. He was prominently connected with the Dorcas, Indigent Sick, Bible and Tract Societies, the Dispensary, and the Blind Society. For many years he was Secretary to the Jubilee, Kettlewell and Union Schools, and was appointed a Magistrate in 1860. He took the deepest interest in sailors, and was instrumental in the building of the Sailors' Home, and on the Committee from the beginning. The Tyne Lifeboat Institution, too, claimed him as one of its most ardent workers, and the Sailors' Widows' and Orphans' Society owed much to his help. He started the St. John's Ambulance Association in North Shields, and was one of the first to take a certificate. He was a prominent member of the Literary and Philosophical Society, and the Technical Education Movement in Shields, of which he was Honorary Secretary, owed much to his exertions. He also took deep interest in the Boys' Aid Society, and, in fact, at the time of his death was associated with between sixty and seventy Movements and Committees. The chief work of his life was the Volunteer Life Brigade for saving life from shipwreck, and with it his name will always be associated. Hi s brother Joseph, Mr. John Morrison, and himself founded the first Brigade at Tynemouth in 1864, just after the wreck of the steamship "Stanley," on the Black Middens at Tynemouth, when many lives were lost owing to the lack of trained men to help the coastguard. He was Honorary Secretary from the first, and as the Board of Trade consulted him, and all new Brigades asked his advice, the work was enormous. He only laid down the duties with his life, as the last act that morning was to send out notices for a drill. The men met indeed on the day named, but it was to carry him to his last resting place, followed and mourned by thousands of those whom he had helped and worked for during his long and useful life. His business career began with Boldemann, Borries and Company where he worked as a cashier for five years. He started his own business, Clephan and Wiencke, iron and mineral merchants and commission agents. He also served as an agent for Armstrong, Whitworth and Co.

In 1869 he married Elizabeth, the daughter of John Foster Spence of North Shields. Elizabeth died in 1914 leaving Clephan with four sons and six daughters. Clephan's principal area of study was medieval armour and he built up a fine collection of his own, and was recognised as an authority on the subject. He wrote extensively on arms and armour. Some of his publications have included The defensive armour and the weapons and engines of war of medieval times and of the "Renaissance" (1900), Armour notes: with some account of the tournament (1915) and The tournament: its periods and phases(1919).

Clephan was also interested in firearms. Some of his publications on firearms have included The military handgun of the sixteenth century (1910), An outline of the history and development of hand firearms, from the earliest period to about the end of the fifteenth century (1906) and An outline of the history of gunpowder and that of the hand-gun, from the epoch of the earliest records to the end of the fifteenth century (1909).

Clephan travelled extensively in Germany, Denmark, Norway and Sweden and mastered all of the languages spoken in those countries.

In his later years his interests turned toward Egyptology and Egyptian antiquities. He was fascinated with the exploration of Egypt and travelled there many times. Clephan also prepared catalogues of Egyptian objects, ancient lamps and Greek Pottery for the Society of Antiquaries.

He was a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries.

Robert Clephan died on the 21st of March 1922, at his home, Marine House in Tynemouth.

GRASS slopes akin to the Cumberland fells, patches of wattles, big stretches of bush, streams coursing down the valleys, a farm- stead 3,000 ft. above sea level, the kraal and a score of native homesteads-that is the setting for Bob Clephan's life and work at Carslogie. No other house can be seen, but the same thing is repeated half-a-dozen miles away, where a friendly neighbour has the same outlook. The farms of Bob Clephan and his brother Jim march together-each has six thousand acres, with sheep, cattle and horses. They grow the oats and mealies that are needed, they discuss

the quality of 40 lb. cheeses, and await wires from Durban quoting the prices their wool has fetched before shipping to the Old Country. The farms are nearly self-contained. Bob and the natives have done the building and thatching. The house is of bricks made on the farm ; the dairy is of stone, the summer-house of wattle and plaster. And the garden, gay with butterflies, is a glow of purples and mauves, a tribute to the industry of Mrs. Bob and the lavish hand of Nature. At four o'clock someone is astir, at five comes early tea, at six the ox-cart takes milk to a neighbouring farm where cheese is made. By breakfast time the back of the day's work is broken; after lunch, in the heat of the day, some people are " dead to the world " for a couple of hours. A cup of tea wakens us ; more work, dinner, music and songs of the North, early bed. Anyone who has lived on a farm realises ceaseless work from before sunrise until after sunset. Clephan is everywhere; lending a stout arm here and planning new sheds there. Some- times we liked to think we were helping him, counting hundreds of sheep as they scuttled past and making an error of two; holding tapes, dropping plumb-lines, wondering what the Baas really thought of the help. One day the mail comes in with the ox-cart, the next day it goes out with the ox-cart. One morning we mounted steeds and rode away to Oddspot for eleven o'clock tea with delightful neighbours. Another day we set of f with four horses, a whimpering foal, and three dogs over the hills and into the bush for a picnic lunch. On Din- gaan's day the ladies drove the spider, and Bob and I rode horses into another bush for the Christmas tree. Nearly a hundred men, women and children had come together, and a score of natives helped to prepare lunch on the grass. Suddenly, on a small truck, down a woodsman's narrow-gauge line, came Father Christmas, covered with arum lilies, wild smilax and maidenhair. Loud cheers greeted him as he stepped out with the presents, and a team of oxen towed the empty truck awa

