They had eight children: Geraldine, John Edmund, Leonard, Gilbert, Alfred William, Huldah Rebecca, Christopher, and Stephen.

8-Geraldine Southall²² was born on 29 Jun 1865 in Birmingham, Warwickshire and died on 30 Jan 1941 at age 75.

General Notes: Cadbury, Dame Geraldine Southall (1865-1941), social and penal reformer, was born Geraldine Southall at 5 Highfield Road, Edgbaston, on 29 June 1865, the daughter of Alfred Southall (1838-1931), chemist, and his wife, Anna Strangman, née Grubb (1841-1912). She inherited a propensity for social activism from her Quaker parents; her father was a temperance worker who taught a working men's adult school class, while her Irish mother was a supporter of women's suffrage. She was educated at Edgbaston High School for Girls, and briefly at the Quaker school, The Mount, in York. On 8 September 1891, at the Friends' meeting house, Birmingham, she married Barrow Cadbury [see below]. They had three children: Dorothy Adlington (1892-1987), Paul Strangman (1895-1984), and Geraldine Mary (1900-1999).

A committed Quaker, Geraldine Southall Cadbury reconciled her faith with the couple's increasing wealth by engaging in social reform; throughout her life, her activism was motivated by her Quaker faith. In 1904 she began a lifelong connection with the Birmingham Lying-in Charity and its services to poor mothers, officially opening its new maternity hospital buildings in Loveday Street in November 1907. She and her husband donated a nurses' hostel in 1933, and shortly before her death she was planning the hospital's new premises. Among her educational interests were the Birmingham People's Free Kindergarten established by Julia Lloyd in 1904, and the provision of open-air schools for inner-city children, the latter drawing on her own maternal experience. The health of her elder son as a child had caused concern and in 1907 the couple built a family home, Cropwood, in the Lickey Hills, designed on open-air principles. Seeing the beneficial effects on their own child, the Cadburys donated two open-air schools to Birmingham, Uffculme in 1911, and Cropwood itself in 1922.

Cadbury's other educational concerns were the Sunday school class where she taught from 1905, and her women's adult school class at Moseley Road which she led from 1907. In 1907 she and Barrow Cadbury founded Westhill Training College for Sunday School Workers, providing the building and most of the project's financial support. Her part in its establishment was recognized in 1917 by the National Sunday School Union when she was elected as its first woman president. In her presidential address, 'Stand by the children', she announced her campaign for the year, the 'difficult boy and girl' and the Sunday school's role in their reclamation for society, thereby uniting her interest in Sunday schools with the cause for which she is best remembered, the reform of the treatment of young offenders.

On 1 April 1905 at the instigation of a local justice, J. Courtney Lord, Birmingham established the first separate court for children in England. Modelled on American children's courts, the experiment led to the provision of juvenile courts in the Children's Act of 1908. In the same year as the court's inception Cadbury was invited by a fellow Quaker, Ellen Sturge, to accompany her on her regular visits to the courts. Together with Marian Priestman, another local Friend, she became a volunteer probation worker, supervising the case of every girl offender, investigating her home circumstances, and advising the appropriate course of action. She followed this up after sentencing by corresponding with every girl, always enclosing a stamped addressed envelope for a reply. Her work convinced her of the need for a safe home where children could be accommodated while on remand, and in 1910 she and Barrow Cadbury provided Birmingham with the first purpose-built children's remand home in Britain. They donated the site on the Moseley Road, established a voluntary management committee under their direction, and paid for the erection and furnishing of the building, which was largely designed by her. As for other buildings donated by the couple she drew detailed sketches of what she required, which were then handed to the architect to work up into building plans. During the First World War, Cadbury organized temporary accommodation for hundreds of Belgian refugees at the Friends' Institute in Moseley Road and ran a Belgian maternity home at 19 Carpenter Road, receiving the medal of Queen Elisabeth of Belgium in 1918 in recognition of her services. A committed pacifist, she was one of the 156 members of the British committee of the Women's International Congress at The Hague (28 April - 1 May 1915), to which she and her daughter Dorothy had intended to travel but were refused passports. In the post-war period Cadbury was increasingly recognized as an expert on juvenile justice policy locally and nationally. Between 1911 and 1927 she was co-opted onto Birmingham education committee's special school sub-committee. In 1920, following the Sex Disgualification (Removal) Act of 1919, her position in Birmingham children's court was formalized when she and Marian Priestman became the city's first two women magistrates, and from 1923 she chaired the justices' panel in the children's court. In 1922 she was appointed to the Home Office's advisory committee on probation, and in 1925 to the Home Office departmental committee on the treatment of young offenders, the committee that laid the ground for the Children's Act of 1933. As part of her investigations for the young offenders committee, Cadbury visited Maurice Rouvroy's Belgian observation home for young delinquents in 1926. Established in 1913 the Centraal Observatiegesticht at Moll was a child-centred community where young offenders were psychologically assessed. Cadbury had a long-standing interest in psychology; Dr George Auden acted as psychological adviser to her Moseley Road Remand Home from its establishment, and from the early 1920s the Birmingham children's court used two local doctors, W. A. Potts and Hamblin Smith, as experts in child psychology. The visit to Moll convinced her of the value of observation homes and when the young offenders committee reported in 1927 it recommended that at least three British observation centres should be established to provide psychological reports on all offenders under the age of twenty-one. Much to her disappointment, and that of the Howard League, financial constraints prevented the recommendation's inclusion in the Children's Act of 1933, and it was not until after her death that the first British observation home was established in Birmingham, by her husband and in her memory.

During the 1920s Cadbury took part in campaigns against the death penalty, and from 1923 supported the work of what later became the National Council for the Abolition of the Death Penalty. She also travelled widely, investigating juvenile justice provision in Europe, America, New Zealand, and Australia, often combining her interests with Barrow's business travels and visits to Quaker international gatherings. In 1928 the fruits of her travels fed into her designs for a new children's court complex in Steelhouse Lane, Birmingham, only the second purpose-built juvenile court in England. Presented to the city by the couple, the court was officially opened by the home secretary, Sir William Joynson-Hicks, on 17 July 1928. Her beliefs were incorporated into its fabric in the form of the ceremonial key which showed Justice unveiled and without a sword, symbolizing justice with understanding.

Cadbury was instrumental in the establishment of the Birmingham Child Guidance Clinic, founded by Birmingham city council's education committee in 1931, initially for an experimental period of three years. It was funded by the Commonwealth Fund of New York supplemented by an anonymous local donation of £1500, which may well have come from her. In 1935 she and Barrow Cadbury founded Copeley Hill Hostel for boys and Carpenter House Probation Hostel for girls. She also continued to be appointed to Home Office committees, including the committee to inquire into juvenile courts in the Metropolitan Police district (1930-41), the juvenile court rules committee (1932), the conference on girls aged 15-17 appearing before London juvenile courts (1934), and the committee to consider observation centres (1938). From 1935 she was vice-president of the International Association of Children's Court Judges. Her book Young Offenders Yesterday and To-day (1938) stressed the transformative power of education and personal intervention in the lives of the young, and articulated her long-held belief that the juvenile court was there to protect rather than to punish, and that child offenders were not intrinsically flawed but were reacting to their environment, poverty, poor parenting, and a lack of alternative role models. In May 1937 Geraldine Cadbury was appointed DBE 'for public and philanthropic services in Birmingham' (London Gazette, 11 May 1937, 3089), a worldly honour that as a Quaker she seriously considered declining. She rarely used the title, preferring to be known as Mrs Barrow Cadbury. She died at her home, 40 Edgbaston Park Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, on 30 January 1941.

Geraldine married **Barrow Cadbury**,²² son of **Richard Cadbury**^{22,24,27,28} and **Elizabeth Adlington**,^{22,28} on 8 Sep 1891 in Birmingham, Warwickshire. Barrow was born on 27 Sep 1862 in 17 Wheeley's Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham and died on 9 Mar 1958 in 73 Wellington Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham at age 95. They had three children: Dorothy Adlington, Paul Strangman, and Geraldine Mary.

General Notes: She was survived by her husband, Barrow Cadbury (1862-1958), cocoa and chocolate manufacturer and social reformer, who was born in Edgbaston, Birmingham, on 27 September 1862, the son of Richard Cadbury (1835-1899), cocoa manufacturer, and his first wife, Elizabeth Adlington (1838-1868). His mother died when he was six years old. After schooling locally, at the age of eleven he was sent to a Realschule in Stuttgart, before attending a Quaker school at Hitchin from the age of fourteen. This was followed by two years at Owens College, Manchester, and an apprenticeship in London. In 1882 he completed a two-month tour of Canada and the USA, investigating American chocolate manufacture, before joining the family firm. On his father's death he became one of four directors of a new limited company under the chairmanship of his uncle, George Cadbury. From 1914 Barrow was vice-chairman of Cadbury Brothers Ltd. In 1918 he negotiated a merger, against his uncle's wishes, with J. S. Fry & Sons of Bristol to form a new holding company, the British Cocoa and Chocolate Company. On George Cadbury's death in 1922 Barrow became chairman of Cadbury Brothers Ltd until his retirement in 1932.

Quiet and reserved, Barrow Cadbury's Quaker faith and pacifist principles were central to his life. He was active in his local meeting at George Road and from 1898 at Highgate Mission. In the same year he was made an elder of the Warwickshire monthly meeting and later served as clerk to the quarterly meeting. Nationally he was a regular attender at yearly meeting and a member of the meeting for sufferings. In 1923 he played a key role in the building of Friends' House in Euston Road, London, raising much of the necessary funds as treasurer of the building committee. Like his father, he had a lifelong interest in adult education and taught a working men's class throughout his life. Following his father's death he inherited the management of his recently built Moseley Road Institute for adult education. He served on the council of the National Adult School Union and was its treasurer (1907-22), and president (1926-7).

Before the First World War, Barrow Cadbury was involved in Anglo-German friendship initiatives, hosting visits by German peace delegations in 1906 and 1911, and participating in several return delegations to Germany, the last shortly before the outbreak of war in 1914. During the war he was an early member of the Fellowship of Reconciliation in 1915, and supported the work of the Friends' War Victims Relief Committee, the Friends' Emergency Committee for the Relief of Enemy Aliens, and the Friends' Ambulance Unit in which his son, Paul, served. He maintained his witness for peace during the 1930s when he supported George Lansbury's Embassies of Reconciliation initiative. After the Second World War he collaborated with a fellow Ouaker, Kathleen Lonsdale, on a series of letters to world leaders pressing for peace and disarmament, the last of which was written in 1957 a few months before his death.

Barrow Cadbury shared his wife's interest in penal reform and served as a magistrate from 1906 to 1940, often presiding in the children's court. Following Geraldine's death Barrow Cadbury continued to support the causes she espoused, and purchased Forhill House intending to establish an observation home for young offenders in her memory. However, delays with Forhill prompted him to begin experimental work at Fircroft College, Selly Oak, where her Moseley Road Remand Home had been evacuated following bomb damage, and which in effect became the first British observation home. He persevered with Forhill, which was officially opened on 30 May 1947 as a Senior Boys' Remand and Observation Home and presented to the city in Geraldine Cadbury's memory. In 1920 the couple had converted a large proportion of their fortune into the charitable Barrow Cadbury Trust. Birmingham Civic Society awarded its gold medal to them in 1931 in recognition of their contribution to the city. Although he never coveted public honour and often worked anonymously, Barrow Cadbury was granted the freedom of the city of Birmingham in 1932. He died at his home, 73 Wellington Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, on 9 March 1958.

Details

Son of John Taylor, a stockbroker, and Mary Jane Cash; was born at Peckham Rye on Feb 1st, 1871, and was educated at King's College, London. He matriculated at Cambridge from Caius College on Oct 1st, 1889, where he resided for five terms but did not graduate. He then entered Guy's Hospital, where he was House Surgeon and Resident Obstetrician. Later he was Assistant Medical Officer at the London Temperance Hospital.

He settled in Hampstead in 1898, and acquired a large general practice, the claims of which did not prevent his finding time for work in connection with child welfare and temperance. He was a member of the Hampstead Borough Council, and was much interested in the cause of children and in the preservation of open spaces. At the time of his death he was Surgical Officer to the Hampstead Infirmary, where he originated the idea of the nurses being able to qualify for their full certificate with poor-law hospital experience. Robert Claude Taylor was born in Hampstead on 9 May 1901, the eldest child of Edwin Claude Taylor MD, MS, FRCS (1981-1924), see Lives of the Fellows, Vol.2, p.386. 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Mary Constance Hodgkin (1909-1985), anthropologist, lecturer and student adviser, was born on 5 April 1909 at Mobberley, Cheshire, England, daughter of Arnold McKerrow, manager of a lithographics works, and his wife Gwendolen Mary, née Jones. Mary was educated at Altrincham County High School for Girls and Victoria University of Manchester (B.Sc., 1930), where she majored in botany. On 13 February 1931 at the register office, St Pancras, London, she married Ernest Pease Hodgkin, a fellow student, who had been appointed government medical entomologist in the Federated States of Malaya. Four months later, after gaining her teaching diploma, she joined Ernest in Kuala Lumpur. A daughter and three sons were born there. She taught at several schools and was involved in the Girl Guides movement.

Following the Japanese invasion of Malaya Mary Hodgkin and her four children were evacuated in January 1942 to Perth and her husband was interned in Singapore. Helped by local Quakers to find temporary accommodation, she soon bought a house at Cottesloe, using a legacy from an uncle. She taught part time (1942-55) at various schools, including Presbyterian Ladies College (1942-54), and continued her association with the Girl Guides, becoming a district commissioner. In October 1945 Ernest joined his family and next year was appointed a lecturer in biology at the University of Western Australia.

In 1956 Mary Hodgkin returned to study as one of the first students in the new department of anthropology and comparative sociology established by Ronald Berndt at UWA (BA Hons, 1959; MA, 1962). In her honours thesis-published as *The Asian Student in the University of Western Australia* (1958)-she made useful suggestions (later implemented by the university) for assisting overseas students. Research for her master's thesis covered a wider sample of students including those attending schools and technical colleges.

Appointed by the government of Malaya (Malaysia from 1963), Mrs Hodgkin served (1959-72) as a liaison officer for the country's students at UWA, providing generous hospitality, practical help and emotional support to hundreds of them. From 1965 she also cared for students from Singapore. A Freda Bage fellowship of the Australian Federation of University Women enabled her to spend eight months in 1961 in Malaya to gauge the adjustment of returned graduates. Assisted by a grant from the Myer Foundation, she travelled to Britain and the United States of America in 1967 to learn how these countries aided Malaysian students. In 1972-80 she was UWA's honorary adviser to overseas students.

Mary Hodgkin tutored and lectured (1965-77) in the department of anthropology; her students remembered her as a lively, interesting and caring teacher. Her publications included *Australian Training and Asian Living* (1966) and *The Innovators: The Role of Foreign Trained Persons in South-East Asia* (1972). Active in the Anthropological Society of Western Australia, she was made an honorary life member in 1982. She served on the council of the Girl Guides Association of Western Australia until 1974. In 1972 she was awarded an honorary Ahli Mangku Negara by the Malaysian government, and in 1976 the British Empire medal. She enjoyed painting in water-colours. Survived by her husband and their four children, she died on 1 March 1985 at her Mosman Park home and was cremated.

During the 60s, Miss Pim, who was a cousin of the former RUC Inspector General Sir Richard Pim, correctly predicted changes in society which would lead to health issues such as obesity and a lack of physical activity by people.

Away from the Ulster College, she was an adviser to the Department of Education in the Republic and on this side of the border she was president of the Soroptomists, the Keep Fit Association, the Central Council for Physical Recreation and several youth clubs.

"Oonah is fondly remembered by all the members of the lecturing, administrative and domestic staff who worked for her," says retired lecturer Roy Downey. "She regarded them as her wider family. Oonah enjoyed parties and dances at the college - but vetted all the partners of the students when they arrived."

Another retired lecturer Miss Musgrave Davidson added: "Oonah headed a happy group at the college. She was a visionary ahead of her time." Miss Pim's services to education in Northern Ireland were recognised when she was awarded an OBE in 1973.

In 2003 aged 90, her contribution to the development of the University of Ulster was recognised when she was awarded an honorary doctorate. In her retirement, Dr Pim moved to the village of Solva in south west Wales.

Dr Pim was cremated at Parc Gwyn Crematorium, Narbeth, Pembrokeshire, and her ashes were scattered in a garden.

A Quaker Silence was observed in Solva. Dr Pim is survived by her nephew David Pim and his family.

From that industry the flour milling was a development, and it was S.R's grandfather who, in 1814, established the business which became the Bishopwearmouth Steam Mills, and which in turn was carried on and developed by the founder's son, Caleb, and eventually by Stansfield Richardson and his brothers Edwin and Frederick. S. R. retired from the business in 1907, after having being associated with the management for fifty years. In 1897 S. General Notes: Pim, Sir Alan William (1871'961958), administrator in India and colonial adviser, was born on 17 May 1871 at Foxrock, co. Dublin, one of at least four children of James Pim and Elizabeth Fayle Evans of Monkstown, co. Dublin. From 1885 Pim attended the Society of Friends school, Bootham, Yorkshire (which took a large number of boys from Ireland), winning the annual old boys' association leaving scholarship on his departure in 1887. He attended both Leipzig University and Trinity College, Dublin, where he matriculated as a scholar in 1891, graduating BA in 1893. After success in the 1894 Indian Civil Service exams, Pim arrived in India on 4 December 1895. He held various positions in the North Western Provinces and Oudh (later the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh) including, briefly, from May 1898, those as private secretary to the lieutenant-governor, Sir James La Touche, and as assistant settlement, and then settlement, officer. Pim published a monograph on the region's woollen industries in 1898. In 1903 he was appointed to the provincial legislature, and then in 1910 was made the joint secretary of the board of revenue. Remaining in India during the war, Pim served as secretary to the government from April 1912 to August 1917. In 1916 he married Nora Gordon, daughter of Sir J. Scott. Appointed divisional commissioner, in April 1925 he returned to the board of revenue as commissioner. Pim was selected as a temporary member of the United Provinces executive council in December 1928. He retired in July 1930 having been made CIE in June 1918, CSI in January 1926, and KCIE in June 1929. Pim belonged to both the Royal Asiatic Society and the Punjab Historical Society. In 1935 he was made KBE. His most notable and important work, investigating the financial and economic conditions of British colonies, chiefly African, began in 1932 when the Colonial Office appointed Pim to carry out a financial and economic inquiry in Swaziland. Pim undertook similar commissions in Zanzibar, also in 1932, where he re

The Colonial Office continued thereafter to draw on his expertise, with Pim advising in a report submitted in 1948 against the possibilities of large-scale settlement of European displaced persons in Kenya, Tanganyika, and Northern Rhodesia. Pim also served from 1935 on the colonial development advisory committee. All this experience equipped him for subsequent activities as a speaker and writer concerned with African economic conditions. He gave the 1938 Beit lectures on colonial economic history at the University of Oxford, published in 1940 as The Financial and Economic History of the African Tropical Territories, paying particular attention to the application of European capital, and produced Colonial Agricultural Production under the auspices of Chatham House. A draft of a book dated 1953 entitled 'The dependent empire' went unpublished.

Little is known about Pim's private life, but he listed his hobbies as 'rather indefinite, books generally, and some games; later, travel' (Bootham School Register, 183). He died aged eighty-seven at the White House, Headington Hill, Oxford, on 28 June 1958. He was survived by Lady Pim. *Sarah Stockwell*

The family, who were Quakers, were prominent in Dublin business and philanthropy. Details have not survived, but as a member of a leading mercantile family, Pim would have received a rigorous education to prepare him to direct the business of poplin manufacturing which he eventually headed. In 1828 he married Susanna Todhunter (1806–1868); they had eleven children. Pim's lifelong concern to improve the condition of the Irish peasantry became public when, at the age of twenty, he signed a list of Friends endorsing the Statement of ... the causes of the disturbances in Ireland and the miserable state of the peasantry. This was a Quaker plan which, rejecting the 1823 House of Commons select committee report on Ireland, proposed landholding reforms, including the purchase of a large estate to be converted into productive farms and transferred to tenant ownership through rental payments. During the great famine (1845–9), Pim served with Joseph Bewley, a fellow elder of the Friends' Dublin meeting, as co-secretary of the Central Relief Committee of the Society of Friends (CRC), organized in December 1846. Against advice from Ireland, Lord John Russell's new whig government dropped Sir Robert Peel's successful relief measures of 1845–6 and implemented laissez-faire policies unsuited to the massive distress which followed the total potato failure of 1846. Co-ordinating with the Friends' London committee, Pim pressured Russell with a statistical picture of Ireland during the famine, assembled through investigative journeys by himself and fellow Quakers, as well as irrefutable records of the Quaker relief programmes. Pim wrote the appeals which extended the relief campaign to North America, which responded with an unprecedented outpouring. With Bewley, Pim directed the CRC's relief work into 1849. Rejecting the whig government's policies in 1847, the CRC used interest-free loans and grants to establish and revitalize industry, fishing, women's employment, and diversified farming to reduce dependence on the potato, arguing that employment, decent wages, and a stake in their country would eradicate the cause of endemic famine and also reduce Irish unrest. Pim, the CRC, and the London committee defined the limits of philanthropy and government responsibility in times of disaster. Pim wrote the three unsigned volumes of reports issued by the CRC during the famine and the committee's official report, Transactions of the Central Relief Committee of the Society of Friends during the famine in Ireland in 1846 and 1847 (1852). He also wrote the signed Final report of the Central Relief Committee of the Society of Friends established in Ireland in 1846 ... and dissolved in 1865 (1865); all of these reports rejected the government's laissez-faire policies and gave proof of the success of the Quaker relief and employment projects. From then on, these methods were used in the long series of relief enterprises undertaken by the Society of Friends from 1855, including those for the Irish famines of 1860-63 and 1880-81 and the distress of 1920–21. It became the basis of the Friends Service Council and provided the pattern for much relief and assistance given to the developing world by other agencies and governments in the twentieth century.

Convinced that revision of the Irish landholding law was essential, Pim was a leader in the campaign to pass the Encumbered Estates Act of 1849, writing The Condition and Prospects of Ireland (1848) which included his pamphlet Observations on the Evils Resulting to Ireland from the Insecurity of Title ... with Some Suggestions towards a Remedy (1847). As Liberal MP for Dublin City from 1865 to 1874, Pim continued to work for the restructuring of Irish landholding laws. He wrote The Land Question in Ireland (1867) and Ireland and the Imperial Parliament (1871) and closed the debate on the Landlord and Tenant (Ireland) Bill of 1870, the most crucial piece of Irish land legislation between 1849 and 1881, laying out the issues and recommending amendments with great clarity of exposition. He voted for the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland, and against Gladstone's abortive Reform Bill of 1866. After his defeat in the general election of 1874 he served as president of the Statistical and Social Inquiry Society of Ireland (1875–7) and wrote A Review of the Economic and Social Progress of Ireland since the Famine (1876).

Pim died at his home, Greenbank, Monkstown, co. Dublin, on 6 July 1885, and was buried in the Quaker burial-ground at Temple Hill on 9 July. A popular belief that he wrote the Land Act of 1881 may have resulted from confusion with his son, Joseph Todhunter Pim (b. 1841), who wrote Ireland in 1880 with Suggestions for her Land Laws (1881), but it no doubt also reflects the high esteem in which Pim and the Ouakers generally were held in post-famine Irish public opinion. Another of his sons, Frederick William Pim (1839–1925), also continued his work, writing The Society of Friends in Ireland and Home Rule

(1893). His brother, William Harvey Pim (1811–1878), was noted for a series of biblical commentaries, his firsthand knowledge of Palestine, and an active role in Dublin philanthropy.

Wigham, John Richardson (1829–1906), engineer and inventor of gas lighting for lighthouses, was born on 15 January 1829 at 5 South Gray Street, Edinburgh, the youngest of three sons (there were three daughters) of John Wigham (c.1784–1864), shawl manufacturer, of Edinburgh and his wife, Jane Richardson (d. 1830); his father was a member of the Society of Friends. Eliza Wigham, the women's activist, was his sister. Eliza Wigham was his elder sister. Following meagre schooling at Edinburgh, he went in 1843 to Dublin, where he continued his studies privately while serving as apprentice to his brother-in-law, Joshua Edmundson, who ran a hardware and manufacturing business. The business subsequently traded as Joshua Edmundson & Co. and then transferred to Wigham's control on the death of Edmundson.

With Wigham as chairman, Edmundson's Electricity Corporation grew rapidly; a branch was opened in London and taken over by a separate company. In Dublin the firm devoted itself largely to experiments in gas-lighting and Wigham was particularly successful in designing small gasworks suitable for private houses and public institutions. In addition to his private business he held various engineering posts, and as engineer to the Commercial Gas Company of Ireland he designed the gasworks at Kingstown (later Dún Laoghaire). Wigham also played a prominent part in the commercial life of Dublin. He was a director of the Alliance and Dublin Consumers' Gas Company from 1866 until his death; director and vice-chairman of the Dublin United Tramways Company from 1881 to his death; and a member of council (1879), secretary (1881–93), and eventually president (1894–6) of the Dublin chamber of commerce. Wigham was married, on 4 August 1858, to Mary, daughter of Jonathan Pim of Dublin, MP for Dublin City from 1865 to 1874; they had six sons and four daughters, of whom three sons and three daughters survived him.