If I tried to describe some of the roads I should be told, in Alan Breck's words, "Ye're a poor hand of a description." But Jim takes the prize as chauffeur. It was fifty miles to Riverside; heavy rains had fallen; now we were a foot deep in soft mud; now we were skidding on a curved surface on the lip of a deep rut deepened by erosion; now the axle stuck on a rock; now we were crossing drifts with Mrs. Rowntree's luggage well under water on the running board. But Jim pulled through. Two Clephan sisters were staying at the farm, painting and firing china and embroidering after the manner of their artistic clan, civilised art inside contrasting with barbaric art outside. Men, women and children are there, with a varied charm of their own. There is a little nipper wearing half a dozen beads; there is another minus the beads. A woman who works in the kitchen has a baby in the homestead; at regulation meal times a four-year-old, with a black, peppercorned head, slings the baby on his back, brings him down to the mother, and then carries him home again. We shall not forget the kind hospitality of our host and hostess in East Griqualand, the hard work, the comfort, the beauty of environment, the culture, the patriarchal relations with the natives, the flow of language that I was once privileged to hear. A native had left the long team of oxen in the hot sun, neglecting to outspan. Bob's heart went out to the dumb creatures, and out of the heart the mouth speaketh. For five minutes speech poured out in fluent Xosa language, lighted up now and again by phrases borrowed from Billingsgate, which I chanced to understand. The native will not repeat the cruelty. These are two celebrated Ipswich names of the 20th century. Indeed Frederick Corder was the founder of the silk mercers and drapers departmental store: Corders of Tavern Street, Ipswich. As yet I have not identified any connection between Jane, and Thomas Ransome founder of Ransome & Rapier of Ipswich, though the fact both families had strong Quaker connections would suggest this possible.

John was educated at Boothams School for Boys at York. On the death of his mother, his father married Maria Morris, a sister of architect Joseph Morris. This marriage proved very influential to John's career. In 1872 he became 'articled' to Mr Morris in his Reading Offices. John began his own architectural practice in the Thoroughfare, Ipswich in premises adjacent to his father's drapery stores, before setting up home and offices in Wimbourne House in Tower Street.

John then worked on his own. it is apparent his real love was in the old buildings of the borough. This is borne out by his meticulous and tactful restoration of The Christ Church Mansion; and The Guild Hall in Lavenham.

Christ Church Mansion is a red brick Tudor house set in several acres of parklands, which has been open to the people of Ipswich since Felix Cobbold, gave it to the borough in 1892. Inside there are many examples of fine period furnishings and art collections including renowned local artists as Constable, Gainsborough, John Moore, Thomas Churchyard, and Alfred Munnings. As a junior member of a wealthy Ipswich family, income was not a driving motivation for work, something that would explain his ability to spend countless hours on his favourite commissions. It would appear his sketchings of the old buildings of the borough were in fact his first love. It was these he would devote much of his time to perfecting.

Two volumes he was responsible for are entitled 'The Corner Posts of Ipswich' and 'a Brief History of Christchurch or Withepole House', both of which give further evidence of this man's incredible talent.

There are in excess of 100 commissions credited to John Corder. These range from the construction of no 65 Anglesea road, Ipswich, 'a three storey detached house in French Empire style, with Suffolk white bricks and slate mansard roof complete with cast iron crestings to roof ...', to a large private house in Edwardian style at Hacheston lodge for a Mrs Paterson; Additional classrooms for Grammar School in Burkett road, Woodbridge, and work at 'The Black Boy' public house in Sudbury, in the form of exposed timbers and plaster work in tudor style, demonstrate the range of his works. http://www.historicalsuffolk.com/suffolk-people.php

John Shewell Corder.

By one who knew him.

(Reprinted from the "East Anglian Daily Times " of July 20th, 1922.) BY the death of John Shewell Corder, Ipswich has lost one of her most illustrious townsmen. Modest withal, he never boasted of his prowess, and his works remain a fitting monument of skill and knowledge. Born 65 years ago at the Old Manor House on St. Margaret's Green, now the home of the British Legion, he not long since showed me the attic at the North corner which was his bedroom in his boyhood's days, connected with which he had memories of many a boyish escapade. His high spirits he retained through life till illness struck him a few months back. Forty years have elapsed since I first made his acquaint- ance, when he had just started business in a modest way as architect in a small office in the Thoro'fare, his