Wigham is remembered mainly as the inventor of important applications of gas to lighthouse illumination. In 1863 he was granted a small sum for experiments by the commissioners of Irish lights, and in 1865 a system invented by him was installed at the Baily lighthouse on Howth Head near Dublin. The gas was manufactured on the system's main advantages were that it dispensed with the lamp glass essential to the four-wick Fresnel oil lamp of 240 candle-power, in use from 1835, and that the power of the light could readily be increased or decreased: a 28 jet flame, which gave sufficient light for clear weather, could be increased successively to a 48 jet, 68 jet, 88 jet, or 108 jet flame—2923 candle-power— on foggy nights. Although highly valued in Ireland, the system was condemned on trial by Thomas Stevenson, engineer to the Scottish northern lights board. It was made more effective, however, by Wigham's invention of a powerful composite burner in 1868, and in 1869 its further employment in Ireland was strongly advocated by John Tyndall in his capacity as scientific adviser to Trinity House and the Board of Trade. Wigham's ingenuity also acted as a powerful stimulant to rival patentees and led to various improvements in oil apparatus by Sir James Nicholas Douglass and others.

In 1871 Wigham invented the first of the many group-flashing arrangements which enabled mariners to distinguish between different lighthouses. His arrangement was adopted at Galley Head, Mew Head, and Tory Island off the Irish coast. In 1872 a triform light of his invention was installed experimentally at the High lighthouse, Happisburgh, Norfolk; but its further adoption in English lighthouses was discouraged by a committee of Trinity House in 1874. The Irish lights board, however, continued to favour Wigham's system, and in 1878 they installed at Galley Head a powerful quadriform light with four tiers of superposed lenses and a 68 jet burner in the focus of each tier. In 1883 the Board of Trade appointed a lighthouse illuminants committee to consider the relative merits of gas, oil, and electric light. For some years Tyndall had felt that Sir James Douglass had used his influence as engineer to Trinity House for the furtherance of his own patents, to the disadvantage of Wigham's system. He now protested that, as rival patentees, Douglass and Wigham ought both to be members of the lighthouse illuminants committee or ought both to be excluded. His objection was overruled, and consequently he resigned his position as scientific adviser to the Board of Trade in March 1883. A bitter controversy followed in the press between Tyndall and Joseph Chamberlain, president of the Board of Trade. On Tyndall's resignation the lighthouse illuminants committee collapsed. A new committee, of which Douglass was a member, was appointed by Trinity House and, after extensive experiments at South Foreland, it decided to recommend oil and electric light in preference to gas. Wigham protested against his lack of opportunity to demonstrate the advantages of his system, and claimed that his rival Douglass, who had condemned in official reports Wigham's invention of superposed lenses, afterwards employed them for the improvement of his own oil apparatus. Wigham eventually received £2500 from the Board of Trade as compensation for the infringement of his patent. Among Wigham's other inventions were a device for fog signals; a gas-driven siren; a 'sky-flashing arrangement' and a 'continuous pulsating light' in connection with his system of gas illumination for lighthouses; and a lighted buoy or beacon in which, using oil as the illuminant, he obtained, by imparting motion to the wick, a continuous light needing attention only once in thirty days.

Descendants of Tobias Pim

Wigham was a member of the Royal Dublin Society and of the Royal Irish Academy, an associate member of the Institution of Civil Engineers, and a fellow of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers. He read papers on gas as a lighthouse illuminant and related subjects before the Society of Arts, the British Association, the Royal Dublin Society, and the Shipmasters' Society. In politics he was a unionist and a member of the Irish Unionist Alliance, and he spoke at public meetings against Gladstone's Home Rule Bill. He was also one of the leaders of the temperance movement in Dublin. As a member of the Society of Friends (the Quakers) he twice refused knighthood in 1887. He died on 16 November 1906 at his residence, Albany House, Monkstown, co. Dublin, after four years of ill health. He was buried on 19 November in the Quaker burial-ground, Temple Hill, Blackrock, co. Dublin. He was survived by his wife.

General Notes: WILLIAM BAYLDON BARBER Many an Old Boy has stood by the pavilion to cheer Billy as he led his team on to the field, and has watched him from the touch-line taking the ball down the wing and passing it into the centre. We rejoice that the School and Old Boys have had him all these years as a friend and leader of sport. He served on the School Committee for many years, from 1916 onwards. I often noted his punctuality, his careful attention to business, and his sound judgment. He was a boy at Bootham from 1885 to 1891; he played his first game as an Old Boy against the School in the spring of 1892; in 1924 he celebrated "The Old Hundredth"; in 1932 he played his last game of football against the School, and in 1935 his last game of cricket. That means that during those fifty years, 1885 to 1935, he played on the School ground every year (usually several times)-a very remarkable record. "The Old Hundredth " needs a few words of explanation. Billy played his hundredth Old Boys' match on July i2th, 1924. Presentations were made after lunch by the staff and the boys, and in the evening a dinner was given in his honour by the School Committee at the Station Hotel. Mrs. Barber recalls how she and Billy treasured these gifts and the "silver salver given by the School when we were married. It has been in our hall all these twenty-eight years, and taken upstairs every night so that it would be quite safe. He loved it." Many Old Boys knew him far more intimately than I did, and have their own vivid pictures. I think of him first as comrade and sportsman; I think of his happy home-life and the hospitality generously dispensed by him and his wife, and of his genius for friendship; I see him watching young players as they came up the School and making sure that they began playing against the School as soon as they were leavers; I see him fielding at a critical period of the game, taking short steps, tense, a bit worried, playing for a win and maintaining the highest standard of true sportsmanship. An Old Boy writes : "Billy Barber joined the Falcons for their second tour, and on the retirement of Stephen Priestman he was unanimously elected Captain, a position which he held until ill-health obliged him to retire from cricket two or three years ago. Billy, as a batsman, was at his best on a fiery wicket against fast bowling. Although by no means a big man he had an extra- ordinary reach when playing forward, and would often show the younger players the right way to deal with fast bowling under those conditions. He was an excellent captain on the field, showing great judgment in the use of his bowlers, and inspiring the whole team never to deviate from the true spirit of the game, even when going all out for a win. Off the field he was really invaluable, for the spirit of comradeship which he instilled into the Falcons spread to the many clubs we played." Another Old Boy finds it difficult to overestimate the influence that

W. B. B. had on those who played under his captaincy. "He often said to us, 'keep in touch,' and he always kept in touch with us." This cricketer thinks that the spirit of Billy was the spirit of Mrs. Battle : a fine day, a fast pitch and the rigour of the game. He sees him pacing up and down by the pavilion, condemning opponents who were wasting half an hour of a sunny day through lateness ; he sees him unpacking the cricket bag which contained his every need, and from which the smallest article was never missing, and he sees the look of pleasure on his face when another game was won and another day was well spent. A third Old Boy, who valued Billy's sane and practical outlook on life, writes: "I shall always associate him with my happiest moments playing games in the open-air, and just as happily talking over them again when the day's play was over. . . . For me, he will always be alive wherever there are green fields in England : he was a wise counsellor, a great sportsman, and a very dear friend." I think of Bayldon Barber as a disciple of the philosopher who wrote : "Thou canst preach thy gospel better by means of a good life than in any other way. Thou needest not to go far in search of the service of the best." A. R.

Shortly before Whitsun a few years ago, soon after I had got married, Billy, knowing that money was not very plentiful, wrote to me. I have his letter before me, and I quote it verbatim : " Are you and (my wife) coming up to O.S. ? If you are, and can do so, will you do me a great favour ? If you book for the Station Hotel, may I include you in my " party "? Please don't refuse, as I shall be very disappointed. "I want you to book as you like, but let me square up on the 'q.t.' when we meet. No living soul will ever know, and it is a very little thing to ask when you can give so much pleasure by doing as I ' request.' I've had one or two little pleasures before on similar lines and never got caught I " Well, I'm sure you understand; don't go and hunt out some excuse not to come to avoid our seeing you. I promise I'll never do it again. If you can come, write to the Station Hotel at once." I doubt if anything could be more typical of Billy than that letter, which needs no comment. One more little Billy incident. When I visited him during the great trade depression, seven or eight years ago, at a time when most people were cutting down their staff, I noticed that he had more men than I'd seen before working in his garden. I commented on it, and he replied that he had taken on an extra man, or men, because the depression hit the less-well-off so much harder than the better-off that it was up to the latter to see that they gave as much employment as they possibly could. Would that there were more like Billy ! K. G. J. My earliest recollection of Billy Barber is of the congratulations upon his marriage, made to him at the tea-table speech-making after the O.S. football match in 1911. As Schoolboy and Old Scholar, I see him in a long succession of similar occasions. I do not think he enjoyed making these speeches, but always there was the same merry smile, the same conviction that the best side had won, the same cordial invitation to next year's Leavers to ask for a " place on." These pictures flash rapidly by in order that I may reach the great goal, and there browse as long as time permits-those glorious August weeks, year after year, when he led the Falcon Touring Cricket Club in their matches in Shropshire, Worcestershire and Herefordshire. My fixture card for 1936, his last tour, has written across it, "With best wishes from W. B. B.," and of the thirty tours up to that date he had only missed one or two. I see him year after year, as the team assembled on the ground for the first match of the tour, welcoming each member as he arrived, radiant with happy anticipation of the week's cricket in store. For us, and for our opponents, Billy Barber was the Club. Each day, as we arrived on a fresh ground, the first question would be where was Barber, or sometimes " the little 'un," and great would be the dis- appointment of team and onlookers if it happened to be a day when he was standing down. I see him with H. K. Foster, or "The Colonel," at Hereford, cracking a joke as the coin was spun, and if it happened to be the same joke as on many previous occasions, so much the merrier. I don't think he was ever unkind to a soul, but a cricket match had to be conducted properly, and he was really disgusted by such things as slackness or fooling on the field, avoidable unpunctuality, or any infringement of a decent understanding of rules, written or unwritten. His thoughtfulness for each member of the team was boundless, he wanted everyone really to enjoy that week, and although the batting order was a serious matter he would somehow see to it that everyone had a chance during the week, often at the sacrifice of himself. The social side of many touring teams has been the cause of their undoing, but the Falcon team, under Billy Barber, was invariably a happy family, and his captaincy was practically a guaiantee that it would be so. I am sure there are many who would willingly go those tours again, even as non-players. There can be few Falcons who have not walked arm-in-arm with him round some garden on an August evening, and any who have done so are never likely to forget the sincere and understanding friendship which he gave to them. A. L. W. Another Old Scholar writes : "Billy Barber went to extraordinary trouble in getting his football teams together for the O.S. matches, particularly during the war. One autumn I stopped with him on the way to York, and it came out in chatting that in order to get his team together-even so, one man short- he had written 107 letters with his own hand. That was, I think, the famous occasion when Arnold Rowntree turned out to make the eleventh man, and performed so valiantly in goal. The boys found it useless to charge him. "Another time when I was staying with Billy, at a time when he was nearer sixty than fifty, he said, 'Now, can you look after yourself for half an hour? I usually change into footer things and go a run for a mile or so just to keep fit.' And probably this too vigorous attempt to stem the tide of years helped to shorten his time with us. " One of the most enjoyable times I ever remember was one winter's day when he revolved effortlessly and accurately round an orange on the frozen pond in his garden, encouraging my faltering attempts, I having squeezed my feet into his daughter Ruth's skating boots, quite five sizes to small ! But it was in Switzerland that he really relaxed, and to enjoy his smiling companionship on the English Rink at Davos was an unforgettable experience."

Anne, born into a Quaker family in Lincolnshire, was one of the first women to be admitted to Barts Hospital as a clinical student after having read medicine at Oxford. Anne's contribution to medicine was in the field of family planning and infertility. Being committed to a cause and supporting it enthusiastically was characteristic of her involvement in life itself. When Anne married Chris Barber they moved to Aughton near Liverpool where their five children were born or adopted, a concept familiar to Anne as she was on the committee of the Lancashire and Cheshire Adoption Society. Anne was genuinely interested in people. She had a real gift of getting to know people, being trusted by them and so being able to help them. She was exceptionally good with younger people who perhaps were a bit lost or at odds with their families, drawing on her own experiences of struggles in her youth. Anne was very perceptive and could often see other people's qualities which were not immediately apparent, and this gave her an insight which she used most sensitively to encourage and support those she was involved with. Anne and Chris lived for many years in Peppard Common, north of Reading, where Anne was hostess and acting mother to a large number of visitors, including many people from Oxfam. Anne's welcome and her involvement with all who came was remarkable and many, especially the younger ones, kept up the connection for years. A Quaker throughout, Anne contributed to Friends' affairs as family and work allowed. In the Liverpool area she played her part in setting up a small allowed meeting in Ormskirk. In Reading and Henley she was at times an Elder or an Overseer. Further afield she served variously on the governing body of The Retreat in York, as a governor of Leighton Park School, and on Woodbrooke Council. This latter appointment followed a year when she and Chris were resident Friends there - a year which was of special importance to Anne. Anne had a clear belief in God and his guidance but was concerned that sometimes she was doing things to get personal acclaim and not because God wanted her to do them. Anne's spoken ministry in Meeting was always thought-provoking and often reached great depth though expressed clearly in accessible language, a characteristic that was so typical of her thoughtfulness for other people. Warwick Friends were blessed with Anne's presence for her last few years when she moved to be closer to her youngest family and grandchildren. But in that time she made a lasting impact, encouraging us to consider the spiritual needs of older people as outlined in the booklet This is who I am. She never lost her will to learn and took up art class and painting as a way of doing less socially but at the same time doing more in expressing herself. Anne believed in God being in the beauty of nature and loved the countryside. She had a longstanding attachment to the Lake District where her father had belonged, and frequent visits there would always include attending Colthouse Meeting at Hawkshead. Here her ashes have been scattered on the dam built by her grandfather to create a tarn above Colthouse. Away from the Ulster College, she was an adviser to the Department of Education in the Republic and on this side of the border she was president of the Soroptomists, the Keep Fit Association, the Central Council for Physical Recreation and several youth clubs.

"Oonah is fondly remembered by all the members of the lecturing, administrative and domestic staff who worked for her," says retired lecturer Roy Downey. "She regarded them as her wider family. Oonah enjoyed parties and dances at the college - but vetted all the partners of the students when they arrived." Another retired lecturer Miss Musgrave Davidson added: "Oonah headed a happy group at the college. She was a visionary ahead of her time." Miss Pim's services to education in Northern Ireland were recognised when she was awarded an OBE in 1973.

In 2003 aged 90, her contribution to the development of the University of Ulster was recognised when she was awarded an honorary doctorate. In her retirement, Dr Pim moved to the village of Solva in south west Wales.

Dr Pim was cremated at Parc Gwyn Crematorium, Narbeth, Pembrokeshire, and her ashes were scattered in a garden.

A Quaker Silence was observed in Solva. Dr Pim is survived by her nephew David Pim and his family.

Dublin, one of at least four children of James Pim and Elizabeth Fayle Evans of Monkstown, co. Dublin. From 1885 Pim attended the Society of Friends school, Bootham, Yorkshire (which took a large number of boys from Ireland), winning the annual old boys' association leaving scholarship on his departure in 1887. He attended both Leipzig University and Trinity College, Dublin, where he matriculated as a scholar in 1891, graduating BA in 1893. After success in the 1894 Indian Civil Service exams, Pim arrived in India on 4 December 1895. He held various positions in the North Western Provinces and Oudh (later the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh) including, briefly, from May 1898, those as private secretary to the lieutenant-governor, Sir James La Touche, and as assistant settlement, and then settlement, officer. Pim published a monograph on the region's woollen industries in 1898. In 1903 he was appointed to the provincial legislature, and then in 1910 was made the joint secretary of the board of revenue. Remaining in India during the war, Pim served as secretary to the government from April 1912 to August 1917. In 1916 he married Nora Gordon, daughter of Sir J. Scott. Appointed divisional commissioner, in April 1925 he returned to the board of revenue as commissioner. Pim was selected as a temporary member of the United Provinces executive council in December 1928. He retired in July 1930 having been made CIE in June 1918, CSI in January 1926, and KCIE in June 1929. Pim belonged to both the Royal Asiatic Society and the Punjab Historical Society. In 1935 he was made KBE. His most notable and important work, investigating the financial and economic conditions of British colonies, chiefly African, began in 1932 when the Colonial Office appointed Pim to carry out a financial and economic inquiry in Swaziland. Pim undertook similar commissions in Zanzibar, also in 1932, where he reached the difficult conclusion that the numbers and salaries of European and Indian officials would have to be cut in order to effect an improvement in the government's financial position, in the Bechuanaland protectorate in 1933, British Honduras in 1934, and Basutoland in 1935. In Kenya, Pim investigated the controversial issue of the racial basis of taxation in 1936. His report, recommending a European income tax, was described as a 'Mill's bomb' by dismayed white settlers (Bennett, 326). His last major appointment was as financial and economic commissioner in Northern Rhodesia in 1937, and his painstaking work on these commissions, by highlighting the need for colonial economic reform, contributed to the late 1930s official reassessment of colonial development policy.

The Colonial Office continued thereafter to draw on his expertise, with Pim advising in a report submitted in 1948 against the possibilities of large-scale settlement of European displaced persons in Kenya, Tanganyika, and Northern Rhodesia. Pim also served from 1935 on the colonial development advisory committee. All this experience equipped him for subsequent activities as a speaker and writer concerned with African economic conditions. He gave the 1938 Beit lectures on colonial economic history at the University of Oxford, published in 1940 as The Financial and Economic History of the African Tropical Territories, paying particular attention to the application of European capital, and produced Colonial Agricultural Production under the auspices of Chatham House. A draft of a book dated 1953 entitled 'The dependent empire' went unpublished.

Little is known about Pim's private life, but he listed his hobbies as 'rather indefinite, books generally, and some games; later, travel' (Bootham School Register, 183). He died aged eighty-seven at the White House, Headington Hill, Oxford, on 28 June 1958. He was survived by Lady Pim. Sarah Stockwell

After Cambridge he returned to Bootham to teach French and German which he did for 41 years, broken only by a sabbatical term during which he visited Old Scholars in many parts of the world. He was soon to become Housemaster of Fox and many will remember with pleasure that spacious Georgian drawing room in No. 47 with its white panelled walls, its large reproductions of French Impressionist paintings and, in early spring, the masses of hyacinths and daffodils which Tony grew with unfailing success. He was appointed Senior Resident Master in 1946 in which year he married Isobel Leyland who readily shared in the hospitality of No. 47 and in the care of the boys who slept there. They retired to her family home in Askrigg in 1965 where later on Tony was to tend her with patience and devotion during her last crippling illness. He himself had a severe heart attack early this year and died on the 17th of March. Looking back on Tony's services to Bootham is like looking at the hundred bits of a jig-saw puzzle and wondering how they can be made into a picture. He was the least academic of teachers; and he always turned down my annual suggestion that it was his turn to take the top French sets: he had no professional ambition and was content to remain Form Master of the Upper Schoolroom, and he had no yearning to take Advanced Level classes. He always said that his job was 'house-training' the young - and this he did thoroughly to their and our profit. This involved eternal vigilance and persistence - so much so that an Old Scholar told me that in the Schoolroom A.N.P. was 'like a nagging wif

exemplified. When he announced his retirement, Albert Lindley asked him to make a list of his duties - they filled nearly three sides of foolscap and had subsequently to be divided amongst the other residents. The idea of working a fixed number of hours a day would never have occurred to him and he readily went 'the second mile' however late into the night the journey took him. I can only make my own (very limited) choice of what were the more important pieces that make up the picture: the long period over which he conducted The Schoolroom Sunday Morning Meeting; his morn to evening chores at The Lads' Club camp; his full-time parade of the dining room when on tea duty, usually with a cloth and basin in hand to see that spilt tea was mopped up; his late evening weeding of his rose garden (boys claim that he did it by torchlight); his immaculately written reports and mark sheets; his vast knowledge of Old Scholars and of their parents and grandparents at Bootham or The Mount and his record of their careers in 'Across the Months'; above all, perhaps, his unfailing courtesy and solicitude for the domestic staff and maintenance men, some of whom came to regard him as a close friend - nothing aroused his indignation more than a boy's impudence or thoughtless behaviour towards any of the kitchen staff; his constant presence amongst the boys - he knew far more about them than did his colleagues and they, when they meet again, have more anecdotes to exchange about A.N.P. than about any of the rest of us. This, I think, helps us to see the whole picture - everything and everybody connected with Bootham were of equal importance. He never preached about Community, but he lived it with his whole being and through his constant devotion. His single-minded dedication to an almost mystical concept of the Bootham Community enduring over a century of time reveals Tony in his completeness. We shall never see his like again. Whether they realise it or not, no influence on the majority of boys during their life at Bootham was great

One important source of employment in Tullamore in the latter half of the 19th century was the tobacco industry. This industry provided up to 150 jobs in the early 1880's and was one of three important sources of employment in Tullamore alongside malting and distilling. The tobacco industry differed from the other two because it was largely dependent on imported raw materials and offered permanent rather than seasonal employment.

The factory, T. P. & R. Goodbody, was established by two brothers, Thomas Pim and Robert James Goodbody, who were members of that remarkable Clara family which was responsible for setting up the jute industry there. The jute factory industry need not concern us here, but it may be said that Clara was one of the few Irish towns to experience population growth in the latter half of the 19th century. The Tullamore factory was located in O'Connor Square in the area formally occupied by G. N. Walsh's garage. The premises was purchased by the Goodbody brothers in 1841. A general grocery and provisions outlet was operated in the front portion of the premises while the factory, which was established in 1848, was located at the rear.

Little has been discovered about the workings of the factory before the 1880's. The firm exhibited at the Cork Exhibition of 1883 alongside the Tullamore distillery of Bernard Daly. At that time the Goodbody brothers employed 140 men and 9 women. The 150 men or so workers were paid £3,500 a year in wages or approximately 9 shillings a week each. This was the average wage for labour in Tullamore at that time. Of course, the hours were much longer and probably ranged form 7a.m. to 7p.m. Six days a week with no annual leave. The Goodbody's themselves worked the same hours or more, often at 5.30a.m. and

finishing at 7.00p.m.

Some idea of the size of the factory can be gauged from the fact that in 1883, the firm paid out about £160,000 in duty calculated at the rate of 3.6d per lb. of tobacco. This would mean that the firm was processing approximately one million pounds of tobacco in 1883.

The Tullamore factory had three products; tobacco for pipes, cigarettes and snuff. The quantity of tobacco spun each day was usually about 4,000 lbs. The Goodbodys employed about six travellers on the road and had branch offices in Dublin. Limerick and Liverpool.

Brand names had already made their appearance and the firm was using names as Bird's Eye, Golden Flake and York River. The best known of the rough tobacco was Quaker Twist. The snuffs went by Cork, Brown and High Toast.

EXPANSION

The tobacco business continued to expand in the 1880's and employment in the factory was put at 220 when the disastrous fire occurred in March, 1886, which resulted in the loss of the building and damage estimated at £40,000.

The Goodbody brothers decided to move to Dublin and re-located at Greenville, Harolds Cross, in a suitable building which was readily available (now the site of recently built apartments). The brothers said they could not afford to wait for the factory at Tullamore to be rebuilt. In addition, being near to Dublin Port would be a distinct advantage leading to a reduction in transport costs. How the move affected Tullamore was neatly summarised in a newspaper column of the time where it was stated that the last and final departure of Goodbodys employees had taken place in May, 1886, with young and old leaving for Dublin on a special train. The departure of the work-force and their families contributed further to the serious downward trend experienced by Tullamore during the 1880's. The population of Tullamore fell by 13.8% between 1881 and 1891 or from 5,324 to 4,676.

Some years after the move to Dublin of a clergyman who had lived in Tullamore in the mid-1880's stated that the factory was moved because the politics of the Goodbody brothers was at variance with those of the workers, presumably one was unionist and the other nationalist. The clergyman, a Mr. Harpur, went on to accuse the Tullamore workers of burning the factory. This was repudiated by the Goodbody firm. The directors of the firm rote: "We moved to Dublin, not Liverpool, simply and solely because it was more central for our trade, and we had no choice but to make the move or built a new factory in Tullamore. Had the factory not been burned no doubt we could be working there happily still. We brought all the men with their families with us to Dublin, which was proof that we valued their services and had no differences with them in any shape.

Long after the departure of the Goodbody firm it was suggested that Offaly farmers mighty grow tobacco with a view to manufacturing it in the county. The Tullamore Industrial Development Association took up the matter in 1905 and experiments were carried out at Mr. Richardson's farm at Mullaghcrew near Mountbolus. But little came of this. It was rather similar to the attempts to encourage the growth of flax in Offaly some fifty year before.

The native Irish tobacco industry faced increasing competition from the Imperial Tobacco Company after 1900. This company was a combination of the best known and largest producers in Great Britain. In 1920 there were about seventeen factories in Ireland engaged in the manufacture of tobacco from imported leaf. Four of these firms were very large, including Gallaghers of Belfast; T.P. & R. Goodbody Ltd. was one of the smaller firms finding it increasinly difficult to increase output or meet competition from the larger firms. As a result it went into liquidation in 1929 and shortly after was taken over by the Dundalk firm of P.J. Carroll.

The founders of the Tullamore firm, Thomas Pim and Robert Goodbody died in October 1890, outliving by a few years their three brothers. One beneficial result of that disastrous fire of 1886 was the setting up of a voluntary fire brigade unit in Tullamore in the same year.

To his mother it will be the loss of everything, a fearful blow, for him one cannot be very sorry. a child's death is seldom or never a sad thing for itself for it has been born to the birthright of Heaven without any risk of losing it. Mon 28 May 1883 - Darlington. Went up and talked to the Aunts at Southend about Charlie's death.

Tue 29 May 1883 - Darlington making arrangements for the funeral which will be on Thursday, Uncle & Aunt Arthur have gone over to Dublin to make arrangements for bringing the remains over.