first commission being a design for a bay window to a small house in High Street, for the late Mr. Thomas Harrison, which brought him the modest fee of five pounds. He was at one time joined in partnership by Mr. Frank Brown, but this was not of long duration, and he later acquired the house in Tower Street, formerly the residence of Admiral Page, and here he made his offices and home, and here he died. It was an ideal bachelor home, and fitted throughout with pictures, works of art, and antique furniture in accordance with his well-known antiquarian tastes. In this department he will be largely missed, for he had a more intimate acquaintance with the ancient history of the borough of Ipswich than any other living man, and his knowledge was always at the service of the inquirer. Christchurch Mansion was one of his pet hobbies. He was in the confidence of the Fonnereau family, and when it came into the possession of the town, by the gift of Mr. Felix Cobbold, John Corder was entrusted with the supervision of the necessary repairs. Later on, when the ex-Curator, Mr. Frank Woolnough, made his interesting discoveries of the original 16th century fireplace in the kitchen, which had been bricked up, and the various other Tudor openings, the complete restoration of these, and wood panelling in various parts of the building, were all carried out under the supervision of Mr. Corder, who had kindly consented to act as honorary architect for the Mansion for the Museum Committee. Nothing in the course of his professional work gave Mr. Corder so much pleasure as the restoration of ancient buildings, and restoration to him meant going back to the original. Little Wenham Hall will ever remain a monument of his judgment. This was done in recent years for the late Mr. F. A. Crisp, with whom John Corder was on terms of close intimacy, for they were truly kindred spirits. Several county mansions have been restored under John Corder's supervision, and new ones have been built to his designs, and quite a number of churches have been renovated by him, but always with the utmost care. John Corder was one of the leading members of the Suffolk Archaeological Society, and no excursion was complete without him. No matter who was lecturing or upon what subject, he was always able to contribute additional interesting information; he had a marvellous memory for facts and dates. He was a frequent contributor to the-journal of the Society, and at one time was part editor. He was consulting architect for the Tower Church, and it is due to his care that the fabric is in its present state of preservation. For over forty years he was a member of the Ipswich Scientific Society, and a frequent contributor of papers at their meetings. These were always full of information, and usually illustrated with lantern slides, which he had specially prepared. Ipswich possesses many specimens of Corder's architectural talent. The Municipal Secondary School buildings on Tower Ramparts are a block of classrooms, etc., which have received much praise from educational experts for design and utility. The Ipswich Gas Company's offices in Carr Street is another of his designs, and Royston House, on Westerfield Road, which he built for his father, is a model of domestic comfort. He was responsible for several of the Banks in the town, and there are numerous buildings which do nor occur to the writer at the moment. For three years he was a member of the Town Council, but when that time was up he would not seek re-election'97some of the company, he said, was not congenial. For many years he had been a useful member of the Museum Committee and the Sub-Committee for Selection of Pictures, etc., under the Felix Cobbold Bequest. In private life, John Corder was a boon companion; there was a touch of Bohemianism in his nature, but he had his serious side, and I have spent delightful hours in his company at Wimborne House going over musty documents, hunting up items of bygone history, or looking in a lighter moment over his sketch-books. He was never without one of them in his pocket, and a few broad lines with his facile pencil and skilled hand soon made a record of any passing incident which attracted his notice. I have quite a collection of correspondence from him, and his letters were generally illustrated by pen and ink sketches of a most witty nature. On a holiday he was glorious company. His favourite hunting ground was the Norfolk Broads, and he knew intimately every twist and turn of those quiet waterways, where I have sometimes accompanied him, for I know and love them myself. He was a great admirer of Nature in those quiet byways in Norfolk. His notebook was always in requisition'97a simple flower, a boy, a rustic, an old ruin, a barn, a thatched cottage'97they all brought pleasant memories when you looked through them afterwards, perhaps years afterwards. But all this is over now. John Corder has passed away: the blinds are down and the merry tongue has ceased'97the rest is silencce. But we can say, with Hamlet: He was a man, take him for all in all,

We shall not look upon his like again.

General Notes: PERCY CORDER was born in 1863, being the third of five sons of Alexander and Lucy Corder, of Sunderland. This town remained his home up to the time of his marriage, after which he lived in Newcastle-on-Tyne. He was married in 1893 to Helen Lindsay Watson, of Middlesbrough. Three sons and a daughter were born to them, but the eldest died in infancy, and the next one, Terence, died in 1921 of fever in Mesopotamia, where he was serving in the army after the conclusion of the war. Of his childhood, it is reported that he would make his brothers play at elections, marching in procession and shouting "Corder for ever !" Another incident is of an old nurse leaving and saying tearfully, "Be kind to Pearcy, he may be led but he'll never be druv." He was educated at Wigton and afterwards at Bootham, where he remained from October, 1878, to June, 1880, becoming oldest boy. On leaving school he served his time as a solicitor under his uncle, Robert Spence Watson, of the firm of Watson and Dendy, Newcastle-on-Tyne. After qualifying, he went into partnership with Harry Benson, the firm of Benson and Corder continuing for 13 years. In 1899 an opportunity offered of returning as a partner to his uncle's firm, which then became Watson, Burton and Corder. His childhood's liking for politics developed and remained for long his great interest. He was a stalwart Liberal and a great admirer of Robert Spence Watson, the relationship helping him to an inside knowledge of, and a chance of participating in, the affairs of the party. He had, too, the keenest zest in all the fun of the game of politics. I have heard him tell how, in the great Liberal revival of 1880, while still at Bootham, he was allowed to go over to Leeds to hear John Bright speak; the meeting was so excited that two or three persons had failed to get a hearing, when Sir Wilfrid Lawson began in a hoarse voice, "Do you see that man in the white hat?" Everyone turned to look at this unfortunate individual, concerning whom a funny and totally fictitious story was told; but it made the meeting listen, and the way was paved for the great orator to give his speech. He had many other humorous political recollections, many of them dating from before the Corrupt Practises Act of 1882, when elections were conducted more lavishly than now. On one occasion the Conservatives had hired all the cabs in Gateshead for polling day; a Sunderland bruiser employed by the Liberals, but acting doubtless without orders, met these cabs on the High Level Bridge and turned them all back. At a later election a threatening letter had been received by John Morley, so the same bruiser was engaged, unknown to the candidate, to shadow, and if need be protect, him throughout the day; after receiving his fee from Percy, the boxer remarked with a smile, "Do you know, I sent that letter myself?" Percy Corder was Liberal agent for the Tyneside Division from 1888 to 1899, first for Wentworth Beaumont (afterwards Lord Allendale), and later for "Jack "Pease (now Lord Gainford). He also acted as agent for "Willie "Allan in a by- election at Gateshead. His more active political work had to be dropped when he became a partner in the firm of Watson, Burton and Corder, but his enthusiasm remained, both in opposition to the jingoism which accompanied the Boer War and in rejoicing over the Liberal victory of 1906. The cause of peace was always a very deep interest with him and he republished William Penn's suggestions for a league of nations. The Great War came to him, as to so many, as a very great shock, though his intimacy with some of the leading Liberals gave him a knowledge of facts denied to most. There must have been a very deep and painful wrench before he could throw himself unreservedly into support of the war, and it was certainly in no spirit of militarism that he did so, but in the desire for international law and order. He took the chair at a meeting very early on, when the idea of a league of nations was being explained and discussed. When the war was over his political interests seemed largely changed; new associations had been formed and old ties broken; he was even asked to stand as a Unionist candidate. Something may be put down to the natural conservatism of advancing years; something to his judgment, as a lawyer, that Lloyd George's increment tax was unworkable. But a remark made in the dark days of the Irish troubles as to how much might have been saved had Gladstone succeeded in the attempt to meet the aspirations of that country, showed that his funda- mental Liberalism was still there. Whatever his views, he took no further active part in politics, and gave his surplus energy to the cause of education and the building up of Armstrong College, of whose council he became vice-president. Much of the money for the new Students' Union and for the playing fields and pavilion was secured by him. He was also largely instrumental in interesting the trade- union leaders in the work of the college; it is stated to-day that three-fourths of its students are drawn from the wage-earning classes. Probably the last public function he attended was the annual college conversazione, when an exhibition of its work is given by the students; this exhibition is repeated again next day for the public, who go in crowds. The photograph shows Percy Corder in his robes for the honorary doctor's degree, Conferred on him by the University of Durham. He had a strong artistic side, and his small sketches and paintings showed what he might have done had he given his time to it. He was keenly alive to the beautifying of the city, and served on the committee of the public art gallery. When the Shipley bequest, a large collection of second- rate pictures, was offered to the city, together with a tempting sum of money to house them, he successfully opposed its acceptance. "Pilgrim House," the block of offices rebuilt by his firm, is a simple and dignified piece of architecture, though in too narrow a street to show properly. When the Newcastle- upon-Tyne Society was founded for the promotion of the city's amenities, it was to him that was given the task of seeking to remove from the Central Station some particularly unsightly advertisements, a task successfully accomplished after much tactful correspondence. For twelve years, from 1887-1899, he was secretary to the