Thurs 31 May 1883 - We went by the early train to Darlington. The funeral started from Southend at 10.15 - We were a small family party, growing less & less in a most impressingly sad manner - over & over again have I followed my relations to their graves beneath the trees in the graveyard, & it has come on me more strongly than ever the realization that time flies by, that we live but for a moment, that death is sure & we live as in a doomed city - this feeling without the consolations of hope & Christ would be unbearable - I expressed some thoughts like these in a letter to Vincent & he writes very truly, that the quickened sense of the irresistible passage of life & the inevitable, and of ones own personal existence ought not to tend to despair, that though it is hard to leave life & the men & women & sights of every day that we love, death is after all, very merciful & not vengeful, taking us from sorrows that we might hardly bear, & that our refuge is to feel the pressing duty to do one's best to help the world we live in, not intent on the cowardly principle of saving oneself, sharing its joys & cares - even whilst leaving inwardly to be less of it - It was a very fine morning & there was a considerable crowd to see Charlie laid beside his father in the same grave. Better accounts of his poor mother. *The Diaries of Sir Alfred Edward Pease Bt*.

24 May 1883, Thurs: Up at 4 o'clock, a fine morning, read Lord Laurence [sic] to Falmouth, breakfasted, letters, and then with George Henry Fox, Henry Fox & 2 girls to the Manacles, fished about the Vase & the big wells with fair success, then moved off to (name omitted) Bay, fished again there, did well at first, home. Very poor a/cs of Charlie Pease, the a/c s very hopeless, felt very sad about him.

26 May 1883, Sat: At letters &c; into the town, called on Reginald Rogers, agreed with him that I would bid Chatham up to £3,000 that I would leave a margin in his hands, that I would sell him 6 & 1/2 acre field 4 acres wood at 1/5th of the purchase money giving him a right of road to the sea beech, then with 5 girls of my own, "Den" & Fan Rogers & Wilson Fox in the Roseberry to Durgan, lunched there then up to Glendurgan, walked to Carwinion, walked down to the sea va Chatham, Roseberry to Porthgwidden, called, found them out, tea there, then to King Harry - back to docks, landed there, set the Rogers girls to the Station, home; Maud Rogers at dinner most pleasantly. Theodore H. Bewley came in from Ireland to attend the funeral tomorrw. Remains left in the hearse & not brought in to the house at Southend; William & Rachel Fowler also.
31 May 1883, Thurs: Poor little Charlie G. Pease's funeral. Left Southend about 10.15; Minnie & self, Arthur & Mary, Kate, Jane & Emma. Alfred, Nellie, Albert, Aunt Henry & 2 younger sons, William & Rachel Fowler, R. Goodbody, E. Pike, H.F. Bewley, Capt. Richard Pike; it was a beautiful day, dear Charles' grave was decorated with flowers; Harrison Penny prayed beautifully by the grave anmd in meeting, William Taylor preached in language very suitable and very beautiful, we returned to Southend to lunch. most of the party soon after all seemed to break up and return home. Minnie & I went to Bushel Hill and spent an hour or more with Edwin & Fanny Pease, he seems better though very, very delicate, the new house is charming & complete. Arthur Pease, the next brother was born in 1837, so would be about 26 - as a child & boy I was more in awe of him and his brother Charles than of my other uncles - he was a very tall fine built man of great strength and rather critical - but I grew very fond of him in after years and I am sure no man ever did his duty and walked with a more tender conscience in religious matters. He began life with narrow views, but long before he died, these had given way to larger ones. I did much electioneering with him when he stood for Whitby and the Whitby Division - He like my father wobbled much on the Irish question, but altho' he had gone much further than my father with the Home Rulers, his wife pulled him over to the Unionists while I flatter myself (if it is a cause for self congratulation) that I kept my father with the Liberals, I remember very distinctly Arthur's wife as a girl, Mary Pike coming to Southend with her sister Louisa after they were engaged - a sweet fair pretty Irish girl - I remember being at their wedding in 1864 and signing the marriage certificate in the column of relations at the Darlington Meeting House. Arthur Pease had an excellent business head and my father's constant complaint was that 'Arthur has all the ability to .help me, but never will' He was really very lazy and indifferent about business and would not work at detail, but when he did attend to a question was distinctly good - his was really an indolent nature and he never bothered to write more with his own hand than he could help. He left all worries and difficulties to my father and always said 'Joseph will attend to that' and went off to his Quarterly Meetings, Sunday Schools and Temperance affairs. He preached and was a Minister - he preached and spoke well and quietly and was impressive with a nice voice and earnest manner. One fault he had of staring at you, a sort of religious glare, and he was fond of talking, gossiping and anecdote. He was excellent company, fond of horses and farming and country things. After every good story he told he would stare or glare at you with a smile and say what?... what?... or just stare till you showed you had fully appreciated it. Arthur Pease in the earlier part of his life became also a very strong teetotal advocate. His health suffered as his brothers from this abstinence, and his life prolonged by his having courage to give up this practice, and he lived to be 61 and died of heart disease. He lived at "Hummersknott" built by his father for him, near to "Uplands" built for his sister Rachel when a

Arthur Pease, 61 27 8mo. 1898

Marske-by-the-Sea, Yorkshire. A Minister.

Arthur Pease was the third son of Joseph and Emma Pease, of Southend, Darlington, and was born there on the 12th of Ninth Month, 1837. He became one of a happy family of twelve brothers and sisters, in a home that was well known, not only in the Society of Friends, but in a much wider circle.

As a child he was somewhat delicate, and received that maternal care which happily so frequently attends such children. This produced a very close mutual attraction between mother and son, and made him acutely feel her death in 1860.

He was educated at Tottenham School. Naturally of a quiet and amiable disposition, he passed through this early probation as a favourite with his fellow pupils, and with those who had the charge of his education.

Leaving school in 1853, he entered upon the family business, and became a most useful member of the firm in which his father, uncles, and elder brother were engaged. It is not, however, with his business avocations that a memoir for the "Annual Monitor" is concerned. It is with the history of that inner life which is often hid from the world, but which is revealed in a man's life and works and

words. There is no doubt that whilst at school the influence of the Holy Spirit on his young heart led him to abhor that which was evil, and to cleave to that which was good. During his early life, the death of his younger brothers had a decided influence on his character. He was impressed as he stood by their graves, and marked the vacant places at the table and hearth, with the uncertainty of time, the certainty of death, and the need of preparation for the life to come. He evidently felt himself to be " a stranger and a pilgrim," seeking " a better country, that is a heavenly." To those who knew him intimately he always seemed to sit loose from earthly things. He enjoyed life, entering into all its interests, social, municipal, political, philanthropic and religious ; but he evidently looked with steadfast gaze on the life beyond, treating things here as temporal, and the things eternal as those that endure.

With this substratum of character - whilst in business he had a most excellent and honest judgment, and in philanthropy and politics a warm interest - he never was absorbed in details, or in those close investigations which would distract his time and thoughts from the higher aims on which he had built his life. It may be said that he was devoted to the endeavour to promote Christ's kingdom on earth. His engagements were numerous. A regular attender, during his early life, at our religious meetings, he took a useful but not a very prominent part in meetings for discipline, acting as clerk at home, and assisting at the desk in the Yearly Meeting, where his quiet, serious manner, his good presence, and well regulated voice were much appreciated.

He was acknowledged as a minister on the 12th of Eleventh Month, 1874, and his invitations to accept the grace of God which brings salvation were warm-hearted and sincere. But Arthur Pease's were no narrow views on religious observances or beliefs. By conviction he was a Friend ; and whilst those most dear to him trod other relgious paths, he held to those views in which he had been early educated and which made him a Friend, without feeling that they were in any way separated in things essential and eternal.

Giving up his Darlington home, he removed for the last few years of his life to a house on the Yorkshire coast, built by his father. It was situated in the Cleveland iron-mining district. He generally attended our meetings in the morning of First-days. In the evening he frequently occupied the pulpits of various denominations in the town or mining village, and occasionally aided the Vicar of Marske in reading the lessons of the day in Holy Scripture. The testimony as to the manner in which these services were received, and as to the real good that was, through the divine blessing, given to the souls of his hearers, is wide and emphatic.

He was elected member for the Borough of Whitby in the parliament of 1880-5. He was not a frequent speaker in the House of Commons, but served most usefully and diligently on public and private Bill Committees. When he did address the House, it was generally clearly to the point on matters with which he was by experience acquainted. In 1895 he again entered parliament as member for Darlington, as a supporter of the Unionist party. His sympathies were intensely with Ireland. . He deplored the condition of the peasantry, and the trials which the sad social state of the country brought upon all classes. To one of his most intimate friends, who was speaking to him of the difference of opinion between himself and others dear to him, he said, " I would give my life for Ireland tomorrow, if the sacrifice would make a happy Ireland." With these views he felt it his duty to dissent from Mr. Gladstone's measures on Home Rule, and to support (not without apprehension that there might occasionally be some tension of his views on other subjects), the Conservative or Unionist party.

He was Mayor of Darlington in 1873-4. He was chairman of the Durham Council, and for many years chairman of the committee having charge of the County Asylum. In these offices and many others he showed that love to mankind which is begotten by the love of God to men.

He married on the 14th of Fourth Month, 1864, Mary Lecky, the daughter of Ebenezer and Lydia Pike, of Besborough, Cork. His family consisted of three sons and four daughters. They formed, as they grew up, part of that united family circle of their name in and around Darlington, who regarded their father with much affection, and received his love in return. But life here, however pure, however complete, however valuable to family, neighbours, and country, has its end. Arthur Pease's family friends and neighbours could not but feel anxious about a life so dear to them, as they noticed failing health, and a waning physical force. He was quite aware of the fact ; and although able still to discharge his public and private duties, he frequently alluded to his life here as uncertain.

Death in his own family was a sore trial to him. In Tenth Month, 1896, his daughter Rosa, who had been long in delicate health, died in the faith of the humble Christian who confides in a loving Saviour's sacrifice. She was buried in the little churchyard of Marske by the Sea, where the cross over her grave could be seen from her father's windows. He bore the bereavement as a Christian ; but those who loved him noticed how much he felt it. Still he followed his usual occupations with conscientious assiduity.

Late in Seventh Month, 1898, he went to speak at a political meeting at Callington in Cornwall. Whilst there he was seized with a sudden addition to the physical weakness under which he had suffered for some months past. The physicians called in took a serious view of his case ; he knew it and said, "I desire to die as a Christian." All fear of death was taken away from him. Faith in the blood of Christ - the sense that his sins were pardoned - was over all. For many days hope and fear influenced those about his bed. There seemed at one time such a rally, as gave reason to hope that he might at least be removed to his own house by the sea, where he so much longed to be ; but such was not permitted. On Seventh-day, the 27th of Eighth Month he passed, as we reverently trust, to the many mansions already prepared for those that love their Lord.

On Ninth Month 1st he was buried in the churchyard at Marske, beside the child he had loved so well. It was a striking scene ; the open grave, the tributes of flowers, with hundreds of neighbours and friends around the grave. The peer, the peasant, the miner, all came to show respect to one who had shared their labours, and many to bear witness to the power of his ministry. The ministers of the Society of Friends, and those of the Established Church stood side by side at his grave in all harmony, and each spoke that which was given him to say. How beautifully appropriate are the words: "Therefore my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

An intimate knowledge of all questions connected with the coal trade made Arthur Pease a valuable member of the Durham Coal Trade Association, and he was a member of the owners' side of the Durham Reconciliation Board. He was prominently before the public during the protracted negotiations arising out of the minimum wage agitation, and was one of the three members representing the Durham owners on the Coalowners' committee appointed to meet the Government and the Miners' Federation's representatives. On the formation of the Joint District Board for Durham in April, 1912, under the Minimum Wage Act, he was appointed to state the case of the coalowners. He was also a vice-chairman of the Cleveland Mineowners' Association. He held office as Second Civil Lord of the Admiralty in 1918-19, and was created a baronet in 1920. He was elected chairman of the Durham County Council in 1922, and had done good work on that body as the chairman of the Higher Education Committee. He was a J.P. and D.L. for the county of Durham, and was High Sheriff in 1920. Always a keen lover of sport, he was regularly to be seen with the Zetland Hounds, and on occasions with the other packs hunting North Yorkshire and South Durham. In politics he was an ardent Unionist, and had been president of the Darlington Unionist Association from its formation in 1910. Sir Arthur Pease married, in 1889, Laura Matilda Ethelwyn, daughter of Mr. Charles Peter Allix, of Swaffham Prior House, Cambridgeshire. She survives him, with one son and three daughters. His son, Captain Richard Arthur Pease, who succeeds him in the title, was born in 1890, served in the Great War, married Jeanette Thorn, daughter of the late Gustav Edward Kissel, of New York, and has two sons and one daughter. Sir Arthur Francis Pease (1880), 1st Bart., created 1920 ; MA (Cantab.) ; DL ; JP ; High Sheriff, Co. Durham, 1920 ; Second Civil Lord of the Admiralty, 1918-19 ; Chairman, Durham County Council, 1922. From Oatlands he went on to Brighton College and Trinity College, Cambridge ;

Pease, Sir Arthur Francis, first baronet (1866-1927), coal owner and industrialist, was born at Hummersknott, Darlington, on 11 March 1866, the eldest son of Arthur Pease, coal owner and MP, and his wife, Mary Lecky, daughter of Ebenezer Pike of Bessborough, co. Cork. He came from a Quaker family which had long been associated with industrial development in Durham and Yorkshire. He was the great-grandson of Edward Pease, railway projector; grandson of Joseph Pease [see under Pease, Edward], also a railway projector, and the first Quaker to sit in parliament; and nephew of Sir Joseph Whitwell Pease, first baronet, of Hutton Lowcross and Pinchinthorpe, who for nearly forty years represented a Durham constituency in the House of Commons. Pease was educated at Brighton College, and at Trinity College, Cambridge, and received a business training in Darlington with the family colliery concern, Pease & Partners. Pease was fortunate to avoid the financial catastrophe which afflicted the family bank, J. and J. W. Pease, in 1902, when negotiations for a takeover by Barclay & Co. revealed the bank to be insolvent. Pease had earlier sold his interest in the business to his uncle, Sir Joseph Whitwell Pease, whose estate was forfeited to meet liabilities in excess of £400,000. A portion of this sum was owed to Pease & Partners and it was owing to Arthur Francis Pease's acknowledged non-involvement in the bank's collapse that he was able to become chairman and managing director of that concern in 1906. In the course of time Pease became

associated as chairman or director with numerous coalmining and other industrial undertakings in the north of England; he was also a director of Lloyds Bank and of the London and North Eastern Railway Company. In 1889 he married Laura Matilda Ethelwyn, daughter of Charles Peter Allix, of Swaffham Prior House, Cambridgeshire, who survived him; they had a son and three daughters. Pease became known to the public as a prominent negotiator when an organized demand arose among miners for a minimum wage. He was one of three representatives of the Durham owners who served on the committee of coal owners which was appointed in 1912 to meet the government and the Miners' Federation. Subsequently, when the joint district board for Durham was set up under the Minimum Wage Act of 1912, Pease was called upon to state the case for the owners. After the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, Pease's great experience of industrial affairs was at once available for the government, and during the years 1914-21 he was an active member of many government committees. He held office as second civil lord of the Admiralty from 1918 to 1919, and was created a baronet in 1920. In the conduct of labour relations Pease departed from the principles of conciliation and arbitration which had informed Sir Joseph Whitwell Pease's stance as a negotiator in the Durham coal industry in the two decades before 1900. These were the years of 'Lib-Labism' when organized labour accepted a subordinate position in the hierarchy of liberal capitalism. As a unionist, Pease rejected this philosophy, especially in the years after 1906 when employers and trade unionists in the coal industry began to mobilize on a national basis in the face of declining productivity and profitability. In the great disputes of the 1920s Pease was a firm advocate of the view that, in the event of trade union opposition to wage reductions in response to trade depression, employers should resort to the tactics of the lock-out. Pease devoted much time to the affairs of his native county. He was elected chairman of the Durham county council in 1922 and took an especial interest in education. He was a JP and a deputy lieutenant for the county of Durham, and in 1920 he served as high sheriff. During the First World War he helped to raise the 18th battalion of the Durham light infantry. Preoccupation with business affairs prevented him from seeking election to the House of Commons, but his strong political sympathies induced him to act as president of the Durham Unionist Association from the time of its formation in 1910. He was devoted to all forms of sport and was a regular follower of the Zetland hounds. Pease's health eventually became precarious as a result of overwork, and he died at his home, Middleton Lodge, Middleton Tyas, near Darlington, on 23 November 1927, after a cerebral haemorrhage during a meeting of directors. His son, Richard Arthur Pease, succeeded to the baronetcy.

General Notes: Saturday 4th January 1936 - When I came in, there was a message from Dick Pease to say that his mother Ethelwyn had died peacefully this morning – I do not know how old she was (68? 69?) – they were married in 1889 - & Arthur died in 1927 –

From the time that Betty & I married in 1922, neither Arthur nor Ethelwyn took any notice of us socially – which to say the least was mannerless & gratuitously offensive – Even when we lost our little Judy & I had to meet Arthur on business a few days after her death - he never said a kind word or alluded to it – When Arthur was not well, he proposed to come here to talk business with me – but Betty after 4 years

of their insulting attitude said "No!" - & I told Arthur it could not be -

No one else unless it was Mrs Clive Dixon & Alice & Evelyn behaved in this way for a time & Herbert & Claud were quite nice – Since Arthur's death there has been no association whatever – There was a vein of jealousy in Ethelwyn but she was a capable woman & a good mother – but like Arthur had a hard & nasty side – she never got on with Herbert & Alice nor with Jack & Elsie – Elsie however was always nasty to the Arthur Peases especially to Lucy! In old days I had very nice times with Arthur, Ethelwyn & the girls & the change that came over them is rather difficult to understand.

Born into an old Banffshire Jacobite family - he traced his origins to Adam Duff of Clunybeg in 1590 - he was imbued by his mother, Lydia, in the notion of public service as an end in itself. While his impeccable vowels enunciated an education gained at Eton and Sandhurst, he was never slow at employing the native Doric. However, challenged once during a council meeting that he was a landed Tory of the old school, he retorted: "Tory, yes. Landed, yes - if you count 13 acres as 'landed'."

His ability to think out of his conventional upbringing won him the political friendships he readily used when projects were being driven through - in education in Banffshire days, and as chairman of water with Grampian. His quarter-century of council service ended at the height of Margaret Thatcher's unpopularity in Scotland during a purge of Conservatives in the 1986 local elections. But his public mission continued, serving as deputy-lieutenant to two Banffshire lord lieutenants, his elder brother, Robin, and latterly one-time Banff County Council colleague James McPherson. Young Lachlan's father was killed in action with the Gordon Highlanders in Flanders a month before his birth in 1914.

He grew up in Cornhill in Banffshire, always knowing Robin would inherit the lairdship of Drummuir and Park. Active in the TA from youth - he joined the 1st Bn Gordon Highlanders in Edinburgh in 1935 - he served in Gibraltar and Singapore before being transferred to Orkney as adjutant of the newly formed 7th Gordons after the outbreak of the Second World War. The 7th Gordons were later included in the Highland Division re-formed after losses at St Valery in 1940. As company commander he saw action in Libya, Tripoli, North Africa and Sicily, and was second-in-command at Lubeck. After leaving the Army in 1947, he combined farming in Argyll with service in the TA, rising to colonel and commanding the 8th Bn Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders for eight years from 1951.

Following divorce from his first wife, he returned to his Banffshire roots in 1960, living and farming at Park House.

After the death of his second wife, he left Banffshire to live with his old friend, Bee Dufort, in Langley, Cheshire, devoting his time to researching the life of the soldier father he never knew. In 1997, aged 82, he published With The Gordon Highlanders To The BoerWar And Beyond, an immediate bestseller chronicling his father's exploits. Col Lachlan Cecil Gordon-Duff TD DL JP; born November 23, 1914, died January 6, 2005.

THROUGHOUT the Cold War years, a high level of surveillance was maintained by the four powers, especially in Berlin. British, American and French troops watched the movements of the Soviet army carefully, as, of course, the Soviets watched their erstwhile allies.

The British Commanders'-in-Chief Mission to the Soviet Forces of Occupation in Germany (Brixmis), and its Soviet counterpart, Soxmis, had been established in 1946 to build co-operation between the British and Russian occupying forces at a senior level. They soon became espionage divisions – although the official shield continued to display both the Union flag and the hammer and sickle.

Each kept a careful eye on the individuals attached to the other's embassy, taking note of all troop movements and – perhaps most significantly – any new weapons seen on parades. In the 1970s Major Simon Gordon-Duff served with a division of the British forces which collected intelligence through covert activities. It was a dangerous and demanding job with several missions being carried out in East Germany.

Gordon-Duff displayed a cool nerve – especially during one incident in 1976 when his car was forced off the road in East Germany.

Simon Lachlan Gordon-Duff was the son of Major Lachlan Gordon-Duff, whose family roots were in Aberdeenshire. The family could also trace their origins back to the 1745 rebellion, when their forebears rose at Glenfinnan to support the cause of Charles Edward Stewart.

After attending Eton, Gordon-Duff was commissioned into the Scots Guards in 1961 and trained as a helicopter pilot. His first tour of duty was with the 1st Scots Guards in Borneo. He served during the Indonesian/Malayan confrontation, a fiercely fought and intermittent battle (1962-66) over the future of the island of Borneo between British-backed Malaysia and the troops of Sukarno's Indonesia.

In 1967, Gordon-Duff was seconded to the 1st Irish Guards to serve in Cyprus and the Middle East. In Aden, his skill as a helicopter pilot was tested during a reconnaissance manoeuvre. He came under attack from enemy groundfire but kept his nerve, returning safely to complete his mission. For his courage and professionalism he was mentioned in despatches. In 1968, he was transferred to the Army Air Corps.

In 1972, Gordon-Duff was transferred to Berlin to serve with Brixmis. Although the Cold War tension had somewhat relaxed, the espionage remained at a high level and it was viewed as a challenging posting. The Allied forces were operating under the added hazard of being watched closely by the East German police; they invariably created problems for any proposed visit to the eastern sector.

In September 1976 Duff-Gordon and two colleagues were returning from a mission to observe Soviet army manoeuvres outside Dresden. Their car (clearly marked as a Brixmis official vehicle) was forced down a subsidiary road by two motorcyclists. As they were turning to return to the main road the car was rammed by an East German air force lorry, which then left at speed. Gordon-Duff and the driver were concussed as their car rolled over and landed in a ditch while the third member of the party suffered more serious injuries. They were helped by locals, and an ambulance was called which took them to the nearest hospital.

Gordon-Duff remained in hospital for more than a fortnight and on his return to Berlin an official complaint was lodged with the East German authorities. Throughout the situation, though, Gordon-Duff took a typically calm and measured approach which ensured the incident was downplayed and no further action was deemed necessary. He retired from the army in 1985 and managed the Cotswolds branch of the estate agency Knight Frank & Rutley. Typically, he viewed this as no part-time retirement job and became active in the area and an authority on its property, often quoted in the local and national media. It was a time of much expansion in the Cotswolds as the area was rapidly becoming popular for second homes.

Gordon-Duff was a highly respected soldier and his colleagues remember him as a "true officer and a gentleman" with a generous nature and courteous manner that helped him achieve considerable success in both his careers.

He is survived by his wife, Caroline, whom he married in 1990, and a stepson. The Scotsman

Tony Maude - who came to warn us that I should be much shocked to see Bobby Pike or "Piko" (23 jan 1858-29 jan 1933), as he is called - that he was a mental & physical wreck & kept himself going on whisky too much - All of which we found too true **Thurs 7 April 1932** - We travelled to Ferns & reached Ravenswood (Newtownbarry) for lunch - were warmly welcomed by Piko who has been counting on our coming - We stayed with him from 7th to 18th April - the fishing was exceptionally bad this season & the weather unfavourable & the water too cold, but Betty fished hard & enjoyed it in spite of every discouragement & did better than neighbouring expert rods some of which did nothing - she landed 2 19lb salmon & some old kelts - I fished very little, partly because I wished to be with Piko & to cheer him up and also because I was so breathless - this breathlessness is alarming & distressing to me & attacks me about 2.30 - 6 a.m. at night and with walking - not in fishing - I only fished about 3 times & landed one nice 10 lb fish & a big fish 20 to 30 lb brok me - I was interested in seeing Ireland again - it must be well over 40 years since I was at Arklow & Wicklow & c (It was 1887 - 45 years earlier) - the country is most wonderfully improved, tidied up, better farmed, better buildings, people better off - But wire has quite spoilit if or hunting - it is dreadful everywhere - There is still the old feeling of insecurity, apprehension & suspicion in the air with de Valera & the murderers now in power - The treachery & cruelty of the bad R. Catholics in the 'bad years' makes decent people trust no R. Catholic servant. The man who is most detested for suppressing Irish news in England and in preventing the murderers and burners from being prosecuted

We went to see Sir Richard & Lady Butler whose place was burnt down - nice people living in a cottage by the ruins - Col. Kavanagh & Mrs K we met, & we lunched one day at Ballin Temple - Mrs Arthur K is my 3rd cousin & as a little girl stayed with us at P'thorpe when her father Gurney Buxton had the Westerdale shootings - her mother, Alice Birkbeck was my 2nd cousin -

I went one day to Dublin with Piko & lunched at the Kildare St. Club - met Maude there Col. Brown-Clayton, a Guinness &c -

Capt. Tony (Anthony Fritz) Maude spent 3 nights at Ravenswood, he is a charming man, gave Betty lessons, & we had much talk - I have seen him in past years judging hunters at the Royal Shows in England. I was telling him of my memories of his wife's grandfather the Archb'p of Armagh, Primate of all Ireland in the sixties when he lived as we did in Prince's Gardens - & of the State he kept always driving to the House of Lords & everywhere in a great State Coach with 2 or 3 footmen with staves behind & a wigged coachman on the hammer-cloth, all in full liveries like other big people had -& he told me his wife remembered my father sending 2 brace of grouse to the Archb'p but they arrived during a month when he had let the P. Gdns house, & his tenant bagged them & wrote to the Archb'p to say "he had eaten them in his name" which the Archb'p indignantly considered "damned cheek". I also told Maude we used to play with 3 very naughty girls in Princes Gdns, his cousins, daughters of Lord Howarden - he said they grew up "very wicked women" ! - He confirmed my story that they then had an uncle living (?Francis Maude) who remembered his grandfather who lived in the reign of Chas II! - but this is the fact:- Capt. Second and youngest son of Robert Lecky Pike, D.L., of Kilnock, Tullow, Co. Carlow, and of Mrs. Pike.