O.Y.S.A., then in its early days. All who were present at the meeting in 1900 will remember his valedictory address to his successor, Roger Clark, then just about to cross the Atlantic to be married-" like the Pilgrim Fathers, but they went for freedom "; recalling, too, the American politician's reply to the inquiry whether he would attend the funeral of a great opponent, "I ain't agoing, but I highly approve of it." He served on the York Schools' Committee for some years, and at the time of the Centenary gave the opening address at the Old Boys' art exhibition. The Bootham Register gives a list of many other appointments held by him. His year as Under-Sheriff for the county of Northumberland brought the intensely trying duty of arranging for an execution. He wrote the "Life of Robert Spence Watson," a heavy piece of work, but a labour of love; it is well arranged, well written, and worthy of its subject. His professional mind judged of a thing mainly by what experience had showed to work well. He had a love of dignified ceremonial, of things done decently and in order, and of historic associations. But what one thinks of mostly was his constant geniality and wit, whether in his own home or in his lawyer's office; in the impromptu after luncheon discussions in "Committee Room No. 15" of the Newcastle Liberal Club (alas, that the goodly fellowship of that room is now dispersed !); at Christmas family gatherings or in country walks, both in fair weather and foul. His health gave way rather suddenly about Christmas of 1926. I saw him one day in the following Summer, and though mind and body were both enfeebled the old geniality was still all there. Under doctor's advice a move to the south was planned and a house taken at Hindhead, in Surrey, but he was not himself able to take a share in the arrangements. He stood the journey itself rather better than expected, remaining in a hotel while the house was put in order; but only a few days after moving into his new home he died, on November 15th, 1927, at the age of 64. General Notes: Philip Corder who died on May 29th, 1961 will be remembered chiefly by members of the O.Y.S.A. as being Senior English master at Bootham from 1918 to 1938. Some will also remember him leading a group of boys in the archaeological investigation of the Crambeck site-off the Malton road, near Castle Howard-a site which proved to have been a Roman pottery factory. Philip Corder was born in 1891 of a Sunderland Quaker family and was at Bootham from 1904 to 1907. On leaving he went to Bristol University and studied mechanical engineering and from there to Cambridge, taking a Medieval and Modern Language tripos. Whilst teaching at Bootham he pursued his archaeological interests, stimulated at Crambeck, and excavated a number of other sites in East Yorkshire. His scholarship and enthusiasm won him recognition as a leading authority in Roman Archaeology in Britain and in 1938 he took up the Curatorship of the Roman Museum at St. Albans. In 1943 he left St. Albans to go to Burlington House where he was appointed Secretary to the Society of Antiquaries. He was already editor of the Archaeological Journal, and was later awarded an Honorary Degree of D.Litt, by the University of Cambridge in recognition of his scholarship. At Burlington House he also edited the Antiquaries Journal, Archaeologia and Research Reports, and was made President of the Royal Archaeological Institute from 1954 to 1957. He is affectionately remembered for his gay and charming personality, and respected for his scholarship by those who knew him at Bootham and in his later activities.

General Notes: Corder, Stephen Pit (1918–1990), linguistic scholar, was born on 6 October 1918, at 4 Bootham Terrace, York, the second of the two sons of Philip Corder (b. 1885), schoolmaster, and his wife, Johanna Adriana van der Mersch (b. 1887). His father was English and his mother Dutch. Pit, as he was known to colleagues, attended the Quaker school, Bootham, in York. At Merton College, Oxford (1936–9), he read modern languages. Corder's father belonged to an old Quaker family and was himself a master at Bootham School. After Oxford, Corder taught at Ayton (Quaker) school until he was called up for military service in the Second World War. Having registered as a conscientious objector, he was awarded exemption conditional on his working with the Friends' Ambulance Unit (FAU). He served with the FAU throughout the war period in Finland and Egypt. In 1946 Corder married Nancy Proctor (b. 1916). Second cousins, they maintained his mother's house in the Lake District during their years abroad. They had two sons and a daughter.