Captain Pike entered the Royal Navy in 1903, but, owing to an accident, which left him with a stiff knee for life, was invalided out three years later. At the beginning of the War, in September, 19 14, he joined the Royal Flying Corps, took his pilot's certificate after a month's training and quickly became an expert airman. He remained in England until the end of January, 1915, when he went to the Front. Three months later he was promoted Flight-Commander and temporary Captain. He was killed on August 9th, 1915, flying a De Haviland Scout, fighting two German aeroplanes single-handed near Hooge. He defeated one of the enemy machines, but whether he was shot down by the other or by shell-fire from below is not known. He fell in the German lines and died almost immediately. A German message was picked up in our lines saying that he had died a gallant death and had been buried in a churchyard close by, with full military honours.

Oswald was born on 31 Mar 1880 in Auckland, New Zealand, died on 6 May 1952 in London at age 72, and was buried in West Dean, Alfriston, East Sussex. They had two children: **Maxime Gabrielle** and **Marcus Lecky Oswald Hornby**.

General Notes: Birley, Sir Oswald Hornby Joseph (1880–1952), painter, was born on 31 March 1880 in Auckland, New Zealand, the son of Hugh Francis Birley, of St Asaph, north Wales, and his wife, Elizabeth, daughter of George McCorquodale, of Newton-le-Willows, Lancashire, while his parents were on a world tour. He was their only child and his father was determined to ensure the development of his son's artistic talent which had shown itself at an early age. He was educated at Harrow School and then, in 1897, was taken by his father to Dresden, Munich, and Florence. In 1898 he went up to Trinity College, Cambridge, and then to Paris in 1901 where he studied under Marcel Baschet at the Académie Julian and exhibited regularly at the Salon until 1904. In 1905 he visited Madrid, staying there for almost a year and executing a series of copies from Velázquez which presented him with an ideal and helped him to formulate his style. From 1906 Birley was working in London, rapidly establishing a reputation as a portrait painter and exhibiting his portraits at the Royal Academy from 1904 and almost every year thereafter until 1945. In 1907 he was one of the co-founders of the Modern Society of Portrait Painters, exhibiting alongside his friends and principal rivals, Glyn Philpot and Gerald Kelly, both of whose portraits he painted about this time (both National Portrait Gallery, London). From an artistic viewpoint, much of his best work, including interiors such as Room at James Pryde's (1914; sold Christies, Charleston Manor, Sussex, 3 October 1980, lot 25), was executed during this period.

In 1914 Birley enlisted in the Royal Fusiliers with whom he served until 1915 when he was transferred to the intelligence corps, flying as an observer with the Royal Flying Corps. He became a captain in 1916 and received the MC in 1917. In 1921 he married Rhoda Vava Mary Lecky Pike (1900–1981), daughter of Robert Lecky Pike, of Kilnock, co. Carlow (they had one daughter and one son), and the following year moved to 62 Wellington Road, St John's Wood, London, which had been built for him by Clough Williams-Ellis.

In the 1920s Birley's painting began to change rapidly, the artist using coarser brushwork and his approach becoming increasingly literal, but this had no discernible effect on his burgeoning career as a society portraitist. He received his first royal commission, a portrait of George V for the board of the National Museum of Wales in 1928; and thereafter he was to paint virtually every member of the royal family including Queen Mary and George VI (1945), and Queen Elizabeth, Elizabeth II, and Prince Philip (1949). He painted Stanley Baldwin twice (1928, Goldsmiths' Company; 1939, formerly

Carlton Club, London), Neville Chamberlain (1933, City of Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery), a bluff portrait of Ernest Rutherford (1932) for the Royal Society, and, as well, a large Conversation Piece (1937) for The Times. A series of painting travels included, besides Europe, visits to the United States (1922 and subsequently); Mexico in 1926, where he painted President Plutarco Calles; India (1927 and subsequent visits), which produced some of his more inspired 'off-duty' work; and Siam in 1929, where he painted the king and queen.

In 1943, while serving with the Sussex Home Guard, Birley lost the sight of an eye in an accident when a weapon exploded, but he adapted himself with great patience to his partial loss of vision. He painted most of the statesmen and military leaders of the war, particularly a series for the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, of George VI and his admirals, and four portraits of Winston Churchill with whom he sometimes painted in the south of France.

Birley, who was a member of the Royal Society of Portrait Painters from 1912 and latterly its vice-president, was knighted in 1949. In 1951 an exhibition of his work, ranging over half a century, was held at the Royal Institute Galleries in London. A year later, after a final visit to the United States and a long period of increasingly poor health, he died at his London home on 6 May 1952. He was buried in the country churchyard at Westdean, near his Sussex home of Charleston Manor. The house and garden subsequently became well known for an annual festival of music and the arts organized by his widow, herself an amateur painter, until shortly before her death in 1981. His daughter was the designer and fashion writer Maxime de la Falaise (1922– 2009) and his son the club owner Marcus (Mark) Birley (1930– 2007).

Captain Birley, as he continued to call himself, was indeed described by The Times (7 May 1952) as looking more like a soldier than a painter. Exceptionally handsome, he had immense charm which must in no small degree have accounted for the success of his portrait practice. Although a number of obituaries expressed surprise that he had never been elected a member of the Royal Academy, it was presumably for the same reasons that none of his work was ever acquired by the Tate Gallery or any of the major municipal art collections. In addition to the collections already mentioned, however, his portraits are also found in the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, Edinburgh (Lord Reith, 1933) and the Imperial War Museum, London.

General Notes: Maxime de la Falaise (1922–2009), model, designer, fashion writer, food columnist, and gallante, was born Maxine Birley at the Corner House on 22 June 1922. She had a French governess, and every summer was spent in the south of France. During the Second World War she served in the Women's Auxiliary Air Force and worked briefly at Bletchley Park, but was invalided out after an episode of kleptomania and sent by her parents to America. There she worked for Vogue and met Alain Richard Le Bailly de la Falaise. Comte de la Falaise et de Courdroye (1903–1977), an aspiring publisher, whose brother Henri had been married to the American actress Gloria Swanson. Birley and de la Falaise married in London on 18 July 1946. They had a daughter, Louise (Loulou) (1947–2011), later a fashion designer and muse to Yves Saint-Laurent, and a son, Alexis (1948–2004), later a furniture designer. During this marriage, which ended in an acrimonious divorce in 1950, she had several lovers, including Duff Cooper, the British ambassador in Paris, and an Italian playboy. In the 1950s, moving between London, Paris, and Provence, and by now calling herself Maxime (rather than Maxine), she worked for Elsa Schiaparelli, and modelled for photographers including Cecil Beaton, who described her as 'the only true hardcore chic Englishwoman of her generation' (The Times, 9 May 2009). She also began designing clothes for Hubert de Givenchy and on her own account; she supplied designer clothes to Marshall and Shelgrove department store among other outlets. Her reputed lovers in this period included the painter Max Ernst and the film director Louis Malle. During the early 1960s she lived with the American artist Bernard Pfriem, first in Provence and then in Greenwich Village, New York. On 6 July 1967 she married John Joseph McKendry (1933–1975), the Calgary-born curator of prints and photographs at the Metropolitan Museum of Modern Art, New York. McKendry was numbered among the lovers of the photographer Robert Mapplethorpe, whose work

millionaire John Paul Getty III. In the 1980s she moved to St Rémy-de-Provence, where she lived with Sarah St George, daughter of Edward St George, the Bahamas developer and racehorse owner, and granddaughter of William Hill, the bookmaker. She died at St-Rémy-de-Provence on 30 April 2009.

General Notes: Desmond FitzGerald, the 29th and last Knight of Glin who died on September 14 aged 74, was a connoisseur of the decorative arts who worked for the Victoria and Albert Museum and the fine art auctioneers Christie's and, as a campaigning president of the Irish Georgian Society, helped to save many architectural treasures over the Irish Sea from dereliction or insensitive development. The greater part of his energies, however, he devoted to restoring and preserving his family's ancestral seat of Glin Castle, on the Shannon estuary in Co Limerick. The Knight of Glin, also called the Black Knight, is one of three ancient Irish hereditary titles dating from the 13th and 14th centuries and recognised by Irish Republican governments. (FitzGerald's kinsman, Adrian FitzGerald, the 24th Knight of Kerry, is known as the Green Knight; Maurice FitzGibbon, who died in 1611, was the 12th and last White Knight.) The Black Knights descend from a younger or illegitimate son of John FitzGerald, 1st Baron Desmond, grandson of Maurice FitzGerald, a companion-in-arms of Strongbow, the 12th century Norman conqueror of Ireland. Glin, an estate which once encompassed more than 30,000 acres, was granted to this branch of the FitzGerald family in the early 14th century by their overlord at the time, the FitzGerald Earl of Desmond.

Unlike their ill-fated overlords, the Knights of Glin survived both the Elizabethan conquest of Ireland and the Cromwellian and Jacobite wars, even though they were invariably on the losing side. In 1567 the then Knight of Glin, Thomas FitzGerald, was hanged, drawn and quartered and had much of his estate confiscated for his role in the Desmond Rebellion against Elizabeth I. Legend has it that his mother seized his severed head and drank his blood before gathering his body parts for burial. In the Jacobite wars of the 17th century another Knight was told that if he did not surrender, then his six-year-old son (who had been kidnapped and tied to a cannon) would be blown to bits. He replied that as he was virile and his wife was strong, it would be easy to produce another son. Other colourful ancestors include "The Cracked Knight", who is said to have ridden his horse up the back stairs; "The Big Knight", who took solace in the whiskey bottle; and "The Knight of the Women", who was reputed to have fathered at least 15 illegitimate children, but was forgiven because he was a Gaelic scholar (and native speaker) revered by the local people. But Desmond FitzGerald would refer to the "general improvidence" of his ancestors. For generations the Knights of Glin kept debt collectors at bay by setting a mob on to them, although the 21st Knight, Richard, spent time in a Dublin prison for unpaid monies. By the time the 24th Knight, Colonel John Bateman FitzGerald, inherited the castle in 1781, the debts could no longer be avoided. The original medieval castle of Glin was a ruin and the Knights had moved into a new "castle" — in reality a long thatched house overlooking the River Shannon. Expensive carriages, 5,000 acres of land and many treasured family heirlooms had to be sold to make ends meet.

The Colonel's marriage to Margaretta Maria Gwyn, a wealthy Englishwoman, led to a temporary respite in the family's inexorably declining fortunes. He added a large Georgian house to the castle in 1795, where she oversaw the installation of neo-classical plasterwork ceilings and a dramatic double flying staircase. But they never got around to finishing the third floor and, when the Colonel died in 1803, it was found he had no money left. An auction was held of the entire contents of the house — the only things not sold were the family portraits and the library shelving. In the 1820s "The Knight of the Women" added battlements and false arrow loops, but the third floor remained unfinished — a maze of exposed rafters and bat colonies. Yet the family was tenacious in hanging on to what remained of its patrimony. In 1923 Desmond's grandfather, the 27th Knight, saved the castle from being raided by a Sinn Fein mob. Confined to a wheelchair after a stroke, he refused to leave the castle, roaring: "You'll have to burn it with me inside, boys." On hearing this, the rebels were said to have dispersed to a village hostelry while the Knight used the petrol they had left behind to run the farm machinery.

Desmond FitzGerald inherited the castle and title aged 12, on the death of his father from tuberculosis in 1949. By this time, all that remained of the estate was 500 acres of park and grazing land. The castle was dilapidated and there was very little good furniture.

Things began to look up after his mother, Veronica, married again in 1954. Her second husband was the Canadian millionaire, Ray Milner. Together they set about restoring Glin Castle after centuries of neglect and, after moving back to Glin from London in 1975, Desmond and his wife Olda threw their own energies into the project. They spent decades combing auction rooms in an attempt to buy back the pictures, drawings and china that had been sold in leaner times, steadily restoring the fabric of the building and "filling in the incomplete pretensions of the 18th and 19th century" as Desmond put it, including completing the top floor. A plaque in the garden bears the legend 1785-2002 — a construction span of 217 years.