After the war Corder joined the British Council, and served in Austria, Turkey, Colombia, and Jamaica. At the time the council was rapidly expanding its English teaching operations worldwide. For this purpose it needed a cadre of specialists. Corder's background in language studies and his own interest in the work led in 1957 to his joining the newly established school of applied linguistics in the University of Edinburgh to study for the postgraduate diploma in applied linguistics. After that year he was seconded for a period to the Nigerian ministry of education in order to develop language teaching materials for television. Then in 1961 he was outposted by the British Council to the University of Leeds, where Peter Strevens, with whom he had served in the FAU, was developing postgraduate training in English language teaching. In 1964 he resigned from the British Council on appointment as director of the school of applied linguistics at the University of Edinburgh. There he remained for the rest of his career, serving successively as senior lecturer, professor of applied linguistics, head of the department of applied linguistics, and head of the very large department of linguistics, which had more than thirty academic staff. He was a founder member of the British Association of Applied Linguistics or two successive periods of three years each, a member of the British Council's English teaching advisory committee, and the first holder of a university chair in applied linguistics in the UK (and possibly in the world). He was promoted to a personal chair in 1971 and was created emeritus professor on retirement in 1983. The Edinburgh school (later department) of applied linguistics had been set up in the late 1950s with government funding under the Colombo plan to provide at an advanced level research-based training for English teachers from the former colonies. Corder quickly brought together a young and enthusiastic team of academic researchers, and with them developed the influential teaching materials that be

Corder's publications chart his own intellectual development, moving from the very traditional (and successful) textbook An International English Practice Book (1960), through the early attempt to integrate language teaching with situation in The Visual Element in Language Teaching (1966), on to the magisterial defining of a coherent linguistic discipline in Introduction to Applied Linguistics (1973), and finally to the innovative cognitive approach in his later papers, brought together in Error Analysis and Interlanguage (1981). It was these papers in which he offered a view of language learning that captured the imagination of researchers internationally, providing them with a rationale for investigation that remains hugely productive. What Corder pointed to was both daring and obvious, but he was the first to provide the necessary explanation: namely, that the learning of a second or foreign language is developmental, that it follows a sequence that can be checked, and that it can be studied by analysing the errors that learners make. These errors, he insisted, are signs of positive thinking rather than of negative inadequacy. Corder's claim that the learner's language, which, following a seminal paper by Larry Selinker (1972), he termed 'interlanguage', is a language in its own right is now generally accepted.

In spite of the esteem of his colleagues in British applied linguistics, in the late 1970s and 1980s Corder seems to have found himself increasingly isolated intellectually. In part this reflected his growing dissatisfaction with the British tradition of English language teaching, to which applied linguistics was initially attached and which Corder himself had done so much to promote in his early career and in the Edinburgh Course in Applied Linguistics. That approach he came to see as finally wanting, considering that its attempt to marry bits of theory to practical issues was ultimately incoherent. What was needed, he seems to have thought, was a proper marriage between practice and theory. His dissatisfaction also reflected both his own excitement in ideas, his moving on always to new ventures, and his lack of interest in anything empirical, whether in practice or in research. Language teaching as such did not engage him, thereby absolving his students and younger scholars from any responsibility for the ever-increasing gap between language teaching practice and language tacquisition research. Neither was he personally excited by research. That he left to his students. What really mattered to Corder was the sudden poetic or artistic insight, 'the incision of inspiration which cut through the clutter of established thought' (Widdowson, vi). Corder's ideas were influential but he did not establish a 'school'. He inspired by example and by his own intellectual curiosity. He belonged to a very British tradition of speculative curiosity. His hobbies showed that, just as much as did his intellectual interests. His craftsmanship in wood, his music, and his home-making and family were as important to him as his career. He was a man of conviction, clear about his place in the world. That is why he could move from one phase of his career to another with finality. After a series of mild heart attacks he retired in 1983, and when he and his wife moved back to the Lake District he donated all his academic books to his de

In the space of just 9 months in this department, he was able to complete a longitudinal follow-up study of some 400 patients with Alzheimer's disease; he also contributed to the production of six peer-reviewed publications, including an invited editorial in the journal Age and Ageing, as well as the review article in this issue, which explores potential relationships between nutritional factors and Alzheimer's disease (1).

The numerous qualities of William Reynish greatly impressed all his colleagues in Toulouse: this included his enthusiasm for work, his sensitive nature, his diverse interests, his exacting scientific rigor, and his superb clinical ability. His efforts allowed this department to secure a significant financial grant from the European Commission in order to establish the European Alzheimer's Disease Consortium.

William Reynish died in an accident on May 13, 2001, in the Pyrenees. His death is an immeasurable loss for the world of geriatric medicine and our ongoing struggle against Alzheimer's disease. We can only hope that others will be able to continue those tasks that he had decided to undertake with so much passion and skill. To his wife, Dr. Emma Armitage-Reynish, to his son, Felix, and to his family, we offer our deepest sympathy at this time of their tragic loss.

THE histories of families across Wearside are to be documented in a new project launched by Sunderland Antiquarian Society.

An appeal for people to send in their family trees was today made by the group's president, Douglas Smith, who said: "You don't need to have traced your family back hundreds of years, we are happy to hear from people who can go back just one or two generations."

The appeal follows the launch of a new project called Continuing Corder, aimed at picking up where the dedicated researcher left off in the 1940s. James William Corder was inspired by George Bain, a founding father of Sunderland Antiquarian Society, to study local history in his early 20s. He then devoted the next 40 years of his life to compiling 25 volumes on Sunderland families, detailing their births, deaths and marriages. "By the time he read his first paper to the Antiquarians in 1931, Corder already knew all about the streets and buildings of the town," said Mr Smith. "He was already compiling his volumes by this time too, but of course they went on and on, for there is never an end to family history!" Today, Corder's unique record of Sunderland life, housed at the city's Central Library, provides a vital starting point for many genealogists. "Anyone tracing their family history in Sunderland will be well aware of James Corder," said Mr Smith.

"What we want to do is take up where he left off and record the family trees of people across Sunderland now, so researchers in the future will benefit." Corder, the son of a wholesale merchant, could trace his own roots back hundreds of years to Pebmarch in Essex, where his father Francis was born. Francis later moved to Sunderland in 1863, following in the footsteps of his brother Alexander, who had set himself up as a draper in the town. Later that same year, Francis married County Durham-born Edith Watson and James, their first child, was born in 1867. Four daughters followed.

"Not much is known about Corder himself, although some of his education seems to have taken place at the Bootham School in York," said Mr Smith. "He never married and most of his life must have been entirely taken up with genealogy and local history."

Corder began delving into Sunderland's history at the end of the 19th century, copying the registers of three ancient churches during his research. He also used information provided by registers held by several Presbyterian chapels in the town, as well as trade directories and marriage licence bonds. "From his comments, it would seem that he also made personal approaches to families for information too," said Mr Smith.

"Where he could, from this mess of dates, he constructed pedigrees with notes on the origin of families and the date of their first entry into the town. "The letter A alone covers 90 surnames. His comments on each range from a single page to over 50, as in the case of the names Brown and Thompson." Corder's knowledge of the intermarriage of families was immense, as can be seen in his volume on Friends Pedigrees, dealing with Quaker families. His books did not, however, just contain dry information. He often spiced up details with potentially libellous comments on certain families. Corder dubbed one man a "worthless nonentity", another "a habitual drunkard". Others had "dissipated habits" or were of "unsatisfactory character". "With these pithy and somewhat scurrilous comments it is no wonder these volumes long lay behind the librarian's counter," said Mr Smith. "But now, with the passing of time and litigation worries, they are readily available once again and heavily used by people researching their heritage." The project to create a "new" Corder manuscript was prompted by the huge popularity of tracing family trees - one of the UK's fastest-growing hobbies.

"But what do you do with your ancestors when you have finished your reseach? After all, you don't want all that work to be lost when you become an ancestor yourself," said Mr Smith. "The aim of our project therefore is to preserve your information for future generations of researchers, in the form of another Corder-like book." Members of the Antiquarians have already deposited copies of their own pedigrees - otherwise known as family trees - in the society's archives. But now Mr Smith is anxious to widen the research by including as many people from across Sunderland as possible.

"Whether you belong to Sunderland, came here from elsewhere or were born here and have now moved, we would like to hear from you," he said. "Just think of the interest your family tree will rouse in future family researchers in 50 to 100 years' time, when the world will be very different." A life devoted to the people of Sunderland

HOUR after hour, week after week, year after year - James William Corder devoted almost his whole life to researching Sunderland's history. As the privately-educated only son of a merchant tradesman, Corder could probably have taken his pick of careers.

But instead, he chose to document the lives of Sunderland's families, leaving behind a unique legacy of social history which still intrigues today. "He was absolutely dedicated to his cause," said Douglas Smith, president of Sunderland Antiquarian Society. "He worked and worked and worked." Corder spent years searching church records, trade directories, marriage licence bonds and parish registers to compile his 25 volumes of details.

And as well as his family records, Corder also chronicled Sunderland's streets, buildings, churches and industries in a further 36 volumes.

"With all this detailed and intricate work, it is hardly surprising that his eyesight began to fail in later life," said Mr Smith.

Corder eventually retired in the late 1940s, donating his many volumes of research to Sunderland Central Library.

Just a few years later, he left Sunderland for Over Stowey in Somerset, where he died in a nursing home in 1953, at the age of 85. "Corder's volumes were his legacy to the people of Sunderland," said Mr Smith. "We would be very interested in hearing about any memories of Corder, or talking to descendents of him."

General Notes: Corder, Susanna (1787–1864), biographer, was born in Stoke Newington, Middlesex, the daughter of John Corder and Ruth Marriage, both Quakers. A delicate child, she was educated from 1797 to 1799 at Ackworth School in Yorkshire. About the age of twenty, after a period of spiritual depression, she experienced a deepening of her religious commitment. She nursed her mother devotedly until her death, after which she decided to pursue a career in teaching, to which she had long felt called. From 1817 to 1824 she taught at a school at Suir Island, Clonmel, Ireland, which she enjoyed. In 1824 she returned to England and, with the help of William Allen and other leading Quakers, started a school for girls at Fleetwood House in Stoke Newington, which was modelled on the Irish establishment. Corder's school was a progressive one: the curriculum included astronomy, experimental philosophy, physics, and natural history, as well as more traditional subjects such as writing, arithmetic, history, French, and needlework. Greek, Latin, German, and Italian were offered as extras, and William Allen gave lectures on chemistry and lent his telescope for the use of the pupils. In 1827 the wide range of subjects offered was celebrated in some doggerel verses by one Joseph Pease, who referred to the 'astounding variety of stores intellectual imbibed by pupils at the "N[ewington] Nunnery" (Shirren, 163). By that date the number of pupils had risen from twelve to twenty-five.