They started a bed and breakfast business and in 2002 turned the castle into a small hotel which did well for a number of years, and where the 29th Knight, a youthful and handsome figure into his 70s, continued to cut a dash in his signature tweed jacket and black polo neck sweater. But the international credit crunch and the Irish economic nosedive hit them hard and finances became increasingly strained.

In 2009 hundreds of paintings and objets d'art from Glin Castle went under the hammer at Christie's, raising two million euros: "Glin has been the ancestral property of my family for over 700 years," FitzGerald explained. "It is my greatest hope that it will continue to remain in the family and be enjoyed and cherished long into the future." Desmond John Villiers FitzGerald was born on July 13 1937, the youngest of three children and an only son. His father, the 28th Knight of Glin, was a keen fisherman and driver of vintage sports

cars, for which he was known locally as "the Nippy Knight". His English mother, Veronica Villiers, was a considerable beauty and a cousin of Winston Churchill. His parents' marriage was tempestuous, but the children did not see them much. Desmond, along with his sisters, Rachel and Fiola, lived in four dilapidated rooms on the unfinished third floor of castle, while their parents occupied the main floor. He described his childhood as lonely.

During the Second World War (in which the Republic of Ireland was neutral), his father tried to join the Irish Guards but failed the medical. Desmond recalled an occasion when, holidaying in County Kerry, they discovered that a German was staying at the same hotel: "My mother, who was a very forthright woman, informed the manager that she would not have dinner in the company of a German, so she ordered her dinner in her bedroom. All the other people in the hotel followed her example, which caused quite a ripple. She had a plan that if they came up the river Shannon, she would ask all the officers to dinner, and when they sat down, they would be given poisoned soup."

Desmond was sent to England from the age of eight and claimed to have gone to "more schools than you've had hot dinners". But he settled down at Stowe, an "architectural paradise" which inspired him to study Architecture and Art History at university.

He first went to the University of British Columbia, where his mother lived part-time after her second marriage. He then took a Master's degree at Harvard. In 1965 he moved to London, where he got a job at the Victoria and Albert Museum as a curator in the furniture department.

FitzGerald had collected antiques from his early teens and in London he spent much of his spare time prowling around antique shops, finding it possible to buy Irish antiques quite cheaply, as few people knew anything about Irish furniture, and Irish collectors concentrated on silver and glass.

It was around this time he met his first wife, Loulou de la Falaise, who would become famous as the muse of Yves St Laurent, but the marriage lasted less than a year. They remained friends, however, and in 1970 he married Olda Willes, a great friend of Loulou's.

After returning to Ireland in 1975 FitzGerald was appointed Christie's Irish representative and became involved in the Irish Georgian Society, founded in 1958 by Desmond Guinness. "While a certain animosity still exists towards these homes given that they were arguably the product of an enslaved society," he argued, "people should remember that the craftsmen who fashioned them came from the Irish community as a whole." He served as the society's president from 1991.

FitzGerald wrote and lectured extensively on Irish art, architecture and decorative arts. A governor of the National Gallery of Ireland, he published a family history, The Knights Of Glin in 2009. Other books he published included Irish Furniture (2007) and The Irish Country House (2010, both co-written with James Peill). He was also elected a member of the Royal Irish Academy and served on the boards of the Irish Landmark Trust and the Castletown Foundation.

Desmond and Olda FitzGerald had three daughters; the eldest, Catherine, is married to the actor Dominic West and was previously married to the Earl of Durham. The Knight was philosophical about having no son to inherit the Glin title and estate: "I can't really feel too sad about it. A male heir would have inherited an impossible burden". None the less Olda, Catherine, Honor and Nesta FitzGerald intend to continue the restoration of Glin Castle to which he contributed so much.

9-Marcus Lecky Oswald Hornby Birley⁵⁷ was born on 30 May 1930 in Corner House, 62 Wellington Road, St John's Wood, London and died on 24 Aug 2007 in Charing Cross Hospital, Fulham, London at age 77. Another name for Marcus was Mark Birley.

General Notes: Birley, Marcus Oswald Hornby Lecky [Mark] (1930–2007), club owner, was born at midnight on 29–30 May 1930 (his birth was recorded as 30 May), at the Corner House, 62

Wellington Road, St John's Wood, London, the only son of Sir Oswald Hornby Joseph Birley (1880–1952), portrait painter, and his wife, Rhoda Vava Mary (1900–1981), daughter of Robert Lecky Pike, high sheriff of co. Carlow. His only sister was Maxime de la Falaise [see below]. He was educated at Eton College, and had a year of philosophy, politics and economics at University College, Oxford, before failing his prelims. On 10 March 1954 he married Lady Annabel Vane-Tempest-Stewart (b. 1934), younger daughter of Edward Charles Stewart Robert Vane-Tempest-Stewart, eighth marquess of Londonderry. They had two sons, Rupert (1955–1986, presumed drowned off the coast of west Africa) and Robin (b. 1958), and a daughter, India Jane (b. 1961). In 1964 his wife became maîtresse-en-titre of his boon companion Jimmy Goldsmith: the Birleys subsequently separated, and were divorced in 1975 after she had had two of Goldsmith's children. Although Birley was a considerable philanderer, who ranked sex before cigars, wine, and dogs as life's four chief pleasures, he was profoundly depressed when his wife left him. During the 1950s Birley worked for J. Walter Thompson's advertising agency. Beginning as David Hicks's successor as the art department's paste-up boy, he was later art director of the Horlicks advertising campaign and redesigned Tatler. In 1959 he opened the first London shop of the luxury-goods firm Hermès in Jermyn Street. There he honed his skill in convincing customers that spending large sums on trifles showed discernment.

In 1962 Birley's friend John Aspinall opened the Clermont gambling club at 44 Berkeley Square, and leased its basement to him. He started with a piano bar of two rooms, dug out the garden, extended his premises to Hay's Mews, and opened a nightclub with dining tables and dance floor in 1963. It was named Annabel's after his wife. As the son of artists he had a good eye for pictures, and indeed for visual impact: his eclectic collection of paintings and sketches (many of them canine), together with rich textiles, created an air of Edwardian luxury. He was often said to have devised a country-house effect, but his arrangements were too flawless and contrived for country-house living. The balance between Birley's stylish, old-money clients and the parvenus, who were indispensable to the profitability of his club, was always precarious. There was an influx of property developers and ill-starred secondary bankers in the 1970s. During the 1980s Arab businessmen with their escorts were conspicuous at its dining tables. The crisis in the Lloyds insurance market had a greater impact on Annabel's than any other event: the old-money membership greatly receded in the early 1990s. After 2000 Annabel's membership lists were revived and enhanced by his daughter, India Jane, who refitted the club and made Annabel's a sexy brand for the rich young crowd working in the hedge funds and private equity companies with headquarters near Berkeley Square.

Birley opened a second club, Mark's, at 46 Charles Street in 1969. This was a luncheon and dining club, serving English fare, intended to vie with Wilton's restaurant in Jermyn Street. Men could talk business there, which was prohibited in St James's Street clubs, in a luscious atmosphere of country-house living in the Sassoon or Rothschild manner. It was a thundering success with its members. In 1975 Birley leased a former wine merchant's premises at 26 South Audley Street, where he created a restaurant, Harry's Bar. Named after Giuseppe Cipriani's famous bar in Venice, the restaurant had a Milanese menu (Alberico Penati was renowned among London chefs) and Venetian décor, in which Fortuny fabrics were juxtaposed with works by the New York cartoonist Peter Arno. Unlike Mark's Club it was intended to attract women habituées. For thin ladies who lunched, as well as American visitors and devotees of Italian cuisine, the food and ambience were sublime. Prices were exorbitant: at one time Harry's Bar was the highest grossing restaurant per square foot in the world. Birley considered it to be his apogee. In 2001 Birley opened another dining club, George, at 87– 8 Mount Street. The Bath and Racquets Club, a private men's gymnasium at 49 Brook's Mews, was another Birley operation, with his hallmarks of elegance, luxury, and exclusion. Its steam-rooms, showers, and urinals were made of green onyx. He also opened an interiors emporium in Pimlico Road in 1973 and a cigar-shop and vintners in Fulham Road in 1978.

Birley's mother had been cruelly unloving: he detested her memory. As a result he found his satisfactions in objects rather than people, in material perfectionism rather than demonstrative affection. He lacked empathy with women, preferred dogs to humans, was mistrustful and emotionally constipated, sometimes melancholic. Standing 6 feet 5 inches tall, he had daunting manners, chill formal elegance, and despotic habits. His temperament was imperious, peremptory, irritable, and impatient. Selfish about his personal convenience, and self-indulgent about his comforts, he was nevertheless Berkeley Square's Beau Brummell, who set the fashions of his set. People savoured his dry, dismissive wit: when asked at a dinner what the French excelled at, he paused for effect before replying, 'they are very good at raking gravel'. Although he was loyal to select friends there was a lifelong rupture with Aspinall. He could be charming when in a good mood, but was intolerant of failure or imperfection. His businesses were ruled with a close scrutiny and relentless insistence on quality. He travelled widely to copy good ideas or filch staff. Employees were carefully selected, and treated with paternalistic generosity: Annabel's head doorman earned enough to put his son through Harrow and Cambridge.

Birley smoked ten cigars a day even after a threatening heart by-pass operation. In his final years he suffered long spells of hospitalization, had a publicized estrangement from his surviving son, Robin, and in June 2007 sold all his club interests for a reported £90 million to Richard Caring, who had made his first fortune in the garments trade and already owned The Ivy and Le Caprice restaurants. Birley died at Charing Cross Hospital, Fulham, London, on 24 August 2007, of a spontaneous intracranial haemorrhage. His funeral at St Paul's, Knightsbridge, on 19 September 2007 was attended by, among others, Prince and Princess Michael of Kent.

PIKE, WILLIAM WATSON, Major, was born 10 March, 1860, son of the late William Pike, J.P., of Glendaray. He entered the Army in 1882, and became Major, Royal Army Medical Corps, 4 Feb. 1894 (12 years' service). He served in the South African War, 1899 to 1902; was present at the Relief of Kimberley; took part in the operations in the Orange Free State, Feb. to May, 1900, including operations at Paardeberg (17 to 24 Feb.); actions at Poplar Grove and Dreifontein; operations in the Transvaal, east of Pretoria, July to 29 Nov. 1900; operations in Cape Colony, south of Orange River, 1899-1900; operations in Cape Colony, 1901. He was mentioned in Despatches [London Gazette, 8 Feb. and 16 April, 1901); received the Queen's Medal with five clasps; King's Medal with two clasps; and was created a Companion of the Distinguished Service Order [London Gazette, 19 April, 1901): "William Watson Pike, Major, Royal Army Medical Corp . In recognition of service during the recent operations in South Africa." The Insignia were pre ented by the King 3 June, 1901. He became Lieutenant-Colonel 4 Feb. 1903; Colonel, 9 Nov. 1911. Colonel Pike served in the European War from 1914; was appointed Deputy Director of Medical Services 31 Oct. 1915: Director of Medical Services, 1st Army, B.E.F., 1 Nov. 1915, to 20 July, 1917; was promoted to Temporary Surgeon-General 1 Nov. 1915, and to Major-General 3 March, 1917. He was mentioned in Despatches; created a C.M.G., 1916, and a K.C.M.G., 1919. Sir W. W. Pike was a Rugby International, Ireland, 1879- 3, and a Hockey Inter-Provincial, Ireland, 189. He is an F.R.C.S.I.

Major-General Sir WILLIAM WATSON PIKE, K.C.M.G., D.S.O., R.A.M.C. (ret.), died at Lincoln on June 26, aged 81. He was born in Co. Mayo on March 10, 1860, the son of the late Mr. W. Pike of Glendaray, and was educated at Dublin, taking the L.R.C.P. and S.I. in 1880 and the F.R.C.S.I. in 1888. In his student days he was a famous rugby international, playing at three-quarter back in the Irish team on several occasions. He entered the Army as surgeon in 1882, reached the rank of full colonel in 1911, was specially promoted to surgeon-general for distinguished war services in 1917, and retired in 1920. He served throughout the South African War of 1899-1902, when he took part in the relief of Kimberley; in operations in the Orange Free State, including the actions of Paardeberg, Poplar Grove, and Dreifontein; in the Transvaal, including actions at Pretoria; and in Cape Colony; was twice mentioned in dispatches and received the Queen's medal with five clasps, the King's medal with two clasps, and the D.S.O. In the war of 1914-18 he served first as A.D.M.S. of a division. then as D.D.M.S. of a corps, but in 1917 as D.M.S. of the Fourth Army. He was then sent to East Africa to confer with General Smuts on the medical organization of the troops in that theatre of war. In 1918-19 he was serving in India on special duty and on his return home was made a K.C.M.G. Before receiving this honour he was mentioned in dispatches three times and received the C.M.G. as well as a special promotion. Sir William Pike had been a member of the British Medical Association for thirty five years. In 1886 he married Sara Louisa, daughter of Mr. E. Wheatley; she died in 1918, leaving a daughter who married Colonel 0. Y. Hibbert, and died in 1935.