If the curriculum was liberal, the general regime of the school was not. In her youth Susanna Corder had experienced 'much conflict of mind on the subject of dress' (Annual Monitor, 43) and had adopted the full austerity of traditional Quaker dress. Accordingly, her pupils were required to wear stiff Quaker bonnets, which exposed them to the ridicule of their contemporaries at a neighbouring school. The religious needs of pupils were catered for extravagantly: copious spiritual readings and talks were given by such visitors as Allen and Sarah Grubb. The high days and holidays of the school year consisted of visits to the British Museum and attendance at the yearly meeting in London.

The ethos of the school reflected the essential conservatism of Susanna Corder's religion. She herself was described as 'an embodiment of perfection as regards propriety of manner, costume, and doctrine of the medieval section of the Friends' Society' (Shirren, 162). She became an elder of the local meeting soon after her return to Stoke Newington, and it was in this capacity that she signed a warning letter to John Wilkinson, whose heterodox views produced a schism among the Stoke Quakers in 1836. She was also on the revising committee of the Morning Meeting for fifteen years. In 1841 she published A Brief Outline of the Origin, Principles, and Church Government of the Society of Friends, in which her strong adherence to the traditional Quaker dress, manners, and doctrine was clearly manifested. Susanna Corder retired between 1840 to 1845, and moved to Chelmsford, where she spent the rest of her life. She now turned entirely to her writing. Corder had already published her most successful work, Memorials of Deceased Members of the Society of Friends (2nd edn, 1839), which went through at least six revised editions. These sketches of the lives of eighteenth- and nineteenth-century English and American Quakers concentrated on their spiritual experiences, opinions, and work, and often recounted their edifying deaths in great detail. Her subjects were largely obscure; one was her own pupil Ann Backhouse, who had died at the age of nineteen. Corder's emphasis on the inner spiritual lives of her characters— rather than their (often unspectacular) public careers— no doubt helped to ensure a roughly equal balance of male and female subjects: the second edition (1839) included twenty-seven men and twenty women. Corder's most significant work, however, was her 1853 biography of the prison reformer Elizabeth Fry, which she wrote at the request of Fry's family. Based largely on Fry's diaries, from which it quotes continually and extensively, the Life succeeded in tracing the inner spiritual journey of a well-known public

Susanna Corder also published Christian Instruction in the History, Types, and Prophecies of the Old Testament (1854), an 'epitome of Scriptural history and doctrine' (p. iii). The text of this work— which, as Corder herself said, does not rival the 'impressive sublimity of the beautifully simple style of the Sacred Volume' (ibid., 1)— shows the author's usual tendency towards an earnest and ponderous verbosity. She also wrote several pamphlets, including one advocating the exercise of spiritual gifts by women (1839), which reached a third edition. Susanna Corder died on 28 February 1864 at her home in Chelmsford, and she was buried in Chelmsford on 3 March.

General Notes: Marriage [married name Garrett], Ellen (1865–1946), translator, was born on 23 August 1865 at Laboratory Yard, Stratford, Essex, the eldest of the four children of James Haworth Marriage (1839–1913), confectionery manufacturer, and his wife, Mary, née Brookfield (1835–1899). She spent her early life in George Lane, South Woodford. The family had Quaker roots, and accordingly all four children were sent to Quaker schools, the son, Ernest, to Sidcot in Somerset, Ellen and her sisters, Caroline and Elizabeth, to The Mount in York. Ellen's stay there lasted from January 1880 to June 1883; she retained fond memories of the place, but it was Elizabeth who achieved the greatest academic success, proceeding in 1893 to Newnham College and thence to scholarly research into German folksong. Ellen became a (reluctant) office-worker: 'The invoice clerk— that is me— had such piles of invoices to make that he could do nothing else— none of his other work.' The 'other work' included wide reading in English and French and experiments with writing: 'Don't you like to draw sketches and to find the best words ... to give the effect you mean and search after? I have hundreds, almost, now' (Ellen Marriage to Elizabeth Marriage, 20 April 1889, priv. coll.).

It was the literary scholar A. R. Waller, a friend and neighbour of the Marriages, who suggested Ellen Marriage as translator when he put forward the idea of a complete edition of Balzac's Comédie humaine to the publisher J. M. Dent. Up to this time no complete edition had been published in England, although a few novels had appeared singly since the 1850s and a complete edition was coming out in America between 1885 and 1896. (Strictly speaking, neither edition was truly 'complete', as both omitted the most 'shocking' works, La physiologie du mariage, Sarrasine, La fille aux yeux d'or, Une passion dans le désert, and Petites misères de la vie conjugale.) Under George Saintsbury's editorship, all forty volumes were completed between 1895 and 1898, an immense task for which Marriage eventually had to be assisted by Clara Bell. In addition one volume was translated by Rachel Scott and several by a 'James Waring'. However, this was apparently a pseudonym: according to Frank Swinnerton, who worked in Dent's office in the 1900s, Waring was 'none other than Ellen Marriage working under a masculine name [for the bolder works]. Whether this prudishness was Dent's or the translator's I do not know' (Background, 68). Swinnerton's evidence was only hearsay, but the styles of Ellen Marriage and James Waring are certainly similar. Of the forty volumes of the Dent edition of the Comédie humaine, several containing more than one work, Marriage translated nineteen and James Waring seven. Marriage took far greater trouble over them than was then common with translations of French novels, not only searching for 'the best words' but visiting France to check local details and grappling manfully with Balzac's specialized vocabularies: 'I have some heraldry that has fairly beaten me. There seems nothing left but the desperate step— a lunatic's step— of going to the College of Arms and trying what impudence will do' (Ellen Marriage to Elizabeth Marriage, 3 Jan 1896, priv. coll.). The results were justifiably admired; her versions, particularly the descriptions and narration, often have the 'colour and swing' she admired in other writers and usually avoid the unnatural literalness that had characterized many earlier versions. Dent incorporated several of the novels into his Everyman's Library, begun in 1906, and many long remained in print. Financially they were less rewarding; at the height of her career Marriage was receiving '£3 to £4' for what she could translate in a week. The prolonged effort and isolation of the Balzac translations exhausted Marriage; she confided to her sister Elizabeth that she did not want to become involved in such a project again. She published only three further translations: Henri Murger's Scènes de la vie de bohème in 1901 and Marcel Prévost's Frédérique (1900) and Léa (1902). In 1901 she was admitted to Nayland Sanatorium in Suffolk, suffering from neurasthenia. During her seven-month stay she met the journalist (Fydell) Edmund Garrett (1865–1907), whose terminal tuberculosis had brought him to Nayland. As they lay on adjacent 'long chairs' they discovered common interests in life and literature; they were married on 26 March 1903 and took up residence first in Windy Park, St Ives, and later in a cottage at Wiverton Acre near Plympton, Devon. After Garrett's death Ellen moved back to the south-east, where she 'collected and arranged' his translation of Lyrics and Poems from Ibsen and revised the translation of Brand he had published in 1894; the whole was published by Dent in 1912.

For a period from 1910 Ellen Garrett took an interest in the suffragist activities of her husband's cousins Millicent Garrett Fawcett and Elizabeth Garrett Anderson, and worked with Common Cause, the suffragist newspaper. Her journalistic contacts proved useful from the First World War onwards, when she contributed articles, usually anonymously, to various journals, including the Manchester Guardian, the Westminster Gazette, and The Observer. Several of these were on political or social aspects of Bulgaria; in 1904 her sister Elizabeth had married Constantin Mincoff, a Bulgarian diplomat.

For most of the 1920s Ellen lived in Elgin Crescent, Notting Hill, moving in the early 1930s to The Folley in Wells Road, Malvern. She died on 23 December 1946 at South Grove, Abbey Road, Malvern, Worcestershire, of heart failure.

General Notes: As chief executive of a thriving engineering institute and founding director of a science park in Cambridge, Bevan Braithwaite was an international figure in the field of metaljoining technology. But no achievement of his working life was more spectacular than the task he set himself in retirement, to be fully realised four months after his death at the age of 68, after a long illness.

In 2004 Braithwaite became chairman of the Bressingham Steam Preservation Trust, at Bressingham, near Diss, Norfolk, and his enthusiasm and energy inspired many innovations at its steam museum. The greatest was the restoration of the locomotive Royal Scot, which had originally run on the west coast main line from London to Glasgow from 1927 to 1962. The locomotive was moved to Bressingham in 1969, having spent six years as an exhibit with Butlins holiday camp at Skegness. It ran regularly at Bressingham until 1992, when its boiler certificate expired. It took 12 years to raise the £1m needed for restoration: the project was still in its early stages when Bevan joined the trust in 2004, after which he was constantly addressing the many problems of updating a piece of railway heritage to meet modern standards. The Royal Scot will be in steam again at Bressingham in August.

Bevan was born in Hoddesdon, Hertfordshire, into a renowned Quaker family. His father was a partner in the prominent stockbroking firm of Foster and Braithwaite, and his grandfather had led the development of the railway at Saffron Walden. His Norwegian mother died after the birth of Bevan's younger sister, Magnhild, in 1946, and Bevan was brought up by his stepmother Nora (nee Ford-Smith). Bevan got his passion for railways from the headmaster of the Downs school, Colwall, in Worcestershire, which has had its own light railway since the 1920s. He went from the Downs to Leighton Park school, a Quaker establishment near Reading. At Jesus College, Cambridge, he gained both an MA in engineering and a lifelong love of jazz - Bevan played the banjo, and his jazz band activities often took precedence over his studies. He had also qualified as a Class 1 welder, and his ability to put his knowledge into practice was the constant hallmark of his career. In 1961 he joined the British Welding Research Association, subsequently The Welding Institute and then TWI, and made his mark three years later with papers on the fatigue strength of structural steel and on friction welding. By the time he became the organisation's chief executive in 1988, he was a world authority on structural fatigue. He was appointed OBE in 1991, and eight years later made both president of the International Institute of Welding and fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering.

In the 16 years that he led TWI, it grew to 3,500 members from more than 60 countries, fulfilling his vision of creating a global network in the vital area of joining materials. In 1997 he formed the idea of building Granta Park, Cambridge, where a number of leading British hi-tech companies could come together to enjoy access to the university's academic research. The main TWI building within the park bears his name and its 40-acre site is served by the narrow-gauge railway he built to carry staff to the restaurant, laying much of the track himself and building a locomotive and carriages. The railway also provided a test bed for the development of long-range ultrasonic testing.

Bevan was in demand as a speaker at conferences around the world. His other commitments included membership of the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council and being vice-president of the Transport Trust.

He loved to restore old houses, and the dust he inhaled over many years probably caused the lung cancer that killed him. He also loved to build steam engines, and working models adorned his house and office, with larger projects kept in the garage.

Not only was Bevan pragmatic, good-humoured and practical, but he always respected and showed his appreciation of other people's efforts. He is survived by his wife, Vanda, and a son and two daughters from his previous marriage.
